

The Moderator, Mr. Riley, opened the meeting at 6:05 A.M., read the first section of the warrant, certification of posting same by the Selectmen, and declared the polls open for voting. Ballot clerks serving at this meeting included Beatrice Bourbeau (d), Francis Gray (r), Theodore LaVertue (d), Lee Harvey (r), Bertha Beauchesne (d), Ruth Blakeley (r), Doris Riley (d), and Edith Rice (r), with Barbara Johnson, as Deputy Clerk and Roland Levesque as Assistant Moderator.

Mr. Pike made the motion to keep the polls open until 7 P.M. Motion was seconded by Mr. LaFond and voted in the atfirmative.

This second session of the Town Meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Mr. Riley, at 7:05 P.M. Introductions of Town officials were made and rules of procedure were outlined by Mr. Riley. All voting is to be done on paper ballots.

ARTICLES 1a and 1b are on the Town hallot and were taken care of on March 6.

ARTICLE 2: Enlargement of the Sewer Treatment plant with a \$462,000, bond issue. Ralph Page made the motion to approve the article. Robert Morin seconded. Robert Letendre moved to amend the article by adding - "The contract is not to go out for bids until the Town has State and Federal money in hand." George Steers seconded. Vote on the amendment was negative. At 7:32 P.M., the Moderator declared the polls would be open until at least 9:45 P.M. for voting on the Bond issue.

RESULT: 527 votes cast, 351 needed to pass (2/3) 430 YES 97 NO

ARTICLE 3: Disapproved by Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 4: \$40,000 for study of Sewer Treatment plant expansion. Mr. Ralph Page moved to adopt the article as read. Robert Morin, Sr. Seconded. Article was disapproved, (249 - Yes, 264 - No).

ARTICLE 5: Borrowing money in anticipation of taxes. Lowell Apple moved to adopt the article as read. George Goulet seconded. Article was approved, (477 Yes, 40 No).

ARTICLE 6: Discount on taxes. Lowell Apple moved to adopt the article as read. Oscar Morin, Jr., seconded. Roger Hebert moved to amend the article to read 2% discount. Clint Bradley seconded. Vote on the amendment was voted in the affirmative. There was much discussion on the article. Mr. Steers wanted to know if 2% could be allowed on the first 40,000 dollars of valuation and 1% thereafter. Legal counsel said it would not be a prudent thing to do. The amended article was approved - (435 - Yes, 90 - No).

ARTICLE 7: Faye Letendre moved to table this article until after the action of Article 21. Seconded by Robert Letendre, and the vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 8: Abatement of taxes on the Hooksett Airport. Rudy Campbell moved to adopt the article as read. Mr. Page seconded. Mr. Roberge moved to amend the article to abate the taxes on the basis of its use between November and May. Motion was seconded. Legal counsel ruled the amendment a proper one. Voice vote defeated the amendment. The article was approved - (418 - Yes, 105 - No).

ARTICLE 9: \$738.06 for Class V Town Road Assistance. Frank Gray moved to adopt the article as read. Roger Hebert seconded. The article was approved - (502 - Yes, 24 - No).

ARTICLE 10: Discontinuing a section of old 101B. Oscar Morin moved to adopt the article as read. George Goulet seconded. The article was approved - (509 - Yes, 11 - No).

ARTICLE: 11: \$6,000 to construct tennis court at Donati Field. Robert Livingston moved to adopt the article as read. Donald Botsford seconded. The article was approved - (270 - Yes, 259 - No).

ARTICLE 12: \$3,000 for doors at Village Fire Department. Alfred Collerette moved to adopt as read. Donald Botsford seconded. The article was approved - (286 - Yes, 235 - No).

ARTICLE 13: Disapproved by Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 14: \$6,435 for second full-time fireman at So. Hooksett Fire Station. Alfred Law moved to adopt as read. Ralph Page seconded. The article was approved, (420 - Yes, 109 - No).

ARTICLE 15: \$47,747 for Communications Center to be installed in the Police Department. William Shackford moved to adopt the article as read. Barbara Johnson seconded. Mr. Shackford moved to amend the article to \$35,747, because of adjusting the salaries when the Center becomes operable. Mrs. Johnson seconded. Fire, Police and Highway Departments would be responsible for training the dispatchers. Personnel would be policemen under the direction of the Communications Commission. Several people spoke at length, for and against, the article. The amendment was voted in the affirmative and the amended article was approved - (294 - Yes, 239 - No).

ARTICLE 16: \$1,947.40 for continuing membership in the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission. Warren Harvey moved to adopt the article as read. Ronald Philibotte seconded. The article was approved - (356 - Yes, 157 - No).

ARTICLE 17: Re-assessment of the Town. Armand Roberge moved to adopt the article as written and vote "no" on the ballot. Lowell Apple seconded. Mr. Roberge suggested that we hire an outside firm to do the re-appraisal work. Mr. Apple gave a few examples of tax inequities in the Commercial area along the Daniel Webster Highway. The article was disapproved - (196 - Yes, 321 - No).

ARTICLE 18: Appropriations for tax map. Lowell Apple moved to adopt the article as read. Warren Harvey seconded. Mrs. Riley informed the town that the State is going to be taking aerial photos of the seven southern counties and these photos would be available for purchase by the Towns for their tax map work. The article was disapproved - (242 - Yes, 274 - No).

ARTICLE 19: \$20.00 per day salary for Special Justice of the Hooksett District Court. Patricia Sack moved to accept the article as read. David Hess seconded. The article was approved - (405 - Yes, 103 - No).

ARTICLE 20: Lease and purchase of Duracrete Block Co. building on the D.W. Highway, for use as Town Library. Roger Hebert moved to adopt the article as read. Mrs. Hess seconded. Mrs. Johnson, Library Trustee, spoke at length on the advisability of purchasing this building, which will not be available to the Town another year. Mrs. Harvey wanted it noted in the Town records that Mr. Donati offered the Duracrete Block building to the Town at \$15,000 per year for five years, interest free, for the purchase of the building. (Total purchase price to be \$75,000) The article was approved - (302 - Yes, 209 - No).

ARTICLE 21: \$15,000 for connecting Village and Central Water Precincts, through water mains along the D.W. Highway. Ralph Page moved to adopt the article as read. Lowell Apple seconded. The article was disapproved - (139 - Yes, 282 - No).

ARTICLE 7: Withdrawal and expending of Revenue Sharing funds. Oscar Morin, Jr. moved to adopt the article as read. Mrs. Letendre seconded. The article was approved - (282 - Yes, 72 - No).

ARTICLE 22: Disapproved by Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 23: Disapproved by Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 24: Disapproved by Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 25: Disapproved by Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 26: Mr. Riley ruled the article illegal and any vote on this article would only be for informational purposes, to indicate the feelings of the people to the Town officials.

ARTICLE 27: This article also ruled illegal by the Moderator and any vote would be for information purposes only.

ARTICLE 28: Acceptance of first section of Oak Hill Road as a public way. Leon Pearson moved to accept the article as read. Mr. Marshall seconded. Mr. Apple, Selectman, stated that the article could not be allowed under the present Town Ordinances.

ARTICLE 29: Oscar Morin moved to adopt the Budget as amended by Article 15. Lowell Apple seconded. Mr. Riley read a letter from the Human Rights Committee in Concord. The Budget was approved - (206 - Yes, 37 - No).

Mr. Riley declared the ballot box for the Bond issue closed at $10:50\,$ P.M.

The results of the voting were given by the Moderator at 12:20 A.M., and the meeting declared adjourned at 12:40 A.M.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF HOOKSETT, NEW HAMPSHIRE IN THE COUNTY OF MERRIMACK IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby natified to meet at the Hooksett Memorial School an Tuesday, the fifth of March next at six of the clock in the forenaon to cost your ballats for Town Officers and for questions required by law to be an the ballats. Polls close at 7:00 P.M.

The remainder of the warrant will be acted upon at the Hooksett Memorial School, Friday, March 8, 1974, at 7:00 P.M.

- 1A. Ta chaase all necessary town afficers for the year ensuing.
- 1B. "Shall we adapt the hameawners' exemption provisions of RSA chapter 72 granting a \$5,000 exemption based on equalized assessed valuation an all awner-accupied units and a \$10,000 exemption based on equalized assessed valuation an all awner-accupied units owned by persons over sixty-five years of age?" (On Town Ballot)
- 1C. Are you in favor of having the office of Town Clerk combined with the office of Tox Collector, thereby creating a new office of Town Clerk-Tox Collector to be held by one individual, with a term of three years. (On Town Ballot)
- 1D. Shall the provisions for absentee ballat for the election of Town Officers be adapted by this Town? (Authority granted by RSA 60:31) (On Town Ballat)
- 2. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of the 1974 taxes, to be repaid therefrom.
- 3. To see if the Town will vate to give a discount of two percent (2%) an all taxes except Resident Tax and Sewer Rents paid on ar before the fifteenth (15th) day of July, and to grant the Selectmen authority to extend this date if unable to get tax rate from State Tax Commission as of July 1st.

- 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for and accept aid relative to disasters as recommended by the Disaster Office of the State of New Hampshire.
- 5. Ta see if the Tawn will vate to raise and appropriate the sum of seven hundred thirty six dallars and seventy cents (\$736.70) the state furnish four thausand nine hundred eleven dallars and thirty ane cents (\$4,911.31) the same to be expended under the State Highway Department for Class V Town Road assistance or take any action thereto.
- 6. To see if the Town will vate to amend Article 20 of the 1945 Warrant (Carl R.N. Jahnson moved that authority be given the Selectmen to sell Real Estate acquired by the Town through Tox Collector's Deed, to be in effect until rescinded, and it was so voted, attest Charles Hardy, Town Clerk) To read as follows:

The Baard of Selectmen, after cansulting with the Planning Board, Conservation Cammissian and School Baard, are given authority to sell Real Estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deed.

