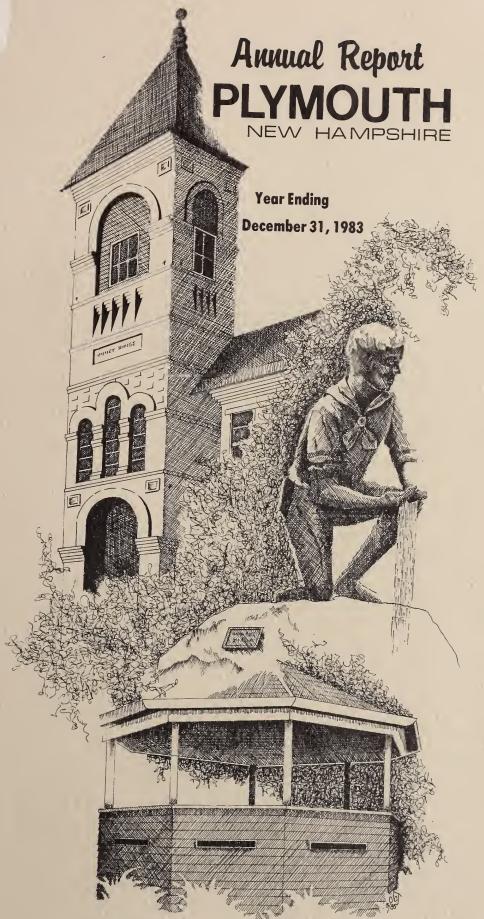

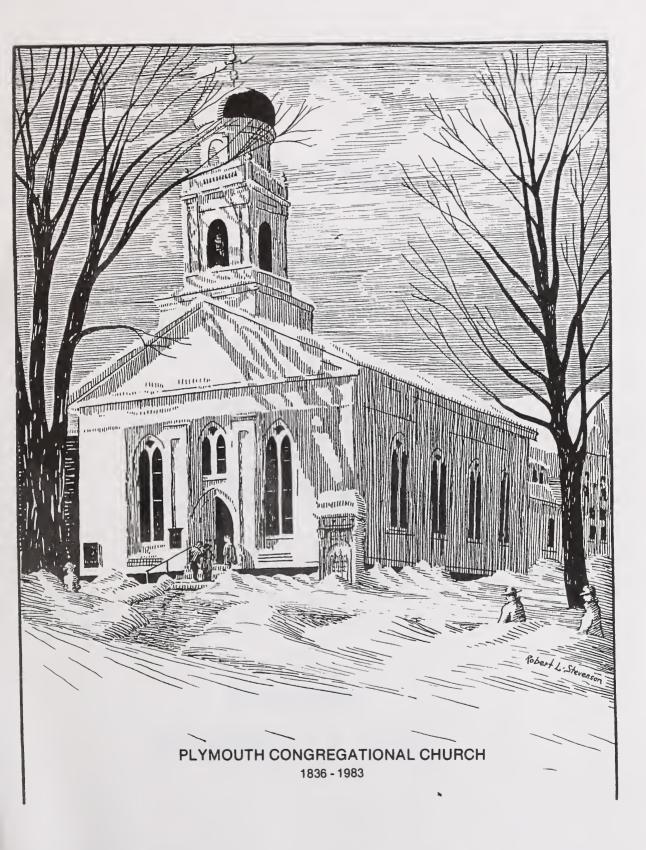

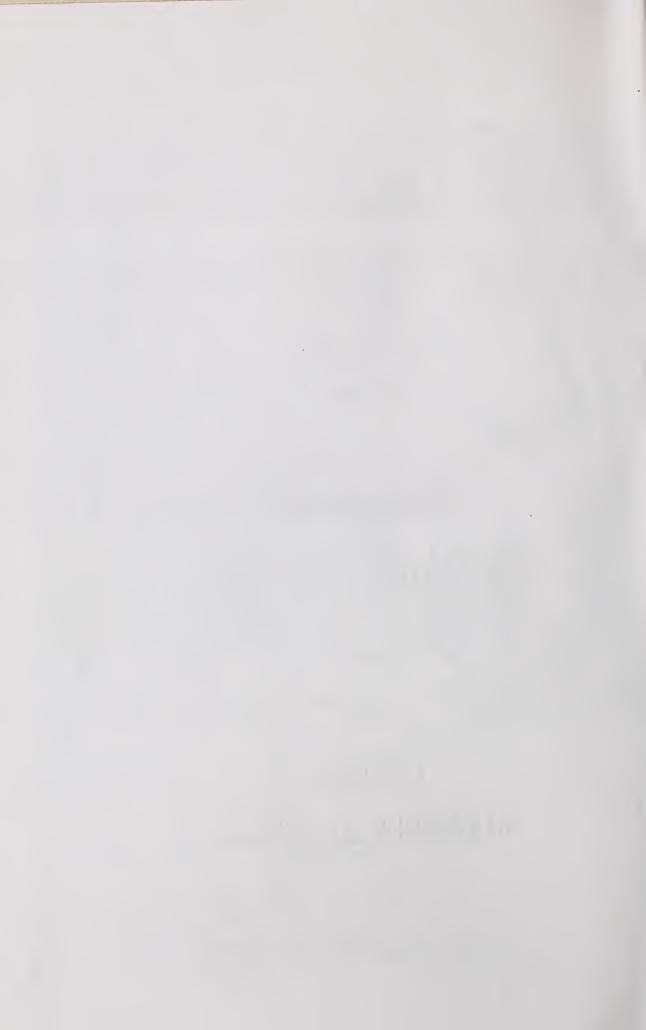

TOWN MEETING TOWN OF PLYMOUTH, N.H. March 8 and 9, 1983

A legal meeting of the inhabitants of the Town of Plymouth was held in the Court Room of the Plymouth Town Hall on Tuesday, March 8, 1983. The meeting was opened at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon by the Moderator, Attorney Walter L. Murphy, reading from the 1983 Warrant. Moderator Murphy read Articles 1 through 6, which were to be voted upon by ballot during the voting hours, 10:00 a.m. through 6:00 p.m. It was voted to dispense with the reading of Articles 7 through 53 of the Town Warrant until 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon at the second session of Town Meeting to be held on March 9, 1983, in the Lecture Hall at Plymouth Area High School.

Stephen Smith, Moderator of the Plymouth School District, read Article 1 of the School Warrant, which was to be voted upon during this same session of the Town Meeting.

The polls were closed to voting on Articles 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 of the Town Warrant and Article 1 of the School District Warrant at 6:00 o'clock in the afternoon and counting of the ballots commenced.

After counting of the ballots was completed, Moderator Murphy announced the results of the voting as follows:

Article 6 was declared void due to negative vote on Article 5.

