*To the inhabitants of the Town of Henniker in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at Cogswell High School Auditorium in said Henniker on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next, at one of the clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

Polls open at 1:00 p. m. and close at 8:00 p. m.

Town Meeting will be recessed for School Meeting.

The articles in the Warrant will be taken up at 8:00 p. m.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
2. To hear and act upon the reports of Town Officers, Library Trustees, Trustees of Trust Funds, and other Committees.
3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year.
4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of highways and bridges, and repair or purchase of machinery.
5. To see what action the Town will take in regard to Public Health and raise and appropriate money for the same.

6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expense of observing Memorial Day.

7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of Tucker Free Library.

8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of the Fire Department.

9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintaining hydrant service for the ensuing year.

10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lighting for the ensuing year.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid Construction of Class V roads.

13. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the operation of the Town Disposal Area.

14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Age Assistance.

15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Concord Hospital.

16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for legal services.

17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Merrimack Valley Region Association.

18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the District Court.

19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Workmen's Compensation.

20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Henniker Community Center.

21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to prevent the spread of White Pine Blister.

22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Civil Defense.

23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expenses of the Planning Board.

24. To see what action the Town will take in regard to relocating the Town Sheds, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

25. To see if the Town will vote to observe Henniker's Bi-Centennial in 1968, raise and appropriate a sum of money for support of same; instruct the Selectmen to appoint a committee chairman, or take any other action relating thereto.

26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to pay to the Trustees of Trust Funds the five hundred dollars received from the Government for a flowage easement thereon.

27. To see if the Town will vote to have a complete re-appraisal of the Town made by the State Tax Commission, or a private firm, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

28. To see if the Town will vote to use a portion of the

accumulated income of the Edna Dean Proctor Fund for the purpose of constructing a historical display area in the Tucker Free Library.

29. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the action taken at the last Town Meeting under Article 32, relating to the construction and financing of a sewerage system.

30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to file in behalf of the Town an application (in form and manner required by the United States and in conformity with P.L. 560, 83rd Congress) and do whatever else may be required for an advance, in the amount of \$42,500.00, to be made by the United States to the Town of Henniker to aid in defraying the cost of final report and plan preparation for sewerage and sewage treatment facilities for the Town of Henniker, and further, to see if the Town will make the necessary arrangements to provide such additional funds as may be required to defray the cost of preparation of the report and plans.

31. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Zoning Ordinance submitted by the Planning Board.

ZONING ORDINANCE  
FOR THE TOWN OF  
HENNIKER, NEW HAMPSHIRE

An ordinance to promote the health, safety, convenience and general welfare of the community in regulating the use of land in the Town of Henniker.

ARTICLE I

*Preamble*

In pursuance of authority conferred by Chapter 31, sections 60-89, N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated 1955, and for the



purpose of promoting the health, safety, prosperity, convenience and general welfare, as well as efficiency and economy in the process of development of the inhabitants of the incorporated Town of Henniker, N. H. by securing safety from fire, congestion and other dangers, providing adequate areas between buildings and various rights of way, by preserving the rural charm now possessed by our Town of Henniker, N. H. now therefore the following Ordinance is hereby enacted by the voters of the Town of Henniker, N. H. in official annual meeting convened.

## ARTICLE II

### *Districts*

For the purpose of this ordinance the Town of Henniker is divided into districts as shown on the zoning map filed with the Town Clerk and dated February 6, 1967 and including the following:

(1) Residential Districts; (2) Commercial District; (3) Recreational Districts; (4) Agricultural and Rural Districts. The zoning map will be adjusted and brought up to date within one year from the establishment of this ordinance.

## ARTICLE III

### *General Provisions*

A. No owner or occupant of land in any District shall permit fire or other ruins to be left, but shall remove same to ground level within one year.

B. The removal of clay, sand or gravel is permitted for private use or for sale. No pit or cellar hole to be left in an unsightly or hazardous condition.

C. All dwellings and sanitary systems shall be constructed and maintained in accordance with the standards set and en-

forced by the N. H. State Department of Health, and by the N. H. Water Pollution Commission.

D. Advertising signs shall be permitted as designated under the various districts. Official Town, State or Federal signs shall be exempt from these regulations.

E.