- 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into an agreement for the lease and purchase of the Schroeder property buildings and thirty-four acres of land, lacated on route 3A, for use as a sonitary land fill site, at a price not to exceed the sum of \$20,000.00 per year for a period of five years.
- 8. Ta see if the Town will vate to appropriate up to fifty thausand dallars (\$50,000.) as required, for the purchase of a 15 ton bulldozer, fencing and other necessary materials needed to implement a sanitary land fill aperation, and authorize the withdrawal of the amount needed for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the pravisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to expend the sum of twenty three thousand dallars (\$23,000.00) for the purpose of purchasing a new truck and load packer for the rubbish department, and to withdraw said sum of money from the Town Capital Reserve Fund for equipment and capital improvements.
 - 10. To see if the Tawn will vate to raise and appropriate the sum of

four thausand dallars (\$4,000.00) ta purchase a utility tractor/with lawn mawer for the Highway Department.

- 11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate an amount to maintain membership in the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission (1974–1975) membership fee based on 1970 U.S. Census figures at thirty-five cents (\$0.35) per capita one thousand nine hundred farty-seven dollars and forty cents, (\$1,947.40) or take any action thereto.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand three hundred (\$5,300.00) dallars far the purpose of building a combination office, dispatch room and starage room to the South Hoaksett Fire Statian. Said addition to be 15' 4" × 29' 4". (Inserted by petition)
- 13. To see if the town of Hooksett will form a cammittee far the bicentennial celebration in 1976 and ta raise a sum of \$1,500 per year for three years for a tatal of \$4,500 to cover the costs of this celebration. (Inserted by Petition)
- 14. To see if the tawn will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) to be matched with a grant of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) from the Land and Conservatian Fund Act of 1965, the Bureau of Outdoar Recreation within the Department of the Interior. To be used by the Tawn Conservatian Commission to improve Riverside Park (old Dundee Mill property) for a multi-purpose recreational area. (Haoksett Conservation Cammissian)
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ninety-twa thousand dallars (\$92,000.00) far the purpose of campleting the construction of the Shopping Center sewer line, so called running from the Martin's Carner Pumping Station to the Shopping Center on Daniel Webster Highway and Route No. 28 By-Pass, as authorized by Article 11 of the 1971 Tawn Warrant, and to construct a Lift Station on said sewer line; and to authorize the Selectmen to raise said sum by the issue of Serial Notes ar Bonds, on the credit of the Town, under the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33 as amended); and further to authorize the Board of Sewer Commissioners to accept any State Aid which may be available for said purposes.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of fifty thousand dallars (\$50,000.00) for the purpose of emplaying engineering services to study the available methods far future expansion of the Town's sewage treatment capacity and to make recommendations as to the method most advantageous to the Town, together with a report of cast estimates and recommended time table far canstruction; and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrowsaid sum of money by the issuance of Serial Notes of the Town, repayable over a period of four years, under the Municipal Finance Act. (Inserted by Petitian)
 - 17. To see if the Town will vate to extend a sewer line in Granite Street

from the end of the existing sewer on Bullard Drive, easterly a distance of 700 feet to and including the residence of Regina Vallee and to raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand five hundred dallars (\$10,500.00) far this purpose. (Inserted by Petition)

- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand five hundred dollars (\$10,500.00) to extend the present sewer line from Kennedy Drive to the end of Merrill Drive. (Inserted by Petitian)
- 19. To see if the Town will vate to accept the Budget, as submitted by the Budget Cammittee, or take any other action in relation thereta.
- 20. Selectmen of the Town of Hooksett. Please insert the following in the town warrants for March 1974:
- 1. In addition to the State And Local laws, the Selectmen and the Planning board are directed to hold the neccessary hearings etc. sa that the following can be added to planning and zoning laws at the next special or regular town meeting held after the one in March of 1974:

A-That all requests on planning and zoning receive equal treatment providing area, frontage, sewer, water, road, drainage etc. requirements are equal.

B-That all needed requirements are met by all applicants using same procedures for all.

C-That any measurements using edge of right of way of any road or highway shall be made from nearest side to properties involved.

2. In addition to State and local laws, the Selectmen and Board of Adjustment are directed to hold the needed hearings so that the following can be added to any planning and zaning ordinances at the next special or regular tawn meeting held after March 1974 town meeting.

A-That all requests for variances from planning and zoning laws be treated equally.

B-That decisions made in one case shall apply to similar cases in the future.

C-That all measurements using edge of right of way of road or highway shall be made from nearest side of roads to properties.

- 3. Selectmen are directed to take any ar all actions needed, through regional planning, to insure proper size water main to replace present inadequate water main, from Belmont St. Extension near Genest Ford through interstate interchange. This will ensure water supply for this area of Hooksett for Industrial or Commercial development.
- 4. Selectmen are directed to take any and all actions needed, through regional planning, for extension of Manchester sewer to take care of area south af Hale Ave. for future industrial and commercial use.
- 5. Selectmen are directed to take any and all actions needed to extend Manchester waterup Route 3A from where it will end at Manchester Hoaksett line for any group needing water for commercial or residential use.
- 6. Selectmen are directed to take any and all actions needed through regional planning for extension of Manchester sewer up Raute 3A where it will be extended for N.H. To the Residents of the Town of Hooksett:

In this annual report the Board of Selectmen will attempt to outline its activities in administering the affairs of the Town of Hooksett for the year 1973 and its thoughts about the future.

At the Town Meeting in March 1973, there were three articles which were passed by an affirmative vote and included instructions to initiate their implementation. The Board took the following actions as respects these articles:

Article 7. This was the first year that the Town utilized Revenue Sharing Funds. The Board applied the sum of \$35,000. to the areas specified in this article, thus reducing the funds raised through taxes. While this assistance is welcome, it could be a problem in the future, for if the program is discontinued, that year we will not only experience the normal increase in the cost of services but will also have to make up the amount we applied as income through Revenue Sharing. As a consequence we will experience a delayed increase in the tax rate.

Article 15. This article appropriated the sum of \$35,747.00 for the purpose of establishing and manning a Communications Center. In March, the Board appointed a Communications Commission comprised of representatives from the Police, Fire and Highway Departments and the Board of Selectmen to carry out these instructions. In October, the center became operative and, since that time has been manned 24 hours a day, 7 days a week handling emergency calls and keeping contact with local, state and county police units, the Town's tire departments, the Road Agent and the Tri-Town Ambulance Service. It is estimated that the unit will handle over 22,000 calls per year. This is your emergency service. Remember the telephone number 485-5177.

Article 20. The Board of Selectmen and the Trustees of the Hooksett Library completed the purchase of the building and land located at 1359 Hooksett Road from Duracrete Block Company. When this transaction was completed, the Board of Selectmen then turned the building and property over to the Library Trustees who proceeded to carry out their vision, to

make the Hooksett Library one that we can be proud of. This action was completed on December 6, 1973 when the Library Trustees held an Open House in their new quarters.

During the year 1973 it became increasingly apparent that town government is no longer a matter of three elected officials carrying out the instructions of the voters of the Town. They now must consider the orders imposed upon them by the actions of State and Federal legislative rulings. These rulings will have effects, the consequences of which will be far-reaching and, expensive to the Town. The State Tax Commission's decision regarding the possibility that they could not be responsible for any assessments after 1973 and the suggestion that reassessment should be accomplished at this date presents a problem that must be decided by the residents of the Town. Legislative Action requires that towns complete a Tax Map by 1980. State regulatory bodies have ordered that towns stop burning refuse and, as a consequence, we are being forced to find a new way to dispose of this problem. State controls on the areas we choose to place a sanitary land fill have placed a burden on this Board to find an area acceptable to their standards. State water supply and pollution controls over new subdivisions in the town even precede those of our own subdivision regulations. State acquisition of properties along the 1-93 by-pass has caused a decrease in our tax-base. Federal regulations increase paper work in conjunction with the expenditure of Revenue Sharing Funds. Federal rulings require that we conduct a second water pollution control study of the town before any Federal or State funds can be made available for future plant or interceptor lines in our present system. Federal rulings require that we conduct a land-use study of water-shed areas even before we can make application to find out if we can receive funds necessary to acquire such areas for future town water supplies. Federal and State regulatory authorities are becoming increasingly important in the acquisition of fuel, both for operating our buses, trucks and cruisers and heating our buildings. All of these restrictions prevent a Board from making its own decisions for they dictate that an action be initiated, an action that many times is not desirable at this time, and which causes unnecessary expense to the Town.

During the concluding months of 1973 we began to feel the effects of a change which is spreading over the entire country. We can no longer consume large supplies of gasoline and heating fuels, expending them with disregard for the necessity of conserving for the future. We can no longer ignore the fact that some type of "crisis" is upon us, at least without recognizing that it will cost us as individuals and taxpayers. The effect this period will have on the future is impossible to predict, especially as it pertains to Town Government. It is apparent that everyone will experience higher costs in fuel and electricity. This will mean higher costs in the acquisition of manufactured products, which will mean that more people will have to have higher salaries to pay for these products. We can go on and on speculating on the future and what it will mean to the Town of Hooksett. We must recognize that in the future, as in the past, any efforts we spend to accomplish the tasks before us are never in vain. Being cognizant of this and working together, we the residents of Hooksett, should be able to face any situation, no matter how uncertain we are of its outcome.

In conclusion, we remind you that the Selectmen's office is only a telephone call away. If the answer you receive is a taped message, don't hang up. Leave your name and telephone number and we will contact you. Please remember, if the subject was important enough to call about the first time, it is never less important the second time.

Report of the Budget Committee

A tax increase of close to 20% is what the Budget Committee faced this year, after thirteen meetings with board and committee chairmen.

Many of these increases were due to inflation, the fuel crisis, new government standards for pollution control, and then many were fixed charges (i.e. bond payments and interest) or necessary maintenance expenditures.

It was the unanimous feeling of the Budget Committee that this large an increase in taxes, coupled with the recent high cost of living increase, was more than the average taxpayer could afford to pay.

It was clear that the "Demand had Finally Exceeded the Supply," and that we would have to reduce some expenditures. Expenditures proposed by conscientious boards and committees, who in most cases serve with little or no pay, and are charged with the responsibility of providing town services.

All committees were very cooperative and presented good honest budgets, and explained every request. Many budgets contained only monies to fund fixed charges and/or to provide necessary services, which Hooksett should provide.

