TOWN WARRANT

(L. S.) THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Jackson in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Jackson on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the following purposes:

- 3. Maintenance of summer highways and bridges.
- 4. Snow removal from highways and dooryards and sanding highways.
 - 5. Street lighting.
- 6. Old Age Assistance, J. H. Hodge account and poor relief.
 - 7. Maintenance of Cemetery.
 - 8. Memorial Day exercises.
 - 9. Maintenance of parsonage.
 - 10. Town Library.
 - 11. Fire protection.
 - 12. Police protection.
 - 13. Memorial Hospital.

- 14. Sidewalk construction.
- 15. Jackson Ski and Outing Club.
- 16. Eastern Slope Region.
- 17. Skating rink.
- 18. Retirement of debt now standing at \$1,000.

To see if the town will raise and appropriate sums of money as follows:

- 19. The sum of \$2,763 for State Aid Reconstruction beginning at Saunders Place driveway on east side of six-mile circuit, state contributing the sum of \$5,524.
- 20. The sum of \$215.61 to secure Town Road Aid, state contributing the sum of \$862.45.
- 21. The sum of \$200 to re-open lower end of Thorn Mt. Road.
- 22. The sum of \$92.16 for support of White Mountains Region.
- 23. The sum of \$2,400 to construct reinforced concrete bridge with 18-foot roadway, and raising adjacent grade level by 3 feet at the site of wooden bridge on Dundee Road near residence of Daniel Dinsmore, the state contributing the sum of \$1,600.
- 24. The sum of \$300 for tarring surfaces of roadways between Village Inn Restaurant and residence of Wendell Drew on Thorn Hill road, and between Route 16 and residence of Carl Hayes on Iron Mt. road.
 - 25. The sum of \$750 for re-construction of Meloon Bridge.
- 26. The sum of \$2,000 to cover repair of flood damage on Class V roads.
 - 27. The sum of \$1,500 to secure new town truck.

To see if town will vote as follows:

28. To impose summons of \$.20 on poll taxes uncollected after October 15th, 1951.

29. To authorize selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes.

30. To authorize selectmen to sell real estate acquired by tax deeds.

31. To act upon any other business that may legally come before this meeting.