1. Trailers and mobile homes may be used as residences in agricultural and Rural districts as long as they comply with the resident provisions for the District in which they are located, and sites approved by the Board of Adjustment.
2. The above applies only to trailer and/or mobile homes utilized for residential purposes, and is not intended to cover single trailer and/or mobile homes owned by residents and stored or parked during periods of non-use on the premises of the owner.
3. The Board of Adjustment may approve the temporary use of a trailer or mobile home to be maintained as living quarters by a person employed in adjoining construction work, or for whom a residence is being built, or as an office, store-room or shop in connection with construction work, provided that such use is shown to be a temporary expedient, and also that the use will comply with the sanitary protection requirement listed, and in compliance with the State Law.

F. The frontage on corner lots will be on the street the house faces, so placed as not to conflict with existing spacing if possible.

G. If any proposed use, in any district, is such as to attract vehicles, ample space shall be provided on the property to accommodate them.

H. Nothing in this Ordinance shall be construed to prevent the continuance of any existing use of land and buildings.

## ARTICLE IV

*Residential District*

The Residential District shall enjoy the following provisions:

1. It shall be mainly a residential district. Uses other than specified here will not be permitted.

2. Home products and produce may be bought and sold, and exposed for sale in this district.

3. Single or multiple family residences, tourist homes, convalescent homes and apartment houses may be maintained and operated in this District.

4. Residences may be used to house such uses by the owner or tenant as offices for doctor, engineer, architect, lawyer, real estate, insurance, or other recognized profession, or such home occupations as hairdressing, dressmaking, manufacture of craft products for sale, antique shops or manufacture of food products.

5. Churches and schools are permitted in this district.

6. *Frontage.* Every building lot shall have a minimum lot frontage of one hundred twenty-five (125) feet.

7. *Set Back.* There shall be between the nearest edge of the right of way and extreme front of any building, a minimum distance of thirty-five (35) feet. Any new construction may be in line with existing buildings if within one hundred fifty (150) feet thereof.

8. *Side and Rear Set Back.* No Building shall be less than twenty (20) feet from the property line.

9. *Minimum Land Area.* No lot shall be less than 20,000 square feet.

10. Property owners or business, profession, or service enterprises shall be allowed two advertising signs, such signs not

to total over 4 sq. ft. in area for each sign. One or more signs pertaining to the lease, sale, or use of a lot or building on which placed, or signs dealing with business located within the town, shall not exceed a total of 4 square feet.

11. No neon, tubular glass, or privately-owned flashing electric signs shall be allowed in this district.

## ARTICLE V

### *Commercial District*

The Commercial District shall enjoy the following provisions:

1. Any use permitted in the Residential District under the same provisions as apply to residences in said district.

2. Lodging houses, apartment houses, hotels, inns, motels, tourist courts, cabins, including such retail business within these permitted buildings as are conducted for the convenience of the residents or guests shall be permitted.

3. Shops, restaurants and other retail establishments.

4. Garages, parking lots, and filling stations.

5. Business offices.

6. There shall be between the nearest edge of the right of way and the extreme front of any building, a **minimum distance** of twenty-five (25) feet.

7. No building shall be located within ten (10) feet of the side and rear property lines.

8. Advertising signs which bring attention to the goods or services sold on the premises shall be permitted. These signs shall be not over two in number and not to exceed twenty (20) sq. ft. in area for each sign.



ARTICLE VI

*Recreational District*

The Recreational District shall enjoy the following provisions:

1. It shall be mainly a district of seasonal dwelling and establishments open primarily for recreational and seasonal use.

2. Any use permitted in the Residential District under the same provisions as apply to residences and other establishments in this district.

3. *Frontage.* Every seasonal dwelling and establishment of a seasonal nature shall have a minimum lot frontage of not less than ninety (90) feet.

4. *Minimum Land Area.* No lot shall be less than 10,000 square feet.

5. No building shall be located nearer than twenty (20) feet to an abutter's property line, twenty (20) feet from State water line, and thirty-five (35) feet from the nearest edge of the right of way.

6. Two advertising signs will be allowed in this district pertaining to the lease, sale or use of a lot or building on which it is placed. The size of these signs shall not exceed 4 sq. ft., as in the Residential District.

