#### TOWN WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Sanbornton in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town hall in said Sanbornton on Tuesday, the 9th day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the decoration of soldiers' graves, and the proper observance of Memorial Day.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to secure State Aid for the permanent improvement of highways.
- 5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for payment of town debt.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars for the control of the White Pine Blister Rust.
- 7. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to distribute the resident blanks for inventories at the time they appraise the property to be taxed.

- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Old Home Day.
- 9. To see if the town will authorize the road agents to purchase snow fence.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to sell the railroad stock.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to install three street lights at the Square when the electric power is available.
- 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Sanbornton:

I herewith submit my fourth annual report as superintendent of Sanbornton schools.

This past year, like the year before, five schools have been in session for the full time required by law. Two new teachers were obtained for the present school year, one for Calef Hill, the other for the Meadow.

The former proved unsatisfactory in her discipline and was replaced at Christmas.

At the present time all the teachers seem to be satisfactory to everybody concerned, and school affairs are running smoothly.

. The pupils seem much interested in their work in all the schools, and the attendance has been exceptionally good thus far, though the Meadow school has given some trouble in this respect.

There is noted improvement in the general attitude of the children toward school work in comparison with that of even two years ago. There is more wide-a-wake interest, more eagerness to do things, greater desire to excel. This is due in part to better teaching, in part to the increased activities within the school room, correllated with regular school work, that appeal to the imagination of the active child. If he reads the story of the three bears, he loves to act it out and be a bear. He loves to go to his seat and draw, rudely perhaps, the three chairs, the three beds, and the three bowls of soup. The story is made real to him and he comes to like his reading because it is full of life. The older children, too,

are responding to that urge to be doing something constructive, and they are drawing, or cutting pictures to paste, illustrating some phase of their study lesson.

It is these things, I believe, that is making the school room a more enjoyable place to live in, and studies something more than a task. The improvements made in the school rooms themselves—new floors, etc., and lighter paint brightening the whole appearance of the room, has undoubtedly had its influence upon the children to make their school life pleasanter.

The Calef Hill school is the next one that should be made more cheerful, by a coat of lighter paint to cover the somber color now there.

The action of the trust fund trustees, in granting a substantial amount from the John Doe Taylor fund, No. 1, to be used in purchasing supplementary material for school use, is much appreciated by myself, the teachers, and all the pupils. This will be another means of improving the quality of school work. This material will be purchased only as it can be immediately used for real need in doing more efficient work.

One outstanding weakness of the Sanbornton schools has been the lack of adequate books and supplies to do either the quantity or the quality of work that should have been done. The amount alloted from the fund is going to be a much needed means of help in remedying this weakness.

It is pleasing that the pupils who have gone from our seventh and eighth grades to Tilton, Franklin and Laconia are all doing so well. It speaks well for the preparatory work done in our schools.

I again wish to acknowledge the splendid co-operation of the Board, and their interest in the best welfare of the schools. I wish to thank the teachers for their faithful labors, and compliment them for splendid results obtained.
