

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Center Harbor in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Center Harbor on Tuesday, the 9th day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for repairs of highways and bridges.
- 4. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to hire money for town purposes, in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to raise money to defray expenses for Memorial Day, and if so, how much.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise \$797.25 to defray the expenses of electric street lights in Center Harbor Village.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise money for aid to the Laconia Hospital, and if so, how much.

- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise \$2,000.00 for welfare work.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to raise \$800.00 for the maintenance of the Fire Department.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$84.00 to the Lakes Region Association of New Hampshire for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region.
- 11. To see how much money the town will vote to apply to the town debt.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to accept Class V road assistance, the town to raise the sum of \$204.25 and the State to contribute \$817.00.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to raise money for Band Concerts in Center Harbor, and if so, how much.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to raise money for oil to be applied to roads, and if so, how much.
- 15. To see if the town will choose an agent or agents to care for the fountain at Center Harbor Village.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to provide additional fire, police and health protection due to the war emergency.
- 17. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

- 18. To see if the town will chose a committee to take charge of the wharf, and make regulations for same.
- 19. To see if the town will choose an agent or agents to care for the cemeteries throughout the town.
- 20. To choose agents and committees in relation to any article in the warrant and hear reports of any heretofore chosen.
- 21. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting. Given under our hands and seal, this day of February, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and forty-three.

One class in Home Nursing and two classes in First Aid were held during the winter of 1942 and 5 classes in First Aid were held at two of our girls' camps. Six women from Center Harbor attended the nutri tion class in Meredith, and a very good First Aid Cen-

ter has been set up in the library basement.

The Junior Red Cross held their roll call in November and they also have been active. They collected scrap iron, for which they received \$43.00. \$33.00 of this amount has been turned into the Relief Fund.



REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Changes in Teaching Staff and Administration

Three changes in the teaching staff are noted for the present year. Both Miss Moulton and Miss Sargent left Center Harbor last June to secure positions elsewhere, and the village school continues under Mrs. Newman and Mrs. Bartlett. The Town House School started the year under Mrs. Weeks, but at Thanksgiving she asked for a leave of absence, which was granted; and Miss Cox was employed in her place. We are fortunate, in a time of such scarcity of good teachers, to find experienced people for all these positions.

Due to the small enrollment at West Center Harbor—only two pupils in that district residing in this town—it seemed advisable to close that school last June. A number of children, however, live just across the line in Holderness; so the Holderness School District has voted to maintain the school for the present year, renting the building from us and accepting our two as tuition pupils. Mrs. Smith continues as the teacher, being employed by the Holderness School Board.

School in War Time

More and more the impact of wartime conditions is making itself felt in the lives of our children. Although we may work earnestly to provide the normal conditions of work, play, and growth to which childhood is entitled, it is increasingly difficult to do so.

Your teachers and superintendent are called on to devote many hours to duties quite apart from the job you are paying them to do. The rationing of food and fuel oil, and the sale of war stamps and bonds, represent only a part of our duty to Uncle Sam and the boys in the service. In order to save gasoline and tires, it has been necessary to check over with care all the school bus routes in the nation. These routes have been com-

bined in some cases, and frequently shortened, requiring children to walk part-way between home and school. Lack of transportation has also obliged us to curtail

teachers' meetings for the duration.

Some benefits to children, however, may develop out of the war emergency. An increased emphasis on health and physical education is one important advantage. Many teachers have availed themselves of the First Aid courses conducted by the Red Cross. Much attention is being given to the matter of nutrition of growing children, and school lunches are provided in many schools throughout the country. Special efforts are being made to interest children in gardening under the "Food for Victory" program. Such things as these ought not to have to wait until a war comes; and they should be continued after the conflict is over.

Practical aspects of education, especially as related to war service, are emphasized, more particularly with high school pupils. The progress of aviation demands more emphasis on mathematics, mechanical skills, study of weather conditions, and principles of flight. A new slant on geography has been developed; the distance between two cities may now be measured as a straight line, even though a range of mountains may lie between them.

School costs shot upward rapidly during the course of the first World War in 1917 and 1918. The teacher shortage is definitely more serious now than it was then, and the high wages now paid for various types of war work are influencing the trend of teachers' salaries today. No one can foretell with accuracy what the prevailing rate of increase may be for next year, but it takes no prophetic insight to forecast some increase in the salary schedules of teachers in general throughout the State.

Very successful Dental Clinics were held last spring with Doctors Pottle and Deneault in Meredith. A summary of the clinics show that 19 pupils were treated with a total of 102 operations.

During the past year 6 pupils have obtained glasses.

One pupil was taken to the chest clinic.

One pupil had a tonsil operation.