ARTICLE VII

*Agricultural and Rural District*

The Agricultural and Rural District shall enjoy the following provisions:

1. Any use permitted in the Residential District under the same provisions as apply to residences in said area.

2. *Minimum Land Area.* No lot shall be less than 20,000 square feet.

3. General farming, including horticulture, dairying, livestock, veterinarian, poultry raising, and other agricultural enterprises or uses, or the raising of animals for other purposes are permitted in this district.

4. Directional signs relating to a business operated in the Town of Henniker shall be permitted, provided that said directional signs for any one enterprise does not exceed one in any two mile length of road, not including those to indicate change in direction.

5. Advertising signs relating to business operated in the Town of Henniker may be permitted adjacent to the by-pass, not to exceed forty-eight (48) sq. ft. in area. Advertising signs adjacent to the other state roads may be permitted not to exceed twenty (20) square feet.

## ARTICLE VIII

### *Non-Conforming Uses and Buildings*

#### (Definitions H and I)

A. Any non-conforming use or building (other than uses specified in B below) may continue in their present use, except that any non-conforming use or building may not be:

1. Changed to another non-conforming use;
2. Re-established after discontinuance for two years, except to a use conforming to the district in which it is located;

B. No outdoor advertising structure may continue as a non-conforming use for more than two years after the effective date of this Ordinance unless it is designed to direct attention to a business or profession conducted on the premises.

## ARTICLE IX

*Administration*

1. It shall be the duty of the Board of Selectmen, and the Board is hereby given authority and power to enforce the Provisions of this Ordinance.

2. After passage of this Ordinance, it shall be unlawful to erect any structure or building, or to relocate any building in any District, without first obtaining a permit from the Board of Adjustment. (This permit is to insure that the proposed construction conforms to the permitted uses in the zone that it occupies. Also that it is located a proper distance from the boundaries of the land on which it is built.)

3. The Board of Adjustment shall issue any and all permits requested when such permit is in accordance with the provisions of the Ordinance.

4. No permit for remodeling shall be required provided the purpose for which the building is to be used is not changed, and is subject to review by the Board of Adjustment.

5. Upon any well founded information that this Ordinance is being violated, the Board of Selectmen shall take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance by seeking an injunction in Superior Court, or by any other legal action.

## ARTICLE X

*Board of Adjustment*

Within thirty days after the adoption of this Ordinance, and thereafter as terms expire, or vacancies occur, the Board of Selectmen shall make appointments to the Board of Adjustment of five members conforming in duties to the provisions of Chapter 31 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 1955. Thereafter as terms expire or vacancies occur

the appointing authority shall be responsible for filling vacancies and maintaining full membership on the Board of Adjustment. The Board of Adjustment here provided shall conform in membership and term of office to the provisions of Sec. 67, Chapter 31, N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated 1955. Chapter 31:27 "Powers of Board of Adjustment". The board of adjustment shall have the following powers;

I. To hear and decide appeals where it is alleged there is error in any order, requirement, decision, or determination made by an administrative official in the enforcement hereof or of any ordinance adopted pursuant thereto.

II. To hear and decide special exceptions to the terms of the ordinance upon which such board is required to pass under such ordinance.

III. To authorize upon appeal in specific cases such variance from the terms of the ordinance as will not be contrary to the public interest, where, owing to special conditions, a literal enforcement of the provisions of the ordinance will result in unnecessary hardship, and so that the spirit of the ordinance shall be observed and substantial justice done.

IV. In exercising the above-mentioned powers such board may, in conformity with the provisions hereof, reverse or affirm, wholly or partly, or may modify the order, requirement, decision, or determination appealed from and may make such order, or decision, as ought to be made, and to that end shall have all the powers of the officer from whom the appeal is taken.

V. The concurring vote of three members of the board shall be necessary to reverse any action of such administrative official, or to decide in favor of the applicant on any matter upon which it is required to pass under any such ordinance, or to effect any variation in such ordinance."

In addition to the general powers granted said Board of



Adjustment by said Chapter 31, it may, in harmony with, and subject to its provisions:

A. Permit in the Agricultural-Rural District, any industry which after public hearing proves it can meet the following requirements:

1. Be located at least 35 feet from the nearest edge of the right of way, and not less than 20 feet from each side and rear boundary.
2. Provide adequate parking facilities for freight and delivery trucks, and for employee and customer parking.
3. Will not offend, by reason of the emission of smoke, dust, gas, noise, odor or fumes.

