TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Langdon in the County of Sullivan in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Langdon on Tuesday the ninth day of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE I. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ART. II. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for same.

ART. III. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the support of Highways and Bridges.

ART. IV. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$286.84 for Class 5 Highway Assistance or T. R. A. so-called.

ART. V. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30.00 for the celebration of Memorial Day.

ART. VI. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for the purchase of Backpack Pumps and Refills.

ART. VII. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding one one-hundredth of one percent ($1/100$ of 1%) of the assessed valuation based on the assessment of 1942 for the purpose of publicizing and promoting natural advantages and resources of the town, together with other towns in the Dartmouth Lake-Sunapee Region.

ART. VIII. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the purpose of continuing the control of White Pine Blister Rust and apply for State and Federal Aid to be used with same.

ART. IX. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of snow fence.

ART. X. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$225.00 for a Snow Plow.

ART. XI. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road, subject to gates and bars, beginning at the Beurhaus or Currier Place and leading to the Anger turn.

ART. XII. To see if the Town will vote to accept from the Estate of Mary A. Walker the sum of \$95.00 in trust for care of the Parker-Slade Lots in the Village Burying Ground.

ART. XIII. To see if the Town will vote to accept from the children of Henry E. and Achsah Royce Smith, the sum of Forty-five dollars, in trust, the income to be used for the care and upkeep of the Henry E. Smith lot in the Lower Cemetery.

ART. XIV. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ART. XV. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell or dispose of property acquired by Tax Collector's Deeds during this or succeeding years.

ART. XVI. To transact any other business that may come before said meeting.

ART. XVII. To allow accounts.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Langdon School Board:

Good work is being continued in the four lower grades under the direction of Mrs. Carl Buswell. The work of the four upper grades has been broken by changes of teachers but the children are producing standard material. Mrs. Francis Wirkkala did not return in the fall and the position was held until February 1 by Miss Alice Jezak. Miss Jezak resigned to accept a position in Massachusetts. Mrs. Gratia Way is filling the position.

Teaching is hard work and it is especially hard in school with all eight grades to keep the pupils work progressing to modern requirements, prepare each days work and correct papers.

The shortage of teachers is alarming. Patriotism and higher salaries have called many from the teaching profession to other fields. It is expected that many will stop teaching as soon as their contracts run out in the spring. I recommend if possible we hold the same faculty for next year.

Financially, teachers have been hard hit. Teacher's wages always have been low, in the comparison to years of study and expenses required to prepare for their work. According to a study made by the N. E. A. the cost of living already has risen, 19% since the war began but food, 35% and clothing 25%. The wages of factory workers have gone up 59% and teacher's salaries only 7%. Another inducement that kept teachers in their position before 1939 was that they had no income tax to pay.

Transportation is another serious problem. The cost is higher and it will soon be hard to find good drivers. Without transportation, however we would be forced to open up a large number of small schools with the difficulty of finding teachers.

Books are in good conditions and teachers can get along with less supplies than would be desirable. Unless new homes are built we will not need new furniture.

I appreciate the help and sympathy that I received from the School Board, the teachers and the pupils during my sickness. I am sorry for the inconvenience brought to them and wish to thank them for the extra work they so willingly have done.

January, 1942—January, 1943

During the year I made 23 visits to the schools and on 20 occasions visited the homes of pupils.

On two occasions have taken a pupil to the eye clinic in Hanover and another to the ear clinic (also) in Hanover. I accompanied two pupils for dental corrections to Claremont. A dental clinic was held March 31, 1942, twenty-five pupils were examined and found to need either cleaning, filling or extractions, and in twenty-five pupils the defects were corrected at an expense of \$28.00 of which \$1.50 was paid by the pupils. Each pupil is charged admission fee of ten cents (to the clinic).

Many of the school nurses activities, especially those done in the home, cannot easily be enumerated. Many other activities may be tabulated as follows.
