#### TOWN WARRANT

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF CONWAY, County of Carroll in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Kennett High School Auditorium at Conway, New Hampshire, on Tuesday, the second day of March, 1976, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects hereinafter set forth. Voting on ARTICLE I will be by official ballot and the polls shall open for balloting at nine o'clock in the forenoon or as soon thereafter as the Moderator calls the meeting to order and declares a quorum present. The remaining articles of the Warrant shall be acted upon at seven o'clock in the evening or at the closing of the polls if the meeting shall vote to keep the polls open to a later hour.

## ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary officers.

ARTICLE 2. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the following purposes:

#### COUNTY TAX

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$105,300.00 for the purchase and renovation of a new police station and authorize the withdrawal of \$80,000.00 for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 with the balance to be raised by taxes; and, further, to authorize the Selectmen to reduce said \$80,000.00 to the extent estimated entitlements are reduced or take any other action hereon. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,530.00 for the purpose of providing monitoring and communications equipment, an auxiliary generator and furniture for the proposed new police station, said sums to be expended only to the extent that they are ninety-five per cent reimbursed by federal and/or state agencies. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire upon the credit of the Town such sums of money as may be needed, such sums not to exceed the combined School, Town and County tax budgets, in anticipation of taxes for Town, County and School purposes. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

- ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts and/or Federal or State Aid in the name of the Town of Conway applied for, received and expended.
- ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell at their discretion at public auction real estate in the Town to which the Town has title by Tax Collector's deed, any such real estate to be sold and conveyed on or before December 31, 1976.
- ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to rescind authority previously granted to issue long term bonds or notes in the amount of \$470,000.00 for construction of a steel and concrete bridge at Swift River. Recommended by the Budget Committee.
- ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the Mt. Washington Valley Public Service Council. Recommended by the Budget Committee.
- ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town wishes to exclude from the plan providing Old Age, Survivors, Disability and Health Insurance service in any class or classes of positions of election officials or election workers for a calendar quarter in which the remuneration paid for each service is less than \$50.00. Recommended by the Budget Committee.
- ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to take such action on behalf of the Town as may be necessary or convenient with respect to cable television franchises, fees and conditions thereon pursuant to RSA Chapter 53c. Recommended by the Budget Committee.
- ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 in 1976 and thereafter annually for the next three years, such funds to be designated as a capital reserve for office accounting equipment and to be held in the custody and under the control of the Trustees of Trust Funds and, further, to authorize the Selectmen to expend such funds as are currently on hand commencing on April 1, 1977. Recommended by the Budget Committee.
- ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the New Hampshire Housing Commission to operate within the Town of Conway by adopting the following resolution pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 204-A of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated and the provision of Section 8 of the U. S. Housing Act of 1937, as amended.

WHEREAS, that there continues to exist within the state a serious shortage of safe and sanitary dwelling accommodations at rents which elderly and low income persons can afford, and that such persons are forced to occupy sub-standard dwelling accommodations; and

WHEREAS, the General Court of the State of New Hampshire has enacted Chapter 204-A of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated establishing the New Hampshire Housing Commission; and

WHEREAS, RSA 204-A:9 provides that in a municipality where there is no local housing authority operating, the Commission shall not operate without the consent of the governing body of a municipality; and

WHEREAS, said RSA 204-A:9 provides that consent of the governing body must be given for each project; and

WHEREAS, under the provisions of Section 8 of the U. S. Housing Act of 1937, as amended, the United States of America, acting through the Secretary of Housing and Urban Development, is authorized to enter into annual contributions contracts with public housing agencies pursuant to which such agencies may enter into contracts to make assistance payments to owners;

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved by the Annual Town Meeting of the Town of Conway, County of Carroll, State of New Hampshire, as follows: That the New Hampshire Housing Commission be and is authorized to operate in the Town of Conway. That said New Hampshire Housing Commission is authorized to sponsor a project, under Section 8 of the U. S. Housing Act of 1937, as amended, for any of the following dwelling accommodations or a combination there-of: (a) existing standard housing twenty dwelling units; (b) rehabilitated housing twenty dwelling units; (c) newly constructed housing ten dwelling units; the total amount of the foregoing not to exceed fifty dwelling units. The total dwelling number of dwelling units authorized by this and all previous authorizations shall not exceed fifty dwelling units.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to set aside the sum of \$5,000 toward a Capital Reserve Fund for erosion and sediment control from any cash surplus that may exist at the end of each year, said authorization to start in the current year. Agreeable to a petition signed by Kenneth Dole. Submitted without recommendation by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500 for the White Mountain Regions Association. Agreeable to a petition signed by Daniel S. Jones. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 (One Thousand Dollars) to help defray the expenses of the Water Safety Program as carried out by the Conway Chapter of the American Red Cross. Agreeable to a petition signed by George W. Reny. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

- ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town of Conway will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,020.00 towards the support of the North Conway Child and Youth project. (C-Y Project). This sum to be used as rent for clinic and office space. Agreeable to a petition signed by Joan Whetton. Recommended by the Budget Committee.
- ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six thousand dollars (\$6,000.00) for the purchase of Air Compressor Equipment for use by all Fire Departments within the Town of Conway. Agreeable to a petition signed by Francis Deasy. Recommended by the Budget Committee.
- ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six thousand seven hundred sixty dollars (\$6,760.00) for the purchase of mobile radios for the Town Ambulances, and to apply for reimbursement of this expenditure from any available source. Agreeable to a petition signed by Francis Deasy. Submitted without recommendation by the Budget Committee.
- ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town of Conway will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000.00 for the Memorial Hospital, North Conway, New Hampshire. Agreeable to a petition signed by C. Beach Powell. Recommended by the Budget Committee.
- ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town of Conway will raise the sum of \$6,084.10 for the Home Health Agency, the said sum being \$1.10 per person and authorize withdrawal of that sum from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under provisions of State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. Agreeable to a petition signed by John H. Small. Recommended by the Budget Committee.
- ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,061.30 to assist the Carroll County Mental Health Service, Inc., 1976. Agreeable to a petition signed by Pamela T. Fisher. Recommended by the Budget Committee.
- ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town of Conway will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for day care. Agreeable to a petition signed by Janet Hounsell. Recommended by the Budget Committee.
- ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to amend the 1974 Flood Plain Ordinance by adding to the end thereof the following: "— except Municipal or School District facilities." Agreeable to a petition signed by Chester B. Lucy.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$100.00 to defray expenses incurred by the Saco River Steering Committee to continue its efforts to draw up, in cooperation with other towns in the valley, an overall plan for future use and regulation of the Saco River and major tributaries in Conway. Agreeable to a petition signed by Thomas S. Deans. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town of Conway will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$14,000.00 to assist the Conway Village Recreation Commission and the North Conway Community Center; \$7,000 to Conway Village Recreation Commission and \$7,000 to the North Conway Community Center. Said sums to be allocated to the Conway Village Recreation Commission and to the Board of Directors, North Conway Community Center. Agreeable to a petition signed by Barbara S. Leighton. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to be divided between the Chambers of Commerce in both Conway and the Mount Washington Valley, with \$1,500.00 going to the Conway Chamber of Commerce and \$1,500.00 going to the Mount Washington Valley Chamber of Commerce. Agreeable to a petition signed by J. Leo Milotte, Jr. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 28. To authorize the Selectmen to act in behalf of the Town for the purpose of allocating funds received by the Town from the Cable Television Franchise payments to Kennett High School. These funds to be used to provide TV studio equipment for the school. Agreeable to a petition signed by Charles Toor. Submitted without recommendation by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to amend the flood plain ordinance adopted in 1974 by striking out the words beginning "(including the land flooded. . .") and adding "as defined by the Flood Hazard Analysis Map of Conway, N. H., prepared by the Soil Conservation Service in 1974, or on filled land on the flood plain. public school buildings shall be exempted from this prohibition on the condition that they meet the requirements of Section 1910.3(b) of the National Flood Insurance Program, including, but not limited to, use of building materials resistant to flood damage and construction methods that minimize flood damage. This ordinance shall take precedence oer any conflicting and less restrictive local laws, codes or ordinances." Agreable to a petition signed by Kenneth Dole.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and ap-

propriate the sum of \$2,500 to finance enforcement of the "Conway Leash Ordinance." Submitted without recommendation by the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 31. To act upon any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

#### SELECTMEN'S REPORT

As you look through this year's Annual Report, you will notice a few changes. These have been made in an attempt to eliminate some repetition and to enhance the clarity and usefulness of the report.

The Town of Conway is in sound fiscal condition. Unlike some other towns and cities, and even some states and the Federal Government, we have a balanced budget and a modest surplus rather than a deficit for 1975. This has been achieved despite continued inflation and rising costs for services and materials. As a result of fiscal restraint by the voters, plus some increased valuation, we were able to reduce the tax rate by one dollar per thousand of assessed valuation while maintaining essential services and keeping our plant and equipment up-to-date and in repair. Our efforts in this respect continue.

We were fortunate this year in obtaining the services of Plodzik and Sanderson, Accountants and Auditors. As of this date, they have completed an audit of the Town as of December 31, 1973, and December 31, 1974. This audit is available at the Town Offices for any and all to inspect. Contained in this report you will find their letter of transmittal which, among other things, shows a surplus as at December 31, 1974, of \$322,666.00. You will also note that increases in current surplus are primarily the result of net budget surpluses, some of

which have been utilized to reduce the tax rate.

While improvements have been made in our record keeping, much is left to be done. Right now, for example, we are at a point where we are too large for the hand posting system currently in effect and too small to warrant installation of a mechanical or electronic system, the cost of which is substantial. However, studies are now under way to determine the feasibility and economics of such a system for a

future year.

During the course of this past year, we met with the Budget Committee on several occasions in an effort to keep them and you abreast of our activities and to elicit their advice. In early July we presented them with six months' figures on revenues and expenditures. At that time, we also discussed with them the possibility of having all Town vehicles maintained and repaired by Town employees at the Town Garage. Our studies to date indicate that the saving achieved would not offset the capital expenditures required for an addition to the present building, the installation of some rather expensive equipment and the hiring of additional personnel.

A cost accounting system has been started in the highway department primarily for the purpose of finding out whether or not we are using the right equipment on a particular job and also whether or not the equipment we use is being used properly. We are attempting to extend the life of our equipment from an average of five years to an average of six years and we want to know if this will result in a saving. The downtime plus costs of labor and parts on a particular piece

of equipment will help tell us this. We are also experimenting with some lighter vehicles. If these vehicles can do their assigned jobs properly, it will result in a savings; as the capital cost and cost of parts and repairs are substantially less on these vehicles than on the larger ones.

The Mount Washington Valley Public Service Council has continued its efforts over the past year to reach a feasible solution to our solid waste disposal problems. At the moment, however, no solution has been reached and our incinerator, which has been the subject of some criticism both locally and by the State Air Pollution Control Commission, continues to operate at a cost of about one dollar per ton of waste processed. This contrasts with costs of five dollars or more per ton for landfill, recycling or more sophisticated incineration, plus their additional capital costs of about half a million dollars. We are continuing our negotiations with the State authorities and the Federal Government to permit us to enlarge and improve this facility to meet our needs in the immediate future and at the same time reduce air pollution. Unfortunately, we must report that our efforts have not as vet been successful. While the State has been cooperative, the Environmental Protection Agency, which we think has set unrealistic standards for communities such as ours, has not.

