To the Inhabitants of the Town of Chesterfield in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Chesterfield on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next at 6:30 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects. (Polls will open at 1:30 P.M. — close not earlier than 9:00 P.M.)

Article 1. To vote by Australian Ballot for all necessary Town Officers.

Article 1-A. To vote by ballot on amendments to the Zoning Ordinance.

Article 2. To determine the method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 4. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and act thereon.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the following sums, as approved by the Budget Committee for:

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,738.00 for street lighting. (\$3,125.00 approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$714.00 in support of the Elliot Community Hospital for the year 1967. (Aproved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$482.94 (six cents per \$1,000.00 of the Town's equalized valuation) to the Monadnock Region Association, an agency to advertise, promote and preserve the natural advantages and resources of the Town in cooperation with the other 37 Towns of the Monadnock Region. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,248.95 for Town Road Aid, thereby receiving an additional \$8,326.34 from the State. (Aproved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,000.00 for Winter Maintenance of roads. (12,500.00 approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and apropriate the sum of \$18,000.00 for Summer Maintenance of roads. (\$16,500.00 opproved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the repair and upkeep of Highway Equipment. (\$1,500.00 approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500.00 for the continuation of Road Improvement on our Town Highways. The location of the work to be under the supervision of the Selectmen in cooperation with the

Road Committee. (\$3,000.00 appr. by the Budget Committee.)

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to make a water hole for fire purposes on the land of Lyle Chickering, adjacent to the home of Lawrence Chickering; and to put in a dry hydrant on Pond Brook near the junction of the Curt Chickering and Lasky roads. (Budget Committee approved \$250.00 for a dry hydrant.)

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$4,000.00 to repair and reconstruct the section of Streeter Hill Road from the Fairbanks corner to the Hartt residence or to act accordingly. (1,000.00 approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 to widen and resurface that part of the North Shore Road leading around Spofford Lake known as "Namaschaug Hill." (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 to gravel and blacktop the Holman Hill Road to the residence of Richard Woods, four tenths of a mile. (Submitted without recommendation.)

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,000.00 to gravel and blacktop the road to the residence of Henry Hellus, seven tenths of a mile, or act thereon. (Not approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the purpose of clearing up and leveling off the parcel of land deeded to the Town by the Harry Allen Estate, thereby making lots available in the Spofford Cemetery. (Aproved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 20. To see if the Town will authorize the Road Agent to repair two culverts in Spofford; (1) on Cross Street near the junction of Spring Street, and (2) on Spring Street near the pond known as Lake Elizabeth; funds for this to be taken from the maintenance account.

Article 21. To see if the Town will instruct the Selectmen to move the extra street light on the west side of Spring Street and Route 9 to a point near the intersection of Route 9 and Route 9A East of Spofford village.

Article 22. To see if the Town will raise the sum of \$125.00 to install 3 street lights between the residence of Imogene Chick-

ering and the residence of Paul Stalk. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,900.00 to install a furnace in the Town Hall. (Submitted without recommendation.)

Article 24. To see if the Town will appoint a Citizens Action Committee, the purpose of which shall be to bring to the attention of the Board of Selectmen all violations of the Chesterfield Zoning Ordinance. Said Committee shall also initiate necessary follow-up action so that either compliance, penalty, or other resolving action will be effected. Written or verbal reports of alleged violation, not previously directed to the Selectmen, may be directed to said Committee for investigation. Said Committee shall be appointed by the Moderator and shall consist of no more than three members, none of whom shall be Selectmen.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to use the World War II Memorial Fund in capital reserve to pay for the Monument authorized by the Memorial Committee.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from the estate of Florence R. Bennett, the income to be used for the care of the T. N. Robertson Cemetery.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from George L. Fuller, the income to be used for the perpetual care and upkeep of the George L. Fuller lot in the Spofford Cemetery.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Wilfred H. Richardson, Sr. and Helen E. Richardson, income from same to be used for perpetual care and upkeep of the Wilfred Richardson, Sr. lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Eva G. Robbins Kingsbury, the income from same to be used for perpetual care and upkeep of the Herbert E. Robbins lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Article 30. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from John Orr and Arvid Pearson the income from same to be paid annually for perpetual care in Spofford Cemetery and to be known as the Orr and Pearson Trust Fund.

