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## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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To the inhabitants of the Town of Piermont, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Piermont on Tuesday, the 13th day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriations of the same.

3. To raise and appropriate money to maintain Highways and Bridges.

4. To raise and appropriate money for State Aid and New Construction on Lake Tarleton Road, for post war work.

5. To raise and appropriate money to maintain street lights.

6. To raise and appropriate money for the support of Library.

7. To raise and appropriate money for the support of the Fire Department.

8. To raise and appropriate money for the relief of poor and old age assistance.

9. To raise and appropriate money for Memorial Day and choose committees for same.

10. To raise and appropriate money for Town Maintenance of Highways, with State Aid. T. R. A.

11. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

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12. To raise and appropriate to the White Mountains Region Association, for its program of advertising, etc., as a part of the co-operative investment by regional towns, an amount equal to 10c per \$1,000 of the assessed valuation of the town for 1944.

13. To raise and appropriate money for Pine Blister Rust Control, with State Aid; the State asks for \$400.00.

14. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time they examine the taxable property.

15. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by Town through Tax Collector's deeds or otherwise.

16. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

17. To raise and appropriate money to install running water in the school house and Fire Department building.

18. To raise and appropriate money to install fire alarm system.

19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

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## ANOTHER ENEMY TO CONQUER

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Here is a home front fight that everyone can get into. Last year in this State 558 brush and forest fires burned over 4,648 acres of land, of which 2,788 acres were valuable timber and young growth. With available manpower the lowest of any year since the war started, you can help to keep this loss down by preventing these fires from starting.

Keep in mind these simple rules:

1. Always get a permit from your forest fire warden before starting any fires in the open. Burning under certain conditions is permitted.

2. Never burn unless you have enough help to control your fire—a permit does not excuse you of negligence in case it gets away.

3. Always report any uncontrolled fire promptly to your forest fire warden. Minutes lost are acres lost.

4. Be especially careful with cigarettes, matches and pipes. Smokers caused most of our fires.

5. Never leave a fire unless it is dead out. You can't feel safe while there is a spark left.

Frequent changes of teachers disrupts the even progress of educational endeavor. I hope we may provide an opportunity for Misses Watson and Smith so that we may retain their services for another year. I am of the same mind in regard to Mrs. Robb. I am sure all are mindful of the contribution that music instruction makes to the school program.

Your School Board was faced with a very difficult problem when the Wentworth School Board closed the Atwell Hill School. This meant that the children in East Piermont had to be provided for elsewhere. Because of the crowded conditions in the village school and the difference in road conditions it seemed best to arrange to have these children educated at the Pike School.

In my opinion the work of your teachers and pupils compares favorably with that of other similar schools in the State.

I wish to thank the School Board and citizens of Piermont for their cooperation and help during the rather trying period of adjustment to a new Superintendent who had to pick up the work in the middle of the year.