Another experiment is under way on which we have had both favorable and unfavorable comment. This involves the substantial reduction of salt and calcium chloride content in the sand used on our highways during the wintertime and the use of automatic sanding equipment, which enables us to get a more even spread over a greater area with less manpower. Obviously, this leaner mixture does not have the melting capacity of the richer mixture, so that we do not have bare roads as quickly. However, your cars and trucks probably won't rust as fast.

Highway drainage continues to be a problem. Last year fourteen catch basins and thirty-five hundred feet of culvert were installed at various locations throughout the Town. There is still much to be done in this area and we are proceeding with it as fast as time and money permit.

During the course of the year we met periodically with the Police Commissioners and the Chief of Police in an attempt to coordinate our activities. This open communication has been helpful and, by and large, successful in achieving the desired results within the framework

in which we must operate.

In order to assist the unemployed in our immediate area, we have made Town facilities available to the New Hampshire Department of Employment Security for the disbursement of unemployment compensation. Since we have to heat, light and clean these facilities, we have charged the State rent to cover our costs. We intend to continue this program as long as the need persists.

In March of 1972, the Town Meeting passed a Sign Ordinance.

Since then, every known violator has been cited and over ninety per cent have willingly complied. However, there are several who have not; and so, as a last resort, action was commenced against three of them. A default judgment was obtained against one, and action is pending against the other two.

Edward J. Cravedi, Town Clerk and Tax Collector, retired on October 1, 1975, after serving the Town in these capacities for nine years. During his last year in office, he also acted as president of the New Hampshire Tax Collectors Association. Eddie's dedication to his job and his service to the people of the Town will be long remembered. John D. Stevens was appointed to fill the remainder of Eddie's term.

What do we look for in 1976? Our plans are directed at pursuing sound and prudent policies for the continued growth of the Town. Our budget requests for this year include replacement of the current police station, which is antiquated and inadequate, with a new facility located on the present site of the Porter Office Machines Corp. The cost of the proposed new police station will be approximately \$105,300.00. Last year a similar proposal was presented to the voters at a cost of \$190,000.00, which is \$84,700.00 over the present proposal. The reduction in cost comes about as a result of careful planning and negotiation on the part of each of those involved in this project. We hope that by utilizing \$80,000.00 of anticipated revenue sharing monies, we can complete this project without materially affecting our current tax rate. This will require continued fiscal restraint on the part of all of us.

Within the budget itself is a requested appropriation for the renovation of our District Court. This facility, which is also used for other public gatherings, is in need of repair and refurbishing so that we may continue to have a District Court in the Town.

The Selectmen meet regularly every Thursday at 1:30 p.m. at the Town Offices and at other times when the need arises. These meetings are open to the press and the public. We have been fortunate in having reporters from The Carroll County Independent, The Reporter, and The Manchester Union Leader attend each of our meetings to report our progress, successes and failures. We look forward to their continued attendance at these meetings.

The Town officers and employees are here to serve you. That is our purpose and our duty. If you have complaints, we cannot act upon them unless we learn about them. If you have constructive suggestions, we cannot implement them unless we learn of them.

In conclusion, our thanks to the other Town officers, boards, and

commissions, and particularly the Town employees, for their continued cooperation and assistance.

#### FINANCIAL INFORMATION

#### GENERAL FUND:

Comparative Balance Sheets (Exhibits 1 and 25)

Comparative balance sheets which disclose the financial condition of the General Fund as of December 31, 1973 and December 31, 1974, are presented in Exhibits 1 and 25. As indicated therein, the Town had a current surplus of \$261,005 at December 31, 1973 and \$322,666 at December 31, 1974.

Analysis of Change in Current Financial Condition: (Exhibits 2 and 26)
Statements showing an analysis of the factors which caused the change in current financial condition of the Town during the fiscal years ended December 31, 1973 and December 31, 1974, are presented in Exhibits 2 and 26 respectively.

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal years ended December 31, 1973 and December 31, 1974, are presented in Exhibits 3 and 4; and 27 and 28.

As indicated in Exhibit 4, a revenue surplus of \$112,679, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$43,815, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$156,494 in 1973. As disclosed in Exhibit 28, a

revenue surplus of \$87,925, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$48,381, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$136,306 in 1974

#### LONG-TERM INDERTEDNESS:

#### Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibits 5 and 29)

Comparative balance sheets disclosing the outstanding long-term indebtedness of the Town as of December 31, 1973 and December 31, 1974, are included in Exhibits 5 and 29. The outstanding long-term debt amounted to \$45,000 at December 31, 1973 and \$460,000 at December 31, 1974. Commencing in 1974 the State of New Hampshire, under the T.R.A.-B Fund Program is to contribute \$6,920 annually over a ten year period towards the amortization of the Swift River Bridge bonds.

#### Statements of Debt Service Requirements: (Exhibits 6 and 30)

Statements showing annual debt service requirements of principal and interest as of December 31, 1973 and December 31, 1974, are contained in Exhibits 6 and 30 respectively.

Exhibits 7 and 31 contain statements showing the activity and the fund balance of the Swift River Bridge construction appropriation for the fiscal years 1973 and 1974. As of December 31, 1974 there were long-term notes or bonds authorized — unissued totaling \$470,00 as a result of this project authorization; \$895,000 has been authorized and \$425,000 in long-term bonds have been issued. If the project is complete, the Town should vote to rescind the balance remaining on this authorization.

#### **COMMENTS**

In the last audit report dated January 3, 1974, submitted by the State of New Hampshire, Division of Municipal Accounting, there were mentioned several areas in which the records maintained by the Town were considered substandard. Commencing in 1974 and continuing in 1975, we have noted substantial improvements in the record keeping functions of the Town and general compliance with the recommendations made in that report.

We do however, recommend that the Town consider the implementation of a mechanical accounting system that would perform multiple accounting functions in a single operation, thereby eliminating duplicate record keeping and facilitate monthly and year end reporting, so essential for municipal operations of this type.