Article 31. To transact any other business that may legally

come before this meeting.

TOWN MEETING 1966

Proceedings of the Annual Meeting of the Voters of the Town of Chesterfield, New Hampshire called at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, March 8, 1966.

The meeting was called to order at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon by the Moderator, James E. O'Neil, who read the Warrant through Article 1 and declared the polls open for voting by Australian Ballot for all necessary Town Officers. Gerald Knickerbocker and Mildred Gauthier took their oaths of office as Assistant Moderator and Assistant Clerk respectively.

At 6:30 o'clock the Moderator again called the meeting to

Voted on motion made by Lester Chickering and supported by Russell Johnson to dispense with reading the Warrant. The Articles were then disposed of as follows:

Article 2. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Robert Callahan to continue the method of collecting taxes as in the past. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 3. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Clifford Chickering and supported by Robert Callahan to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes in 1966. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 4. The Chairman of the Budget Committee, Robert Callahan, reported for the Budget Committee. He stated that they had three executive meetings and one public meeting, and that they were disappointed in the number of voters in attendance at the Public Meeting. That they considered the Articles of the Warrant carefully and that their report was given on pages 18 to 20 inclusive. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Russell Johnson to accept the report as given. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 5. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Winston Cray and supported by Francis Hall to amend the Article, Section 3 and raise \$1,900 instead of \$1,600 for Election and Registration expenses as this is an Election year. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry Winn and supported by Lester Chickering to accept the Article as Amended. Vote declared by the

Moderator to be carried in the affirmative and the following sums to be raised and appropriated:

Article 6. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Francis Hall and supported by Harry Winn to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,525.00 for street lighting. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 7. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Warren Allen and supported by Agnes Chickering to raise and appropriate the sum of \$728.00 in support of the Elliot Community Hospital for the year 1966. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 8. Voted by voice vote on motion made by A. Davies Allen and supported by Russell Johnson to raise and appropriate the sum of \$482.94 (six cents per \$1,000.00 of the Town's equalized valuation) to the Monadnock Region

Association, an agency to advertise, promote and preserve the natural advantages and resources of the Town in cooperation with the other 37 towns of the Monadnock Region. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 9. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Lester Chickering to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,257.47 for Town Road Aid, thereby receiving an additional \$8,383.13 from the State. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 10. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Gerald Knickerbocker and supported by A. Davies Allen to amend the article and reduce the amount of \$12,000.00 called for in the Article by \$2,000.00. This motion did not carry in the affirmative. A vote by voice vote on motion made by Lester Chickering and supported by Russell Johnson to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000.00 for Winter Maintenance of roads. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 11 Voted by voice vote on motion made by Winford Chickering and supported by Marjorie Stoddard to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,000.00 for Summer Maintenance of roads. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. Arvid Pearson suggested that he would like to see \$3,000.00 of this sum to be raised to be earmarked for cutting brush and for guard rails.

Article 12. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Callahan and supported by Harry Winn that the amount called for in this Article be cut by \$1,000.00. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. A vote by voice on a motion made by Harry Winn and supported by Robert Callahan to pass the Article as amended and raise the sum of \$1,500.00 for the repair and upkeep of Highway Equipment was declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 13. Voted by voice vote on a motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Winford Chickering to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the continuation of the Road Improvement on our Town Highways. The location of the work to be under the supervision of the Selectmen in cooperation with the Road Committee. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. It was asked that the Road Committee be listed in next years report.