B. Rule on minor adjustments within all districts such as:

1. Small lots.
2. Cases of impaired visibility on corners.
3. Topography.
4. Replacement by fire.
5. Street curvature.
6. Outdoor advertising signs.

## ARTICLE XI

### *Penalty*

Every person, persons, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be fined not more than ten dollars, upon conviction, for each day such violations may exist.

## ARTICLE XII

### *Amendments*

This Ordinance may be amended as provided by Chapter 31-63, 64 N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated. However, no

amendment shall be acted upon by a Town Meeting until a report shall have been made by the Planning Board.

The Planning Board shall hold a public hearing of proposed amendments when deemed necessary. No proposed amendment shall be heard which has not been presented to the Planning Board at least 20 days prior to such hearing.

The Planning Board shall transmit each and every proposed amendment which has been submitted to it pursuant to this Article to the Board of Selectmen prior to the closing date of the Town Warrant. The Planning Board shall submit its report on each and every proposed amendment in the Town Report.

Chapter 31:64 — “Changes in Regulations, etc. Such regulations, restrictions and boundaries may from time to time be amended or repealed. In case of a protest against such change, signed by the owner of twenty per cent either of the area of the lots included in such proposed change, or of those immediately adjacent in the rear thereof extending one hundred feet from the street frontage of such opposite lots, such amendment shall not become effective except by the favorable vote of three fourths of all the members of the legislative body of such municipality.”

Chapter 31.69 — “Appeals to the board of adjustment may be taken by any person aggrieved or by any officer, department, board, or bureau of the municipality affected by any decision of the administrative officer. Such appeal shall be taken within a reasonable time, as provided by the rules of the board, by filing with the officer from whom the appeal is taken and with the board a notice of appeal specifying the grounds thereof. The officer from whom the appeal is taken shall forthwith transmit to the board all the papers constituting the record upon which the action appealed from was taken.”

## ARTICLE XIII

### Saving Clause

The invalidity of any provisions of this Ordinance shall not affect the validity of any other provisions.

ARTICLE XIV

*When Effective*

This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage.

ARTICLE XV

*Definitions*

For the purpose of this Ordinance, certain terms are defined as provided in this section.

A. *Home products and produce*, means and includes everything of an agricultural nature, grown, produced, conditioned or otherwise carried on the property of the resident, also such articles as are manufactured or altered by members of the household of the bona fide resident of any property.

B. *Right of way*, means and includes all range roads, Town, State and Federal highways, and the land on either side of same as covered by law to determine the widths of the right of way.

C. *Tourist Home*, means any place consisting of a room or groups of rooms located on one premises, where transient accommodations for sleeping or living purposes for not more than six persons are provided.

D. *Accessory Building*, means a building subordinate to the main building on a lot, and used for purposes customarily incidental to those of the main building.

E. *Hotel or Inn*, means any building or portion thereof, where lodging is offered to transient guests for compensation and in which there are more than five sleeping rooms with no cooking facilities in an individual room or apartment.

F. *Tourist Court, Cabins, Motel*, mean any group of two or more detached or semi-detached buildings containing guest

rooms or apartments provided in connection therewith, automobile space, which group is designed or used primarily for the accomodation of automobile travelers, including groups designated as tourist courts, cabins and motel developments.

G. *Frontage*, means the length of the lot bordering the public right of way.

H. *Use, non-conforming*, means a use which lawfully occupied a building or land at the time this Ordinance became effective and which does not conform with use regulations of the District in which it is located.

I. *Structure, non-conforming*, means a structure which is lawfully maintained at the time this Ordinance became effective and which does not conform with the regulations of the District in which it is located.

32. To transact any other business that may properly come before this meeting.

Article 21. VOTED, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700.00) for Workmen's Compensation.

Article 22. VOTED, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for the support of the Henniker Community Center.

Article 23. VOTED, that the Town raise and appropriate

the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) to prevent the spread of White Pine Blister.

Article 24. VOTED, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for Civil Defense for the year 1966.

Article 25. VOTED, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) to defray the expenses of the Planning Board.

Article 27. VOTED, that the question of providing a suitable room for housing the Historical Collection be left in the hands of the Tucker Free Library Trustees; and that the Trustees give a detailed report on the matter at next year's Annual Town Meeting.