The two Public Budget Hearings, which were held, had very poor turnouts (less than 1%), and therefore the Budget Committee had no mandate as to the attitude of the majority of Hooksett Citizens, regarding proposed increases, and in what areas, if any, they wanted increases or decreases. This made our task that much more ditficult.

State statutes require that the Budget Committee must "Reconcile the Various Appropriation Requests in Order to Maintain the Tax Load Within Manageable Proportions," and therefore it was the unanimous feeling that a 20% increase in one year was out of proportion. We had then only one avenue of approach, and that was by reducing some expenditures.

Each budget was then carefully reviewed to make necessary reductions wherever possible.

Below is an explanation of how each budget, or article, was

handled and the amount that is being recommended to you the taxpayer:

Hooksett School District requested an increase in appropriations of \$169,242.00, with a request totaling \$1,561,931.00. Since school costs have increased approximately 50% in the past 3 years, while the enrollment has increased only 5%, it was the feeling of the majority that the School District cannot continue to increase at this rapid pace. Some of the services should be reviewed by the School Board to hold costs down.

Highway Department Budget increases included the salary of a new man, who will be doing the lawn mowing, which used to be paid out of Parks & Recreation and the School District Funds. Another increase is for the purchase of two radios to be tied in with the Communications Center. It was the general teeling that reductions in this budget would mean a direct loss of services, or repairs to roads that are essential. This budget was approved at \$156,600.00

<u>Police Department</u>. This department requested an increase of close to 30% over last year's budget. As in most budgets the salary increases were cut due to a comprehensive insurance package to be offered, this year, to all full-time employees of the town.

Since the addition of a Communication Center, with a budget in excess of \$25,000, it was our feelings that this will add to the efficiency of the Police Department.

<u>Communications Commission</u>. Since this is a new budget this year there are no operating figures to use as a guide, however the total requested budget of \$27,113.00 was reduced \$2,000., and is recommended at \$25,113.00, since the full-time employees will be offered the new insurance package.

<u>Selectmen</u>. This budget contains a substantial increase, however, the major increases include the new comprehensive insurance package for all full-time town employees, and the bond payments on the sewer extension to the new shopping center, and the new bridge. This budget was reduced \$2,800., and is being recommended at \$309,343.50.

Parks & Recreation. This budget was proposed by the commission at \$6,975.00. Reductions were made in playground equipment, and drainage and parking lot improvements to Donati Field, and drainage at Fraser Field. Budget was recommended at \$3,175.00

Water Precincts. The three water precinct budgets were approved as submitted, and are recommended as follows:

Listed below are the warrant articles requiring expenditures, which the Budget Committee must recommend or not recommend:

School District Articles:

1. \$19,375.00 to cover deficit in high school tuition.

This deficit is the result of the Manchester School System raising the high school tuition amounts, after last year's budget was approved and voted on. This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.

2. \$20,000. to replace the boiler at Underhill School. Money to be expended from capital reserve fund.

This boiler has been a constant problem since it was installed, and has had several major overhauls, but some of the recent repairs have been only to keep the boiler operating temporarily. The condition is so deteriorated that it is necessary to replace. This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article #5. \$736.70 for Class V Town Road Assistance. This is an annual article to accept state aid, and is recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article #7. \$20,000 a year for 5 years, to purchase Schroeder property as a sanitary land fill site.

This is an article due to state statutes requiring a sanitary land fill area. We can no longer burn refuse at our existing dump, and it cannot be used as a landfill area. This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article #8. \$50,000 for a 15 ton bulldozer, fencing and other materials needed to implement a sanitary land fill operation. Money to be withdrawn from Revenue Sharing Funds.

This is a companion article to Article #7, and necessary for the operation of a landfill area. This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article #9. \$23,000 for purchase of new truck and load packer for the rubbish department. Money to be withdrawn from capital reserve fund. This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article #10. \$4,000 to purchase a utility tractor/with lawn mower for the Highway Department.

This article is a result of transferring all of the lawn mowing (except cemeteries) to the Highway Department, and to purchase a lawn mowing machine of the size necessary for the large areas which require mowing. This will eliminate the high maintenance costs which the smaller tractors have necessitated. It is our opinion that this machine will pay for itself in a short time. This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article #11. \$1,947.40 for membership in Southern N.H. Planning Commission.

This article is recommended, because the services provided by this Commission far exceed the membership fee.

Article #12. \$5,300 to build a combination office, dispatch and storage room to the South Hooksett Fire Dept.

This addition is necessary to give the department an area in which to keep all the records required by the Fire Rating Bureau, as well as an area for dispatching and storage of equipment. This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article #13. \$1,500 a year for 3 years, to cover cost of Bicentennial Celebration.

Since Hooksett's Sesquicentennial Celebration was such a success, and involved so many Hooksett residents, we feel that we will have an active committee to celebrate our nation's 200th anniversary. To be effective they will need these funds.

This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article #14. \$2,500 to be matched by funds. This money is to be used to make Riverside Park a recreational area.

The Hooksett Conservation Commission is a relatively new and energetic committee, that has done much in the past with little or no funds. We are convinced that this expenditure of \$2,500, with matching funds, will go a long way into converting a presently blighted eyesore into one of the most beautiful recreational parks in the area. This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article #15. \$92,000 to complete shopping center sewer line.

This article is necessary to cover the additional costs of constructing the sewer line to the new shopping center. The article passed in the 1971 warrant for this sewer line and was based on costs for that year. The shopping center had several delays, and as a result, costs have increased considerably in three years. The State of N.H. has agreed to tund this project, and the anticipated aid should offset the amount being raised in this article. However, we must agree to spend the money, and once the project is complete we will recover this money in state aid. This article is recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article #16. \$50,000 for a sewer study.

This is a study that is necessary before Hooksett will be eligible for future state and federal assistance, for sewer extension or expansion. Although Hooksett must bear the costs of such a study initially, up to 95% of this expenditure could be recovered on the next approved project from state and federal assistance. Therefore this article is recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article #17 & #18. \$21,000 (\$10,500 each) for sewer line extensions on Granite St. and Merrill Drive.

These two articles are submitted without recommendation, because it is our feeling that extensions such as these, should be submitted by or through the Sewer Commission. No doubt these extensions are necessary, but there are also many other areas in town that may be as needed, therefore these articles are submitted without recommendation, by the Budget Committee.

We have endeavored to recommend to you a budget which will allow our town to maintain its present services, and not curtail

necessary expenditures for maintenance. However due to economic conditions we predict a tax increase of approximately 15% if all our recommendations are enacted.




TOTAL TOWN, COUNTY and SCHOOL APPROPRIATIONS LESS TOTAL REVENUES and CREDITS

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Hooksett for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1972, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

One of the enclosed reports must be given to the Town Clerk for retention as part of the permanent records.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Sewer Commissioners, Arah W. Prescott Library, Municipal and District Courts and Trustees of Trust Funds.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

General Fund:

Comparative Balance Sheets - December 31, 1971 and December 31, 1972:

(Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets which disclose the financial condition of the General Fund as of December 31, 1971 and December 31, 1972 are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the current surplus of the Town increased by \$12,358.17, trom \$69,037.12 to \$81,395.29, during the fiscal year 1972.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in current financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures - Estimated and

Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 and A-4)

Comparative statements of general fund appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1972 are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4.

As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of \$16,874.17, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$10,524.54, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$27.398.71.

Long Term Indebtedness:

Comparative Balance Sheets - December 31, 1971 and December 31, 1972:

(Exhibit A-5)

The outstanding long term indebtedness of the Town as of December 31, 1971 and December 31, 1972 is shown in Exhibit A-5. As indicated therein, the long term debt decreased by \$87,100.00, from \$1,198,200.00 to \$1,111,100.00 in 1972. During the fiscal year, long term notes in the amount of \$12,100.00 and matured bonds totaling \$75,000.00 were paid.

Statement of Annual Debt Service Requirements: (Exhibit A-6)

A statement showing annual debt service requirements, including principal and interest, is contained in Exhibit A-6.

TREASURER

General Fund:

Classified Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of general fund receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1972 made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance general fund - as of December 31, 1972, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Sewer Construction Funds: (Exhibits B-3, B-4, and B-5)

Statements showing the fiscal activity in the special sewer construction funds for the fiscal year are contained in Exhibits B-3, B-4, and B-5.

OTHER DEPARTMENTS AND AGENCIES

Sewer Department: (Exhibits E-1, E-2, and E-3)

Statements showing the financial condition of the Sewer Department, and the results of operations for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1972 are included in Exhibits E-1, E-2, and E-3. As indicated in Exhibit E-1 (Comparative Balance Sheets), the accumulated deficit of the Sewer Department increased by \$46,293.08, from \$110,772.41 to \$157,065.49, during 1972.

Municipal and District Courts: (Exhibits G-1, G-2, G-3, and G-4)

Statements showing the fiscal activity in the Municipal Court and District Court accounts during the fiscal year ended December 31, 1972 are presented in Exhibits G-1, G12, G-3, and G-4. On June 30, 1972, the Hooksett Municipal Court was abolished and the Hooksett District Court established pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 558, Section 2, of the Laws of 1971.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as were considered necessary in the circumstances.

GENERAL COMMENTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Tax Collector:

A review of general fund cancelled checks revealed that numerous town payroll checks were cashed by the Tax Collector's office.

This practice should be discontinued and all tax receipts deposited intact with the town Treasurer.

Public Library Building Fund:

In 1969, the trustees of the Public Library voted to establish a building fund to assist in defraying future capital expenditures, thereby creating a capital reserve fund for the construction of library facilities.

At December 31, 1972, this fund, in the form of a savings account in the custody of the trustees, totaled \$1,855.29, of which \$645.52 represented unexpended trust fund income and \$743.35 accumulated interest earned on the Library's regular savings

account. It is noted that the trust fund income was derived from trust tunds originally created by donors for the purchase of books and for the care of grounds.

There is no provision in the Revised Statutes Annotated giving the Public Library Trustees authority to create such a building (capital reserve) fund. Capital reserve funds may only be established by a vote of the Town, in accordance with the provisions of R.S.A. 35:1, which is quoted herewith:

"35:1 Establishment of Reserve Authorized. Any town, school district, village district, or county, as provided by section 3 of this chapter, may raise and appropriate money for the establishment of a capital reserve fund for the financing of all or part of the cost of (a) the construction, reconstruction or acquisition of a specific capital improvement, or the acquisition of a specific item or specific items of equipment, or (b) the construction, reconstruction, or acquisition of a type of capital improvement or the acquisition of a type of equipment."

