TOWN WARRANT
State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Orford, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Orford on Tuesday, the 14th day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year; also to choose one Selectman for three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds, one Library Trustee for three years, and one for two years.

Article 2. To hear the budget of the Town and raise and appropriate any money recommended therein or pass any vote relative thereto.

Article 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year.

Article 4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of Town Highways and Bridges for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the removal of snow and care of Town winter roads for the ensuing year.

Article 6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to insure Town property.

Article 7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of electric lights.

Article 8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Orford Free Library and Orford Social Library.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to dispense with the distribution of inventory blanks until the Selectmen appraise the property.

TOWN WARRANT — (Continued)

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell and administer property acquired by Tax Deed or otherwise, and to authorize the Selectmen to grant rights-of-way for waterpipes across the mall and common or other Town land.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the use of the Dartmouth - Lake Sunapee Region.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to accept the State aid for the construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate the sum of \$559.98 for that purpose.

Article 14. To see if the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated relating to playing games of Beano shall be adopted in this Town.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to cover the expenses of Memorial Day.

Article 16. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of Common.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the control of Pine Blister Rust and \$150.00 for care of trees.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$100.00 to be paid over to the Federal Airport Project.

Article 19. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise appropriate to be turned over to the Trustees of Trust Funds for purchase of road equipment.

Article 20. To see what action the Town will take in regard to road equipment and how much money it will vote to raise and appropriate for same.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to be used for increased police protection, said sum to be used to patrol various roads in Town for prevention of accidents from May 1, 1961, through November 1, 1961, on Friday and Saturday nights, a regular schedule to be drawn up by the Chief of Police and presented to the Selectmen for approval.

TOWN WARRANT — (Continued)

Article 22. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for use of the Fire Department.

Article 23. To see what sum the Town will vote to be turned over to the Trustees of Trust Funds for purchase of fire equipment.

Article 24. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to accept any land which might be offered the Town as a possible site for a firehouse.

Article 25. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for purchase of land for cemetery purposes.

Article 26. To see what action the Town will take to improve library services and facilities in Orford and to see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for such purposes and to improve, repair, alter or extend the Library-Town office building.

Article 27. To see if the Town will appoint or elect a zoning commission to make a preliminary report and hold public hearings thereon and to make a final report to the Town meeting, including recommendations of boundaries of the various districts and appropriate regulations to carry out the zoning plan in accordance with sections 60-89 of Ch. 31 R. S. A.; to see what other action the Town will take relating to Planning and Zoning; and to see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for such purposes.

Article 28. (a) To see if the Town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the Town the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age, Survivors and Disability Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 101 of the Revised Statutes Annotated Amended by Chapter 301 and 332 of the Laws of 1955 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 to defray the Town's share of the cost thereof.

(b) To see if the Town wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions filled by popular election.

(c) To see if the Town wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions the compensation for which is on a fee basis.

TOWN WARRANT — (Continued)

(d) If a plan for Social Security coverage is adopted to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to execute on behalf of the Town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the Town will designate the Selectmen as the officers to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

Article 29. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 30. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

LIBRARY AWARD

The Orford and Orfordville Libraries are members of the Grafton Cooperative Group which meet together regularly and benefit by a sizeable discount in buying books through the State Library. Orford and Orfordville, along with this group, were recipients recently of the Dorothy Canfield Fisher Award of \$1,000, sponsored by the Book of the Month Club, the award to be presented officially at Concord in April. The money is to be spent on basic books to be shared interchangeably among the libraries and eventually owned by the individual libraries.

Orford and Orfordville also profit by the interchange and ownership of books bought for the group by the Shieling Fund, instituted when the Cooperative was formed over a year ago. All these books, many of which the libraries would not be able to afford on their own budgets, will be valuable additions to the shelves and, it is trusted, of great interest and use to the schools and the reading public.

REPORT OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE

The following is a report of the activities conducted in Orford by the N. H. Department of Health, Bureau of Public Health Nursing, for the year 1960.

Home visits have been made in the town on mothers, pre-schools and babies. Arrangements have been made for children to attend diagnostic clinics at Cripple Children's Clinic, Hanover; Pediatric Clinics at Littleton and Hanover; and some have been assisted through the N. H. Sight Conservation Program and eye examinations and glasses obtained if necessary.