Article 28. VOTED, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for land purchase and expenses, and that the Selectmen be authorized to submit plans and recommendations at the next Town Meeting.

Article 29. VOTED, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) to paint and repair the "Leatherboard" Bridge.

Article 30. VOTED, that the Town appropriate the sum not exceeding Thirty Five Thousand Dollars (\$35,000.00) for the purpose of making improvements to the Class 5 roads within the Town; such sum to be raised through the issuance of bonds or notes under and in compliance with the provisions of Chapter 241 New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended, and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the date and place of payment of such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other steps as may be necessary

to negotiate such bonds or notes as shall be to the best interests of the Town of Henniker. The roads to be improved under this appropriation shall be determined by a committee of seven, including the selectmen, who will work with the State Highway Department in compiling information and making a map showing all the roads in town, together with an evaluation of need for improvement on each section. Such evaluation to be used in determining which sections shall have priority. The committee shall also determine how fast the program will be carried out, taking into consideration all existing conditions such as availability of equipment and other conditions which effect costs and thus determine the feasibility of doing the work at any particular time; the appointment of the members of this committee to be left in the hands of the Board of Selectmen. (Note — This vote found to be not in compliance with the New Hampshire Statutes.)

Article 31. VOTED, that the Town relinquish all claim which it may have on the Miller Howe sign, which now reposes in the Tucker Free Library, in favor of the present owner of the Miller Howe Farm.

Article 32. VOTED, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Seventy Thousand Dollars (\$370,000.00) as the Town's share of the Overall Sewerage Project as delineated in the Preliminary Engineering Report entitled "Preliminary Engineering Survey and Report on Sewerage and Sewage Treatment for the Town of Henniker". The work under this project would generally include the sewage treatment plant, Interceptors A through E, Pumping Stations 1, 2 and 3 and lateral sewers in Depot Hill Road, Gulf Road, Cressey Street, College Sewer, Fairview Avenue, Western Avenue, Hall Avenue, Rush Road, Maple Street Extended, and Gould Street; that the money to be raised be done by a bond issue to be



arranged for by the Board of Selectmen. (Note — This vote found to be unacceptable to the State of New Hampshire.)

## DEPARTMENT OF POLICE

The department purchased (2) 2-way hand portable radios and carrying cases for \$345 which ties into our present radio system. These portables were used many times this year on stakeouts, missing persons, accidents, checking buildings and general coverage. They are a great asset to our "Blue System".

There was an increase in the following categories this year: Telephone calls, missing persons, accidents, vandalism, disturbing the peace, dog bites and strays, messages delivered, breaking and entering, prowlers, assisting other police departments.

One of our rising costs each year is for parking signs. This year it is \$113.26. Many signs are destroyed by vandalism during the year, but the help of the public in preserving these signs could cut costs considerably.

The number of breaks increased this year. The greater number were in summer residences and camps. A plea to the public again; jot down license numbers and descriptions of vehicles and persons seen around or near these places, time of day and any details, then call your Police Department immediately. This information is valuable in solving these cases and can aid in the prevention of future breaks.

Other episodes of vandalism took place in the Henniker Cemetery where grave stones and markers were pushed over; and a short time before Christmas a Blue Spruce tree was cut down. Also, the (4) Bridge lights were damaged and broken. Unfortunately, the files of these cases remain open, pending further investigation.

There are people coming to your homes selling chances, articles or services. Be careful who you do business with. Ask for identification and check all suspicious persons out through your Police Department.



Parking is a problem for Henniker, because we have very few parking spaces available for the large number of vehicles. The spaces in the "Square" are limited parking and should always be available for the shopper. Please be considerate — don't be an overtime parker.

Members of the department attended Police School scheduled through our State Police which was held in Hillsboro. Besides their regular duties, the officers served at the graduation exercises for the High School and N. E. College, H. S. Basketball Games, Community Center Activities, Parades, Painting Lines in Square, Oratorical Contest and Political Rallies.

Tucker Free Library

## REPORT OF THE FRIENDS OF THE LIBRARY

The Friends of the Library was founded last year, a non-profit organization open to all residents of Henniker, to assist the Trustees and Librarians in making the Tucker Free Library more useful to the town. We hope that you will visit the library in the very near future and see for yourselves what has been accomplished in the last few months.

