### Report of the School Board.

The number of schools supported by the town district during the year has been fourteen, the same as last year, and with one exception in the same school buildings. Following is a brief report of each school :

#### IRON WORKS DISTRICT.

Summer term of ten weeks, taught by Mrs. Carrie M. Leyland, who has had charge of this school, more or less, for several years. Mrs. Leyland is well qualified in every respect to fill the position of teacher. Thorough in her method of instruction, pleasant in her relations with her scholars, yet always maintaining good order. Improvement in all branches taught, satisfactory.

Whole number of scholars, 15.

Fall term of fourteen weeks, taught by Miss Edith M. Page. Miss Page has had considerable experience in teaching, having taught successfully several terms of school in the Page Hill district. This term of school was composed of some twentyfive scholars of all ages, and degrees of advancement, requiring a teacher possessing considerable tact as to management and ability to instruct. It is thought by many that we need our best teachers in the most advanced schools, which perhaps is true, so far as education is concerned, but we know from experience that it requires more patience and watchfulness on the part of the teacher in a school made up of several little fellows, than it does in one of larger scholars. Miss Page sustained her former reputation as a good instructress, and the school was like the summer term, a success.

#### GALE DISTRICT.

Summer term of nine weeks, fall term of fifteen weeks, both taught by Frank N. Merrill. This is the third successive term, we have taught this school, by the request of the district. In some branches of study this is one of themost, if not the most advanced school in town. Here are some scholars who have arrived at the age to begin to see the importance of gaining an education, hence during the past three terms of school, have applied themselves quite diligently to their studies, with good results. One young man from this school is now a student at Gilmanton academy. We hope more of them will do likewise.

#### PACE HILL DISTRICT.

Summer term of ten weeks, taught by Miss Edith M. Page. For several terms past Miss Page has labored faithfully for the educational wellfare of the scholars in this dristrict, always giving good satisfaction to all concerned.

Fall term of fourteen weeks, taught by Miss Fannie B. Page. Miss Page has spent considerable time and labor in gaining an education, having attended several terms of school at Plymouth, N. H. She is well fitted for the duties of the schoolroom; being able to bring up before her classes, in a systematic manner, by way of explanations, many points so essential in teaching children. The scholars seemed to understand all lessons gone over through the term, thus proving that they had been taught in a thorough manner.

Here are some quite good scholars.

#### LOUGEETOWN DISTRICT.

Summer term of ten weeks, fall term of fourteen weeks, both taught by Miss Carrie M. Sargent. This school has been under Miss Sargent's instruction for several terms, and seems to be making steady improvement. This is one of the smallest schools in town, yet the teacher seemed to find enough to do to occupy her time profitably.

#### ALLEN'S MILLS.

Summer term of ten weeks, taught by Mrs. Lizzie A. Young.

Mrs. Young has had considerable experience as a teacher and is a most excellent instructress. It was with many regrets that we found ourselves obliged to make a change for the second term. It was made necessary from sickness alone. Second term of fourteen weeks, taught by Miss Lizzie Toof.

Miss Toof came to us from Canada, having taught there for four years. Her experience there had well qualified her for school duties anywhere.

She has a keen perception of the duties of a teacher and a systematic manner. I consider the school very satisfactory.

Number of pupils first term, 4; average attendance, 4. Number of pupils second term, 5, average attendance, 4.

#### CORNER DISTRICT.

Summer term of ten weeks and fall term of fourteen weeks, taught by Mrs. Alice E. Langley.

Mrs. Langley is a faithful and efficient teacher and always pleasant to her pupils. Good advancement was made in nearly all of the studies. There was, as usual, considerable irregularity in attendance on the part of some of the pupils.

Sickness in some cases was a just cause for absence but there were some others that were absent more from lack of interest on part of the parents, a case which is considered deplorable.

Number of pupils first term, 25. Number of pupils second term, 31, average attendance, 19.

#### JONES' MILLS.

Summer term of seven weeks and fall term of seventeen weeks, both taught by Miss Annie E. Weeks.

The fact that Miss Weeks was returned to this school by 'the request of the district is a sufficient recommendation. She has sustained her position in the hearts of parents and pupils and her school gave evidence of good instruction and good government,

Number of pupils first term, 13; Number of pupils second term, 14; average attendance, 11.

#### SANBORN.

Summer term of ten weeks, taught by Miss Fannie B. Page.

A faithful, energetic teacher and a satisfactory term of school.

Owing to some misunderstanding on my part Miss Page was not returned in the fall.

Fall term of fourteen weeks, taught by Miss Josephine M. Clifford.

This was the teacher's first attempt at teaching. She has all of the requisites of a teacher and with a little more confidence may soon become one of our best teachers. The school made good advancement and the recitations were quite good.

