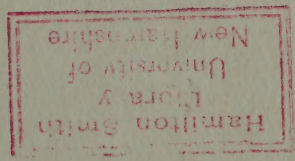

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of New Hampton in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said New Hampton on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of highways and bridges and make appropriations for the same.

4. To see if the town will vote to raise \$2,000.00 for State Road construction the said amount to be expended on the Ashland-Winona-Laconia road.

5. To see if the town will vote to accept Town Road Aid for class V highways and appropriate \$727.67 for the same.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$400.00 for control of Blister Rust in co-operation with the State Forestry Department with the understanding that only local labor be employed.

7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for Memorial Day and make appropriation for the same.

8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for Old Home Day and make appropriation for the same.

9. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of Laconia Hospital to be used to pay for the care of needy residents of the town

10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's Deeds.

11. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$150.00 for the improvement of old and neglected cemeteries.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 and pay the same to the New Hampton Cemetery Association, as a Trust fund, to be added to the appropriation made in 1929, the income to be used to care for its cemetery yard.

14. To see if the town will vote to purchase the house formerly occupied by Mrs. Olmstead and make appropriation for the same.

By request.

15. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Road Agent to itemize his report specifying the exact services or articles received by the town in return for the checks.

By request.

16. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Road Agent to pay all wages including his own salary at the end of each week.

17. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Your attention is called to the following points in connection with the foregoing table of statistics:

(a) The length of our school year is slightly more than the average for the schools of New Hampshire.

(b) The Hanaford and Fiske schools have the lowest record of attendance. The record of the Fiske school, however, shows improvement over the percentage reported for the preceding year (88 per cent).

(c) The Sanborn school had no tardinesses during the year. On the other hand, the record of the Village and Old Institution schools was very poor. Investigation of the records shows that out of the 166 cases of tardiness reported for the year in New Hampton, 96 cases were confined to children of only five families, attending the Village and Old Institution schools.

To encourage a better record during the present year, our schools are competing with each other for a banner, which is awarded at the end of each eight-week term to the school with the best record of attendance and freedom from tardiness for the preceding term. For the two terms ending December 20, 1935, the Sanborn school held the banner.

School Buildings

During the past summer, the Sanborn school has been provided with a small porch that in winter can be closed in as a protection against cold and storms. The Village school has a new coat of outside paint; and all schools have been refinished inside. The Fiske, Village and Sanborn schools have new window shades.

At all of the schools, there are old-fashioned earth toilets. These are in good condition, and as satisfactory as a toilet of this type can be. Each is connected with the school building by a covered passageway; and in several cases there is need for better protection of this passageway against snow, which is blown in by every storm.

Current Problems and Education

In these days history is being made rapidly, and our leaders are attempting to solve great problems such as poverty, unemployment, taxation, neutrality, and many others. It is necessary that our boys and girls understand something of what is going on today, as well as the history of years gone by. Each school is provided with inexpensive weekly newspapers, printed in language the children can read, as one important step toward greater understanding of today's important developments. Our course in social science, combining the work of geography, history and civics for grades seven and eight, also is planned and taught with the fundamental purpose of understanding the various factors that have contributed to our complex civilization.

Music Education

In addition to the regular instruction in singing and music appreciation, several pupils at the Village and Old Institution schools are making a beginning in the study of the violin and cornet. Groups for instruction are meeting weekly under Mrs. Adams' direction.

The Old Institution school has also organized a rhythm or toy orchestra, and a harmonica band.

Alcohol and Safety Education

Instruction concerning the effects of alcohol and other narcotics upon the human system is required by law. Recently a new bulletin for teachers, with suggestions for appropriate methods of instruction, has been issued by the State Board of Education. The need for thorough and effective instruction on this topic has become more urgent during the past few years.

Frequent accidents to children on the highways everywhere make necessary special attention to safety instruction, emphasizing ways of avoiding danger from automobile traffic.

Health and Physical Welfare

Our school nurse, Miss Nichols, reports that with the assistance of \$50 contributed from Federal funds, and \$24 from the Red Cross, seven children were able to have operations for diseased tonsils, and three have been fitted with glasses.

The present year, there seems to be no prospect of money from the government for the physical welfare of school children. Several more New Hampton pupils have physical defects that need attention—chiefly defects of tonsils, teeth and eyesight—and lack the funds necessary for their correction. Raising money for this purpose would be a worthy project for some local organization to sponsor.

Commendable Initiative

A few of the efforts of our pupils and teachers in behalf of their schools deserve special mention. The Hanaford school earned money to buy an electric hot plate and other equipment necessary for providing hot lunches during the winter months. The eighth grade boys at the Plaisted school have set oak posts for swings on the playground. At the Village school, the children bought lumber and gave plants for their flower boxes.

Conclusion

This is one place to express our thanks to various people and organizations for generous cooperation with the schools. The Grange, as before, has sponsored the school fair, and has also loaned its chairs to the Village school when needed at public programs. The pupils of this school are also grateful to Mr. Berl Tilton for helping them provide window boxes, and to Mrs. Charles Flower for reference books donated to them. To the Sanborn school, Mrs. A. C. Fifield of Concord loaned a phonograph and library of records. At the Hanaford

school, the local Young People's Society loaned their piano for use by the school.

It is not possible to mention by name all who have assisted us in our efforts to make the past year of the most value to the children. Teachers, school board, parents and many others deserve our gratitude for their willing cooperation.