Article 14. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by A. Davies Allen to amend the article and buy two trucks by doubling the amount of money to be raised. This motion did not carry. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Lyle Chickering and supported by Lawrence Chickering to pass over the Article. This vote also did not pass. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Russell Johnson to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,000.00 for the purchase of a new Town Truck and Plow. \$3,000.00 to be raised by taxation this year, the balance to be paid the following year. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 15. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry Winn and supported by Robert Callahan to amend the Article and reduce the amount to be raised to \$200.00. Vote on the amendment declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Russell Johnson to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the purpose of Highway Beautification. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 16. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Winston Cray to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000.00 to make a water hole for fire purposes on the land of John Parker, opposite the home of Jack Gold. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 17. A motion was made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Arvid Pearson to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 to blacktop a section of Edgar Road from Maple Lane leading to the Westmoreland Road, approximate distance of ½ mile. This road has insufficient drainage and heavy rain and snowwater wash out the road and hill (towards Kendall Morses' property) every year. A permanent black top would cut down the high cost of upkeep of this road. A vote by show of hands was asked. Then Dexter Thomas asked for a paper ballot. The paper ballot resulted in whole number of votes cast 138. "Yes" had 73 and "No" had 65. Vote was declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 18. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Margaret Schlichting and supported by Ronald Guyette to authorize the Road Agent to repair two culverts in Spofford; (1)

on Cross Street near the junction of Spring Street and (2) one on Spring Street near the pond known as Lake Elizabeth; funds for this to be taken from the maintenance account. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 19. Voted by voice on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Esther Grout to improve the road to the Spofford Cemetery and raise \$300.00 for the same, the funds to be taken from Road Improvement Plan. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 20. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Russell Johnson to raise the sum of \$1,500.00 for the construction of a hard surface access road from Route 63 to a point near the Old Building Site, in the new Morris Friedsam Cemetery. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 21. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Agnes Chickering to raise the sum of \$750.00 for completing the work in that part of the Morris Friedsam Cemetery, now under development.

Before taking up the next two Articles the meeting was recessed to enable the Planning Board to hold a hearing on the proposed changes in the Zoning Laws, which was conducted by Hadley Winn, Chairman, after which the meeting was called to order and consideration of the Articles in the Warrant continued.

Article 22. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Mary Gold to amend Article IV, Section B of the Zoning Ordinances to read: A single Trailer or Mobile Home may be located anywhere in Town, except in the area specified in Article III, Section D, or in any other area in Residential District No. 1, provided it meets the minimum standards as follows: Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 23. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Woodman and supported by E. Davies Allen to amend Part I to read "To prohibit any sign to be erected in Residential District No. 1, within 500 feet of any residence (the distance to be measured along the Public Highway) and at least 50 feet from the center of the Highway, except signs pertaining to the residence of or businesses conducted by taxpayers of the town provided the business is located in town." Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Robert Woodman that the Article as amended be adopted, namely:

1. To prohibit any sign to be erected in Residential District No. 1, within 500 feet of any residence (the distance to be measured along the Public Highway) and at least 50 feet from the center of the Highway, except signs pertaining to the residence of or businesses conducted by taxpayers of the Town provided the business is located in town.

2. No sign erected in accordance with Section A, shall be

larger than 4 feet by 8 feet in size overall measurement.

3. Any sign larger than 4 feet by 8 feet in overall measurement must be erected at a minimum distance of 200 feet from the center of the road and 500 feet from any residence.

Vote declared by the Moderateor to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 24. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Agnes Chickering and supported by Winston Cray to accept the sum of \$100.00 from William D. Pierce to be added to the present fund, the income from same to be used for the perpetual care and upkeep of the Henry Pierce and William D. Pierce burial lot in Spofford Cemetery. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 25. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Francis Hall and supported by Arvid Pearson to accept the sum of \$50.00 from the Chesterfield Cemetery Commission. The income from same to be paid annually to the Chesterfield Cemetery Commission for perpetual care in the new annex to the Spofford Cemetery and to be known as the Emil Ferm Trust Fund. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 26. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Winston Cray and supported by Francis Hall to acept the sum of \$100.00 from Alfred Adam, to be known as the John Cleveland Trust Fund, income from same to be paid to Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for perpetual care and upkeep of the John Cleveland Burial Lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 27. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Francis Hall to accept the sum of \$75.00 from the Chesterfield Cemetery Commission the income from same to be paid annually to the Chesterfield Cemetery Commission for perpetual care in the new Spofford