Number of pupils first term, 8. Number of pupils second term, 7; average attendance, 6.

#### LAMPREY.

Summer term of ten weeks and fall term of fourteen weeks, both taught by Mrs. Myra F. Lane.

Mrs. Lane is a very efficient teacher. She spares no pains to make every point clear and never resting until she feels it is understood by the pupils. The school made excellent progress under her care.

l heard of no dissatisfaction but words of commendation instead. Mrs. Lane is deeply interested in educational matters and is at present attending the State Normal school.

Number of pupils first term, 13. Number of pupils second term, 12; average attendance, 11.

#### KELLEY DISTRICT.

Spring term of ten weeks taught, by Miss Mary E. Weeks of Gilmanton.

Miss Weeks has taught several terms in town and has met with good success. With one of two exceptions the scholars made a good showing. This is a large school and there are so many classes it is impossible for any teacher to do them justice.

Fall term of thirteen weeks, taught by Miss Alice Sanborn.

This was Miss Sanborn's first attempt to teach and being a resident of this district she labored under many difficulties that she would not have met with if she had not been so wellknown by her pupils.

Miss Sanborn has a good education, has a very pleasant way of explaining and making plain the difficult points. With a little more experience which all teachess have to acquire Miss Sanborn will become a first-class teacher.

#### Potter District.

Spring term of ten weeks and fall term of fourteen weeks, taught by Miss Annie M. Barber of Gilmanton Iron Works.

For several years past Miss Barber has had charge of this school and has proved an excellent teacher in every respect.

The pupils under her instructions have made good advancemence and in a thorough manner.

#### POND DISTRICT.

It was thought best to unite the Pond and Griffin schools, or rather alternate them, have a spring term in the Pond and a fall term in the Griffin.

Spring term, taught by Mrs. Fannie Osborne. Mrs. Osborne's report has appeared many times during the past fifteen years, undoubtedly the readers are familiar with it, so it will be useless for me to write a repetition. The school consisted of four small scholars, and under their teacher's instruction the little fellows made very good advancement.

#### SMITH'S MEETING HOUSE DISTRICT.

Spring term of ten weeks and fall term of fourteen weeks, taught by Miss Lena R. Parsons of Gilmanton Iron Works.

With one or two exceptions the scholars in this school are eager to gain a thorough knowledge of their text books, and under Miss Parsons' instruction made very good advancement.

#### GRIFFIN DISTRICT.

Fall term of thirteen weeks, taught by Miss Esther Goodwin of Gilmanton Iron Works. This was Miss Goodwin's first attempt to wield the birch and a successful one. In this school at the present time there are seven scholars. The examination showed that some very good work had been accomplished.

If Miss Goodwin intends to make teaching her future avocation, she will add one more to our present corps of teachers.

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#### GENERAL REMARKS.

The schools in town, under the instruction of their several teachers, have, as a whole, made commendable progress. It was the aim at the beginning of the year to employ the best available talent, always giving the preference to those of our own town, and it is very gratifying to know that Gilmanton still has within her borders some very excellent teachers. Only two were employed from out of town. While the teachers have labored indefatigably for the advancement of those in their charge, it seems that never before have parents and others "visited school" as frequently as during the past year. This is one of the indications that everything will go well in the school room.

Our state superintendent, Mr. Gowing, is doing a large amount of work throughout the state in the interest of our schools, holding institutes for the benefit of our teachers. We believe every teacher should avail themselves of the privilege extended to them by a law of the state and visit at least one of these institutes each year. Much valuable information can be gained as to the best methods of managing and imparting instruction in our public schools. Then, again, we believe all teachers should be a subscriber for some good publication, devoted wholly to the interest of school work. Many valuable hints can be gleaned from this source. In short, if we are to keep up with the best methods of teaching, we should avail ourselves of every source of knowledge which will be for the interest of those intrusted to our intellectual guidance.

#### SCHOOL HOUSES.

The school buildings are, with one or two exceptions, in pretty good repair. The one at Kelley's Corner needs considerable repairing. It will be remembered at the last annual meeting the Cogswell district asked permission to move their schoolhouse from "Nighthawk Hollow" on to the main road, the district agreeing to move the building free of expense to the town. The town appropriated fifty dollars to make repairs, which might be occasioned by moving. After an unsuccessful attempt at moving the building whole, it was decided to take it down, which has been done, and the building now stands on the new site. We presume it will be repaired and put in good condition by the time the spring schools open. T. e schoolhouses in the Corner and Pond districts have been newly shingled and otherwise repaired at an expense of about ninety dollars.

After returning our thanks to parents, friends, teachers and scholars throughout the town for their kindness and courtesy, in conclusion let us say that it is our earnest desire that success may crown the efforts of all in their endeavors to attain an accomplished education.
