Gentlemen:

In accordance with the provisions of Section 27 of Chapter 82, of the Revised Laws, we have made an audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Dublin for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1948 and for the period January 1 to November 7, 1949, and submit herewith our report thereon.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Dublin qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, March 14th, 1950 at nine o'clock in the forenoon until five o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To bring in your ballots for Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, Selectman, Road Agent, Tax Collector, Water Commissioners, Library Trustees, and Trustees of Trust Funds.

2. To choose all necessary Town Officers, Agents, Auditors, and Committees for the ensuing year.

3. To hear reports of Agents, Officers, Auditors, and Committees for the ensuing year.

4. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and for any other purposes mentioned in the Budget.

5. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to apply for Town Road Aid.

6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer and dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed.

7. To see if the Town will vote to resurface part of the Bond's Corner-Brush Road so-called and raise and appropriate money for same.

8. To see if the Town will vote raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.) for the use of the Bi-Centennial Committee.

9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase real estate under authority granted by Chapter 223 of the laws of 1947 and raise and appropriate money for the same. Given under our hands and seals this 6th day of February, 1950.

Comparative Statement of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues:

(Exhibits C & D).

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures and estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1948, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D), a net revenue deficit of \$277.46 plus a net overdraft of appropriations of \$5,722.13, resulted in a \$5,999.59 net budget deficit.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1948 made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts is detailed in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of November 7, 1949 is indicated in Exhibit K.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. For the fiscal year ended December 31, 1948, all vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. For the period ended November 7, 1949, the procedure was confined to the examination of all checks and selective tests of supporting invoices and payrolls. Receipts were checked to source insofar as possible and book balances of Cash were verified by reconciliation with bank balances indicated in statements of the depositary.

Accounts of Selectmen:

The Town should take Collector's deeds to all property on which it has tax liens unredeemed for more than two years after the dates of tax sales.

Checks issued to the Road Agent for work done by the highway department on behalf of other town departments should be drawn in favor of the Town highway department, or in the name of the Road Agent as such.

Accounts of the Collector:

We recommend that the Tax Collector use the prescribed Tax Collector's Cash Sheet for the recording of collections of taxes, interest and redemptions.

It was also noted that the Collector had not used the prescribed Tax Sale Record Book in connection with Tax Sales held. We have instructed the Collector in the proper procedure of making entries in this record.

Town Clerk's Accounts: (Exhibits I & N)

In Exhibits I and N are presented analyses of the Town Clerk's accounts for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1948 and the period from January 1 to November 7, 1949, respectively.

The remittances on account of motor vehicle permits and dog licenses which were made by the Town Clerk to the Treasurer during 1949, to date of audit, were as follows:

In this connection it will be noted that the provisions of Chapter 116, Section 22, of the Revised Laws have not been complied with. This section provides as follows:

"Each designated city official and town clerk shall keep an account of the money received by him for said (motor vehicle) permits and deposit the same in the city or town treasury on the last Saturday of each month, to be used for the general purposes of the city or town. Failure to deposit shall be cause for immediate removal from office.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, provides that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual town report. This letter of transmittal should be included in its entirety, but the inclusion of the Exhibits is optional.

REPORT OF HIGHWAY AGENT

This past year, besides the regular maintenance, such as dragging, grading, cleaning ditches and culverts, we have made several improvements.

These improvements include: installing a new "Sectional Plate Arch" all metal bridge, on the Winslow Pierce road, replacing the old wooden structure; installing three new concrete culverts on the Pickford-Koskella road; installing one new and relaying two old culverts on the Old Crow road; installing one new concrete pipe on the Bond's Corner road, thereby draining a very trouble-some spring, under the road bed.

We regraveled the Winslow Pierce and Windmill Hill roads, using 916 yards; Pickford-Koskella road 386 yards; Goldmine road 196 yards and the Old Marlboro road 200 yards. Nearly every road had from one to thirty loads, making the total yardage hauled, 3283 yards.

Calcium Chloride was applied to the Bond's Corner road, South Side Lake, Old Harrisville, Winslow Pierce, Windmill Hill, Picksford-Koskella roads. Several other roads were spot treated.