Cemetery Annex and to be known as the Patmos Wheeler Trust Fund. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 28. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Winston Cray to accept the sum of \$100.00 from the Chesterfield Cemetery Commission, the income from same to be paid annually to the Chesterfield Cemetery Commission for perpetual care in the new annex to Spofford Cemetery and to be known as the Ray E. Fowle and Bradley C. Miller Trust Fund. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

H. Claude Mowry eulogized the late George Barrett, saying that he had always been willing to serve his community in many capacities and the Moderator declared a moment of silence in respect to his memory.

Mrs. Margaret Dittrich asked about the World War 2 Memorial Fund, and why nothing had been done about it.

The Moderator recessed the meeting at 9:30 and adjourned the meeting at 9:24.

A count of ballots cast resulted as follows:

Total number of names on Checklist 813
Total number of ballots cast 348

For Town Clerk: Imogene L. Chickering had 330 votes and there were 2 scattered votes. Imogene L. Chckering was declared elected.

For Selectman. Clifford E. Chickering had 215 votes, Leonard A. Laskowski had 124 votes, Robert Galloway had 4 votes, Francis Hall had 1 vote. Clifford E. Chickering was declared elected.

For Treasurer. Dorothy C. Spaulding had 314 votes and there were 7 scattered votes. Dorothy C. Spaulding was declared elected.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

TO THE CHESTERFIELD SCHOOL DISTRICT

To the Citizens of Chesterfield:

The Chesterfield Elementary School began the school year under the capable direction of Mr. John Goodwin, the new principal, and several experienced teachers who have been with us for a year or more. These teachers are Mrs. Regis Lysitt, grade 1; Mrs. Carolyn Scruton, grade 2; Mrs. Eleanor Fuller, grade 3; Miss Diane Parks, grade 4; Mrs. Dorothy Dunn, grade 5; and Mr. Martin Fitzgerald, grade 6.

To replace the teachers who left at the end of the school year we were fortunate to hire Miss Ruth Kupfer, grade 1; Miss Brenda Chickering, grade 2; Mrs. Kathleen Cody, grade 4; Mr. Randall Locke, grade 5; Mr. Ronald Barnett, grade 6; and Mrs. Blanche Brown, grade 8. Mrs. Audrey Ericson was hired as a substitute to replace Mr. Lawrence Jackson.

Needless to say the past year was a most difficult one to find suitable replacements. With the tremendous teacher shortage and the late summer release of two teachers, a great deal of time was required to find individuals, to say nothing of finding individuals fully certified. However, as of the mid-year, we have a full complement of teachers in the school.

Water Survey

Article 5 of the 1966 school warrant granted the district \$800 to conduct a water survey for purposes of finding water for the school. This survey was conducted during the summer and fall of 1966 under the direction of Dr. Charles Ratté, Water Consultant, from Brattleboro, Vermont. Several test holes have been made in some of the suggested areas. However, we have not as of this time found water.

The survey, which had to be terminated during the late fall, will be continued this spring and brought to a conclusion.

Union Reorganization

Early in the year Mr. Newell Paire, Deputy Commissioner of Education, informed the board and the administration of the new union reorganization planned for the 1967-68 school year. As part of the reorganization Chesterfield as well as Westmoreland, Nelson, Harrisville, and Marlborough will be added to the Keene School District to form the new Supervisory Union #29 under Mr. John Day, Superintendent of Schools. This change will become effective on July 1, 1967.

Transportation

The school board asked for bids to transport its students to the Chesterfield Elementary School and the Keene High School for a period of three years with a three option subject to negotiation. The bid was awarded to the Cheshire Transportation Company of Keene at a figure of \$18,990 plus \$300 for two feeder routes. Included in the bid but not as part of the \$18,990 was an option for a 3rd late trip from Keene for students wishing to participate in sports or other school activities. The use of such an option was surveyed with those answering favoring such a trip late in the day.