The second session of the annual Town Meeting of the Town of Plymouth was held in the Lecture Hall of the Plymouth Area High School on Wednesday, March 9, 1983, at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon. The 220th annual Town Meeting was opened by Moderator Walter L. Murphy for vote on Articles 7 through 53. Plymouth Cub Scout Pack #56 led the group in the Salute to the Fiag. Moderator Murphy requested that those present stand for a moment of slience in memory of the deceased members of the community. Results of the balloting under Articles 1 through 6 of the Town Warrant, which were voted upon on Tuesday, March 8, 1983, during the first session of Town Meeting, were read by Moderator Murphy.

Francis P. DeLorenzo, Marilyn Foley, Carol A. Elllott, Virginia M. Wood, Fred C. Hussey and Marilyn A. Derrickson were sworn in to their respective offices by Moderator Murphy.

Selectman Allen MacNeil presented a certificate of recognition to retiring Selectman Leon Sherman for six years of devoted service as Selectman to the Town of Plymouth.

Article 7: Town Charges

Moved and voted to postpone Article 7 until all other articles are acted upon. upon.

Article 8: Elimination of the Elected Office of Road Agent and Authorization for Selectmen to Employ a Qualified SuperIntendent of the Highway Dept., Effective After the 1984 Town Meeting (This article Inserted by petition)

Voted in affirmative by voice vote.

Article 9: Withdrawals from Revenue Sharing Fund

Voted by affirmative volce vote to authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 the sum of \$75,849.01 as a set-off against the following debt services:

Voted, by affirmative voice vote, to amend article to raise and appropriate the sum of \$163,815.00. Voted, by voice vote, to so amend and raise said sum, an increase of \$2,651.00 over the original amount of \$161,164.00.

Article 12: Control and reduction of Acid Rain by Federal Government (This article

inserted by petition).

By affirmative voice vote, Article 12 was amended to read: The Town of Plymouth will go on record in support of immediate actions by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain which is harmful to the environment and economy of Plymouth, N.H. and to the health and welfare of the people of Plymouth, N.H.

Article 13: Ratification and Confirmation of Authority and Action of the Board of Selectmen in Dispensing of the Tax Deeded Property Located on Fairgrounds Road, Plymouth, N.H., Which was Deeded by the Selectmen to Samuel C. McGlauflin and Coronet Agency, Inc., on August 6, 1982 (This article inserted by petition)

By an affirmative voice vote, it was voted to pass over this article.

Articie 14: Library Trustee

Steven Lambert was chosen as a Library Trustee for a term of three years.

Article 15: Parks and Recreation Commission Expenses for Year Voted, by voice vote, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$76,360.00.

Article 16: Police Department Expenses for Year Voted, by voice vote, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$164,647.00.

Article 17: Baker-Pemi Senior Citizens

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for Senior Citizen Housing.

Article 18: Zoning Board of Admiustment Member

Robert E. O'Neill was chosen as a member of the Zoning Board of Adjustment for a term of five years.

Voted, by affirmative voice vote, to so authorize.

Article 22: Town Road Aid

Voted, by affirmative voice vote, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$813.21 in order to secure from the State the sum of \$5,421.41 for Town Road Aid.

Article 23: Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital

Voted by affirmative voice vote, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 to be used exclusively for the purchase of needed equipment.

Article 24: Emergency Ambulance Service for the Town of Plymouth Voted, by voice vote, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$52,909.00.

Article 25: Authorization for Selectmen to Transfer \$7,000.00 of the Sum Appropriated Under Article 24 to the Capital Reserve Fund Which was Established for a New Ambulance.

Voted to so authorize.

Article 26: Civil Defense Unit Expenses for Year Voted, by voice vote, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$850.00.

Article 27: Incinerator-Recycling Facility Expenses for Year Voted, by voice vote, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$62,320.00.

Article 28: Planning Board Expenses for Year Voted, by voice vote, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,870.00.

Voted to so authorize by an affirmative voice vote.

It was also voted to seek information and recommendations from the Computer Department at Plymouth State College before spending the appropriated amount.

Article 31: Purchase of New Police Cruiser

Voted, by affirmative voice vote, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,500.00 and to authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Voted, by affirmative voice vote, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,500 and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Article 36: Authorization for Selectmen to Enter Into a Feasibility Study With Other Area Communities to Establish a Regional Refuse Disposal District With the Express Intent of Selling Steam and/or Electricity to Plymouth State College

Voted, by voice vote, to amend motion by striking out the words "to Plymouth State College." Voted to accept article as amended and raise and appropriate the sum

of \$1,860.00 as Plymouth's share of the cost of a feasibility study.

Article 37: Authorization for Board of Selectmen to Apply For, Accept and Expend Money from State, Federal or Other Governmental or Private Source Which Becomes Available in Accordance With the Procedures Set Forth in RSA: 31:95-b.

Article 38: Authorization for Selectmen to Transfer Any Tax Lien Acquired by the Town at Any Tax Collector's Sale, During the Two-Year Period Allowed for Redemption, to Such Person or Persons and for Such Consideration as the Selectmen Shall Deem to be in the Best Interests of the Town and as Justice May Require, and Authorization for Selectmen to Sell and Convey Any Real Estate or Mineral Rights Acquired by the Town by Any Tax Collector's Deed, by Public Auction, Advertised Sealed Bids, Negotiated Sale or in any Other Manner Which the Selectmen Shall Deed to be in the Best Interests of the Town and as Justice May Require.

Voted to so authorize.

Article 39: Veteran's Day Celebration to be Held on November 11, 1983 Voted to raise and appropriate \$500.00.

Article 40: Pemi-Baker Home Health Agency

Voted to raise and appropriate \$9.628.00 as Plymouth's share in helping to defray the expense of operating a visiting nurse and therapeutic service in the area.

Article 41: White Mountain Gateway Chamber of Commerce Voted to raise and appropriate \$600.00.

Article 42: Official Acceptance of the Sum of \$4,461.84 which Was Received by the Park and Recreation Department and Turned Over by Said Department on December 23, 1981, to the Treasurer of the Corporation Known as PLAY, Incorporated Which Was Chartered by the New Hampshire Secretary of State on December 11, 1981, All in Non-Compliance With the Requirements of RSA 31:95-b. Voted to so accept.

Article 43: Operating Costs of Airport Voted, by affirmative voice vote, to raise and appropriate \$1,425.00.

Article 44: Operating Costs of Cemetery Department Voted, by affirmative voice vote, to raise and appropriate \$16,420.00.

Article 45: Rebuilding of 1964 Maxim Fire Truck (Voted at 1982 Town Meeting) Voted, by affirmative voice vote, to rescind \$8,923.73 of the \$18,000.00 appropriated at the 1982 Town Meeting for this purpose.