R.S.A. 35: 10 provides that capital reserve funds shall be in the custody of the Trustees of Trust Funds of the Town.

Furthermore, income from trust funds which are specifically set up for the purchase of books and care of grounds may not lawfully be diverted to other purposes, including the establishment or maintenance of capital reserve funds.

Consequently, it is recommended that the existing building fund be abolished and the resources thereof restored to the operating fund of the Public Library.

Bonds Authorized - Unissued - \$380,000.00:

Authorized but unissued bonds at December 31, 1972 totaled \$380,000.00, and included unissued sewer construction bonds of \$200,000.00 and unissued bridge construction bonds of \$180,000.00.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 71, Section 27, of the Revised Statutes Annotated, require that the auditors' summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town. Publication of the exhibits contained in this report is optional, but this letter must be published in its entirety.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Hooksett for their assistance during the course of the audit.

Hooksett Budget Committee

Gentlemen:

It is a pleasure to submit this budget request, our first as an established commission.

The communication center is at a point of almost completion. One large item yet to be received is the 4000 watt generator, this unit to be used as a back up power supply is yet to be installed.

We are presently dispatching for fire, police, highway and the ambulance service with a great deal of success. The commission was fortunate to acquire the quality of personnel to man our center. This training period has been learning experience for all of us.

This being our first budget request leaves many doubts in our mind os to what our exact operating expenses for the fiscal year will be. Our first three months of operation have proven a number of gratifying facts.

- 1. Police response to a given incident has been greatly enhanced.
- Centralization of all communications provides new depth and growth for our community.

3. Providing an open ear to ony emergency regardless of its nature has relieved many onxieties.

The people of the Town of Hooksett, can be proud of this new establishment. The cost of operating can be broken down to obout \$3.75 per year for each citizen of the town, a small amount to pay for the insurance it affords.

Board of Sewer Commissioners

The Board of Sewer Commissioners is taking this opportunity to report to the taxpayers at the conclusion of the third year of operation of the Town's Wastewater Treatment Facilities.

The number of users on the system continued to increase until a point was reached where the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission intervened in order to prevent the facility from becoming grossly overloaded.

At the present time the Sewer Commissioners can only give permission to owners of private dwellings to connect to the town sewer. Any commercial user or large (50 or more people) user must have his application reviewed by the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission before any permit to connect can be given.

The Commissioners have grants totaling \$462,000.00 with which to enlarge the Plant. This enlargement will help alleviate the problem of overloading at the Plant. The engineering for this addition is almost complete and the Board expects that contracts will be let in 1974 and actual construction started.

There is no way for the Board to arrive at reasonable construction costs for any projects proposed by the taxpayers. Any extension of mains involving more than one or two hundred feet has to be designed by professional engineers. The New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission requires engineering plans for all such extensions. In order to hire engineers for this purpose, it is necessary to raise money. People living in unsewered areas, who wish the extension of sewer mains, should, therefore, retain the services of a State approved engineering firm and let the engineers determine what the project costs will be. It will then be necessary to put an article in the Town Warrant to raise the money.

At a meeting attended by the Sewer Commissioners and the Selectmen, held at the Municipal Building on January 11, 1973 members of the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission explained to those in attendance that the town must have an engineering survey of the entire town, conducted by the Sewer Department engineers. This study will be designed to instruct everyone in town as to where present pollution problems exist, and will provide a means of establishing priorities for extension of sewer mains. Both the State and Federal Governments insist that such a study be made before any further financial assistance will be made available to the town for any future enlargement to the Treatment Plant.

Because of this position by the State and Federal Governments, the Board of Sewer Commissioners has asked the Selectmen to insert an article in the Warrant asking tor \$50,000 with which to conduct this study. If, as a result of this study, a grant of money should be made available to the Sewer Dept. in the future, this \$50,000 would be returned to the town.

The Board of Sewer Commissioners, therefore, suggests that the taxpayers vote favorably on this article so that concrete plans for sewer extensions and Treatment Plant enlargements can be planned in the future.

The Sewer Department is pleased to learn that the town has found a site for the Sanitary Land Fill Operation required by the State. The Sewer Department has an interest in this operation as there are large amounts of waste trom the Treatment Plant that fall under the State Land Fill regulations.

The Commissioners are proud to announce that Bruce Kudrick, Assistant Operator of the Treatment Plant, received government financed tuition grants to attend the New England Regional Wastewater Institute Department of the South Portland Maine Vocational Institute. He is taking courses designed to place him high on the list of qualified Plant Operators as outlined by standards set by the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission. Mr. Kudrick will return as a full time employee at the Treatment Plant in June of 1974.

In October of 1973 it became necessary to hire another full time employee at the Treatment Plant. Mr. Rendell Burbank brings many years of experience with mechanical equipment to the job of aiding Superintendent Page in the daily operation and control of the Treatment Plant.

The K-Mart Shopping Center is progressing rapidly and the Sewer Dept. expects that mains and associated pumps will be in place by the time the Shopping Center opens. At the present time the mains and manholes on Martin's Ferry Road are in place and will be ready for inspection very soon.

The Sewer Commission is including in this report the reproduction of a letter received from the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission on January 23, 1974.

As can be seen from the letter, the State has agreed to provide funds to aid on the lift station and lines for the K-Mart Shopping Center.

The State also asked the Board of Sewer Commissioners to apply to the Federal Government for additional funding in the hopes of further expanding this part of the new Dalton Brook Interceptor System. Since the K-Mart will be opening for business in April and we found that Federal applications require up to six months to process, the Board felt it was more important to complete the Town's obligations to the Shopping Center now, rather than wait months for the Federal Government to review a request from us. There is absolutely no assurance that the Federal Government would approve our request, and the Shopping Center would be without a sewer.






Photo of Main St. Lift Station Underground - No structure

This pumping station, located behind the Village Water Precinct Building, is designed to pump waste water from Riverside Street only. It is pumped into the main which is attached to the vehicle bridge and across the river to the Merrimack St. lift station.

Photo of Merrimack St. Lift Station

This pumping station receives all the waste water from the village area, including the west side of the river, as well as Granite St., Mt. St. Mary's College and the surrounding areas. Also, waste water from Thompson's Corner flows down So. Main St. to the lift station. This waste water is then pumped from the Merrimack St. station up a "forced-main" pipe to the vicinity of Thompson's Corner from which point it flows by gravity to the Treatment Plant.

3 Photo of the Treatment Plant

This is the main part of the Waste Water Treatment facility. It is the most important part of the system, for it is here that all the waste water is gathered and is treated to make it safe for discharge into the Merrimack River. While the Plant is presently the most efficient in the State, it requires the constant attention of two operators to keep it functioning at full capability.

- Bruce Kudrick, Asst. Plant operator, using testing equipment at the plant lab.
- Photo of Martin's Ferry Lift Station

This pumping station is required to move all the waste water from the Lincoln Park area up the Boston and Maine right-of-way approximately two miles to the Treatment Plant. It also handles all waste water from New Hampshire College and North River Road. This station, as well as the Merrimack St. station, had to be constructed due to the varying contours of the terrain in Hooksett. These contours made it impossible to gather all of the waste water by gravity alone.

Record of the Minutes of the School Meeting

RECORDS OF THE SCHOOL MEETING HELD MARCH 2, 1973

The moderator called the meeting to order at 7:03. He then proceeded to read the school Warrant. He also noted that the warrant had been duly posted and certified.

The elected school officials are introduced and then rules of procedure for governing a school district meeting are read. It is brought to attention of the voters that after discussion on article one is completed the Polls would remain open for Voting on the article for a minimum of two hours.

Article 1. To see if the District will vote to appropriate Six Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$650,000) for the alteration and enlargement of the Memorial School in order to provide a minimum of twenty rooms and facilities for Home Economics and Vocational Education and for the purchase of school equipment of a lasting character, to determine whether such appropriation shall be raised by borrowing or otherwise, or take any other action relative thereto.

Mr. James VanVliet: I move that the district appropriate \$650,000 for the alteration and enlargement of the Memorial School (etc...)

The article is duly seconded by Mr. Arthur Sanborn.

Questions are asked of the board and Mr. VanVliet tells of the population growth, Mr. Sack explains the plan and outlines the addition in general. Mr. Collins summarizes why the addition is needed and explains that eventually the addition would be a core facility for a high school.

Discussion on Article One continues with questions being presented by Mrs. Stott, Mr. Gelinas, Mrs. Paquin, Mr. Mitchell and Mr. Hall. Mr. Hall asks if the article can be amended and if so what is the procedure. The moderator states it is not possible. We take the article as read. Discussion on Article 1 is concluded at 7:30. Mr. Morin, the moderator, then declares the polls will remain open until 9:30.

Article 2. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to accept, on behalf of the District, any Federal or State funds designed to improve educational opportunities. Further, to see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for such funds and to expend the same for such projects as it may designate.

Mr. VanVliet makes a motion to adopt article 2, duly seconded by Mrs. Stott.

Article 2 is approved and voted in the affirmative.

Article 3A. To see if the District will vote to: Approve the dual enrollment plan between the District and the Manchester Diocesan Schools, said plan to be Instruction of Business Education, Physical Education, Science and Mathematics, and which plan shall be administered by the School District ot Manchester, N.H. and to further authorize the School Board to sign necessary agreement to implement the program for the school year 1973-74.

Mr. Sack makes a motion to adopt article 3A as read; seconded by Mr. Grey. Mrs. Rice asks for an explanation. Mr. VanVliet explains article 3A. Questions on the article are presented to the board from, Mr. Breton, Mrs. Stott and Mr. MacDonald. Article 3A is approved and voted in the affirmative.

Article 3B. To see if the District will vote to: Authorize the School Board to assign certain students, who are residents of the District to the dual enrollment classes administered by the District of Manchester, N.H. and further authorize the School Board to make such contractual arrangements that may be necessary to implement said assignment of students for the school year 1973-74.