An Immunization Clinic was held at Orford, in cooperation with the schools, on May 26, 1960. Dr. John Hammond administered the following:

Salk Vaccine (all age groups)	132
Triple Toxoid Boosters (children)	4
Smallpox Vaccinations (children)	4

The clinic was conducted by the Public Health Nurse, assisted by the School Nurse and a local committee of ladies. My sincere thanks to all for assisting in this important program.

The Tuberculosis program for Grafton County is now covered by the Public Health Nurse. Chest clinics are held at Plymouth and Lebanon throughout the year in cooperation with the N. H. Tuberculosis Association. Chest examinations and X-rays are given to anyone attending. A report will be sent to the patient following the clinic of results of X-rays. Residents of Orford are welcome to attend these clinics.

YOU, whether YOU be a farmer, homemaker, business or professional man or woman, municipal, state or federal official, clerk or woodsman, can play an important part in the continuing and vital prevention program.

First — by setting a good example YOURSELF — being sensible and complying with the necessary laws and regulations governing the use of fire in and near woodlands.

Second — by using YOUR individual influence in your community and valued counsel with others in insisting and encouraging them to do likewise.

The following simple rules may be used as a guide both for YOU and for them.

1. Before burning, secure a permit from your local forest fire warden — the law requires it.
2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning — don't leave it.
3. Make certain your fire, camp or debris, is DEAD OUT before leaving it.
4. Don't throw down lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes or from moving vehicles — make sure they are out — use your ash tray.
5. Don't burn at home — use your town dump and save yourself much possible difficulty, both personal and financial.

School District of Orford

To the inhabitants of the School District of Orford qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Memorial Hall in said District, on Wednesday, April 5, 1961, at 8:00 P.M., to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To choose a member of the School Board for three years, and to fill an unexpired term for two years and to fill any vacancies which may occur on the School Board.

Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board, and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.

Article 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town.

Article 9. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate, in addition to the original appropriation for 1960-1961, a sum of money to be made available to the School District prior to July 1, 1961, in order to meet obligations due primarily to the receipt of less tuition than anticipated, and to unanticipated repairs and replacements.

SCHOOL DISTRICT WARRANT — (Continued)

Article 10. To see if the District will raise and appropriate Seven Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$720.00) in order for the District to avail itself during 1961-62 of federal funds to be distributed under the provisions of the National Defense Education Act, Public Law 85-864, and to authorize the School Board to make application for, to accept on behalf of the District, and to apply against this appropriation any or all grants or other funds which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire under the provisions of the National Defense Education Act.

Article 11. To see what action the School District will take to authorize the School Board to convey to the Fire Department or to the Town of Orford on behalf of the Fire Department a parcel of land now owned by the School District, not to exceed one (1) acre, to be used for a fire house, if such land should be desired by the town or Fire Department for such purpose.

Article 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

ORFORD ANNUAL REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Orford:

I present herein my report for 1960, my seventh annual report as Superintendent of Schools in Orford.

Mr. Paul Wenners, Principal, in his report to me has covered very well many of the things upon which I had planned to report. I will, therefore, make my report very brief in order to give his in its entirety.

Teachers' Salaries

I feel that I have the obligation to again report to the citizens of Orford the facts in regard to the teachers' salaries. The schools are your schools. You have given ample evidence of a desire to have them good schools. They are good schools and are improving. They can continue to be good and to improve only to the extent that you can attract and retain good teachers. You will have to decide what you want to do in this regard.

The following facts are pertinent. The average salaries in Orford are below state average and seem to be falling further below. In the school year 1959-60 the average Orford salary was \$519.00 below the state average; in 1960-61 it is \$547.00 below. In 1959-60 the average high school salary in Orford was \$646.00 below the state average; this year it is \$685.00 below. In 1959-60 the average elementary salary in Orford was \$510.00 below the state average and is \$547.00 below this year.

The foregoing have been figures for the state as a whole. If we take the towns only, this is the situation: in 1959-60 the elementary women's salary in Orford averaged \$225.00 below the town average; for 1960-61 they averaged \$266.00 below; for the high school teachers they were \$409.00 below the average in 1959-60 and \$438.00 below the average this year.