The provisions of Chapter 71-A, Section 21, require that this letter of transmittal shall be published in the next annual report of the Town. Publication of the Exhibits contained in this report, is optional at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen.

We extend our thanks to the officials and the office staff of the Town of Conway for their assistance during the course of the audit.

The Town Clerk must be given a copy of the enclosed audit reports for retention as part of the permanent Town Records.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 71-A, Section 21, require that this letter of transmittal shall be published in the next annual report of the Town. Publication of the Exhibits contained in this report is optional at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Conway for their assistance during the course of the audit.

#### REPORT OF CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The year 1975 did not witness many newsworthy events or unusual activities. The Commission, however did have regular monthly meetings and spent considerable time reviewing the progress it was making on its plans for the properties already acquired for the Town of Conway, and in working on plans for the long-range management and development of these properties, as well as exercising its responsibilities in the supervision and use of these properties.

The winter of 1974-75 saw considerable ski touring in the Whitaker Woods property which was enjoyed by those availing themselves of this opportunity, and there is an increasing amount of both summer and winter use and enjoyment of this piece of Town Property. Kennett High School, as well as the Eastern Slope Ski Club use Whitaker Woods for training competition.

Davis Park in Conway was the scene of much use and activity during the summer season. A plaque dedication in memory of James Simonds is planned at this location for 1976.

The members of the Commission made an on-site inspection of properties in June, including the Overlook property, Shedd Woods, Shedd property adjoining the Saco River, and the Artist Falls Brook area.

We were greatly concerned and disturbed by the condition still existing in the once-beautiful Artist Falls area and voiced our dissatisfaction to the Special Board in Concord that nothing had been done to enforce the order of October, 1974, issued by the Special Board. Copies of our correspondence were sent to Governor Thomson, town representatives, members of the Governor's Council and the State Senator. Another communication has since been sent to all these parties, again requesting that we wish action taken to enforce the orders issued by the Special Board to restore the damaged areas. We will continue to use our efforts to bring about a workable adjustment of as much of the damaged as is now feasible.

A number of applications for Dredging and Filling were presented to the Commission and acted upon. Easements requested by the Public Service Company of New Hampshire were reviewed and in all cases an on-site inspection of the proposed locations for placement of utility poles was made by a member of the Commission.

The Commission was represented at a Public hearing held relative to the removal of trees along Route 16-302 in North Conway, and voiced its objection to the indescriminate removal of these trees, a number of which would be cut from the Shedd Woods property.

On September 16, the Chairman of the Commission attended a public hearing held in Concord, N. H. relative to the application for Dredging and Filling presented by the Beys on Conway Lake. The original application was not approved and a modified plan was subsequently submitted which was approved, on the basis of using hand tools only. Several on-site inspections have been made of this work as it was carried on to see that the actual work complied with the application as submitted.

The November meeting was attended by Arthur G. Dodge, Jr. for the purpose of presenting and discussing his "Land Use Analysis and Recommendations" for the Whitaker Woods and Pudding Pond areas, and the meeting was dedicated to reviewing these plans and considering the promulgation of suitable flora and fauna for these properties.

The Conservation Commission wishes to Thank all users for the fine cooperation that is being exercised in the multiple use of these Town Properties.

#### REPORT OF THE LIBRARY TRUSTEES

During 1975 the library expanded in many ways: services, activities, equipment, plant, collections, and staff. Two years ago the trustees voted to increase the required number of meetings from four to six; this year they held nine meetings as well as a number of small-committee meetings.

A timer has been installed in the tower clock so that it now strikes during the day but is automatically turned off at night, thanks to Burnham Davis, who donated the funds. New shelves for more children's books have been added to the Arthur and Irene Lucy Memorial Room by gift of the Lucy Family. In the small reading room, shelves with glass doors that can be locked fill the need for proper care of rare books. The stacks now have wall-to-wall carpeting, and there is a new carpet in the main room. A convenient modern desk replaces the inadequate old one in the librarian's office. A book drop in the door at the front entrance is greatly appreciated by our patrons. We express our gratitude to Sherman LaBarge, who contributed his services to making the very unusual sign which stands in front of the library and attracts so much attention and admiration; the only expense to the library was the materials. A memorial flagpole, for which funds given to the library in memory of Edmund Warren have been expended, has been erected northeast of the library. It will be dedicated in the spring.

In January Mr. Keith Henney offered to give his valuable historical collection of books, maps, and documents to the library if an appropriate room to house it could be built at his expense. Negotiations were carried on, with Edmund Warren as chairman of a special committee; and after much discussion and visits to the collection by members of the trustees, an agreement was drawn up and submitted to the selectmen. Work began on the room in the spring and was completed before the end of the year. The collection, which includes the Eaton records on loan, is now on the shelves and is being catalogued. Shortly there will be a ceremony dedicating the room and its contents "to the fond memory and with gratitude to Nella Bradda Henney."

We miss Rev. Ralph Seaver, who retired from the Board in March, but we welcome the newly elected member, Peter Dunn, who immediately assumed the heavy responsibility of treasurer. Edmund Warren became the new chairman; and Helen Bumstead continued as secretary. Margaret Marschner was appointed representative to

the North Country District Advisory Council of the State Library Development Program. A valuable addition to the staff during the last three months of the year was Toni Toothaker, working under the Manpower Program. She graduated from Simmons College in June, 1975, with a degree in Library Science. She works particularly on the Outreach taping program, bringing the equipment up to date and enlarging contacts with the recipients; and she is cataloguing the Henney collection.