Article 46: New One-Ton 2-Wheel Drive Truck with Dump Body for Highway Department (Voted at 1982 Town Meeting)

Voted, by affirmative voice vote, to rescind \$1,946.00 of the \$13,000.00 appropriated at the 1982 Town Meeting for this purpose.

Article 47: Purchase of New Front-End Loader for Highway Department (Voted at 1982 Town Meeting)

Voted, by affirmative voice vote, to rescind \$7,564.00 of the \$70,000.00 appropriated at the 1982 Town Meeting for this purpose.

Voted, by affirmative voice vote, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$52.50 for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages, as well as preservation of the natural resources of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region.

Article 50: Band Concerts

Voted, by affirmative voice vote, to raise and appropriate \$800.00.

Article 51: New Hampshire Humane Society

Voted, by affirmative voice vote, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for an Animal Control Agreement with the New Hampshire Humane Society.

Article 52: Authorization for Selectmen to Borrow Money in Anticipation of Taxes and Pay the Obligations of the Town.

Voted to so authorize.

The State of New Hampshire Warrant for the 1984 Annual Meeting of the Town of Plymouth

To the inhabitants of the Town of Plymouth in the County of Grafton and the State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Plymouth on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, next, polls to be open for voting on Articles 1 and 2 at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon and to close not earlier than 6:00 o'clock in the afternoon, and you are hereby notified to meet at the Plymouth Area High School in said Plymouth on Wednesday the 14th day of March, next, at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon for the second session of the Town Meeting at which time action will be taken upon the remaining articles of this warrant.

ARTICLE 1: To elect all Town Officers which appear on the official town ballot for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2: "Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:43-f for the adjusted elderly exemptions from property tax? These statutes provide for the following exemptions, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$10,000; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$15,000; for a person 80 years of age and older, \$20,000. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years; own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by his spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of less than \$10,000 or if married, a combined net income of less than \$12,000, and own net assets of \$30,000 or less, excluding the value of the person's residence." (This article inserted by petition.)

ARTICLE 3: Whereas Highland Avenue from School Street to High Street is narrow, poorly drained, unsafe for pedestrians, and,

Whereas the students and College have expressed interest in closing Highland Avenue to all but pedestrians, emergency vehicles, and service vehicles, and

Whereas the undersigned residents of Plymouth are registered voters and taxpayers of the town of \dot{P} lymouth,

Now, therefore, we petition the Town of Plymouth to close off Highland Avenue as a vehicular way, except for emergency and service vehicles and to turn over the maintenance and repair of said discontinued roadway to Plymouth State College.

ARTICLE 4: "To remove the parking meters from the community of Plymouth, New Hampshire and to instruct the Selectmen to provide in their place a two hour parking limit on Monday through Saturday during business hours. Said two hour limit is to be enforced by a police presence on Main Street. Said two hour limit would not be enforced on holidays." (This article inserted by Petition.)

ARTICLE 5: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred Sixty Dollars (\$960.00) for support of the Community Action Outreach Program. (This Article inserted by Petition.)

ARTICLE 6: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for, and to support, the Plymouth Area Task Force Against Domestic Violence, a nonprofit organization organized pursuant to New Hampshire Legislation, and partially funded by marriage license fees from the State of New Hampshire. (This Article inserted by Petition.)

ARTICLE 7: "To see if the Town of Plymouth shall call upon the Governor and Executive Council, its State Representative(s) and State Senator to promptly convene a Special Session of the Legislature for the sole purpose of preventing the imposition of huge cost increases in electric rates resulting from the Seabrook Nuclear Power Plant on the citizens, businesses, schools and agencies in the Town of Plymouth, and to direct the Selectmen to promptly notify our above listed elected officials of the Town's desire." (This Article inserted by Petition.)

ARTICLE 8: To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 9: To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 the sum of \$61,589.51 as a set-off against the following debt services.

1983 SELECTMEN'S REPORT

As in past years, there was considerable activity in Plymouth in 1983. Our town is growing and changes in the way we do business must be made in order to keep abreast of these changing times.

We have made some changes in 1983 that are noteworthy and are listed here for your perusal.

- 1. The reassessment of taxable property in Plymouth was completed this year and the hearings were held for taxpayers to discuss the methodology used in arriving at their property values. Needless to say, there were abatements made to some taxpayers.
- 2. Our Master Plan, which is by itself a living document, will continue to be updated as necessary. As part of the Master Plan, the town's maps were consolidated into a single map and copies are available at the Selectmen's Office.
- 3. The Selectmen, using a service available through the New Hampshire Municpal Association, selected the first "appointed" Highway Superintendent for Plymouth, at least in modern times, and Robert G. Kline, P.E. was the choice of the Board and he will start work on March 14, 1984.
- 4. The Selectmen appointed the Plymouth Tree Committee who by proclamation, will be responsible for the care and replacement of trees in town. This Committee shall have its own budget and has the following people serving on this much needed committee: Merelise O'Connor, Director of Parks and Recreation, Kenneth I. Sutherland, Retired Forester, Christopher Northrop, Conservation Commission Member, Steven Swedler, P.S.C. Arborist, Mrs. Christine Craig, interested citizen, John Viano, Interested citizen. We applaud them for their concern for our trees.
- 5. The Management and Operations Study Committee to recommend a suitable computerized system to replace our 1974 Burroughs L4000 bookkeeping system was completed, and a separate article is in this warrant for the purchase of this system.
- 6. 1984 is the first year of semi-annual tax billing and based upon the results of studies, should prove successful and improve the town's cash flow problems, (providing that necessary changes in present payment schedule from sending towns to our area school results in a monthly payment basis rather than semi-annual.

- 7. Our Highway Department's roads, streets and sidewalks program continued to gain ground, with the exception of an emulsion problem on sections of Highland Street, which will be rectified during the summer of 1984.
- 8. The Town of Plymouth along with other towns, participated in a Cogeneration Feasibility Study and an overview of the results of that study can be found elsewhere in this town report.
- 9. The Plymouth-Plymouth State College Planning Committee was brought back to life in 1983, to study problems that were germaine to both communities, and we feel it is important that this committee stay active, and that this is the forum to use when dealing with problems that both communities face. Members include: Frank Olcutt, Assistant to the President, James Hobart, Director of Business Operations, Allen MacNeil, Selectman, Robert Boyle, Chairman of the Planning Board, Mark Okrant, Taxpayer, Richard Pike, Taxpayer, Linda Jean Kennedy, Vice President P.S.C. Student Body and Terri Perkins, Speaker of the P.S.C. Student Senate. It was gratifying to see the two communities working closely together in 1983 in a recommitment to making both a better place to work and live.
- 10. There were two major subdivisions started in Plymouth in 1983, Stagecoach Hill Development and Plaza Village Conduminium Development. We welcome these projects to the Town of Plymouth, N.H.
- 11. The Town of Plymouth, and members of the Congregational Church lost a priceless treasure this past summer when the church and police cruiser were consumed by a fire of suspicious origin. A church committee has been and still is hard at work making plans to rebuild the church.

