## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bow, in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Bow on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Art. 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Art. 3. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for Town maintenance of high-ways and bridges.

Art. 4. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate for street lights, \$2,000.

Art. 5. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$200 for Blister Rust Control.

Art. 6. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for Old Home Day.

Art. 7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$569.63 for the maintenance of the Baker Free Library.

Art. 8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$100 for cemeteries.

Art. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$565.48 for Town road maintenance. The State to give \$2,261.93 making a total of \$2,827.41 for Town roads.

Art. 10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,208.00 for state aid construction.

Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen power to sell or lease or rent property deeded by the Collector to the Town.

Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote to accept bequest of \$75 from Abigail Hemphill, income to be used for care of her lot in Evans Cemetery.

Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the cross road leading from Fletcher Clough's house to the turnpike, so-called.

Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to extend electric service from Batchelder's Corner to the fox farm on the turnpike.

Art. 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 16. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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### To the Citizens of Bow :

During the last few years, the State Board of Education has been faced by the necessity of reducing the number of supervisory Unions in the state. In some cases this has meant the complete breaking up of Unions, assigning those school districts to adjoining groups. In the last two years the town of Bow has had two changes. In the fall of 1933, when Superintendent Roberts resigned, Bow was made a part of the Union of which George Sumner, of Penacook, was the superintendent. The following year, 1934, Bow was taken from that Union and assigned to the Goffstown Supervisory Union, where it is at the present time. Such changes are not welcomed by School Boards. But as matters were, the School Boards did not do the deciding nor did the State Board have any choice. The rearrangement and re-organization which had to be brought about was a difficult task, but done with complete knowledge of the situation to be met, and knowledge, too, regarding the School Districts and Unions involved.

The High School tuition rate is \$100 per pupil per year in both Concord and Manchester.

During the months since I began this work, I have had the cordial and willing co-operation of the members of the School Board and teachers. I wish to express to them my genuine appreciation.