Jim VanVliet makes the motion to adopt article 3B duly seconded by James Dinwoodie. Article 3B is voted in the affirmative.

Article 3C. To see if the district will vote to: Appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) for the payment of the

cost of fuition incurred by the assignment of said students to the dual enrollment program administered by the District of Manchester, at the Manchester Diocesan Schools for the school year 1973-74, and to authorize the School Board to apply for any grants under RSA 198:21, which funds will be credited to the District.

Jim VanVliet makes the motion to adopt the article as read. Richard Gagnon seconded and the vote was in the affirmative.

Article 4. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to expend Two Thousand Three Hundred Nine Dollars and Forty-four cents (\$2,309.44), revenue received in 72-73 from State of New Hampshire for dual enrollment purposes. Said monies to be used to offset the cost of the dual enrollment program for 72-73.

Mr. VanVliet moved to adopt the article as read. Olivetta Donati seconded and the vote was in the affirmative.

Article 5. To see if the District will vote that any agreement or contract that the School Board may make with any group of teachers or with any teachers' association, whether in the form of a master contract or otherwise, shall not be binding upon the District until it has first been ratified by majority vote of the District at a School District Meeting. This requirement shall not apply to the nomination and election of individual teachers as provided in RSA 189:30.

Jim VanVliet made the motion to adopt the article as read. Mrs. Yvette Beauchesne seconded the motion.

Questions on article five are: Has the Article been in past warrants and if not why now? The School Board explains they feel the citizens of Hooksett should ratify agreements between teachers and associations rather than leave the matter entirely up to the School Board. Article 5 is voted in the affirmative.

Article 6 is covered in the budget.

Article 7 is covered in the budget.

Article 8 is to be voted on March 6, 1973.

Article 9. To see if the District will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Ted Koehler made the motion to adopt as printed. Douglas Meeley seconded. A motion was then made to amend the article to read: To see it the District will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee (on a line item basis,) or take any other action in relation thereto. The addition of (on a line item basis) fails to carry by a vote of 199 no to 145 yes.

Richard Riley makes a motion to adopt the article as read. Gordon Moore seconded and the vote was in the affirmative. The Moderator ruled that if the addition to Memorial School failed to pass the budget of the principle payment and interest item would be cut by the State Tax Commission accordingly.

Article 10. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting is ruled illegal.

At 9:33 the moderator declares the Polls are closed. Ballot counters on article one are: Bill Barnard, Kathy Barnard, Mary Farrell, Frank Gray, Gordon Moore, Douglas Mealey, Ray Langer and George Goulet presided over by the clerk Patricia Sack. The total number of ballots cast are 582. In order for article one to pass it needs a 2/3 vote. Article one the vote is 338 No and 244 Yes. Article 1 fails to pass.

A motion to adjourn was made and seconded and the meeting was adjourned at 9:45.

Report of the school board

Our thanks are extended to the people of Hooksett for the support given to your schools and your school board!

Our staff, headed by Mr. Cawley, and our three competent principals are dedicated and have contributed to our children's total education through the classroom and other outside school related activities.

Absent from this year's warrant, annual report and school board report is a request for additional space for our schools. This does not mean, however, that we have adequate room. This fact becomes quite apparent if you have visited the schools recently. The best example being the Underhill School with the library on the cafetorium stage. With two successive rejections of addition proposals, your board felt that expansion planning this year would be unproductive. It is our sincere recommendation now that you, as concerned citizens of Hooksett, be prepared to expend monies next year for an addition that could give you this needed space. In this same line of thinking it should be noted that over 30% of our proposed budget will go for tuition. The proposed High School tuition is more than double the money expended in the 1970-71 school year, for this purpose.

Our curriculum, of which we are quite proud, lacks primarily in the area of industrial or domestic arts. With this type of expasure at the Junior High level some of the potential High School drop outs could find an area that they could excell, or at least perform in. This area should be studied again when additional space is considered.

Our Special Education classes continue to serve the slower learner and have proved beneficial.

The high school busing program has grown into a three main route system to and from the Manchester High Schools. This self sustaining action, at the 15 cents a ride price, has proved to be a worth while effort.

As of July, 1974 Hooksett will be a part of a four school district Supervisory Union 15. (Hooksett, Candia, Raymond and Auburn) This change, from the (eight school district) Supervisory Union 53, will allow greater concentration by the Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent. The slight increase in the Hooksett contribution to the union should be more than returned by increased services. Mr. Dovid Cawley, a former Hooksett Principal and extremely competent Superintendent, will head the new union.

Our school costs are no different than the price rises we have all witnessed in our homes or businesses. Paper products, transportation and maintenance costs have shown large gains and as previously mentioned tuition will account for one half million dollars.

As we all realize our schools are used to the fullest for town meetings, functions and activities, which is money well spent.

Your school board participates in the Hooksett Advisory Council, which is made up of the chairman of each board in town, and the Selectmen. This has proven to be a group where, all are made aware of each others problems, and realize how mutual many of them are.

In summation, your school board feels that our children are receiving a good all around education under the direction of a capable and dedicated staff, at a price that we can afford, in facilities that are getting crowded and that need some curriculum additions. It is hoped that the Hooksett Tax Payer will think about the future as well as they have in the past.

- 11. To determine and appoint the solaries of the School Board, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.

Submitted herewith is the report of the exomination and oudit of the accounts of the Hooksett School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1972, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the District. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board, School District Treasurer, School Lunch Program, Memorial School Principal's Account and the Hooksett Village School Petty Cash Fund.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

General Fund:

Comparative Balance Sheets – As of June 30, 1971 and June 30, 1972; (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative balance sheets as of June 30, 1971 and June 30, 1972 are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the financial condition of the School District changed from a current deficit of \$7,731.07 as of June 30, 1971 to a current surplus of \$9,248.53 os of June 30, 1972.

Comporative statements of oppropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1972, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the Budget Summary, (Exhibit A-4), o net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$3,654.86 plus a revenue surplus of \$13,324.27, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$16,979.13

As we have stated in our previous year's audit, solaries are to be paid only when services have been rendered. Our examination disclosed that the District had remitted to the Treasurer her entire salary in the month of September, 1971.

Conclusion:

Publication of the Exhibits contained in this audit report is optional at the discretion of the School Board. This letter, however, must be published in its entirety.

Superintendent's Report

In the fall of 1973, the School Districts of Auburn, Candia, Hooksett and Raymond petitioned the New Hampshire State Board of Education for withdrawal from their present Supervisory Unions.

This petition was granted in October and as of July 1, 1974, these four communities will officially be organized as Supervisory Union #15.

The rationale for the establishment of this new Supervisory Union was two-fold; one being the cumbersome task of administering eight Districts each with their individual needs and secondly, the growth rate factor of the communities.

Within the framework of Supervisory Union #15 will be a Superintendent who will serve as the executive head of the public schools. His responsibilities shall consist of the planning and administering each District's affairs subject to statutory requirements, regulations of the State Board of Education, and the policies of the local District.

The Assistant Superintendent is to provide services in support of the entire educational enterprise. His major responsibilities will be the employment of personnel certified and noncertified, and to serve in administrative capacity to principals, department heads, teachers, and students.

With the above arrangement, we feel quite confident of providing each District the needed service and it is our intention to have an "open house" within each of the School Districts in the fall of 1974 to explain in detail the purpose and the operation of a Central Office.

Hooksett Memorial School

The Memorial Junior High School program continued to utilize varied instructional patterns in the major academic areas during the School Year 1972-1973. Small group instruction, independent study, and project work highlighted the varied approaches to the curriculum. The teaching staff feels very positive toward the continued usage of these techniques. Classes in French and Consumer Education were added to the Curriculum this year. The first year French program utilized a survey approach to allow as many students to familiarize themselves with the language that desired to do so. Consumer Education included instruction on Budgeting, Taxes, Legal Responsibilities, Social Responsibilities (Drug & Alcohol problems), etc. Both new programs were well received and will be continued next year.

The Special Curriculum areas were again outstanding. Art, Music and Physical Education continued to provide excellent opportunities for students to demonstrate their skills in a given area. The Art and Spring Week Project Show, Christmas and Spring Concerts, and the Gymnastic Show were outstanding and the number of students participating was increased once again. Our athletic teams maintained their high standard of excellence and sportsmanship. The Boy's Basketball Team was the best in the State at this level, completing the season with a perfect 27-0 record.

To provide more instructional time for students, mini-courses were offered for the first time this year and these were taught during the time the students normally would be waiting for the buses. Thus, every possible minute of time was utilized in providing instruction for the students. Students selected 6 courses out of 18 choices to take during the year, thus giving them the opportunity of selection for the first time. Field trips continued to be an important part of the curriculum with visits to Sturbridge Village, Science Museum, Brandeis University

Theater, Salem and the White Mountains. An activity week — called Spring Week— was introduced this year. Students participated in their regular classes but also participated in various activities during the school day. The week was culminated with a show whereby students could demonstrate their projects to their parents who visited school.

Unfortunately, the Town saw fit not to provide the addition needed to allow expansion of the curriculum. As more students are enrolled at the junior high level, and with no physical expansion possible, the program is bound to suffer. Already many small group/large group instruction becomes impossible for next year. There is no room to develop these concepts properly. The library is occupying only half the space that it should and there is no room for expansion. With the introduction of Special Education for the junior high next year, every available space will be utilized. Art and Music are not taught in the proper instructional areas and Industrial Arts (shop) and Home Economics are not provided at all. Yes, decisions as to the future of the junior high program will have to be made rapidly. The junior high program, through the efforts of all concerned, over the last five years, has a solid foundation on which to expand and improve. The decisions as to its future now rests with the people.

Hooksett Village School

The Village School, over the past year, has shown major gains in the academic fields. Starting with the beginning of the year the entire staff worked on basic minimum guide lines for all the academic areas at each grade level. The guide lines were set up so that at each grade level the teacher knew what had transpired before the child came to their room, how far they were to take each child during the year, and where the child would be picked up the following year; thus giving the curriculum a continuity from grades one through six.

