OF THE

Board of Education

For the Year ending February 15, 1912.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS OF LEE.

To the Honorable School Board of Lee:

In making my second annual report, I am able to state that considerable improvement has been made in several ways. In the first place there has been but one change of teachers since my last report, and none since the beginning of the school year last September.

The interest of the individual pupils has reached a most commendable place in development, and has contributed greatly to the efficiency of the schools. In fact, our children are above the average in intelligence, and deserve the best that can be obtained. I wish that every parent, citizen and pupil would come to understand how important it is for every child to be in school on time and at every session; absent treatment cannot be given in education.

We are able to give as good an elementary education as in any municipality in the state. The next step is the secondary school. For this our children must leave home and become quite an additional expense; but it is worth it. The better education and training that a child receives, the better his chance in life. It is not the education in any particular line that is valuable, but the ability to think that it is of value.

The work of the teachers and pupils has been a decided improvement on that of last year. We are bringing the pupils up to standard grade, and now there are few if any who could not make the same grade in any school in the state.

This has been done by honest conscientious work on the part of every one concerned.

Just a word as to the education of the children of any age or place: To begin with, education is not a definite, unchangeable quantity; the education of fifty years ago will not do for today, no more than the way of farming or doing carpenter work. Our children must be developed to meet the changed conditions of society. The pupil of thirty years ago attended the common school till the age of twenty or more; they were men and women with adult minds. Is it any wonder that they could solve mathematical puzzles, and analyze Pilgrim's Progress? But even at that, these grown men and women could not express themselves, either on paper or orally, as well as our twelve-year-old six grader, nor did they have so well grounded knowledge of history and geography.

Changed conditions and demands has compelled us to finish a certain amount of work before the age of fourteen, if the children are going to enter the professions at a reasonable age. Consequently, it has become necessary to do a certain amount of pruning off of the superfluous and useless portions in the several branches. Arithmetic has received the most severe treatment in this respect. The principles in this branch as taught today are confined to those principles that will be of practical use in life; and if persons take a careful, unprejudiced view of the question it will be seen at once how very little arithmetic is needed in life if that little is thorough and practical.

STATUTORY REQUIREMENTS.

There is need of some new textbooks in English Grammar. I therefore recommend that the sum of seventy-five dollars be asked of the Selectmen for this purpose, fifty dollars for scholars supplied, and two hundred and fifty for high school tuition.

In closing, I wish to express my thanks to the board, the teachers, to the parents, and especially to the children, for their aid and support.