After the death of Edmund Warren, the vacancy on the trustees was filled by the appointment of Chester Lucy, who had retired from long service as a trustee the previous year. He was willing to serve as chairman of the committee in charge of the new construction, having helped Eddie with that; but he declined to be chairman of the trustees. At a special meeting of the trustees, Helen Bumstead was elected chairman; and Charlotte Altenbern secretary. We regret that Charlotte Altenbern will be retiring on March 2 after six years of devoted service — five as treasurer and four months as secretary; she deserves much praise.

The loss caused by the death of Edmund Warren was great. Eddie's devotion to the interests of the library was unlimited, and his experience in dealing with problems like those connected with the property, invaluable. Not only did he act as supervisor; he spent much of his own time making needed repairs and applying paint where it was badly needed. His expert services in dealing with the drainage problem outside the northeast corner of the building when the Henney room was built in the basement would seldom be available from a library trustee.

Our librarian deserves much commendation. She received a scholarship from the New Hampshire Federation of Women's Clubs, and took a two weeks' course in Public Library Techniques at the University of New Hampshire in July. We are glad that our faithful assistant librarian has been able to return to her work after a long illness. We express our appreciation for the rest of our staff: Annah Carroll, Amy Gardner, Tracy Gardner, and Toni Toothaker; and of our custodian, James Richardson. And to the many friends who give so much to the library, especially the Conway Woman's Club, we give hearty thanks.

Activities during the year have been many and varied: 22 Story Times for pre-school children, by staff and volunteers; a six weeks summer reading program for elementary school children, directed by Toni Toothaker; observation of National Book Week with the cooperation of McDonald's; a float in the Fourth of July parade; sum-

mer book sale sponsored by the Conway Woman's Club; observance of Children's Book Week with a Doll Party; co-sponsor with the Conway Recreation Center of "Little Red Wagon."

There have been exhibits of the following: Photography of India, by Peter Jeschke; The Holy Land, by Edith Shackford; Craft Books; 4-H; The Duke of Windsor, by Ellsworth Pickering; International Women's Year; Drawings by Leslie Snow; Art by Willey Fromm; Old School Books, by Susan Proctor; a Christmas tree decorated by the Conway Woman's Club; 2 small exhibits of books each month.

Circulation of books in 1975 showed an increase in adult nonfiction, a decrease in adult fiction, and in increase of almost 500 in juvenile books (which had a total of 8,231 in 1974). There was an increase in the number of people using the reference-reading room, and a 25% increase in the number of reference questions handled. The number of patrons registered was 498; number of books assessed, 604, including 7 memorial or gift books.

We express our gratitude to all the volunteers who help to keep our Outreach Program so successful. This program, initiated by Mr. Charles LaCasce of the Welfare Department, and fostered by a large group of volunteers, became an important part of our library's services when we and the Wolfeboro library funded the equipment which makes the distribution of so many tapes each week possible.

We are proud of our library; we thank the voters of Conway who support our bugket.

#### POLICE COMMISSION REPORT

Of major importance during the past seventh year of the Conway Police Commission functioning has been a clarification by the Division of Municipal Accounting of the New Hampshire Department of Revenue Administration of the authorities and responsibilities of the Police Commission with regards to the police budget.

During the past year we had a meeting with the Director, Mr. LaPlante. He furnished many guidelines, all based upon New Hampshire Law, for not only the proper accounting methods and areas of responsibility and authority between the Selectmen and the Police Commissioners, but of equal importance, the better ways and methods of presenting meaningful fiscal information to the voters and taxpayers. His directives and guidelines were set forth in a letter to the Commission, a portion of which we quote:

"Consequently, all expenditures approved by the Police Commission which are within the limits of the police budget and properly supported by vouchers, invoices, purchase orders receiving slips, etc., should be approved by the Selectmen. The authority of the Selectmen over the Police Commission is limited to ascertaining that expenditures of the Police Department do not exceed the sums appropriated therefor, in addition to any proper and lawful appropriation credits."

During the year we availed ourselves of the opportunity of engaging the services of C. Robert Gardner as a fiscal adviser which has proven to be very helpful.

The Police Commission has had a long standing practice that all appointees as either regular or special officers must successfully pass the New Hampshire Department of Personnel examination for patrolman. The requirement is one of several methods used to try to assure the best possible appointees. Unfortunately, only about one applicant in four successfully passes the examination, and the Town must pay the State \$10.00 per examination. The Police Commission has commenced administering a preliminary examination to all applicants, thus only those that show promise of passing the State's Examination are offered that opportunity.

Several businesses and some private homes have security and fire alarm systems which are connected to the Police Department. On each alarm alert the police respond. There have been many instances of false alarms caused by carelessness. The Commission has instituted a penalty charge for this type of false alarm; it has reduced the incidents significantly, yet has not impaired the purpose of security and fire alarm systems.

The fees charged for so-called Commercial Duty; police officers

required at construction sites, public dances, athletic events, etc., have been increased slightly to cover administrative costs incurred by the Town for insurance, FICA taxes and general administration. These additional fees, over and above the police officer pay, go directly to the general fund and are not used as a part of the police budget.

The Commission has met several times during the past year with the Selectmen and with the Budget Committee.

A sad event occurred this past year with the sudden passing of a devoted member of the Department, Mrs. Harriet Shurtleff. We all knew her as "Hatt", she performed the duties of Police Aide and Clerk to the Commission, she was a dedicated and devoted employee of the Department for several years, and will be sadly missed.

As has been stated in the past, the Commission does not interfere with the day-to-day operations of the Police Department, this is the Police Chief's job and responsibility. We cannot help, however, to note with a great deal of pride, the excellent performance by all members of the Department. There have been problems, of course, but the performance of the Department, by almost any standard, is well above average and outstanding in some areas.

The ratio of arrests and convictions to incidents for burglaries and larcenies is two and one-half times better than the National average. In our opinion, this is not accident or chance, but a dedicated effort by well-trained officers, who many times have worked many hours, without pay, to investigate and solve the incidents. Cooperation with other law enforcement agencies has been very helpful toward this accomplishment.