Proposed Bulding Plans

As a result of funds made available at our last district meeting, Mr. John Holbrook of Keene has drawn up several proposals to add classrooms to the Chesterfield School to meet the anticipated growth for the 1967-68 school year. These plans have now been laid aside for at least another year due to falling enrollments and a much smaller anticipated first grade.

Present plans anticipated a first grade of 29 students which is hardly large enough to warrant division but is substantially great enough to justify a teacher-aid to work with the first grade teacher.

The same situation will face next year's second grade.

With the first and second grades as single units, there will no longer be a need for a classroom in the auditorium for the 1967-68 school year. However, some consideration will have to be given another year for future expansion and growth. Should, however, the pouplation continue to decline, it is very possible Chesterfield could continue its program for two years without being forced once again to use the auditorium as a classroom.

The 1968-69 school year will absolutely be the last year Chesterfield will be able to continue without some new construction of some sort.

Title II

The Supervisory Union No. 60 has completed its 1965-66 Title II project. The books and materials purchased with the funds made available are now in the various schools and being used by the students.

Tuition

The final tuition figures for Keene and Brattleboro are \$660 \$926 respectively. What is readily apparent to all of us is that there is a difference of \$266 for each student between Keene

and Brattleboro systems. With the junior and senior year enrollment (No. 25) next year in Brattleboro, this means we must pay an additional \$6,650 over and beyond what it would cost us to educate these same children in Keene.

CHESTERFIELD SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM REPORT

July 1, 1955 to June 30, 1966

The hot Lunch Program opened September 13, 1965, with Mrs. Louise Scharles as Manager and Mrs. Elli Herrick as her assistant. Mrs. Herrick resigned at the end of the School year and Mrs. Marion Berry was hired as Assistant.

The reimbursement rate from Federal Funds remained at 4¢

for each Type A meal served to Children.

From the Government we received Surplus Commodities, which made it possible to keep up the rate of 26ϕ a meal until March 1966. However at the beginning of 1966 Commodities were drastically reduced by the Government, which made it necessary to buy larger quantities of food at the market. This situation made it impossible to keep up the old price of 26ϕ a meal and the School board decided to raise the price of School Lunches to 30ϕ for Children and 35ϕ for Adults, beginning April 1966.

Under the Special Milk Program, we received 4¢ reimbursement for each ½ Pint of milk served.

Each day we served about 225 balanced meals.

Menues of the School Lunch Program are made up in advance for the entire month and copies are given to each child and teacher; thus the parents know what the children are eating each day.

Thanksgiving Day and Chirstmas, Turkey Dinners with all the trimmings were served with extra help.

The Lunch Program was managed without financial help

from our township.

Our Principal Mr. Robert Bellevance and his staff were always helpful supporting our program. I wist to thank them all and also Mrs. Elli Herrick, my assistant, for helping to make the Lunch Program a success.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

To the Citizens of Chesterfield:

On September 7, 1966, the Chesterfield Central School opened with an enrollment of 295 students, as compared with 309 in September of 1965. We reached a high of 302 students and are presently at 290. There is little doubt in my mind that the figure will be above 300 by the end of this school year.

This year we are faced with the same problems, as far as facilities are concerned, that were present last year. Our auditorium is being used as a classroom. This of course limits the usefulness of the auditorium for educational assemblies, play rehearsals, physical education, testing, or adequate lunchroom space. A classroom in the auditorium hampers the education of the children because naturally it cannot offer the advantages of a of a classroom. We have tried to minimize the undesirable effects (noise, interruption, limited blackboard space, lack of bulletin board space and other advantages that a classroom offers) by having students from grades six, seven, and eight share this classroom.

Title I

The Title I project under the Federal Act of 1965 is being continued with some modifications, the same as last year. Mrs. Dorris Parker is working on a half day basis with twenty children in grades one through three. She works with the children in groups of not more than five for a period of ½ hour each day. The subject areas covered are reading, phonics, and arithmetic.

Children involved in this special class, who have not been tested during the previous year, are being tested by Dr. Shankman from Keene State College. This will enable us to better understand each child and his needs. We will then be in a position to purchase special material and work the children

at their particular level.

