## TENTATIVE WARRANT

---

### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Madison qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Madison, on Tuesday, the 10th day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for same.

As follows:

- Town Officers' salaries.
- Town Officers' expenses.
- Election expenses.
- Town Hall expense.
- Fire Department.
- Health Department.
- Summer Highways and Bridges.
- Winter Highways.
- General expense of Highway Department.
- Street Lights.
- Libraries.
- Old Age Assistance.
- Town Poor.
- Patriotic Purposes.
- Parks and Playgrounds.
- Unclassified.
- Interest.
- Protection of Persons and Property.
- Indebtedness.
- Legal expense.
- Relief.

3. To see what action the town will take in regard to discount on taxes.

4. To see what sums of money the town will authorize the Selectmen to hire in anticipation of taxes.

5. To see if the Town will accept State Aid amounting to \$2,023.13 for construction of Class V roads, and raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of \$505.78.

6. To see if the town will continue to care for charities by House Bill No. 296.

7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town in coöperation with other towns in the Lake Region.

8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to improve present town signs and construct new signs.

9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to buy chairs for the Town Hall.

10. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Article 11, added February 22, 1936. To see if the town wishes to instruct the Selectmen to give District No. 3 more than one-third of the appropriation for summer roads, or add part of District No. 3 to District No. 1 or No. 2.

### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

---

To the School Board and Citizens of Madison :

I herewith submit my fifteenth annual report as Superintendent of Schools, it being the twenty-third in the series of such reports.

The schools of Madison are dealing with vitally important problems—the character and education of the boys and girls. Schools should, of course, be varied to meet new conditions as they arise, and some are wisely giving more time to the preparation for immediate tasks of trade or business. The grade schools have not been able to vary much, but have sought, through regular tasks and school activities, to teach lessons of good citizenship.

The High School has made an advance in the introduction of the practical work in chemistry. This course opens up facts which have become the basis of many medical and commercial investigations and many helpful discoveries. It is a prerequisite for girls who wish to enter hospitals for training as nurses.

Another interesting new course is physiography. This is a study of the earth as we find it around us in soils, stratified rocks, kinds of rocks, stream beds and various land formations, winds, tides, mountains and forests. Life becomes more enjoyable and useful when we can know the world forms about us.

The buildings are in the usual good state of repair. The School Board sees to it each summer that the buildings are painted inside and out at proper intervals and that the furniture is repaired and varnished. We do need to take definite steps to modernize our equipment. We need ventilating heaters, chemical toilets, adjustable furniture, beautified lawns, more spacious playgrounds with suitable equipment. I suggest that we begin this year by providing part of these

needs, preferably the chemical toilets at Madison Corner and Nickerson Schools.

Special aids are being offered the schools to enliven the routine work. The Silver Lake Woman's Club is still sponsoring the prize-speaking contest, and a worthy group represents the High School each year in the final contest in the Town Hall. Speakers enliven the club programs on Fridays, some very fine talent donating time to inspire the pupils. Visual education is still bringing worthwhile pictures to interest and help. "The Covered Wagon" proved especially helpful in giving a background for historical study of pioneer days in the far west. On Memorial Day we used the picture, "America Goes Over."

Medical inspection work is still being conducted by Miss Helen Nichols, R. N., who makes examinations and looks after remedial work as far as possible. Remedial work drags, however, as many parents feel unable to pay, and public funds are not available. Is there some public agency which can help in this much-needed work?

Miss Nichols' report is appended.

At this time parents are reminded that little people must be vaccinated if they are to enter school next fall.

Recent graduates now in post-secondary schools include Carlyle Chick in Worcester Tech, Francena Pearson in Bates College, Ruth Van Dusen in Gorham Normal School, Howard Kennett in Northampton Commercial College and Fred Robinson in Concord Business College. Several reports have said these students are reflecting credit on Madison High School.