The cooperation of the State Police, Sheriff's Department, Federal authorities and other local Police Departments is not an accident. It has been fostered by the Chief and members of the Conway Department — the citizens of the Town of Conway benefit.

Chief MacLean, in his report, has several comments on the increase in serious crimes and juvenile delinquency in Conway. We believe that it is absolutely imperative that Conway retain and attract highly qualified police officers; the Town has done this in past years, and it is one of the major reasons for the success of the Department; we hope the voters will continue that support in 1976.

Our present Police Station is of major concern to the Commission and to many members of the community. The Commission re-activated the Police Headquarters Facilities Committee to study and report on alternatives; their report is included as a part of this report, as follows:

This report of the Police Headquarters Facility Committee will include an account of the activities of the committee from its inception in July of 1974 up to January 13, 1976, when the major portion of its work had been completed.

1. The committee was composed of Selectmen Thomas Mona-

han, Robert Dickson, and Harvey Blake; Police Commissioners Philip Roberts, Maurice Frechette, and Robert Gardner; Police Chief Allan MacLean and Sgt. David Bennett and Clerk Harriet Shurtleff; and representative members at large from all parts of the town as follows: James Hill, Mrs. Janet Hounsell, Robert MacDonald, Philip Merrill, Charles Sturdivant, George Tice, Harold Wentworth and Paul Whetton. In September, 1975, the following members were added: Robert Bumstead, Mrs. Robert Davis, Mrs. William Fennell, Herbert Hall, Selectman, Howard Hatch, Albert Lane, Police Commissioner, and Carl Sonne.

2. Each member of the committee put in long hours of time, travel, and thought along all possible courses of action, on renovating the present station, leasing existing buildings, building on town-owned land on one lot of optioned land in various parts of the town.

Four new police stations on Cape Cod were visited, there being no new ones nearby, and were given thorough tours of inspection, in towns of comparable size and character to Conway. All methods of building were explored; architect designed, design-build, and others. All types of construction were studied. Several sites were visited and studied. All known sources of federal or state aid were contacted by letter, telephone, or in person. Meetings were held with various groups to report our findings and to get their reactions, and to inform the voters of our recommendations.

Up to the time of the March 1975 town meeting our best plan was to build a new facility, either on town-owned land in Redstone, or on optioned land on Route 16 just south of its intersection with Route 302, halfway between Conway and North Conway villages. The building plan submitted at the town meeting, produced by architectengineer Howard Millard, was and is in the collective opinion of the committee the ideal solution, but the cost (160,000 to \$190,000) was the deciding factor which resulted in a negative vote, and this chiefly because of a pervading mood of frugality in the minds of most voters at all the town and school meetings in 1975. The committee was disappointed that the vote was not in the affirmative, as the proposed building was to cost slightly more than one-half of what the new stations built in the towns visited had cost for about the same facilities.

The work of the committee this year has been solely concerned with the planning and costs connected with the possible and hopedfor purchase of the three-year-old Porter Office Machine office building located only 150 feet north of our preferred location under the
1975 proposal, and which has been offered to the town only at a price
of \$79,500. The location is ideal, the building is almost new and very
easily adapted to conversion to a police headquarters. Figures for conversion have been obtained from several local, reputable contractors.

and conservative maximum costs for the conversion would be \$25,900 or a total finished cost of \$105,400. Additional and new equipment costing about \$4450 can be obtained at a cost to the town of about \$225, the balance being available through state and federal sharing.

To sum up: Agreed that the present station is totally inadequate, unsafe, and inconvenient, subject to ridicule, and that a new facility MUST be found, the entire committee feels that it would be financially expedient for the town to take advantage of this practical and prudent way to have a new police headquarters, of which we can be proud.

I am sure the residents of the town will all join me in appreciation of the work of a competent, enthusiastic, and united committee for their work toward this new facility.

The year 1975 was very active for the Conway Police Department. In contrast to previous years, Conway has experienced record crowds of visitors throughout the year.

During this past year, we have made some mistakes. However, considering the problems that were thrust upon the department, I am very proud of the over-all performance the members have shown.

The successful investigation of the tragic Redstone covered bridge fire has received a great deal of publicity. The department has also received praise for its handling of the Volvo Tennis Tournament. However, the real work load and performance of the department can be realized from the preceding statistics. The national average of arrests for complaints of burglary and larceny is approximately one to ten. The performance of the Conway Police Department has resulted in a ratio of approximately one to four. Unfortunately, and as an additional burden to the department, these categories of crime have increased over 17% from 1974. Serious crimes have continued at the higher rate also experienced in 1974. These crimes require extensive time and effort for investigation, arrest, and prosecution. In connection with these serious crimes, few people are aware of the frequency an officer is confronted with an armed, emotionally disturbed person. This has been occurring far too often recently.

In further review of the statistics of the past year, there were several significant increases. I am concerned that vandalism increased from 135 incidents in 1974 to 204 in 1975. I also note that larcenies have increased from 371 in 1974 to 460 in 1975.

Motor vehicle accidents involving personal injuries increased from 24 in 1974 to 55 in 1975. I feel that much of this increase was due to the heavy traffic.

There has been a decrease of arrests for driving while intoxicated. (100 in 1974, 67 in 1975). I would like to hope that the reputation we have attained for strict enforcement has contributed to this decrease, but I do know that there are still far too many operators on our roads impaired by alcohol.

The recent changes in the juvenile laws have had a significant

effect on the department's activities. The legal age of juveniles was raised from 17 to 18 years of age.

As a result of a steady increase of juvenile delinquency, the Conway Police Department has taken the initiative to develop and form a juvenile court disversionary committee. This was accomplished after a considerable amount of time and effort by both the department and many interested public citizens. Our goal has been to offer an effective alternative to juvenile court for minor first offenders. This program has been in operation since July of 1975, and was the second of its kind in the state. (Keene being the first).