Brush was cut on nearly every road; some roads more extensively than others, at an expenditure of \$728.90.

My recommendations for the ensuing year are: permanent improvement on some one road; more extensive use of calcium chloride, for the purpose of keeping moisture, thus retaining the dust and fine particles in the road surface; tarring the remaining 1700 feet of new gravel on the Old Harrisville road and at least one-half mile on the Bond's Corner road; retarring all of our black top roads, as these roads have not been tarred for two years.

I have not submitted an inventory of tools and equipment for this report; but one will be on file in the Selectmen's office.

The library added to its shelves during the past year fortyfour new titles, with town appropriated money. Eighteen of these books were adult fiction, the remaining non-fiction of interest to both adult and child. Many books were given by friends of the library.

The library subscribes to fourteen magazines with town appropriated money, as well as two weekly newspapers. By gift it receives three other magazines.

The children of the public school make frequent use of the library. Two classes arrive with their teacher each Wednesday, weather permitting. This practice has been in use for many years now.

Mrs. Sterling gives a subscription to the New York Times Book Review Section yearly, as an aid in book selection. The library subscribes to the Saturday Review of Literature, and many other aids in book evaluation and selection are used.

The Dublin Garden Club gives the subscription, "The Home Garden" as well as leaving their garden library housed in the library that all may have access to it. During the summer many beautiful flower arrangements are given by members. At Christmas time it is through their thoughtfulness and generosity that the library door is adorned with a picturesque wreath, and made an attractively decorated Christmas tree, and other potted plants.

Forty dollars (\$40.00) of the above mentioned cash on hand is money, which is to be used solely for children's books by gift and request of Mrs. Robert Sterling. Pending a memorial gift of children's books, we have delayed our purchase so as not to have duplicate copies on the shelves.

At the request of the trustees the library hours are given in this report. We have tried to work out hours which would enable all to use the library. Each period is a two hour one, and continues summer and winter.

Monday morning—10-12. Wednesday afternoon—2:30-4:30. Thursday evening 7-9. Saturday afternoon —2:30-4:30.

REPORT OF THE BI-CENTENNIAL COMMITTEE

At the town's annual March meeting in 1947, the Selectmen appointed a committee of five members consisting of Arthur T. Appleton, Henry D. Allison, Henry E. Fiske, Henry N. Gowing, and Robb Sagendorph, to serve as a Committee of Arrangements for the observance of Two Hundredth Anniversary of the town's settlement, to be held in June, 1952. Mrs. Fannie Dwight Clark was appointed to fill the vacancy on the board caused by the death of Mr. Fiske.

First meeting of the committee was held on March 9th, last; Henry D. Allison was made chairman. Frank Ellsworth Spaulding, LL.D., distinguished educator, now retired and living in Los Angeles, California, was invited to give the Historical Address and, at a later date, after coming to Dublin to consult with members of your committee, consented to accept the invitation.

Dr. Spaulding, born on "Spaulding Hill" in the west part of the town, attended school in old District No. 5 brick schoolhouse in his youthful days, was educated in this country, in Germany, and France. Amherst College, his Alma Mater, conferred upon him the degree of Doctor of Laws. Yale University established the Frank Ellsworth Spaulding Foundation in appreciation of his services to the college.

Suitable markers to designate important historical locations have been favorably considered and will be erected in due season. None of the \$500.00 already appropriated has yet been expended but, in order to complete the probable required total and make it less burdensome eventually, the committee recommends that an additional sum of \$500.00 be raised and appropriated this year.

It is hoped that the approaching Bi-Centennial celebration may be carried out as impressively and satisfactorily as was the One Hundredth Year observance in 1852. A great many appointments must be made and scores of townspeople will be called upon to assist in an effort to make the occasion a memorable success.

FOREST FIRES—OUR MOST SHAMEFUL WASTE

Everyone apparently fears fire but too many are careless with it. This is particularly true of fires in and near woodlands. Official figures show that more than 98 percent of all forest fires result from human carelessness and can be prevented. Consequently, we may say, "Forest Fires are our most shameful waste."