This class must, by necessity, meet in an improvised classroom that was formerly part of the custodians' supply room. Despite this, it is felt that the program is progressing very well and should help the children involved find greater success in their school work.

Faculty

Again we are faced with the similar situation that has existed during the past years. With a staff of 13 teachers, we have seven new teachers, all except one who does not have prior experience. However, we are fortunate to find capable replacements through the efforts of Mr. Keach and Mr. Bellavance.

The following teachers are new to the school this year: Miss Ruth Kupfer replaced Mrs. Jobin in grade 1, Miss Brenda Chickering replaced Miss Kovacs in grade 2, Mrs. Kathleen Cody replaced Mrs. Dunn in grade 4, Mr. Randall Locke replaced Mrs. Blastos in grade 5, Mr. Ronald Barnett replaced Mr. Jobin in grade 6, and Mrs. Blanche Brown replaced Mrs. Hurst in grade 8. In grade 7 we have been unfortunate in that we had to replace Mr. Jackson with two substitutes, Mrs. Audrey Ericson and Mr. Robert Raymond, but, hopefully, this situation will be corrected shortly.

We are fortunate in having Mrs. Regis Lysitt in grade 1, Mrs. Carolyn Scruton in grade 2, Mrs. Eleanor Fuller in grade 3, Miss Diane Parks in grade 4, Mrs. Dorothy Dunn in grade 5 and Mr. Martin Fitzgerald in grade 6 return for another year.

WHAT ARE OUR NEEDS FOR THE FUTURS?

Education today is much more complex than it was just a few short years ago. We are living in a period of time when great advances have been made in all phases of life. To enable our students to cope with the problems that they will encounter we need to put greater resources into our educational progarm. This would include such things as adequate classrooms, kitchen space, lunchroom space, playground facilities, and an adequate library.

Our curriculum needs to be strengthened by improving the subject areas that we have and by adding art and a guidance program. Our music and physical education programs need to be expanded.

The most important phase of our educational program is an efficient and experienced staff. A good teaching staff is more important than the facilities or the materials that are necessary

to operate a school. A school can be no better than its teachers. Every effort should be made to secure the best possible teachers and to keep them.

SUMMARY

Despite the shortcomings that I have mentioned the total school program is functioning as well as could be expected.

We do have some advantages. We have been fortunate in replacing teachers who have left with good, although inexperienced teachers. We are extremely fortunate in having classrooms that are not overcrowded. This enables the teachers to give more individual attention which is so very important. Our first grades are small, which may concern some people, but these children are fortunate in that they receive from their teacher the attention that is especially important to get them off to a good start in their school career. More time can be spent with them and therefore the teachers can be more thorough in covering the materials that will be the foundation of their learning.

MONADNOCK CHILDREN'S SPECIAL SERVICES CENTER

Title III

This is a Center where school children may go to receive special help with school problems. It should be made clear at once that this Center is operated by your school district. Actually five supervisory unions in this part of New Hampshire worked together in planning the project and the plan was approved, and is financed by the United States Office of Education Act of 1965, or PACE program. It will serve as a model of what can be done to help school children with their problems, be they physical handicaps, learning problems, or the difficulties which arise when young people are upset and confused.

All in all, then the Center provides the type of help which local school districts could not afford on their own. Through the Center, it is possible to pool information on a pupil; his physical condition, his abilities and weak points. Having acquired a rather complete picture of the pupil, all concerned can sit dow ntogether to see that there is understanding and cooperation which is necessary to help the child.

The Center has received 150 referrals for help from the five school systems involved (Fall Mountain, Keene, Monadnock

Regional, Peterborough and Winchester) since our opening October 19, 1966. Some cases are completed, and others are in

various stages of procedure.

While there are many ways of referring a child to the Center, we will list the major ones: the school principal, school nurse, guidance counselor, the classroom teacher, the family doctor, or parents who feel children need help. There is no charge for any of the services provided at the Center, but parents are encouraged to cooperate in many ways, such as transportation to the Center when the child may be scheduled for any one of many evaluations.