Our purposes have been to create better facilities for young readers, to develop a research area where our books of special interest which are too rare and/or valuable for loan may be studied at leisure, and to organize and properly display our historical collection.

As you know, the main part of the historical collection was housed in crowded glass cases, not properly labeled, and not displayed so as to interest the few visitors who entered the room in recent years. We were extremely fortunate in having the assistance of Mr. Daniel Giffen, Director of the New Hampshire Historical Society, in this phase of our work. As of now most of the collection has been cleaned and/or repaired, roughly organized, and a portion of it put on display to better advantage. The work of organizing, registering and identifying the collection is still in process.

Our Children's Activities Committee ran a very successful summer program for the children last year, and this program will continue. This committee has also made use of the space made available when the trustees had the center glass case removed from the historical room to arrange a new reading area for younger children. Since we lacked funds to get all of the necessary equipment, old bookcases were refinished and are being used temporarily. When you visit this room, we think you will be especially interested in the historical display requested by students of the sixth grade, and their own display of Henniker history made in connection with their school work. You will also notice that the model house, made by

the students of Miss Lena Merrick in 1913-14 has been cleaned and restored and is now on exhibit in this room.

Library records show that the use of the library by younger readers has increased each year, as it has throughout the country, and this trend will become greater with the new program of cooperation between our town schools and our library.

You will be asked to vote, at Town Meeting, on a new project to further improve our facilities for children and to create a new historic area. To finance this project, the accumulated funds of the Proctor Trust will be requested. This Trust was established in the will of Edna Dean Proctor for necessary maintenance of the stone bridge and the Proctor fountain, and for other projects "of beauty and utility" for the use of the town. We feel that the improvement of the library would be most suitable as a memorial to the memory of Miss Proctor.

Plans for the new historic area have been made by Mr. Giffen, based on the original blue prints of the building, and making use of the space planned for expansion when the need arose. The area will include a proper storage space for that part of the historical collection not on display, and for a historical room where displays will be changed regularly. Using the present historical room for children will eliminate the need of hiring an additional librarian, which would be necessary if such a room were placed on another floor of the building. The new historical room would be open on a regular schedule and supervised by volunteers trained for that purpose.

The enthusiastic response and the endless amount of volunteer work so graciously given by the town makes us feel that our project has been, and will be, of great service to our citizens. We would like to thank all of those who have helped and who have offered their help for the future, and most especially our Library Trustees and our librarians.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE HENNIKER PLANNING BOARD

Regular meetings were held during the year on the third Tuesday of each month, except July. Often, Town's people attended to enter into the Board's discussions.

Last year, the Board had prepared a construction ordinance requiring a solid foundation, a lined masonry chimney, and commonly accepted permanent siding. The Board proposed a one-year trial of this. Due to oversight and insufficient time before Town Meeting, no public hearings were held on this, so it was impossible to include it in the town warrant. Lyle Wimmergren has taken leave of absence and Andy Holton is filling in as secretary

The first part of the present year was spent in endeavoring to have some areas cleaned up and an attempt was made to eliminate some junk cars. An advertisement was put in the local papers stating that if anyone would call the chairman of the Planning Board and ask to have his junk car removed, it would be done free, if the car had some salvage value. Otherwise, a small charge would be made. There were not many requests for the service. More should be done in this area.

After this, the Board had discussions on the proposed sewer project. Several visitors attended. The Engineering firm sent two men to our second meeting, which was also well attended by visitors. A long discussion was held on all aspects and alternate solutions. As a result of these meetings, it is the opinion of the Board that the proposal is the best for the Town, and suggest that all citizens support this much-needed project.

The subject for the remainder of the year was zoning. It was

felt by the Board and the Selectmen, some of each board having attended instructive meetings on the subject, that it was better for the Town to proceed to a limited zoning ordinance, rather than a temporary construction ordinance. Copies of the proposal were distributed early in January and discussed and corrected late in January. We believe we have the fairest and simplest zoning ordinance of the many we have read that are being proposed or used at the present time.

The Board urges your support of zoning as a step in the right direction to preserve the natural beauty and orderly development of the useful land remaining in Henniker.