Continuity is a key to a good education as it helps to individualize each academic area for the children. However, no matter how well planned a curriculum is, the effectiveness it has depends on the individuals who dispense the facts, ideas and theories within that subject area, the teacher.

The Village School is endowed with a very fine professional staff. On the whole these professionals give many hours of dedicated service, both during school and after school so that the children are able to grow both intellectually and socially. Above and beyond the many hours in the classrooms, the teachers make themselves available to the children during recess periods, lunch periods and before and after school to talk with and help those students who seek additional guidance.

The staff involves themselves with special areas where children excell, art, dramatics, music, sewing, athletics, and other areas too numerous to name. These aspects of the educational structure are very important as they give a child an outlet for creative ability where he can achieve.

The areas of the specialist have also been strengthened this year. Miss Pelletier again did a marvelous job with music and choir at the school and has made plans to further expand the

child's musical experiences for the coming year. Mr. Bilodeau did a fine job with the physical education program, including our first physical education program at the school. Mrs. Linnane worked long hours as the reading specialist as did Miss Bryan with speech, Miss Haller with penmanship and Mr. Jordan as the learning disabilities man. Mr. Boyd allowed the children in grades five and six the opportunity to participate after school in football, basketball and volley ball for the first time in an organized program, as did Miss Brisson and Miss Bergquist for grades three and four in volley ball.

The grade three teachers, Miss Bergquist, Mrs. Wright and Mrs. Gilpatrick along with Miss Pelletier, also worked long and hard on the Christmas Program. Miss Mann, Miss Kzcowski, Mrs. Kling, Mrs. Berry, Miss Brisson and Miss White also put in many hours to present a program of dances and music for the school.

Miss Pelletier, Mrs. Beauchesne, Miss Brisson, Miss Crowley, Mrs. Kling and Miss White gave of their time to take the children skiing during the winter months, while Mrs. Merrill, Mrs. Gould and Mrs. Connor had the first graders participating in many innovative activities. Mrs. Hall and Mrs. Norman who are involved with the special education program, give unselfishly of their time and energy daily to provide a well developed and balanced program for their students.

The Hooksett Village School is working on the philosophy of the total child, a strong academic background in the basic subjects while allowing the children an outlet in related activities so that all children can succeed and thus be successful.

Fred C. Underhill School

There are three essential elements that camprise the program at the Underhill School: a pleasant atmasphere where every child can feel valued and successful; a faculty concerned with developing youngsters wha delight in learning; and, programs that respond to each child's individual needs.

The program of flexible grouping and multi-level regrauping of children; team teaching; independent study, individualized instruction; and tutarial wark has extended into a most successful pragram. Children are invalved simultaneausly in a variety of experiences. Some are warking individually; athers with partners, in teams, with aides, specialists, and in small graups. A hum of learning, curiosity and creativity permeates the building.

The media center has become a valuable resource for everyane. Everywhere in the center ane encaunters the eager faces of children "turned-on" to learning. Students fram all levels come to the center to aperate filmstrip previewers, browse independently, use card catalags, enjay assigned recards at listening tables, hold committee meetings, and even project their awn film.

A new program to serve children with weak learning abilities began this year. Project NEED, funded under Title I, facused its attention to early diagnosis af learning disabilities and provided individual, small graup and supplemental activities co-ardinated with the classroom teacher and conducted by tutars.

In order to familiarize the students with the facilities offered by an emergency ambulance, the Tri-Tawn Volunteer Emergency Ambulance crew demonstrated camman equipment found in most emergency vehicles and showed them through the ambulance.

This year our fifth-grade students traveled ta Camp Gratonwood, Graton, Massachusetts, for a week af environmental study. The children were involved personally in the environment, so that they make a positive identification with the natural surroundings. They developed a desire to improve the environment as well as to learn to arganize in a scientific way.

The Underhill P.T.O. has been most supportive of our "Individual Pupil Experience" program and in assisting all the staff in creating the best passible pragrams for our children. It is with great appreciation that we acknowledge the fine wark so frequently undertaken by aur parents.

It has been a tatal team effort of staff and parents to carry on an effective educational program. This effort must remain continuous to keep our schools in line with the changing world around us and provide quality education.



There were 334 summons issued and there were 384 court complaints brought in by the department. Also the department handled 12 juvenile court cases.

One big help to the department this past year has been the installation of the communications center. This center is manned around the clock and is in radio contact with the cruisers at all times. This center also dispatches fire department, ambulance and highway department.

We still have the situation at the bridge which has been with us for the past three years. This requires 2 men every morning and 3 men every afternoon of every school day. It appears as if this situation will continue through 1974.

Gasoline was a problem in 1973 forcing the department to purchase from private gasoline dealers. A meeting of the department heads was held late in the year with the selectmen and representatives of the oil companies and the situation was relieved somewhat.

I would like to remind the residents of the town that we now have one telephone number for any emergency, be it police, fire, ambulance or highway. This number is listed below for your convenience.

Despite the work involved in establishing and moving the library the staff provided a number of programs through the year. Roundtable book discussions continued with an active group meeting monthly. Several times during the year this group gove most welcomed assistance in the progress of the Hooksett Public Library. Other continuing programs included the summer reading program and Story Hours.

During the year the library was visited by local nursery schools enjoying the story hour and the bookmobile which made three visits this year. Elementary school classes have also explored the new library. At Christmas time a special story hour and croft workshop for the children and a croft night for the adults was held. Mrs. Ellis of Epsom gave a lecture about the Astrological chort of the United States and predictions for 1974. We are indebted to the many individuals for their contributions to these programs.

The Staff would like to thank the Trustees and potrons for all the time, work and support they have given to the library to make this a most successful year.

Report of Library Trustees - 1973-74

The Library Trustees were more than gratified by the support of the people for the proposed Hooksett Public Library. The next step was legal acquisition and fund raising for furnishings. We acknowledge and appreciate the generosity of local organizations, several businesses and individuals who made financial contributions. Among these are; The Hooksett Men's Club, Hooksett Cammunity Grange, Hooksett Woman's Club, Amoskeag Norsianal Bank, Pansy Rebekah Ladge #90, Whitey's Signs, Inc. (Russell Pairier), New Hampshire Landscaping, Inc. (Lean Pearson), Robert Danos, Mr. & Mrs. William Tassie, Rena Burnor, Elaina Jahnsan, Kay Jahnsan. A substantial contribution was also made by the Cagswell Benevalent Trust.

With the help of the 437th Adjutant General Campany (Postal), U. S. Army Reserve all materials from the Arah W. Prescatt Library were moved an Saturday, June 9 and the Haaksett Public Library apened its daars on Manday, June 11. The response of the town has been most interesting; including from bundles of books left upon the doorstep to bird feeders and and houses for the resident wildlife which has proved quite abundant.

The formal Open House was held an December 6 with all the new furnishing an display. It was an evening to remember and an apportunity to acknowledge the contribution of the Building Cammittee. The final meeting of the Library Building Cammittee had been held in late spring, after five years of endeavar with their purpose fulfilled. A special thank you to Mr. & Mrs. John Jacobs, Linda Maher, Fran Raux, and the Haoksett Bank far their contributions to a successful apen house.

The Selectmen, jaining in the evening, used the occasion for the presentation of the Selectmen's Cane to Hooksett's aldest citizen, Eliza Burbank Terrill. Incidentally, the Library hopes to follow this up and seek information on its history.

Unfortunately it became necessary far Trustee, Mrs. Elizabeth McCamish, to resign and Mrs. Dorothy S. Allen was appointed to fill out her term. Further turnover within the staff has led to the hiring of new Assistant Librarians, Mrs. Leslie Breen and Mrs. Lais Payne, both Haaksett residents.

A recurring question which we would like to mention is the status of the Arah W. Prescott building. At the present time it is in the hands of the town's legal counsel and little can be done until a ruling has been made regarding its future use. The Trustees feel that future use could include:

- a branch library far a children's callection, apen one ar twa afternoons per week for area children within walking distance
- 2. use as a meeting room for small groups
- 3. your suggestians are welcome

Included in the Librarian's Report are the figures relating to the Library's circulation of materials. A fifty per cent increase in new card halders caupled with a thirty per cent increase in adult backs circulating certainly paints to a positive attitude from the townspeaple toward library service.

Yaur staff and Trustees attended several new baak meetings, warkshaps, district meetings as well as participating in and attending the New England Library Association Annual Canference, New Hampshire Library Council Annual Canference, and the New Hampshire Library Trustees Association Fall Canference.





ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1973

The regularly scheduled meetings of your Planning Board are held on the first and third Mondays of each month at 7:30 p.m., in the Municipal Building.

During 1973 the Board held 26 regular meetings, three special meetings and four Public Hearings. Thirty-one Sub-division plans were approved and twenty-nine Site plan approvals were granted.

Two new members appointed to the Board during 1973 were Richard Leask and Richard Marshall. These members replaced William Miller and Conrad Croteau. Mr. Miller and Mr. Croteau were very active in the work of the Board and their contributions to planning in Hooksett have been greatly missed.

We continue to have excellent representation on the Board from Jim Tethers, Assistant Director of the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission. His assistance and comments are most helpful.

The Town's representatives on the Southern NHPC are Conrad Croteau and Warren Harvey.

The Board was grateful that the Town approved the new Zoning changes at the Special Town Meeting, December 17, 1973. The members feel that these changes are in the best interest of the Town as a whole and will better permit the orderly growth of the town.

As stated last year, the Board's main function is planning, but with the continued requests for sub-division and site plan approval, very little time has been spent on the important work. We are presently starting to review the sub-division regulations hoping to simplify the instructions without changing the requirements. This will make it easier for an applicant to determine what is required before meeting with the Board.

The Board is also very interested in tax mapping the Town by aerial survey. This could make planning for future development areas much more accurate and reduce the confusion that now exists concerning owners and abuttors.

Your Planning Board continues to work toward making our Town a place that we all can be proud of now and in the future. Yourcontinued interest and support is greatly appreciated.

The members would like to take this opportunity to thank our Secretary, Mrs. William Tassie (Barbara), for her many hours of uncompensated work and her willingness to assist us in many ways under adverse conditions.