Annual forest fire losses are tremendous and their effects far reaching. Such fires destroy the raw products of the forests, the protection forests provide for game and the supply of ground water. They upset local economies by drawing men from gainful employment and requiring the expenditure of public funds to extinguish them.

Our forest fire organization is doing a good job in keeping the size of fires small but the number of fires is increasing. In 1949 there were 100 more fires in New Hampshire than in 1948, but they burned 500 acres less. For the warden and his deputies to do the job they are capable of, they must have the cooperation of the public—YOU!

The primary objective of all fire fighters is PREVENTION—fire stoppage. This is the goal toward which your local forest fire warden and his deputies are constantly working. It can be achieved ONLY IF YOU and YOU and YOU cooperate with them. It is worth YOUR effort and can be accomplished by:

1. Being careful with fire in or near woodland, being particularly careful with matches and cigarettes.

2. Securing the required written permit from the warden when the ground is not covered with snow.

3. Insisting that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.

4. Calling the warden promptly when fire is detected and aiding him to extinguish it.

Let's reduce the number of forest fires and eliminate our most shameful waste.



There were no changes in the teaching staff during the last school year and only one change at the end of the year. Mr. Wilson, the music supervisor, resigned at the close of the year and Mr. Coogan, who has been Music Supervisor in Jaffrey and Gardner, Mass., for the past several years, was elected to the position.

Two teachers, Mr. Keady and Mrs. Doyle are to be commended for their programs of professional improvement as evidenced by their attendance at evening courses in Keene last year and again this, and Mr. Keady's attendance at Boston University last summer. This growth in modern educational methods is reflected in the total educational tone of the school.



HOW FAR APART ARE THE POLES?

One of the most important subjects of study offered in our schools is that of reading and it is without doubt the most difficult to teach. In order to help teachers to acquire higher skill in this tremendously vital area all teachers of the Supervisory Union worked for five full school days (Nov. 7-11) under highly expert leaders from Boston University. The activity was officially called a workshop, and it truly was. Doctors Durrell, Murphy and Sullivan gave as fine a course as could possibly be desired. There wasn't a dull moment from start to finish and all teachers have reported a very helpful experience. The teachers paid one-fourth of the total cost of the course and the school districts shared in meeting the balance of the expenses.

PART III. SCHOOL PLANT

At last it is possible to report real improvement in the school plant. During the past summer the auditorium ceiling and walls were painted, the exterior woodwork of the building was painted and in the 5th and 6th grade room the ceiling and walls were painted, new shades were hung and new fluorescent lighting units were installed. All painting was done according to modern standards of color and light reflective values.

There is much work of this kind around the building that badly needs doing. If one room receives attention each year, the cost will not be excessive and soon the whole building will be greatly improved in appearance as well as in its ability to safeguard the health and welfare of the boys and girls. The budget has been prepared with this in mind.

Gentlemen:

In accordance with your instructions we have made an audit of the accounts and records of the Dublin School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1949. Submitted herewith is the report including Exhibits as detailed in the index.

Comparative Balance Sheets, June 30, 1948—June 30, 1949: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1948 and June 30, 1949, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein the Surplus increased by \$1,044.15 during the year.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B) An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District is made in Exhibit B, indicating the factors effecting the change. It should be pointed out that the School District received a deficiency appropriation of \$2,563.00 for the school year 1948—1949 whereas the Net Budget Deficit was only \$1,091.15. The excess of the deficiency appropriation received over the amount of the actual budget deficit was \$1,471.85. This excess was the principal factor resulting in the Surplus balance of \$1,419.70 at June 30, 1949.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations & Expenditures—Estimated & Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Exhibit C presents a Comparative Statement of Appropriations and Expenditures indicating a net overdraft of appropriations amounting to \$1,060.63.

Exhibit D presents a statement of actual revenues received as compared with budget estimates.