All in all, our town has been a busy place in 1983 and there are many changes facing us in 1984, which should make our town one of the nicest places to live.

One more year has passed and I realize this is the 15th report I have made to you. This year our emergency runs are up to 20 runs over last year.

Fire prevention and life safety is the big issue this year, which means code enforcement such as smoke detectors in all rented units in which people sleep. All new residential buildings shall have smoke detectors. These are to be installed and maintained by the landlord. These are new laws over the past two years.

Codes that in force State wide and are enforced through this office are: flammable and combustible liquids, chimneys, fire-places and vents-NFPA #89M Manual on Clearance for Heat Producing Appliances, storage and handling of liquified petroleum gases-Life Safety Code, tank vehicles for flammable and combustible liquids, National Electrical Code, installation of oil buring equipment, National Fuel Gas Code, AIA Fire Prevention Code, BOCA Basic Building Code, BOCA Fire Prevention Code.

All of these codes are to protect your life and property. Any questions on these please contact the Fire Department and we will do our best to aid you.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Once again, our cooperative town and state forest fire prevention and control program leads the nation in least acres burned per forest fire. Less than one-half acre per fire statewide average.

At the town level, your Forest Fire Warden is responsible for the prevention and control of all grass and woods fires when the ground is not snow covered.

Forest fire prevention is achieved at the town level by issuing a written permit for every fire that is to be kindled on the ground out of doors when the ground is not covered with snow. Each person wishing to have an outside fire must obtain this written permit from the town Fire Warden before kindling the fire. Any person that does not obtain a fire permit, when one is required, is violating our forest fire permit law and is subject to a court appearance and could be fined up to \$1,000 and receive a jail sentence of up to one year.

No fire permit will be issued between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. unless it is raining. The reason for this is towfold: the fire danger increases steadily betwen 9:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m., then subsides to a safe level between 2:00 p.m. and 5:00 p.m. This happens because the sun dries out the fine fuels that are easily ignited and dries the air which permits rapid fire spread. Also during this part of the day fire fighters are not readily available in most communities so an escaped fire could burn longer and cause greater damage before being suppressed.

Your cooperation in burning only when conditions are safe is greatly appreciated.

As Smokey says, "Remember, Only You Can Prevent Forest Fires!"

In 1983 there was a 38 run increase with all towns increasing except Holderness and Groton. The Ambulance Service logged over 9,281 miles in this year.

The squad has just purchased a power ram as a supplement to the "Jaws". This tool along with the Jaws should be very helpful in rescue operations.

There are more and more members of the squad receiving certification in the use of "Esopageal Obturator Airway" technique and the Medical Anti-Shock Trousers. Both of these devices require State certification for their use. Most all members of the squad are at this time certified.

The Town is planning on trading in the 1978 Ambulance Rescue to purchase a new one of similar design. We have looked at a few and should have a vehicle by summer.

To the trustees;

Programs and expanded services dominated at the Plymouth Public Library in 1983. More and better, these became the key words. The librarian, by her affiliation with a public libraries co-op, has gained additional benefits, such as better discounts through joint purchasing, shared inter-library adult fiction loan and exchanges in ideas and programs. The restructuring of the State Library into 6 Area Library Forums has been a positive step. Mrs. Topham was voted in as chairman of ALF III, which includes Plymouth Public, Lamson Library, Plymouth School Library and about 45 other public and school libraries. She was also voted onto the New Hampshire State Library standards committee, which, in 1984, will write a new set of standards for the State Library. The librarian attended, hosted and/or coordinated 37 meetings, workshops and conferences. The Childrens' Librarians of New Hampshire [CHILIS] held their annual spring conference in Plymouth, hosted by Mrs. Topham, with assistance from her staff and the librarian of Lamson Library. The librarian also attended a "Dataline" Workshop at the State Library to become more familiar with the computerized research service now available at the State Library. The library continued the Girl Scout Volunteer Service Program, and Mrs. Topham was pleased to pin service bars on Michelle

Dennis and Wendy Wells at a Girl Scout ceremony.

Mrs. Topham assisted in the judging for the Young Authors' Day in Plymouth, and was Resident Storyteller, as she has been for several years. "I LOVE TO READ" day was highlighted by 4th, 5th and 6th graders voting for a winner in the GREAT STONE FACE CHĬLDRĒNS' FAVORITĖ BOOK AWARD. This has become an annual event in Plymouth, and links up with the state program of which Mrs. Topham is a founder. Mardean Badger, school librarian, cooperates with this as well as other programs, keeping the lines

of communication between school/public library open and busy. Mrs. Topham participated in the Holderness Central School Job Fair and found it to be an excellent event.

The librarian presented programs to the Senior Citizens group, held Story Hours at the Plymouth Elementary School, as well as many book talks, to introduce both new and classic books to the children, hosted visiting students in the library, planned and presented a series of 5 pilot programs for 3 year olds. This proved to be a worthwhile project as over 100 were involved. It will be incorporated into the regular program schedule for 1984. The spring and fall sessions of Story Hour for 4 and 5 year olds marches along with great success, as close to 400 were served in this program. This is a coordinated effort of Pat Topham and Gayle Flickinger, with the Children's Literature students at Plymouth State College.

Fun Films on Friday is firmly entrenched in the regular summer program, with over 225 involved. The librarian held an exciting new reading project for summer entitled "World Traveler Treasure Trip". Those participating had "passports", traveled wherever in the world they desired, and gave accounts of their "trips". The program culminated in a "Welcome Home" party for all the weary travelers, with rewards and refreshments. The second annual Great Scarecrow Contest was held at Halloween, in spite of the snow! We had many great entries and our professional scarecrow judging team had a difficult

time choosing a winner. All were treated to a "spooky" Halloween party.

The librarian's efforts brought several exciting programs to Plymouth, such as The Robot Dilemma. One in particular, a NEH funded series of lecture/discussion programs focusing on the Quest for Identity in America, has brought a gift of money to the

library to purchase books on this subject.
The library had 12 adult and 12 children's exhibits, as well as a special exhibit for "Main Street in May". Mrs. Topham wrote to the Polaroid Company after learning of a pilot program involving libraries, and was delighted to be accepted into their "Check This Out" project. A Polaroid 660 Sun Camera, flash attachment and case are now part of the permanent circulating collection as a gift from Polaroid.