As stated above, this is a pilot project, or a new idea, and is the only Center of its kind in the Eastern United States, and will require the support and interest of all involved, in order to do the very best possible job of helping children, which is

the sole reason the Center has been established.

High School. Seconded by Albert Bradstreet. On a voice vote the motion was unanimously carried in the affirmative.

Article 2. James E. O'Neil moved that the District accept the provisions of RSA-195-A (as amended)providing for the establishment of an area school or schools located in Keene to serve grades 9-12 from the School Districts of Chesterfield, Harrisville, Keene, Nelson, and Westmoreland in accordance with the provisions of the plan on file with the District Clerk. Seconded by Winford Chickering. A written ballot was had on the motion with the following results:

The Moderator declared the motion carried in the affirmative. The meeting was adjourned at 9:25 p.m.

SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

Chesterfield Central School Chesterfield, New Hampshire March 5, 1966

The Moderator called the meeting to order at 3:05 p.m. and the Clerk read the warrant through Article 1. The Moderator then declared the polls open for the balloting for the necessary District officers.

Prior to the meeting, the following ballot clerks were appointed by the school board: Agnes B. Chickering, Anna C. Hubner, and Phyllis Henchey. They took the oath of office from the Moderator. A count of the ballots showed 605 ballots.

Anna C. Hubner was appointed temporary Clerk to serve in the absence of the Clerk throughout the afternoon and evening. She took the oath of office from the Moderator. Otto W. Schlichting was appointed Assistant Moderator, and took the oath of office from the Moderator.

At 8:01 p.m., the Moderator again called the meeting to order, and the Clerk read the remainder of the Warrant.

The Articles were then disposed of as follows:

Article 2. Voted by voice vote on a motion made by James E. O'Neil that the Article be passed over. Seconded by Marilyn Hubner. Motion carreid in the affirmative.

Article 3. Voted by voice vote on a motion made by James E. O'Neil that the Article be passed over. Seconded by Glenn Chickering. The motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 4. Warren G. Allen gave the report of the School Study Committee. (A copy is filed with these minutes.) Clara B. Wellington moved that the report be accepted, along with the report of the Superintendent, principal, nurse, and the director of the school lunch program. Seconded by James E. O'Neil. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 5. Voted by voice vote on a motion made by James E. O'Neil that the district raise and appropriate the sum of eight hundred dollars (\$800) to make a water survey for school purposes. Seconded by Warren G. Allen. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 6. Voted by voice vote on a motion made by James E. O'Neil that the district raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) to provide funds to employ an architect to prepare preliminary plans and specifications for a school building addition. Seconded by Leonard Laskowski. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 7. Voted by voice vote on a motion made by James E. O'Neil that the district vote to instruct the Moderator to appoint a nine (9) member building committee to work with the school board on the building project. Seconded by Leonard Laskowski. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 8. Voted by voice vote on a motion made by James E. O'Neil that the Article be passed over. Seconded by Glenn Chickering, Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 9. Voted by voice vote on a motion made by James E. O'Neil that the district vote to authorize the school board to

enter into a tuition contract with Brattleboro School District. Seconded by Leonard Laskowski. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 10. Voted by voice vote on a motion made by James E. O'Neil that the district authorize the school board to enter into a tuition contract with the Francis Hicks and Austine Schools. Seconded by Agnes B. Chickering. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 11. Marilyn Hubner moved that the school board adopt a policy of providing transportation for all children that reside over one (I) mile from the school. Seconded by Anna C. Hubner. On a voice vote the motion was declared lost.

Robert Mills moved that the Article be passed over. Seconded

by George Joslin. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 12. Voted by voice vote on a motion made by James E. O'Neil that the district vote to accept the provisions of Titles I, II, & III Public Law 89-10 (Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965), and to appropriate such funds as may be made available to the district under said Federal Act for such particular projects as may be determined by the school board. Further, that the district authorize the school board to make application for such funds and to expend the same for such projects as it may designate. Seconded by George Joslin. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 13. Voted by voice vote on a motion made by James E. O'Neil that the district vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept and use in the name of the district, such advances, grants in aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States government or any department or agency thereof, or any state or private agency. Seconded by Leonard Laskowski. Motion carried in the affimrative.