The department is also sponsoring and supervising a law enforcement post of Explorer Scouts. These young men and women are being given an opportunity to explore the many careers in law enforcement. This program is offering benefits to both the officers and scouts. They are exchanging ideas and opinions, and, in the pro-

The Conway Police Department has a work load and problems of a small city. Unfortunately, these problems are destined to expand even further with the growth of our community. If we are going to continue to keep a safe, respectable town, these problems will require increased expenditures. I believe that I would be negligent if I did not make adequate requests for these additional expenses.

I have requested that an increase of \$13,000.00 be made to cover the cost of special officers that are required for various assignments. In the past, officers' have often forfeited their time off because of a lack of funds to provide for special officers, to cover for them. During other times, a shift was left uncovered.

The town of Conway is now active on a year-round basis and this practice often leaves the department under-manned. This additional money would be used to pay special officers and not to hire new full-time personnel.

The second major request is for funds to purchase three cruisers, compared to two last year. By directive and a conscientious effort of all personnel, we have reduced the annual mileage to about 220,000 miles per year, which I believe is the minimum to be expected in the future.

It is my considered opinion, along with detailed analysis by other police departments, that 75,000 miles is the maximum economical mileage to expect from any cruiser. Therefore, I recommend the annual replacement of three cruisers with intermediate size police packages.

I sincerely hope that these requests do not jeopardize the acquisition of the Porter Office Equipment building as a new police station.

The building is essentially the same size as was proposed last year, at substantially less money. The cost of renovation is almost entirely for the cell area. All unnecessary frills have been eliminated to keep the total cost to a minimum. I will do my utmost to answer any questions anyone may have regarding our present or proposed facilities. Anyone is welcome to examine the present facility, at any time.

The town has a right to be proud of the dedicated performance shown by members of the Conway Police Department, and the high morale, considering the substantial amount of unpaid time given.

In conclusion, I would like to thank the members of the department for their dedication and support, the police commission for their time and interest, and the citizens of Conway for allowing me to continue as Chief of Police of your police department.

## REPORT OF THE MT. WASHINGTON VALLEY PUBLIC SERVICE COUNCIL

The council, which was established in March 1974, with representatives from Albany, Bartlett, Conway and Jackson has been given the responsibility to study the solid waste problems of the valley and alternative solutions as per RSA 53-B: 1-5.

Although 1975 was a very active year for the council, the death of Eddy Warren in July was a great loss to us. He was one of the three representatives from Conway and his interest and enthusiasm, to say nothing of his vast experience, was a great inspiration to us all.

We started the year facing the problem that all towns had to cease open-burning by July 1, 1975. Fortunately, due to the realization that this deadline was unrealistic and to the interest and efforts of the council members, HB 566 was passed in the 1975 session of the Legislature. This legislation effectively postponed the deadline for open-burning in Bartlett and Jackson to July 1, 1977, giving the council time to study the several reasonable solutions which are economically practiced.

Last spring the council supported efforts made by Conway and other interested towns in the state to gain acceptance of the principle of "open-pit" incineration by the air pollution board. Although the appeal was not successful, it was interesting to see how many towns realized the practical aspects of "open-pit" incineration as an alternative to conventional incineration. The Conway selectmen report that the cost of disposing of the solid waste from Conway, Eaton and Albany is about \$1.50 per ton. Considering this relatively inexpensive solution, it should be noted that legislation will be considered by the 1976 special session of the New Hampshire legislation which will allow "open-pit" incineration in towns with a population less than 5,000 if the glass is separated before incineration takes place.

Since few adequate landfill sites are available in the valley, we looked into the possibility of trucking our waste to the landfill operation starting in Ossipee. While this might be a reasonable short term solution, it is as wasteful as incineration and could be very expensive. Also concern was expressed about the advisability of land fill in general and specifically one in permeable sands over one of the largest underground lakes east of the Mississippi.

Although recycling continues to be an interesting possibility from

the point of view of conservation of energy, the bottom has more or less fallen out of the market and public resistance to home separation of glass, cans and paper continues to be high.

The council had a frustrating summer until a proposal was made by a firm specializing in solid waste recovery. An idea was proposed to compact our waste and ship it to a company who could use it as fuel to generate steam. The council expressed considerable interest because one ton of garbage is the equivalent of 66 gallons of No. 2 fuel oil. Therefore, the valley, which generates about 80 tons of solid waste per day, wastes the equivalent of 2,000,000 gallons of fuel oil each year.

At present, the council is investigating this proposal and agrees that, if the cost per ton is reasonable (\$1.00 - \$1.50), the towns should be encouraged to participate. It should be pointed out that this is only a proposal but if it can be worked out it will be one of the first such programs in the country. We hope to have more definite news before snow melts.

The Mt. Washington Valley Public Service Council will continue to serve the communities in the valley in 1976. We look forward to a successful year ahead and are open to any ideas or suggestions which any of you would like to make.

## SACO RIVER STEERING COMMITTEE

Subsequent to action taken at the March 1975 Annual Meetings of Conway and Jackson, a Saco River Steering Committee was appointed by the Selectmen. Due to an oversight, a special article to this effect failed to appear in the Bartlett warrant. However, Selectman Gene Chandler agreed to serve in an ad hoc capacity, representing Bartlett.

The purpose of this committee is to "research and draw up in cooperation with other towns in the valley on overall plan for future use and regulation of the Saco River and major tributaries."

Members from Conway appointed were Chester B. Lucy, Ned McSherry, Thomas Deans, Woodrow Allard; Bartlett — Gene Chandler; Jackson — Herbert George and Robert McManus.

It was the opinion of the Committee that it should first take an inventory, so to speak, find out what direction the residents themselves wanted to take, then establish priorities and proceed in implement these priorities.