Mrs. Topham accepted the resignation of Assistant Librarian Nancy Cristiano with regret for the library, but with enthusiasm for the Cristiano family, as they now have a handsome baby boy. Mrs. Nancy Bird has been Acting Assistant, and has now completed 5 Public

Library Technique courses in her quest for certification.

The State Library initiated a new "van service" with the Plymouth Public Library as a regular stop on the route from south to north. This means a more expedient exchange of materials between libraries, with no postal service charges. Mrs. Topham also assisted in coordinating a route for the new "Mediamobile", which makes preplanned,

monthly stops at nursing homes, senior citizen complexes, mobile home parks, etc. for the purpose of exchanging reading, and other materials with people who may not be able to

visit their public library. This is another way in which libraries serve.

The Young Ladies Library Association [YLLA] continues to give many benefits to the town of Plymouth through their support of the library. This fall a new 3M copier was purchased and installed in the library. The YLLA also had 3 historic and valuable lithographs refurbished. The YLLA support the library staff, underwrite courses, and assist in many other ways. They met 8 times in 1983.

In the statistical report, please note the changes that have been made. A line titled "Hardware" now encompasses the 16mm projector, screen, adding machine, Polaroid camera under Materials Loaned. The Vertical File is a separate item, and clustered together under "Realia" are such circulating items as patterns, puzzles, toys, picture

collection, etc.

A number of organizations met in the library during the year. Trustee Steve Smith stepped down, and Steve Lambert was voted in. We thank Steve Smith for his efforts on behalf of the library, and welcome Steve Lambert.

The librarian would like to extend a warm thank you to all the patrons of the Plymouth Public Library, their smiles, their questions, their support is both welcomed and The Plymouth Public Library---better than ever. appreciated.

Our project at Fox Pond Park is unfinished. In 1982, the Town acquired 18.6 acres abutting the Park from Rachel P. Keniston. Her generosity and sense of community spirit made it possible for the Town to receive a \$24,300 Land and Water Conservation Fund grant. It was anticipated that in 1983, the funds would be applied to improving the existing dam and pond at Fox Pond Park. At this time, the work has been rescheduled for the summer of 1984. The Park, located on Langdon Street, is a multi-use area. The Commission hopes to increase and enhance the beauty of the Park to attract more use by townspeople.

The department works closely with the Plymouth Schools. The sixty-three acre site of the school, located on Tamarack Drive, is developed and maintained by the Parks and Recreation department. The School Board, in cooperation with the Commission, adopted a policy for the operation of a combined school-recreation center which involve the lands and facilities of the schools in 1971. Over the years, the policy has been expanded and amended. In 1983, a committee studied the policy and submitted a similar, but updated agreement to the Board and Commission.

This revised agreement was adopted by unanimous vote of both governing bodies. The Commission is proud to work with the Board in an atmosphere of mutual respect and harmony.

The department was fortunate enough to secure another Land and Water Conservation Fund grant in 1983. Plymouth Leisure Association for You, Incorporated (PLAY), has earmarked \$8,200 for the purpose of building a natural ice rink on school grounds. This made the school eligible to apply for and receive an additional \$8,200 in matching federal funds. The water lines have been installed, proper drainage has been completed and the project is slated for completion in the summer of 1984.

Another major undertaking in 1983 for the department was the development of a Tree Care Program for the shade trees in Plymouth. The Town Fathers requested that such a program be started and managed by Parks and Recreation. A proclamation concerning street trees was signed by the Selectmen in September. The program will manage the removal and pruning of hazardous or diseased trees and the planting of new trees where appropriate. The department is excited about administering this program which so greatly affects the town's environment.

The department is proud of the program of year-round recreational activities which it offers to all ages and various interests. From ballet to football, from photography and sign language to swimming, summer concerts, and daycamp, our department is dedicated to providing you with a well rounded program if exciting, stimulating and fun events and classes. People participated more in our 1983 activities than ever before.

We are fortunate to have the help of the officials, employees and people of the Town of Plymouth, the Schools, Plymouth State College, the local merchants, and volunteers. This friendship and assistance certainly helps us to fulfill our goal which is to involve everyone in recreational activity.

Hospice is another service program instituted by the Pemi-Baker Home Health Agency. It provides support to the family of a terminally ill patient by relieving the primary carer for short periods of time. The Agency Nurses and/or Aides may be in the home to tend the needs of the patient and the Hospice volunteer becomes the backup support service to the family.

North Country Council Town Report

North Country Council is the regional planning and economic development agency for communities in the northern part of the State. Your town is one of forty-three member towns that utilize Council services in community and land use planning, economic development, solid waste, transportation, recreation, and municipal services. The Board of Directors is made up of representatives from every member town.

In Plymouth, we assisted the Planning Board in writing two sections of the Master Plan - the general policy statement and future land use plan - and worked with the Board to revise the zoning ordinance to reflect the Master Plan's goals. We also assisted Plymouth and other towns in establishing a solid waste distict and provided information and coordination to the waste-to-energy feasibility study.

In regionwide economic development, the Council has devoted time to improving utilities in and access to industrial parks, in lobbying for continued maintenance of regional transportation facilities including rail, highways and airports, and to increased business marketing efforts. Through grant assistance, coordination with State and federal agencies and data, the staff has assisted local development organizations in four towns which serve as area employment centers.

The Council has provided information and guidance to several towns on the Community Development Block Grant, Urban Development Action Grant, and Farmers Home Administration Programs and prepared several grant applications. The Council is a partner in the Business Assistance to Northern New Hampshire Program, providing demographic data to individuals, businesses, and economic consultants interested in the North Country. This summer, we prepared a Plymouth Area Economic Base Study, to be followed by similar reports on other North Country subregions.

The Council participated in research and marketing efforts to increase the use of the Concord-to-Lincoln rail line and to maintain a schedule for rehabilitation of other regional railroad lines.

Other regional activities of importance include the coordination and establishment of eight solid waste districts. Council staff has assisted towns in developing work plans to assess their waste disposal needs and current methods and develop a 10-year plan. The Council has also surveyed local disposal practices for septage, estimated future needs, and will be recommending alternative disposal arrangements.

REPORT OF THE GRAFTON COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

We appreciate this opportunity to more directly communicate with our taxpaying citizens through their annual town/city reports.

Because of our July 1st fiscal year, it is hard to anticipate the local tax impact of the county budget. The Commissioners are accountable to the public and taxpayers, and accordingly are extremely conscious of meeting the citizens' needs adequately and efficiently, yet as economically as possible. However, we are faced with similar budgeting dilemmas as towns and cities. Real budget concerns are created by the federal and state mandated programs and services without supporting funds or local control, and the increased demand for services while attempting to hold down budgets and taxes. We all must maintain a close relationship with our legislators. The Commissioners are following very closely the pending legislation regarding settlement and assistance programs, and hope that the towns are also involved in this very important issue.

