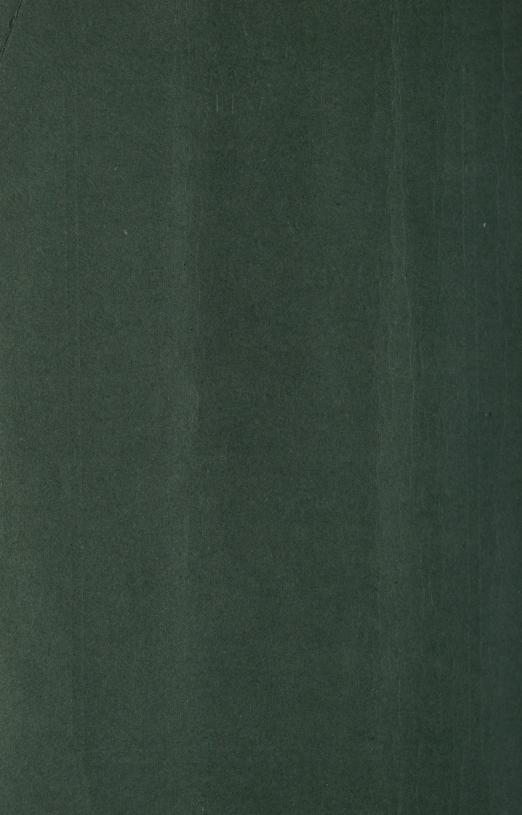

REPORT OF LIBRARY TRUSTEES

On July 7th, at a special town meeting, a new building to house the books constituting the Nelson Free Public Library was presented to the town. This building, known as the Olivia Rodham Memorial Library, was given by friends of the late Olivia Rodham, the funds having been raised largely through the efforts of Mrs. Wm. H. Elliot of Keene. The donors named three residents of the town as permanent trustees to act in co-operation with the three trustees elected by the voters of Nelson.

Mrs. Elliot has recently given the trustees ten shares of the capital stock of The American Telephone and Telegraph Company, the income of which will amount to about ninety dollars annually. Forty dollars of this is to be used to supplement the librarian's present salary, and fifty dollars to be paid to H. F. Priest for the oversight of the building and grounds.

In June, when the books were moved, Miss Frances Hobart, the secretary of the N. H., Public Library Commission, spent three days in town arranging the books in classes according to approved library rules. Since then an alphabetical card index has been made which shows title and author of each book in the library. The record book which has been kept by the librarian from the beginning showing the date of purchase and accession number of each book is to be continued in the same way.

Miss Hobart advised the sale of a few of our books which had evidently never been of interest here. These included such books as: the genealogy of a little-known Massachusetts family; some books of which we had two or three good copies; some French novels; etc. In every case the trustees acted with the advice of the Public Library Commission. Some

books which are worth keeping, but badly worn are stored in the basement to be rebound when funds permit.

Mrs. Delia H. Osgood who has been librarian for 35 years, resigned at the end of the fiscal year. She was urged to reconsider her action, but felt that she could no longer keep on with the active work of the library. It is impossible to overestimate the value of her devoted and willing service. Her carefully kept records will be of great help to those who are to carry on the work.

At a meeting of the trustees it was decided to engage Miss Ida Holbrook as librarian, and Mr. Albert Jackson as janitor.

The library has been fortunate in having a great many volumes given by interested friends during the past year. Mrs. Wm. H. Elliot has given us a set of The New International Encyclopedia, The New Reference Atlas of the World, and latest edition of Webster's New International Dictionary.

We wish to thank Mr. John Elliot for loaning us a Remington typewriter with which to finish the card index.

In all, 260 volumes have been given to the library by the following persons:

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Nelson:

It is with pleasure that I herein submit my fourth annual report as superintendent of schools.

Our great problem is to maintain our schools in creditable condition and at the same time keep within the limits of our appropriations.

America's greatest problem today is to train the rising generation of boys and girls into useful and law-abiding citizens. This implies a thorough preparation in the fundamentals of mental, moral and religious life. No generation of boys and girls ever faced so many temptations and pitfalls of society as modern life presents today.

It is the duty of the home, the school and the church to train and guide the emotions of children to a greater degree than ever before.

Promotions in June were based on results of following standard tests: Ayres's scale in writing and spelling; Charter's diagnostic language test; Stanford's achievement test. These were supplemented by frequent tests given by the teacher, a few by the superintendent. With these results were taken into consideration the ranks of individual pupils throughout the year.

On the above basis, the following number of pupils were promoted in the respective schools:

At the Munsonville school, remarkable harmony prevailed between teacher and pupils. Under the leadership of Miss May there is a ready response by the pupils in all classes. The work is well motivated, the discipline effective and instruction thorough.

At the Center, Mrs. Jackson maintained her former reputation for efficiency in instruction, tact in discipline and alert interest in community activities.

The per cent of attendance for this school was especially high, 98 per cent.

At the close of the year in June, Dorothy Priest and Eliot Priest completed their eighth grade in excellent standing. Both are attending the Keene High School the present year.

Both schools closed a successful year in June. The teachers were conscientious and did faithful and effective work.

The instruction has been kept in line with modern psychological and pedagogical methods. The teachers have placed emphasis on the fundamentals, viz. reading, writing and arithmetic, the use of good English, both oral and written, and a more extensive knowledge in geography and history. Good work has been done in drawing and nature study.

In number work, your teachers have followed standard laws, proceeding from the concrete to the abstract, from the known to the unknown, from particular to general, from problem to rule.

In writing, Houghton's system has been followed and we have aimed at neatness, legibility and a fair amount of speed.

Beginning with September of the present year, Miss May continues her service at Munsonville. Mrs. Jackson having resigned, Miss Vera White was assigned to the Center school.

At time of writing, both schools are running smoothly and give promise for a successful year.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the teachers who have worked with me the past year and assure them of my heartiest appreciation, to acknowledge the cordial co-operation of citizens and to express my gratitude to the school board for their help and support.