During 1966 the Community Center sponsored 47 Saturday night dances for the teenagers in the Henniker area. In the winter months, Joe Clement coached basketball for boys from Grade 5 through 8 on Saturdays and these boys are presently playing in a league with Hopkinton, Boscawen, Penacook and Chichester. Uniforms have been provided for both of our teams.

A men's team is also sponsored by the Center and their games are scheduled against Milford, Goffstown, New Boston, Weare and Manchester. These games are played at the College gym and your attendance would be appreciated.

During the spring and summer, the Center fielded two baseball teams for boys from 8 to 14 years old. The 14 to 16 years old team was dropped due to the lack of coaches. These two teams had scheduled games against Hopkinton, Weare, Bow and Sutton. After the baseball season, Carl French arranged and supervised a trip to a major league game in Boston for most of the team members.

The Center also helped sponsor a Halloween and Christmas parties for the grade school children during the past year. The kindergarten and nursery schools utilized our facilities again this year and the Boy Scouts and other non-profit groups held their meetings in the Hall on many occasions.

Over the past twelve months, the Center has completed some repairs on the hall, made folding tables for suppers or parties and made major improvements on our baseball field. However, a lack of help prevented us from completing all the projects we anticipated in our last annual report. We do appre-

ciate the help we received from citizens of the Town in supporting our baseball and basketball teams.

SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Compiling any sort of comprehensive report of the activities of the Henniker School District after such a short time in office is somewhat difficult only because of not being able to present a thorough analysis of the strengths, weaknesses and accomplishments of the system. Thus, this report will confine itself to a few topics that seem to have some importance.

In October the High School was evaluated by a committee of educators representing the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. This committee in a three day stay in Henniker evaluated all phases of the High School program, and submitted a report to the School District detailing a number of commendations and recommendations concerning the school. There is much to be gained from such an evaluation. Simply stated it encourages a continuation of the good and a reassessment of the not so good with an eye towards eventual strengthening of the school system. This we plan to do.

It is encouraging to note the number of elementary school teachers who are taking part in the Elementary Science course offered over Channel 11. It is our hope that this will be the start of an in service program wherein we will be able to make available to all staff members resources that will enable them to do a more effective and efficient job in the classroom.

It is generally agreed that the Title I program in remedial reading has been most beneficial to many students in the Elementary School. This has been an area sadly lacking for



many years, and with reading being the key to a majority of what a student comes in contact with, is one that must not be neglected.

Other areas that will receive scrutiny in the future will be faculty assignments in the High School, increased and improved methods of supervision, guidance services, art programs for grades 1-2, curriculum revision at all levels and procedures to attract and retain capable teachers. Every effort will be made by all concerned to provide Henniker with a good school system. The current cooperative study plans are an ideal way of approaching many of these problems. They should receive your most serious consideration.

I wish to express my appreciation for the excellent cooperation I have received since arriving on the job. For this I am most appreciative.

## REPORT OF THE HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

Our world, with its advances in science and technology is a rapidly changing world. For professional educators this proposed new challenges. How are we going to prepare today's students for such a role?

Henniker High realistically is attempting to face these problems and give the students a well rounded education not based merely in making them recorders of facts parroting educational jargon, but one that will awaken inquiry into the academic, social and cultural phases of our society.

How does one teach these things so that an average student may become an independent thinker and have an inquiring mind? Not an easy task you will agree, but the teachers and I are attempting this giant step by continually trying to expose pupils to situations that will require them to use their ability to reason and acquire the necessary facts to solve the problem rather than dictating answers to them.

An interesting event that took place during the beginning of the school year was the evaluation by the New England Association of Secondary Schools. The purpose of the visiting committee was two fold:

1. To check the evaluation made by the staff.
2. To use the combined experience of the members of the evaluation committee to make helpful objective suggestions for continued improvement.

These recommendations fall usually under four categories:

1. Recommendations that can be carried out immediately.

2. Recommendations that can be carried out in the near future.
3. Recommendations that need to be carried out through long planning.
4. Recommendations that we judge to be invalid.

The visiting committee made numerous commendations as well as recommendations and finalized their findings by stating, "That most of the problems outlined in this evaluation would be solved by consolidation".

Whether or not consolidation is possible the staff and I will make every effort to continually work to improve our school.

The staff and I again extend an open door to you.