Courtroom #2 was finished last summer and was dedicated during the opening of the fall term of Superior Court on September 13, 1983. We anticipate having a second judge in March, which should relieve the backlog and reduce the need for masters.

Counties, as well as towns, are experiencing the transition of the courts into the new State Unified Court System, and should notice a decrease in local expenses for the judicial system. However, the counties will have to "reimburse" \$2.75 million to the Unified Court System in fiscal year 1985, which means approximately \$200,000 to Grafton County. We also expect that the counties will retain certain operating expenses such as Probate Court guardianship and appeals costs, Superior Court bailiff costs, and probably will have to provide court space, furnishings and equipment without remuneration.

On Commissioner recommendation, the Delegation Executive Committee appointed a Jail Study Committee to review the needs for the county correctional facility. The National Institute of Corrections made an independent study of the correctional facility at no cost to tax-payers, and issued an encouraging report recommending minor changes, but overall indicating a good facility in general compliance with laws, regulations and meeting needs. Some attention is being given to the need for additional space, especially for "weekend" incarcerations. There was no recommendation for new permanent facility construction at this time.

Grafton County is currently involved in litigation in a retirement buy-back issue which could have heavy impact on all local governments in the N.H. Retirement System. Assessment on Grafton County in this one case could run approximately \$70,000 plus legal fees and could result in a serious "domino" effect on local governments.

Grafton County will be going through the budgeting process in May and June, with a public hearing on the Commissioners recommendations expected to be held in mid-June. The hearing will be advertised, and we strongly encourage your attendance at the hearing to voice your opinions and feelings on the budget. We welcome your attendance and comments.

The Commissioners meet Mondays at 9:30 a.m. at the Courthouse and at 12:30 p.m. at the Nursing Home. Meetings are open to the public.

In community planning, we have assisted many towns with adopting or amending zoning ordinances, subdivision regulations, site plan review and other local regulations. With the reorganization and slight revision of the state planning and zoning laws, we've been busy trying to keep planning boards informed of the changes and new requirements. A workshop was held in the fall and more are planned for the spring. We also met with over 20 towns to help them review regulations relating to subdivision and building in the floodplain to insure compliance with federal regulations. The staff successfully assisted communities in applying for funds for recreation and library facilities.

A new NCC service this past year has been computerized tax billing. We provided this service under contract to four towns. We anticipate expanded municipal and in-house use of the computer.

These are some of the highlights of the past year. We welcome your town's active participation on the Board and use of the Council's services and look forward to working on your behalf in 1984.

PLYMOUTH CONSERVATION COMMISSION 1983 ANNUAL REPORT
The Plymouth Conservation Commission met regularly in 1983
to address local conservation and resource issues.

The impact of various proposed developments, both residential and commercial, on wetlands and floodplain areas was discussed. Expansion of permitted uses created additional concerns. Dealing with the State Wetlands Board proved frustrating to Commission members.

A study of bacterial contamination in the Fox Park drainage was completed by Plymouth State College students under the direction of Dick Fralick and presented to the Commission. In addition a preliminary wetlands inventory and mapping of Clay Brook watershed and the airport bog were prepared by PSC students David Anderson and David A. Vaughan to assess the potential for designation of specific highly valued wetland areas as "prime" wetlands. The Commission would like to commend these students on their dedication and interest in assisting the town in data gathering and critical area documentation.

A joint meeting with the Holderness Conservation Commission was held. Chairman "Tink" Taylor reviewed their efforts in preparing a wetlands inventory. Differing perspectives on the proposed Pemigewassett River dredging project were discussed as well as other resource issues affecting both communities.

Members attended several regional meetings sponsored by the NH Association of Conservation Commissions and other resource groups on wetlands, acid rain, town forest designation and wilderness areas.

Solid waste disposal and recycling were the focus of several meetings. Modification to the Incinerator/Recycling Facility regulation were proposed to the Selectmen and assistance provided in developing a design for the development of the ash landfill. The Chairman participated in the feasibility study for a refuse-to-energy facility to serve 14 area towns and reported the findings to the Commission (too expensive at this time).

Comments were offered to the Planning Board on the potential impact of proposed changes in the zoning regualtions on wetlands and natural resources in the community.

Meetings are held at 7:30 p.m. in the Town Offices on the first Tuesday of each month. All are welcome to attend - we need your support!

PLYMOUTH PLANNING BOARD 1983

Subdivision changes in January started our year off. Preparing for Town Meeting in the form of changes to the Zoning Ordinance added to the workload which was increasing as the year progressed. More work was needed on the Subdivision Regulations and the Master Plan needed, and still does, work to bring the plan to the point that reflects the future needs of the Town. The Board was also working on the Zoning Ordinance. We felt a new Zoning Ordinance was in order.

Lectures given by the Municipal Association, literature on planning and development techniques and other sources, indicated to us that the present Zoning was not adeuate to allow planned growth.

In August we contacted the North Country Council and asked for help in preparing a new Zoning Ordinance. Miss Vicki Smith worked with us to prepare the document the Board believed is needed for Plymouth.

At the two public hearings the townspeople spoke and said Zoning should be postponed until next year. The Board will ask those townspeople for their help in shaping the proposed Zoning Ordinance to fit the Town of Plymouth needs.

This year has been a very busy one for the Board. The following figures reflect our involvement in planning this year. We had 20 subdivisions involving regular subdivisions, condominiums, and large tract development.

We sat on 27 meetings which dealt with lot line changes, registration of plats on previously unrecorded plats (in Haverhill) and some subdivisions which never came about. We also had over 25 meetings on the proposed Zoning Ordinance.

The Board wishes to thank the people for their participation in our public hearings. The Board also encourages more people to become involved in their town.

REPORT OF THE 1983 REFUSE TO ENERGY FEASIBILITY STUDY

Article 36 in the 1983 town warrant was approved by the voters called for the Selectmen to enter into a cooperative agreement with area communities to study the advisability of establishing a regional solid waste district and raised funds for a feasibility study of a refuse to energy facility to be located in Plymouth. Fred Moody of North Country Council was nominated to be the project coordinator. Daniel Crean of Concord was selected as legal counsel.

Initial meetings focused on organizational structure, selection of officers, and committees. Member towns and PSC comprised the Pemi-Baker Resource Recovery Ad Hoc Committee. A smaller group, called the Working Committee, was charged with developing the details and make recommendations to the Ad Hoc Committee.