Conservation Commission Report



TO THE CITIZENS OF HOOKSETT

This year has been a productive one for members af the Conservation Commission. The Commission was expanded from four to seven members this year thus moking it possible to undertake more projects and do some thinking about the future preservation of Haoksett's natural resources.

One of the occomplishments of the Commission was the construction of a nature troil. This troil can be found by going in the Danoti Field Road, staying to the left and porking beyond the Donoti Memorial. There is a sign indicating the beginning of the troil. This sign, as seen in the picture on this page, was constructed by George Nuttle. Yellow dots and nature stations mark the mile long troil. In the spring we will add benches, more nature stations and a map of the area, as well as exponding the trail itself. It is the hope of members of the Conservation Commission that this nature area will be used as an outdoor laboratory by the local schools as well as for the enjoyment of all Hooksett residents.

At the request of Selectmon Oscar Morin, members of the Conservation Commission cleaned up and restored the Clay Family cemetery on Holl Mountain Raad. The Clay brothers were Civil War veterans and it was appropriate that this area was restored, grave markers rediscovered and flags placed in the cemetery for Memorial Day.

Two projects in progress at this time that should be af interest to citizens of Hooksett are plans to abtoin outside funding to purchase 1503 acres of land around Head Pond and plans to build a riverside park on the Old Dundee Mill property.

Recently members of the Commission met with Mr. John Hyde, President of Liberty Street Corporation (a land holding company in Concord) and the owner of the 1503 acres around Head Pond. Mr. Hyde has indicated on interest in selling this land to the town of Hooksett in its entirety so that the area could ultimately benefit the town of Hooksett in some way. The land around Head Pond is one of the last large tracts of undeveloped land left in Hooksett and members af the Conservation Commission feel every effort should be made to preserve the area in its natural state as a potential water source or as a wilderness area. Senators McIntyre and Cotton and Representatives Wyman and Cleveland have been contacted for their assistance in obtaining outside funding far the purchase of the land.

The Conservation Commission has been granted authority by the Selectmen to manage and control the presently undeveloped town property south of the Public Service Power Station and bounded on the west by the Merrimack River and on the east by Merrimack Street. The Commission has requested funds from the Land and Water Conservation Fund, Bureau of Outdoor Recreation with matching funds hapefully to be provided by the Town for improvements on this plot of land. Our goal is to make this somewhat unsightly area more attractive and more accessible to our residents by filling in several large foundation holes; grading of the river bank; grading, loaming and seeding the area; and paving a parking area. This area nat only has a view of the beautiful natural falls and a long span of the river, but also has historical interest for the town. It would be an ideal location for a town common, with areas to fish, ta lounch boats and for picnicking.

Many citizens of Hooksett have already become involved in our projects, but members of the Commission would like to have more people working with us to help us in preserving our natural resources.

We have mony projects planned for this next year - making a list of our wetlands, cleaning up areas along the river, more nature trails, setting up a recycling center, a spring clean-up day and ony other conservation projects you may feel are significant. If you have any ideas or suggestions, contact any Commission member or attend our meetings on the first Wednesday of each month at the Municipal Building.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

The New Hampshire Forest Fire Service is represented in every town, city or unorganized place in our state by the forest fire worden. Anyone wishing to kindle on outside fire when the ground is not covered with snow must first obtain the written permission of the fire worden. Except for cooking fires, no fire can be kindled between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. unless it is a commercial or industrial burn or it is raining. The fire worden is assisted in his work by the District Forest Fire Chief who works for the Department of Resources and Economic Development Forest Fire Service.

Fire prevention was, again this year, the most important part of the Forest Fire Warden's job. Fire statistics show the need with 72% of the fires caused by smoking, debris burning and children. Smokey the Bear is an important prevention tool but he still needs much help from the public. Parents should warn their children of the hazards of playing with matches. Children tend to forget that a lighted match held in their hand is a potential forest fire.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Report for Year 1973

During 1973 we had 12 forest fires, two of which involved oid to Pembroke and two involved aid to Allenstown. The fires burned about 18½ acres. Most of the fires occurred in the months of October and November. The worst of the fires was located off the Chester Turnpike south of the Allenstown line. Because the fire burned about one mile from the road no equipment could reach it and all fighting had to be done by hand tools in between large boulders and fallen trees. This was a very expensive fire.

During the year we issued 201 fire permits. These permits can be abtained from me at my home at 18 Dundee Avenue or from Deputy Fire Warden, Gerard Lambert at Lamberts Store, or in South Hooksett from Chief Low or Deputy Leon Boisvert.

We all know that the town is growing rapidly, that more children and grownups moving around increase the hazard of forest fires. In connection with this growth is the new problem of having newcomers to the community buy a piece of property and thinking that because they own the property they can burn anytime. This is not so. If at any time there is a need to burn the owners should contact one of the above named individuals for a permit. Then we can check the area for your own safety and that of the other landowners in the area. The fire on the Chester Turnpike did not start by itself. Sameone was in there and without the help of a mini-bike for none could travel in the area.

Out of the 12 forest fires experienced during 1973, 75% were of suspicious origin. We are asking the help of all concerned citizens. If they see something is not right, to report to the fire wardens or any officer of the law. Take the license plate number from any car seen near the area of any fire. Report any suspicious person seen in the area. By doing so we can protect our forests, other landowner's properties, homes that may be in the path of a forest fire or may be even someone's life.

Fourteen oil burners were inspected by Coptain Donold Botsford. Three of these installations were rejected. In addition we have inspected foster homes, kindergortens and restourant facilities to be sure they abide by State regulations.

The members of the Department have made various improvements to the fire station. Among these are the installation of electric dampers on the two heating units to prevent downdrafts, the construction of wooden cobinets in the radio room, the pointing of the station floor, not once, but twice and have had the drive in front of the station seoled.

Although there are always a few men around the building on Saturday and Sunday, cleaning the station or doing maintenance on trucks we find that the growth of population has increased the number of colls we receive during the weekdays, Manday through Friday, to the extent that one permanent man should be on duty to handle emergency calls. We are therefore increasing our 1974 budget in order to provide this service to the Town.

I would like at this time to thank all those who donated so freely of their time while we conducted the dragging operation last spring, Captain Harold Murray and his skin-diving team for the many man hours they donated without cost to the Department, Mrs. Borboro Brock, President of the Hooksett Auxiliary and all the members of the Auxiliary for preparing food and coffee when the men went to fires, and for the Christmos Porty and their gift of two ash tray stands for the Station. I would also like to thank all of the men for their cooperation in the Department during 1973.

ANNUAL REPORT

For the first time in the history of the Department, which was established in 1925, our emergency calls for one year exceeded the 100 mark. A total of 102 calls kept the Department pretty busy. Our statistics for the year show that it required, in addition to the two permanent men, a total of 1,447 manhours for the Call Men. The estimated value of the property involved was set at \$1,318,700. with an estimated loss at \$78,800. Fifty-five calls came in during the daytime hours and 47 occurred at night.

Nine calls were for major building fires, 11 for minor fires to buildings, also 24 brush fires, 10 auto fires or accidents and numerous miscellaneous calls.

There were 14 calls for mutual aid assistance. Nine to the City of Manchester, 1 to Pembroke and two each to Hooksett Village and Allenstown.

New Hampshire College on North River Road gave us some concern during the year. Being located in Hooksett and Manchester the Department has an arrangement with Manchester Fire Department for a dual response on alarms there. 15 calls were received for the College and of these, 13 were false alarms. Through their security staft two separate individuals were arrested, one found guilty and convicted and the other awaiting trial. Working with Manchester and the College, we hope to put a stop to this dangerous practice.

We have again submitted an article in the warrant for the construction of a combination Office and Radio Room to the Station. As was explained last year, we do not now have the facilities to do the necessary office work required of us and with the area growing by leaps and bounds, this is more evident day by day. We are also committed to establishing numerous new records which were recommended by the State Board of Underwriters two years ago.

With all of this office work to be done, it has now become critical that facilities be provided. The days of working from a brief case between home, the station and the office are gone since it is impossible to accomplish what is necessary in this way.

The opening of the Lincoln Park North apartment complex has added considerable concern to the Department. With seven buildings each having 30 apartments for a total of some 210 units, involving possibly 600 to 800 lives has started us working on preplanning for possible emergencies to this particular area.

By the time of this printing the Department should be hooked into the new Hooksett Emergency Communications Center. Once this is established the Town will have one telephone number for emergency use. This will take care of calls for Police, Fire and Ambulance requirements. We are hopeful that this will reduce responding time at the time of an emergency. The new number is 485-5177.

There were three resignations during the year. Leaving the Department were Frank A. Allen and Jean J. Labonville who have moved out of the area and Philip Freethey for personal reasons.

Returning to the Department after a leave of absence were Raoul Desmarais and Patrick E. Lacroque.

In accordance with the New Hampshire Statutes, Chapter 251 Laws of 1947, a total of 13 permits were issued for the installation of power oil burner equipment. Six of these required reinspection.

We cannot close our report without expressing our thanks to the Ladies Auxiliary for all the help rendered to the Department during the year.





As of the end of 1973 the Precinct serves 447 customers. The Precinct pumped 54,255,000 gallons of water, an increase of 444,000 gallons over 1972.

The Metering Program is nearing completion. Eighty-six accounts are not, as yet, metered and it is planned to meter most of these during 1974.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures - Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 and A-4)

Comparative statements of general fund appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1972, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit A-4), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$6,826.11, less a revenue deficit of \$3,582.48, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$3,243.63.

INDEBTEDNESS

TREASURER

General Fund:

Classified Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A classified statement of general fund receipts and expenditures of the Precinct for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1972 is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance - General Fund - as of December 31, 1972 is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Publication of Auditors' Summary of Findings and Recommendations Mandatory:

The complete text of the auditors' summary of findings and recommendations, included as part of the annual audit report which is made to the Board of Water Commissioners by this Division after completion of the audit and examination of the Precinct accounts, must be published in the next annual report of the Precinct, persuant to the provisions of R.S.A. 71:27a.

The provisions of R.S.A.71:27a stipulate that if such summary of findings and recommendations is not so published, the Tax Commission, at the expense of the Precinct, may cause such summary to be separately published and distributed.

