TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Warren in the Coun-

ty of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at The Town Hall in said Warren on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1 To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3 To hear the reports of selectmen and other Town Officers and pass any vote relating thereto.

4 To bring forward your ballots for the election of Delegates at Large, Alternate Delegates at Large, Delegates and Alternate Delegates to the National Convention of the various political parties to be held to nominate party candidates for President and Vice President of the United States.

5 To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget act.

6 To see what action the town will take in regard to a bonus for Dr. F. J. Kasheta and to pass any vote relating thereto.

7 To raise and appropriate money toward support of town poor.

8 To see if the town will accept State aid for the construction of the Class 11 road known as the Lake

Tarleton Road, and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose, the sum of \$861.00; or will accept State aid for the construction of Class V roads, and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$270.93.

9 To raise and appropriate money to maintain highways and bridges, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

10 To raise and appropriate money for town library.

11 To raise and appropriate money for Memorial Day.

12 To raise and appropriate money for cemeteries and to pass any vote relating thereto.

13 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum sufficient to complete the waterhole near the Swain Hill road.

14 To raise and appropriate money for support of fire department.

15 To raise and appropriate money to maintain street lights.

16 To see what sum of money the town will raise to pay on notes held by F. B. Little.

17 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30.00 to purchase equipment for a municipal Christmas tree.

18 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to dispose of the town farm buildings.

19 To see if the town will vote to have a budget committee and to pass any vote relating thereto.

20 To raise and appropriate money for other town charges.

21 To authorize the selectmen to distribute inventory blanks at the time they examine and appraise taxable property.

22 To see if the town will vote to allow discount on taxes on real estate and personal property if paid on or before such time as the town may vote.

23 To authorize the selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

24 To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

In addition to the information brought out in the above tables, I would like to call attention to a few other facts. The per cent of attendance for last year for the whole state was 94.66, while that for Warren was 92.99. It seems as though attendance might be improved if some of the simplest rules of hygiene were carefully observed. The school nurse would, of course, be glad at any time to confer with parents on matters of diet, cleanliness, clothing, and prevention of colds. We were fortunate to have federal funds available for supplying milk to twenty-four pupils during the five winter months, and the treatment of sixty-three children at the dental clinic in November. The transportation furnished by some of the friends of the school was a help in making this clinic a success.

In the summer, the school at Glencliff was painted on the inside and the replacing the old desks by the modern adjustable type was completed. So far as may be ascertained at the present time, the equipment and buildings are in very good condition.