The 1961-62 School Budget contains an increase in teachers' salaries that the School Board feels is the basic minimum if we are to continue to secure and retain teachers. Teachers, with the necessary supplies and textbooks, are fundamental to the operation of the schools. The Board has cut all the other parts of the budget as much as seems consistent with prudent operation and maintenance of the school plant and the school activities.

Orford has supported its schools well. The tax situation is a difficult one, particularly as almost the entire cost of the schools falls on real estate. I sincerely hope that the people of New Hampshire will in the near future become sufficiently aroused that they will demand more state aid for education in order to take some of the burden off real estate. The people should realize that New Hampshire stands 47th out of the 50 states in state aid to education.

Developments in the School

Mr. Weners' report, which is to follow, tells of the improvements that have been made in the school plant and of improvements in the curriculum. Particularly in relation to the latter I want to express appreciation to Mr. Weners and the members of the school staff for the wholehearted, constructive way in which they are attempting to make ever better the work of the schools. They are a loyal and hard-working group.

Conclusion

In concluding my report, I want to express appreciation to the School Board for its positive help and great effort. I want also to express appreciation to the people of Orford for their continued help and support.

The following is the report made to the Superintendent by Mr. Paul J. Wenners, Principal.

"Nearly a century ago a great English leader stated most prophetically: 'Upon the education of the people of this country the fate of this country depends.' Benjamin Disraeli, the Winston Churchill of his day, would no doubt — if now living — find this statement of his appropriate to the international situation faced today by the great English-speaking nations and their allies.

"In the belief that the education of the people cannot wait upon the development of vast Federal plans of school construction, nor upon the formulation of perfect curricula to be guided by master teachers armed with electronic devices for the education of superior students, we in Orford have been working to make the best possible use of available buildings and local resources — both material and human — for the education of those young people who are in our schools now.

"Steady progress is being made in the modernization of the school plant, particularly in the oldest of the three school buildings. Greater safety has been provided for the high school students by the enclosing of the two staircases and the installation of metal-clad doors to the boiler-room and the shop, as recommended by the fire marshal. Protection from the hazards of ice in the winter is now afforded by the extension of the roof over one fire escape and by modification of the porch roof. The business education room now has adequate fluorescent lighting for the close work required of the students. Painting has improved the appearance and educational effectiveness of the science room, the library, and the social science room. The cataloging of the library is now

nearly complete. By partitioning the old cafeteria, an adequate classroom and teachers' room have been obtained. The shop has been made weather-tight, as have the four classrooms of the wooden annex, by re-roofing. The lighting of the library, the science laboratory, and three classrooms has been improved by the replacement of the window shades, which were in poor condition. Finally, the office of the principal has been improved in appearance and efficiency by repainting.

"Considerable progress has also been made in the grading of the road through the school grounds from Route 10 to Route 25A. A walk has been constructed by the F. F. A. boys, under the direction of Mr. Guptill, at the entrance to Memorial Hall. Of course, the usual maintenance work has been done to keep all three buildings functioning properly.

"Improvements to buildings and grounds are easier to see and to describe than the improvements in the actual educational work for which the buildings exist. Yet these improvements have been taking place nevertheless. The morale of the teaching force and of the students at all grade levels is excellent; there are few disciplinary problems, and none of these even approach the types of problems so often reported in the press of many communities. The spirit of mutual helpfulness between teachers and pupils is evident in the classrooms, the corridors, the school grounds — everywhere. The curricula are modern, the teaching methods effective, the results increasingly more satisfactory.