The Committee has met with members of the State Planning Commission, North Country Council, Saco River Corridor — Maine, and others. Two public meetings with landowners along the Saco were held. Field trips by the Committee were made inspecting the Saco from above Bartlett village to the Maine-New Hampshire state line. 2000 questionnaires were mailed throughout the Valley requesting opinions on different aspects and priorities of the Saco River Valley, from which there was a return of 284.

Since there is already broad legislation concerning river control and planning on both the Federal and State level, it is our opinion that the residents in the Valley would much rather have control from a local level rather than Federal or State. The returns from the questionnaire bear this out. Therefore, if some local plan, no matter how broad, is already in existence, it follows that other regulatory bodies would have a "hands off" policy. This has been confirmed from higher levels of government.

At this point I would like to say that from the very beginning in April 1975 we have had tremendous cooperation among the different town representatives and officers. Everyone concerned feels we have

a common purpose, and that political boundaries should have no bearing on our efforts and direction.

Because of the scope of our project and the fact that we are all volunteers, we are able to give only a progress report rather than a final report at this time. Most of the leg work is done so that the next twelve months should see a final report with recommendations. For these reasons, there is a special article in the Conway warrant requesting further funding to pay future expenses and "keep us alive." There is a similar article in the Bartlett and Jackson warrants. We promise not to squander.

As positive action recommended at this time, we have petitioned an article in the Conway warrant to amend the Conway Flood Plain Ordinance to except municipal and school district facilities. This would enable water districts to construct pumping stations, if needed in the future, and school plant expansion on existing sites if so desired by the voters.

At some point in the future public meetings will be held to get your in-put and also explain our progress so far.

# Water Safety Program

The Town of Conway appropriated \$1,000 for 1975 to defray costs of the Water Safety Program as directed by the Conway Chapter, American Red Cross.

Classes for Conway and North Conway children were held at Echo Lake State Park. Center Conway children attended classes at Conway Lake. Scheduling was arranged for two different four-week sessions at Echo Lake. The first one was attended by children from Intervale, Kearsarge, North Conway and Redstone, Conway village children attended the second session. Russell (Butch) Webster volunteered as a Water Safety Aide-in-Training as a part of the requirements in becoming a Water Safety Instructor.

The staff for 1975 included Kathryn Burnell, Jody Camille, Marc Ohlson, Karen Junge, Janine Bean and Helen Hill.

265 children were enrolled in the classes. Many more should have been involved but did not have transportation. It is hoped that this problem can be worked out so that all who want to participate will be able to get to and from the sessions.

Parents, relatives and friends who watched the demonstrations on the final days will agree that the young people had achieved many skills which will provide them with recreational enjoyment and most importantly a respect for the water and safety procedures. The principles of mouth-to-mouth resuscitation were taught to all pupils as the beginning in Basic First Aid.

These figures do not include telephone, postage, supplies and equipment. The Conway Red Cross Chapter pays all other costs for Water Safety Programs. The training of two new instructors in 1975 at Aquatic School was financed by the Conway Chapter.

# Report of Forest Fire Warden and District Chief

Upon the recommendation of town selectmen and city councils, the Division of Forests and Lands appoints a forest fire warden and several deputy forest fire wardens in each town and city every three years. The town or city warden is responsible for maintaining a force of men and adequate equipment to suppress any wildfire that occurs in his town or city during his term of appointment. The fire warden must authorize all open burning when the ground is not covered with snow. No open fires can be authorized between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m., unless it is raining, without the additional permission of the state district fire chief.

Any person wishing to kindle an open fire when the ground is not covered with snow must first obtain the written permission of the forest fire warden. Camp and cooking fires also require the warden's permission.

The Division of Forests and Lands, through its Forest Fire Service, assists all cities and towns in meeting these requirements by training the warden and deputy forces in wildfire suppression tactics, making hand tool suppression equipment available at fifty percent of cost, supplying pieces of Federal excess property for use as fire attack vehicles and sharing up to fifty percent of the cost of wildfire suppression costs.

Wildfire prevention is also a joint state, city or town program. Smokey Bear is available from the Forest Fire Service for local fire prevention programs. Posters and Junior Ranger kits are available for distribution by local fire departments upon request to the Forest Fire Service. Each forest fire warden is expected to carry on a continuous prevention program within his town or city.

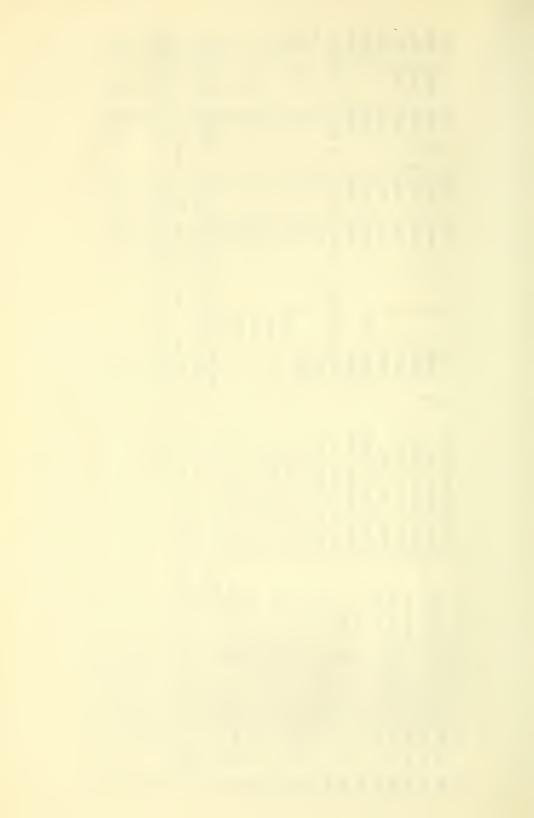