Article 14. Voted by voice vote on a motion made by Warren G. Allen that under caption 1200, of the budget of the School District, item 1265 be amended to read \$800, and item 1266 be amended to read \$1000, and that the district raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred twenty-two thousand seven hundred seventy dollars (\$222,770) for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district. Seconded by Robert Woodman. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 15. James E. O'Neil moved that a rising vote of thanks be given to the School Study Committee for their excellent help and splendid cooperation given during the past year. There being no objections, this was done.

James E. O'Neil told the meeting of the coming retirement of Superintendent Elliot W. Keach as of July 1, 1966. This is the last annual meeting at which he will be meeting with us. Mr. O'Neil also spoke of the untiring efforts of Mr. Keach in building and maintaining the high level of instruction and progress in our school. A rising vote of thanks and good wishes was given Mr. Keach.

At 10:07 p.m., the meeting was recessed by the Moderator.

At 10:10 p.m., the Moderator declared the polls closed.

A count of the ballots resulted as follows: Number of votes cast 160.

For Moderator: Harry E. Winn had 155 votes. The clerk declared Harry E. Winn elected Moderator for the coming year. He took the oath of office from the Clerk.

For School Board Member for (3) years: Lillian Lane had 115 votes; Inez Laskowski had 36 votes, and Judith Chickering had 5 votes. Lillian Lane was declared elected a member of the School Board for (3) years by the Moderator. She took the oath of office from the Moderator.

For Clerk for the ensuing year:. H. Claude Mowry had 132 votes. H. Claude Mowry was declared elected Clerk for the ensuing year. He took the oath of office from the Moderator.

For Treasurer for the ensuing year: Evelyn L. Winn had 147 votes, and was declared elected Treasurer for the ensuing year. She took the oath of office from the Moderator.

For Auditors (2 required) for the ensuing year: Warren G. Allen had 25 votes; Carl Johnson had 13 votes; Margaret Dittrich had 7 votes; Wilber Dittrich had 5 votes; Barbara Melvin and Freda Davis each had 2 votes, and there were four (4) scattered votes. Warren G. Allen and Carl Johnson were declared elected Auditors for the ensuing year. They took the oath of office from the Moderator.

At 10:46 p.m., the Moderator declared the meeting adjourned.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Fire records are made by people—those who cause fires and those who control them. Your forest fire warden, deputy wardens, fire chief and firemen have, in spite of a prolonged drought, made one of the best fire control records in recent years. Despite a very dry spring, we in New Hampshire working together, have substantially reduced our fire incidence (885 in 1965 to 595 in 1966.)

This enviable record is largely due to two factors:

- 1. A closely coordinated and integrated state-town organization jointly carrying out programs of forest fire prevention, training and suppression with dedicated personnel.
- 2. Your appreciation of our forest fire control program and your individual effort in practicing fire prevention.

Statistics show, however, there is room for improvement. Major problems are still with us; (1) the careless disposal of cigarettes; (2)the householder's carelessness in burning rubbish; (3) the failure of woodlot owners and contractors to completely extinguish their brush burning fires; (4) failure to extinguish camp fires; (5) unsupervised children playing with matches.

New Hampshire has 4,339,000 acres of woodland to be protected. In 1966 we experienced 595 forest fires on this area and restricted acreage burned to 395 acres—a fine testimonial to the efficiency and dedication of the men who make up our forest

fire control organization.

- 1. If you must burn you will need a permit. Permits are not issued between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. except on rainy days. Permits are not needed when the ground is covered with snow. To minimize risk the best way to dispose of rubbish is at your authorized town or municipal dumping area.
- 2. Be sure all discarded smoking material is out.

3. Don't leave a live camp or cooking fire.

4. Most important - Instruct your children that matches are not play things.