As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$1,060.63, plus a net revenue deficit of \$30.52, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$1,091.15.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the year and proof of Treasurer's balance at June 30, 1949 is indicated in Exhibit E. The accounts and records of the School District were found in good condition and our thanks are extended to the Officials of the District and the Superintendent's office for assistance rendered during the course of the audit.

March 8, 1949

The meeting was called to order by the moderator at two o'clock in the afternoon, followed by the reading of the warrant.

Article 1. The clerk was instructed to cast one vote for Arne H. Olsen for moderator. One vote was cast, and Mr. Olsen was elected and took the oath of office.

Article 2. The moderator was instructed to cast one vote for Mrs. Isabel F. Clukay for clerk. One vote was cast and Mrs. Clukay was elected and took the oath of office.

Article 3. The total number of ballots cast on the first balloting was 96. 49 votes were necessary for election. Dorothy Worcester received 25 votes; Christine Shook, 24; Marion Latti 30; Lois Faulkner, 21. 97 votes were cast on the second ballot; 49 were necessary for election. Dorothy Worcester received 25; Christine Shook, 24; Marion Latti, 30, Lois Faulkner, 18. 104 votes were cast on the third ballot; 53 were necessary for election. Dorothy Worcester received 28; Christine Shook, 30; Marion Latti, 45; Lois Faulkner 1. 99 votes were cast on the fourth ballot; 50 votes being necessary for election. Christine Shook received 50; Marion Latti 48; Gertrude Creighton, 1. Mrs. Shook was elected and took the oath of office.

Article 4. The total number of votes cast was 92. Gertrude Creighton received 31; Glen H. Scribner, 60; Helen Luopa, 1. Mr. Scribner was elected and took the oath of office.

It was moved and seconded that any candidate for school clerk, school treasurer, or member of the school board may place with the moderator, ballots with his name thereon and the office for which he is a candidate, at any school meeting and that it will be the duty of the moderator to appoint tellers to see that all candidates' names are distributed to the voters. The motion was carried unanimously.

Article 5. It was voted that the salaries of the district officers be as follows: School Board chairman, \$100.00; each other member of the school board, \$75.00; treasurer \$50.00; clerk \$5.00; each auditor, \$5.00.

It was also unanimously voted that the sum of \$300.00 be raised and appropriated to be added to the janitor's salary.

Article 6. It was voted that the reports from page 52 through 57 be accepted and adopted as printed in the Annual Report.

Article 7. Auditors elected were Phyllis S. Worcester and Ethel L. Adams, and they took the oath of office.

Article 8. \$27,412.00 was appropriated, this amount to include the appropriation made under Article 5 for the increase in the janitor's salary.

Article 9. \$200.00 was appropriated for the purchase of new equipment.

Article 10. It was voted that the sum of \$2,563.00 be raised and appropriated as a deficiency appropriation for the school year 1948—49, and that the money be made available before June 30, 1949.

The meeting adjourned at 3:30 P. M.

PART VI. AUXILIARY ACTIVITIES

A. Report of School Health Work

A. On March 17, 1949, physical examinations were made by Dr. Clark, and Dr. Mason assisted by the school nurse, and defects found were reported to the parents who were present.

B. The school nurse visited the school at regular intervals during the year.

C. Students were weighed and measured three times, and vision and hearing of the students was tested. The Mass. Vision test and the Maico Audiometer Test were used.

D. Defects found were followed up by notices, phone calls, interviews, and visits to the homes of the parents.

E. Registering pre-schoolers were given vision and hearing tests and defects found were reported to parents present.

F. Recommending exclusion from school of children having symptoms of communicable diseases in compliance with the regulations of the State Board of Education.

G. The first aid cabinet is equipped thoroughly for injuries and illness.

H. Records have been made and a health card is on file for each student including the diseased census, physical growth, heights, weights, and defects.

I. The school nurse attended the work shop in East Jaffrey and the Teachers' Convention in Manchester, N. H.

At this time the school health department wishes to express its appreciation to the principal, teachers, Supt. of Schools, Board of Education, and the local board of Parents and Teachers for their cooperation and help, and the local P. T. A. for the new examining gowns.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Dublin qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 14th day of March, 1950 at 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