Contingency Fund:

The amount of \$800.00 appropriated for contingency expenses was in excess of legal limitations set forth in R.S.A. 52:4a which reads as follows:

"Every village district annually by an article in the warrant may establish a contingency fund to meet the cost of unanticipated expenses that may arise during the year. Such fund shall not exceed one percent of the amount appropriated exclusive of capital expenditures and amortization of debt by such village district during the preceding year. A detailed report of all expenditures from the contingency fund shall be made annually by the commissioners and published with their report."

Incompatibility of Offices - Commissioner - Collector:

In accordance with R.S.A. 52:8 which governs the duties of Village District (Precinct) officers, the moderator, clerk, treasurer and commissioners shall severally qualify and possess the same powers and perform the same duties in respect to the district's meetings and business affairs that the moderator, clerk, treasurer and selectmen of towns respectively possess and perform in respect to like matters in towns.

Further reference is made to R.S.A. 41:4 which prohibits a person from holding any two of the following offices: "selectmen (commissioner), treasurer, moderator, trustee of trust funds, collector of taxes."

Withdrawal from Capital Reserve in Excess of Requirements - \$1,304.84:

During the fiscal year ended December 31, 1971, a withdrawal of \$4,400.00 was mode from the Capital Reserve Fund to fund expenditures of the Brick Yard Brook - Main project. Expenditures for this project amounted to only \$3,095.16, thereby leaving an unexpended balance of \$1,304.84. This aforesaid balance should be returned to the Capital Reserve Fund.

Written Commitment of Water Rents Recommended:

The occounting for water rents is presently inadequately controlled inasmuch the Collector of water rents is not given a firm commitment of water assessments, signed and sealed by the Water Commissioners. The procedure that is followed at this time is such that the Collector must compute the meter readings and post these computations to individual ledger sheets.

In order to provide sound occounting control over these revenues, it is recommended that written water rents warrants together with lists of water assessments be delivered to the Collector at each billing period.

Basis of Accounting:

The accounts of the Precinct are kept essentially on the cash basis of accounting, i.e., revenues are recorded when collected and expenditures when paid; the cost of plant acquisition and improvements is charged to expense in the fiscal year in which disbursements are made. Perpetual inventory records are not maintained.

This report, however, was prepared on the modified cosh basis; uncollected water rents and other service charges due to the Precinct have been set up in the Comparative Bolonce Sheets (Exhibit A-1).

Accounting System:

The general accounting system consists primarily of cosh receipts and disbursements journals. General ledger proprietary and budgetary accounts are not kept. Similarly, subsidiary plant and equipment ledgers are not maintained.

Consequently, the occounting system is incomplete and does not provide adequote occounting over the resources and octivities of the Precinct. For this reason, it is not possible to prepare meaningful and occurate financial statements which express precisely the financial condition or operating results of the Precinct.

Adoption of General Accounting System Recommended:

We again recommend the installation of a complete general accounting system. This system should include all general ledger accounts and subsidiary ledger records necessary to reflect accurately the financial condition and operating results of the Precinct.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 71, Section 27-a, of the Revised Statutes Annotated require that the auditors' summory of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town. Publication of the Exhibits contained in the audit report is optional, at the discretion of the Board of Water Commissioners.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Hooksett Village Water Precinct for their assistance during the course of the audit.



The year 1973 was another year of steady growth for the Precinct in terms of assessed valuation as well as the number of customers served.

New areas were brought into the Precinct and several new commercial buildings as well as private homes were constructed in the Precinct.

The Precinct pumped 52,700,000 gallons of water during 1973. This is an increase of 8,900,000 gallons over 1972.

During the year 1973 the Commissioners completed negatiations with the State Industrial Development Authority to acquire the Hooksett Industrial Park water system on a lease-purchase agreement. Under the terms of the agreement the precinct will take over the Industrial Park System and service the customers in the Park. The purchase price of \$64,000.00 will be paid

as annual rent of \$4,000.00 and when the entire purchase price has been paid the system will be transferred to the precinct. This rent maney comes from incame derived from serving the customers located in the Park. The incame is greater than the rent paid to the Park Authority so there is no added tax to the taxpaying water users in the rest of the Precinct. The factories in the Industrial Park have been taken into the Precinct and pay Precinct taxes at the same rate as all other Precinct members. This system consists of a 100,000 gallon standpipe, a well with pump, mains, valves and hydrants located within the Park. This system, several years aga, was connected by mains and valves to the Central Haaksett system in such a way that each could serve as a back-up system to the other.

The first building to have a sprinkler system, the L & F Canstruction Co., was built at the Industrial Park.

The buildings now under construction at the K-Mart Shapping Center will all have full fire-sprinklers in them. A water main was run through the Shapping Center connecting the Route #3 main with the Londonderry Turnpike main. This loop will provide additional fire safety to the entire area and provide mare flexibility in the event of a break in a main.

Plans are under way in South Hooksett for the re-activation of the South Hooksett Water Precinct. The Central Hooksett Precinct has taken the tentative stand that it will be willing to sell water to the South Hooksett Precinct if they carry through their plans to install mains, etc. within their precinct bounds.

The Precinct is also studying the possibility of establishing additional well-sites for future expansion.

The Precinct is in the process of installing a Propone-gas driven electric generator to be used for stand-by power to pump water in the event of interruption of public electric utility. This stand-by system would be effective in the event of a "rolling-black-out" of the public utility or other interruption of power. The present energy crisis makes this move to provide uninterrupted water service for fire protection and regular water service an important one.

The voters, in 1973, rejected the request for money to connect the Village Precinct and the Central Precinct together. This "gap" should one day be eliminated because it would give both precincts a complete backup system.

The Precinct suffered a loss that cannot be replaced in the untimely death of Commissioner Lindsay Rice. Mr. Rice was a Commissioner for almost 12 years and was totally dedicated to the idea of providing a high quality water system for the residents within the Precinct.

The Precinct was also saddened by the death of Edward Higgins. Mr. Higgins was one of our original commissioners and worked very hard with the board to get the Precinct started. He served as Commissioner for almost 15

years and left, not because he no langer wanted to serve, but because he moved outside of the Precinct bounds so was not eligible to serve. The Precinct is grateful for his many years of service.

HOMEOWNERS' EXEMPTION

TO BE VOTED ON AT TOWN MEETING MARCH 5, 1974 (ON TOWN BALLOT).

Procedure for Adoption.

A town desiring to adopt the provisions of this subdivision may have the question placed on the warrant for a town meeting at which town officers are elected in the manner provided in RSA 39:3. Such question shall be presented for voter approval in the following manner:

For a town which has an official ballot for the election of town officers, the officer who prepares the ballot shall place the question on such official ballot as it appears in paragraph below.

The wording on the ballot of any referendum for the adoption of RSA 72: 44–60 shall be as follows:

"Shall we adopt the homeowners' exemption provisions of RSA chapter 72 granting a \$5,000 exemption based on equalized assessed valuation on all owner-occupied units and a \$10,000 exemption based on equalized assessed valuation on all owner-occupied units owned by persons over sixty-five years of age?"

Upon approval of the question by a majority of those voting on the question, the provisions of this subdivision shall be deemed to have been adopted and shall take effect on April first next following the referendum for the tax year beginning on such date.

Owner-Residents Exempted. Every person who has the legal or beneficial title in equity to real property including a mobile home in this state and who resides thereon and in good faith makes the same his permanent home, or the permanent home of another or others legally or naturally dependent upon said person, shall be entitled to an exemption of five thousand dollars of equalized assessed valuation as determined by the tax commission from all taxotion except for special assessments on said home up to an assessed valuation determined by the tax commission; providing, however, that in no case shall the remaining equalized assessed valuation be less than eight thousand dollars on any homestead. Said title may be held solely, jointly or in common with others and said exemption may be apportioned among such of the owners as shall reside thereon as their respective interests shall appear. The exemption provided herein shall be allowed on each condominium parcel occupied by its owner and on any other entity recognized at law as realty and occupied by its owner.

Computation of Exemption. Owner-resident real estate, as defined in RSA 72:45, occupied by qualified owners under sixty-five years of age, to the assessed valuation of five thousand dollars and occupied by qualified owners sixty-five years of age and over to the assessed valuation of ten thousand dollars shall be exempt from toxation provided, however, if property

within the town or city is not assessed at its full and true market value, the amount of the valuation exempted will be that portion of five thousand dollars or ten thousand dollars that the level of assessment as found by the tax commission bears to one hundred percent.

(Hooksett's property is presently being assessed at 77% of value, thus the \$5,000 becomes \$3,850 - the \$10,000 becomes \$7,700 and the \$8,000 becomes \$6,160. No exemption will be allowed on Hooksett property assessed for \$6,160 or less.)

Elderly Exemption. In the case of a taxpayer who attained the age of sixty-five during the preceding tax year or any previous tax year and whose application for an exemption hereunder is opproved, the exemption granted shall be double the amount as allowed in RSA 72:45, provided, however, that the provisions of this section shall not apply to an applicant who has not been a resident for five consecutive years or who, during the five years immediately preceding application, received a transfer of the real estate for which the exemption is sought from a person related to the applicant by blood or marriage who has not by the date of said application attained the age of sixty-five.

Residence; What Constitutes. For the purpose of this sub-division the word "residence" shall mean occupancy such as to indicate that the person claiming a homeowners' exemption in good faith regards the place as his home to the exclusion of all other places where he may, from time to time, temporarily reside, and he must use this residence as his principal place of abode. A claimant must have resided in the claimed residence for at least six months prior to April first of the year in which the exemption is claimed unless a six-month period of residence has been interrupted or made impossible by active military service.

Abandonment. The cessation of residence in the dwelling unit claimed for a homeowners' exemption, or the rental of an entire dwelling unit previously claimed as a residence for tax purposes shall constitute the abandonment of said dwelling unit as a residence and that abandonment shall continue until said dwelling unit shall have been occupied by the owner for the six month period provided in RSA 72:48.

Tax Exemption for Elderly. The provisions of RSA 72:39-43 relative to certain tax exemptions for the elderly shall not apply in any town or city which adopts the provisions of this subdivision.

(RSA 72:39-43 is present elderly exemption being granted.)


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