"A very material contribution to this increasing effectiveness of the educational work of the schools is the testing and guidance that has been done under the direction of Mr. James Clark. The enlarged testing program has furnished proof of what the faculty had come to believe from classroom experience — that the range of ability and interest among Orford High School students is quite as great as in most school systems, a fact that underlines the necessity of providing varied curricula if Orford students are to have that 'equal opportunity' required of public schools dedicated to democratic education. In particular, book learning alone cannot provide many students with the kinds of educational experience they need to become self-supporting and self-respecting American citizens. Though it is not inexpensive to provide more than college preparatory subjects and so-called 'general education', it is far more expensive in the long run to have in the community young people not trained for em-

ployment in our modern industrial society. Unskilled workers have less opportunity for employment each year, with the result that they become a burden on the taxpayers for the support of themselves and their families. It is economic nonsense to save on education for the few high school years of each student at the cost of long periods of support at public expense later on. State records prove that New Hampshire is one of America's most highly-industrialized states; our tests prove that many of our students are capable of profiting from education to fit them for skilled occupations. Failure to provide such education is both undemocratic and economically unwise.

"Considerable progress has been made in the past two years in the improvement of the curricula. The 1960 report of the New Hampshire State Department of Education indicates that in breadth of subject offerings Orford High School now leads the nineteen 'small' high schools, and surpasses thirty-eight of the forty 'medium' New Hampshire high schools; indeed, Orford High School offers more academic courses than thirteen of the twenty-six 'large' high schools of the state, and more practical arts courses than eleven of these same 'large' schools.

"Particular attention is drawn to the fact that students of grades seven and eight now have five periods a week of science in the high school's new science room, and that the girls of these grades now have five periods a week of home-making in the new home-making room while the boys of these grades are having the same number of periods per week of shop work. In this way, the education of students of the upper elementary grades is being improved without added cost for space or teachers; the only cost is for some materials used.

"Practical results of such curricula can be found in the employment record of our graduates and in the success of the many who have decided to continue their education. Twelve of the twenty 1960 graduates have gone on to college and other institutions of higher learning, three times as many as in 1959, and almost as many as in the past four years combined. The substantial scholarship aid provided by the Orford Community Scholarship Fund, supplemented by scholarships awarded to Orford graduates by the University of New Hampshire and many others, had a considerable part in making advanced education possible for many of the graduates.

"As Disraeli said long ago: 'Change is inevitable. In a progressive country change is constant.' Not, of course, change for the sake of change — but change for the sake of progressive improvement. While Orford has not been plagued by the problem of providing much more educational space for great numbers of new pupils, we shall now begin to feel the impact of larger entering classes in the elementary grades. The enrollment expected in the first and second grades next fall will probably be not less than forty — far too many for the very important initial teaching of these young pupils by one teacher. It is therefore proposed to have the first grade only taught by one teacher, while grades two and three will be combined under a second teacher, as will grades four and five, and grades six and seven. Grade eight pupils will become a part of the high school organization; probably in another year grade seven pupils will become a part of the high school division, resulting in what educators call the 6-6 plan (six years of elementary, and six years of secondary education). Moving grade eight into the high school saves constructing another classroom and adding another teacher, effecting a substantial saving to the taxpayers.

"Looking ahead to the two-fold goal of providing the necessary classroom space for further enlargement of the elementary school, and curriculum improvement where that is still clearly needed, it is suggested that a new agricultural shop building should be provided outside the present buildings, but placed near enough to Memorial Hall to become an integral part of the developing school plant. Construction of such a shop would free two classrooms in the main high school building, one the present agriculture classroom (Room 7), and the other resulting from alteration of the present shop. It is **not** contemplated that this new shop would be constructed at the expense of the taxpayers. Plans are being formulated that anticipate use of state and possible federal funds, together with local contributions of materials, labor and gifts to erect a shop at low cost as a monument to what can be done by community cooperation. It is probable that such a shop should be ready by the fall of 1962 at the latest, so that the classrooms that will then be needed for the expanding elementary grades may be available without expensive new construction; shop space costs less than classroom space.

"The major improvement needed for the coming year is in the area of science equipment, especially for the proper teaching of physics. There is so little such equipment now

in the science room that we must literally build almost from nothing. By using a substantial amount of the N. D. E. A. funds now available, the money that the taxpayers need furnish to supply this equipment will be only a small amount to match N. D. E. A. funds that will be available next year.

"Mention, however brief, should also be made of the evident effect upon our sports results of the growing physical education program, and the popularity of our social events, especially of the Christmas Pop Concert, first given in 1959, and again offered to a capacity audience in December, 1960.

"With the continued support of the community, we shall go on to make possible for our young citizens better living through better education."
