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TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hampton Falls in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hampton Falls on Tuesday, the Ninth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the control of the White Pine Blister Rust, in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Department.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$227.71 for Town Road Aid, the State to contribute \$1,518.04.
- 5. To raise and appropriate, for economic advancement of the Town through publicity and promotional services of the Seacoast Regional Development Association, in cooperation with other communities, a sum not exceeding one-hundredth of one percent of assessed valuation, the sum of \$151.50.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the Fire Department to de-

fray the expenses of the Red Line Telephone system and equipment for trucks.

- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$475.00 to purchase the snowplow now rented.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$148.00 to paint the Tractor shed.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$500.00 to repair or remove the Town Horse Sheds.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to insulate the Library ceiling.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to sell any property acquired by tax sale.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.



School Report

SCHOOL WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Hampton Falls qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the Fifth day of March 1954, at Four o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
- 8. To see if the District will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the District, as determined by the School Board in its annual report.
- 9. To see if the District will vote and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for fixing playground.

- 10. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the District, such advances, grants, and aids or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from State Agencies or the United States Government or any department or agency thereof.
- 11. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to execute any and all contracts or agreements necessary, proper and advisable in connection with the construction and equipping of an addition to the school building.
- 12. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to engage a qualified architect for the purpose of securing plans and specifications for the construction of an addition to the school, and to solicit bids from competent contracting firms, to accept the most advantageous bid or bids, to supervise the construction and to see that the contracts are carried out, and to accept the project for the School District, and to take any other necessary or desirable action in connection with such bids, contracts, construction and all other matters in connection therewith.
- 13. To vote to build a two-room addition to the school building in Hampton Falls.
- 14. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000 or any part thereof for the construction and equipping of an addition to the school, and in order to furnish such funds to authorize the School Board to issue notes or bonds upon the credit of the District in accordance with Chapter 72 New Hampshire revised laws (Municipal Bond Act) and any special acts governing the issuing of bonds or notes by the School District of Hampton Falls, said notes and/or bonds to bear interest at a rate not exceeding 4%

per annum, payable semi-annually, to mature during a 20 year period.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Hampton Falls School Board:

I herewith present to you my 24th report as Superintendent of your schools. The current year began on Wednesday, September 9, 1953 with an initial enrollment of 94. This compares with last year's September enrollment of 77 and 61 of the year previous. Since the first grade was the heaviest with 26 pupils enrolled, the prospects for increased enrollment for future years is evident. It would seem that the time has come when a complete survey of our situation should be made.

At the present time we have an unsatisfactory alignment of grades owing to the large entering class. Since it is all important that our children secure a good start in the first grade, one teacher has been assigned to this group. This leaves two teachers to work with the remaining five classes. Because of grade enrollment it was necessary to divide the fourth grade. This leaves two teachers with two full grades and part of another. The census shows a first grade, at least, nearly as large as that of this year. If this proves true, our situation will be critical.

By enactment of the legislature of 1953 the position of Helping Teacher was established for six unions in the State. The criteria for determining the unions eligible for such assistance included such factors as: the number of school districts comprising a union, the number of teachers, number of pupils, number of schools, population trends and general educational problems of the communities served. With these criteria, Supervisory Union No. 21 was offered the services for which this law provided. The helping teacher is a full time employee

serving throughout the calendar year. She will be a highly trained person serving teachers, pupils, parents, and citizens of the communities. She is not a supervisor as such, but is at the service of the teachers at their request. With the large classes we now have, her help will be in increasing demand. The State Department of Education has obligated itself to pay \$2,500. toward the salary of this teacher. The remainder of the total salary is to be apportioned among the seven towns of the Union in the same manner as other Union costs. Since the total salary voted by the Union at its regular budget meeting was \$4,100. with the state paying \$2,500. of this amount, and since Hampton Falls pays 4.96% the cost to the district will be \$79.36. This amount is included in the school budget as presented.

Prior to the acceptance of this help the board members of the seven districts held meetings with the Commissioner of Education and with a helping teacher now working in New Hampshire. At these meetings the plan of this teacher was carefully outlined and her actual duties were explained. As a result of careful study by the board members, it was voted to adopt this means of improving the efficiency of our schools.

Federal Aid has been received in all seven districts of Union No. 21. This was made possible by amendment of the house bill 874. As originally passed, aid was given to districts educating children whose parents are employed on federal property "part or all of which is situated in such state." Since the Naval Shipyard is located in Maine, our district was not eligible for federal funds. However, the amendment allowed aid for children whose parents work on federal property and who live in reasonable commuting distance of said property. Thus our districts became eligible and received as reimbursement for the year 1952-1953 a total of \$32,172.90. Hampton Falls received \$1,128.60.

The work of the Supervisory Union is continually increasing. Teachers are being added almost yearly in each of the districts, because of constantly increasing enrollments. The entrance of pupils from other districts always offers problems of placement and orientation. The federal government has now entered the field through its aid program. These are a few of the reasons that the Union felt an executive assistant should be employed. This assistant will be paid on the same basis as all Union employees with each of the districts contributing its proportional share. A more efficient organization will result.

Hampton Falls has a school building of which it can well be proud. It is an attractive modern building and well located. Such a building attracts people to the town. The Parent-Teacher association is interested in developing the playground facilities. Good playgrounds help materially in the morale of the school. Children who learn to play together develop the ability to work together. The P. T. A. is to be commended upon their interest in this phase of the school program.

The immediate concern of the school board is the welfare of the children of the district. Under its guidance the school will keep pace with the ever increasing services of schools everywhere. For their continued advice and help I express my appreciation.