Twelve engineering firms were asked to bid on the project based on a scope of services letter. After interviews and a mutually agreed upon selection process, a contract was signed with the firm of Gershman, Brickner and Bratton, Inc. of Washington, D.C. combined with Hoyle Tanner & Associates, Inc. of Londonderry, N. H. to do the feasibility study. This team worked closely with member communities and the study committee over a period of several months. They prepared and delivered a draft report of findings to the working committee and then final report to the Ad Hoc Committee. I would like to single out and give particular thanks to Harvey Gershman for his honesty and professionalism in overseeing this work.

Minutes of all meetings of both committees plus copies of the reports prepared by the engineers can be reviewed in the Selectmen's Office.

Results of the study showed that for a 72 ton per day all-steam or cogeneration (steam and electric) facility to be cost effective would require a disposal fee of about \$50 per ton from sending communities plus an average of \$15 per ton cost for transporting the waste to the central facility. The economics of an all electric facility required at least 150 tons per day of refuse - an amount that could not be com-

mitted by larger towns in the surrounding area. The conclusion drawn by the study committees was that no town would pay \$65 per ton to handle its solid waste - that it would not be cost effective to proceed with the project. I agreed and recommend to the Plymouth taxpayers that we proceed no further with refuse to energy at this time. All members agreed however, that the study was absolutely necessary to develop good information for long range planning.

However, under state law, we must continue to participate in regional solid waste planning per RSA 149-m. The group will soon be reorganizing under the name of the Pemi-Baker Solid Waste Planning District and will be contracting with North Country Council to prepare a 15 year plan for member towns.

This district is committed to finding a solution to the solid waste problem and shall continue to meet on a regular basis to accomplish this task.

We have examined the combined financial statements and the combining fund and account group financial statements of the Town of Plymouth, New Hampshire as of and for the year ended December 31, 1982, as listed in the table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 6, the financial statements of the Plymouth District Court for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1982, have not been included in the accompanying financial report.

As described in Note 1B, the combined financial statements referred to above do not include financial statements of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the above paragraph, the combined financial statements and the combining fund and account group financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the Town of Plymouth, New Hampshire at December 31, 1982, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements taken as a whole and on the combining fund and account group financial statements. The accompanying financial information listed as supplemental schedules in the table of contents is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the combined financial statements of the Town of Plymouth, New Hampshire. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the combined, combining fund and account group financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the combined financial statements taken as a whole.

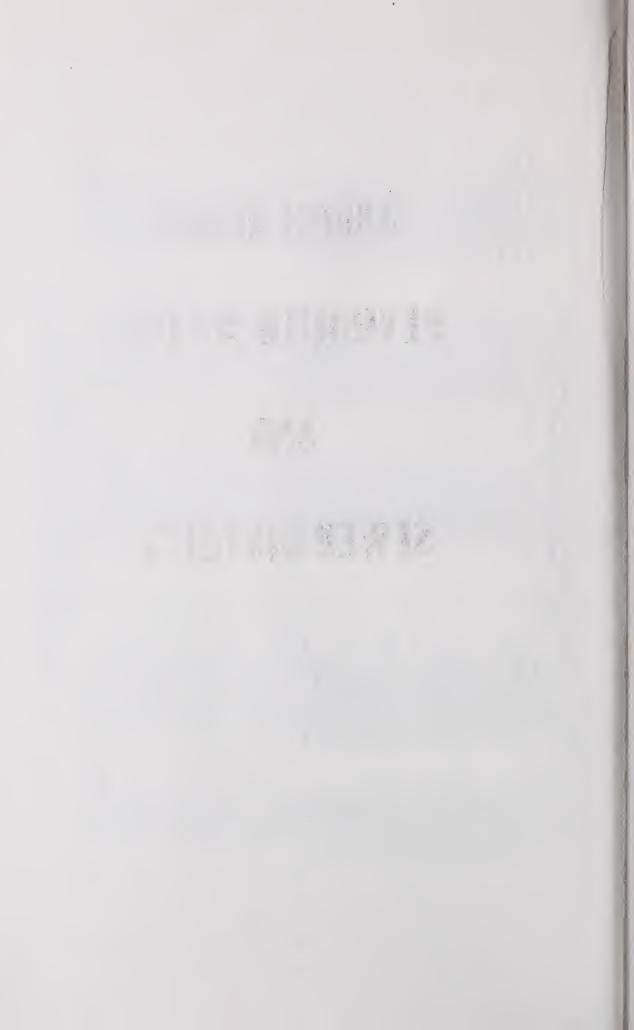

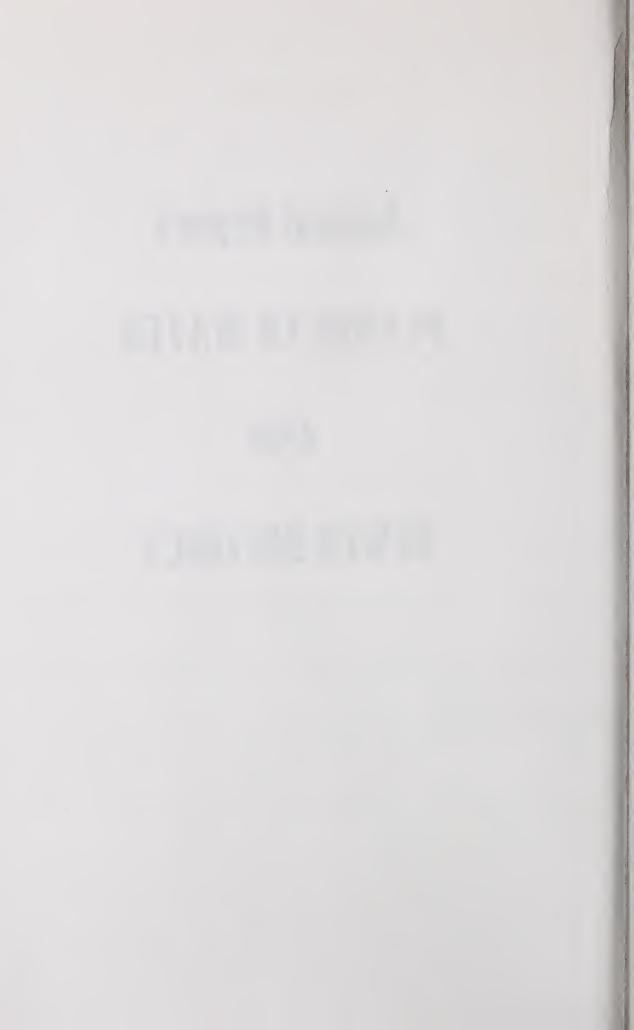

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Plymouth Village Water and Sewer District qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are notified to meet at the Plymouth AREA High School Lecture Hall on Thursday, the 15th day of March, next, at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following articles:

- ARTICLE 1: To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.
- ARTICLE 2: To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- ARTICLE 3: To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- ARTICLE 4: To choose Auditors for the ensuing year.
- ARTICLE 5: To choose a District Commissioner for the ensuing year.
- ARTICLE 6: To see if the District will vote to rescind the affirmative vote on Article 6 of the warrant for the annual district meeting held on March 10, 1983, wherein the District voted to authorize the Commissioners to withdraw funds from the Secondary Treatment Account for purposes of funding certain improvements at the wastewater treatment facility.
- ARTICLE 7: To see if the District will vote to authorize the Commissioners if they determine that it is in the best interests of the District to do so, to transfer from the Trustee of Trust Funds account #170-277-8 at the Pemigewasset National Bank, the entire amount accumulated, being approximately \$27,600.00, to the Secondary Treatment Account, to be used with funds already available, towards short-term funding and to help defray the District's share of the Sewer Separation Project.
- ARTICLE 8: To see if the District will raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000 for the purpose of funding the design of sewers, pump station and appurtenances for the extension of sewers to the precinct boundary on Fairgrounds Road, the total amount to be raised by the Precinct Tax. (This article inserted by petition.)
- ARTICLE 9: To see if the District Commissioners will take whatever actions as may be necessary to implement corrosion control measures as previously funded. (This article inserted by petition.)
- ARTICLE 10: To see if the District will vote to authorize the Commissioners to make application for and to accept and expend on behalf of the District, any and all grants or offers from the State or Federal govenments or other sources available for the purpose of defraying expenses of the District.
- ARTICLE 11: To see if the District will vote to authorize the Commissioners to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and other revenue to

pay debts of the District, and to give notes therefor, countersigned by the District Treasurer, all in accordance with RSA 33:7,11.

- ARTICLE 12: To see if the District will vote to authorize the commissioners to sell, or otherwise dispose of, on behalf of the District, any equipment owned by the District which in the judgment of the Commissioners no longer has any value in fulfilling the statutory obligations of the District.
- ARTICLE 13: To see if the District will raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Eighty-nine Thousand Two Hundred Thirty-five Dollars and Twelve Cents (\$289,235.12) for the operation of the Water and Sewer Departments for the year of 1984, and that the total anticipated income from these departments in the amount of Two Hundred Seventy-four Thousand Seven Hundred Seventy-five Dollars and Seventy-six Cents (\$274,775.76) be applied against this appropriation leaving a balance of Fourteen Thousand Four Hundred Fifty-nine Dollars and Thirty-six Cents (\$14,459.36) to be raised by precinct tax, formerly known as hydrant rental.

ARTICLE 14: To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

1983 Work Report

In 1983 a total of 101,060,822 gallons of water was consumed by the metering and approximately 4,360,000 by trailers.

A total of 173,923,501 gallons was pumped. A total of 243 feet of pipes of all sizes laid in 1983.

The Sewage Treatment Plant treated a total of 239,462,190 gallons of influent. Pumped a total of 813,678 gallons of sludge which when dewatered produced 333 cubic yards of filtered sludge which weighed 399,600 pounds. 34.25 cubic yards of sand was removed.

It required 14,834 pounds of lime, 996 gallons of ferric chloride and 9,085 pounds of chlorine gas to process sewage that went through the plant in 1983. The average daily flow was 656,061 gallons per day and the high flow for one day occurred March 2, 1983 and was 3,709,000 gallons.

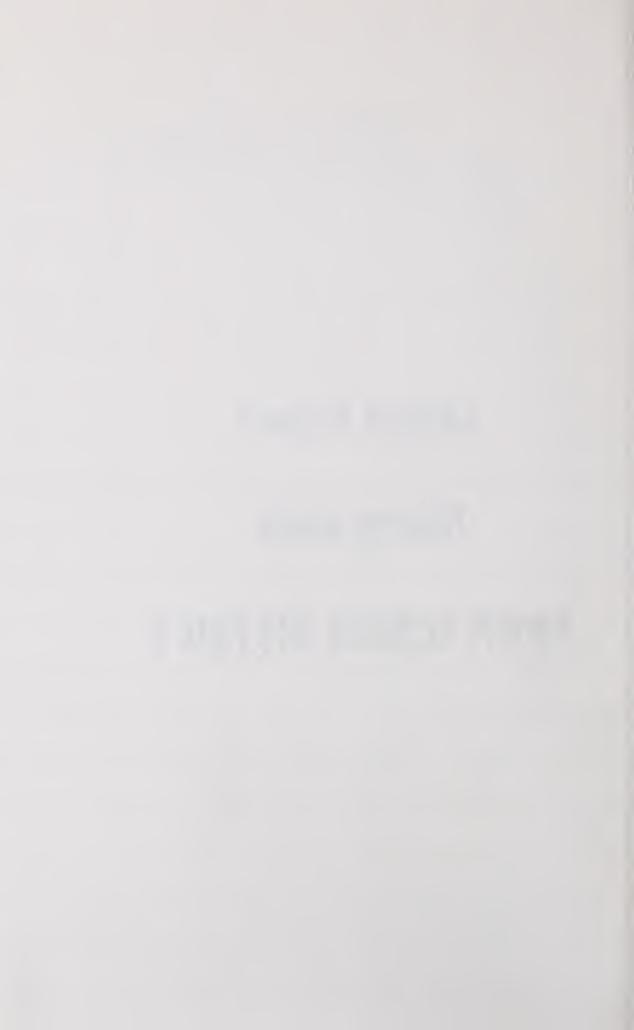

To the inhabitants of the Plymouth School District in the County of Grafton and State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Plymouth on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, 1984, polls to be open for voting on ArtIcle 1 at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon and to close not earlier than 6:00 o'clock in the afternoon, and you are hereby notified to meet at the Plymouth AREA High School in said Plymouth on Tuesday, the twentleth day of March, 1984, at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon for the second session of the school district meeting at which time action will be taken upon the remaining articles of this warrant.

- Article 1: To elect all School District officers which appear on the official School District ballot for the ensuing year.
- Article 2: To see what action the District will take relative to the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers.
- Article 3: To see if the District will authorize the School Board to negotiate and execute such tuition contracts as they may determine advisable for non-AREA School Districts.
- Article 4: To see if the District will raise and appropriate a supplemental appropriation in the total amount of Sixteen thousand dollars (\$16,000.00) for the purchase of a truck. This supplemental appropriation is to be funded from estimated 1983-1984 fund balance.
- Article 5: To see If the District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) for school grounds improvement.

Article 6: To see if the District will vote to establish a contingency fund in accordance with New Hampshire RSA 198:4-b, such contingency fund to meet the costs of unanticipated expenses that may arise during the year and further to see if the District will appropriate the sum of Twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000.00) therefor.

Article 7: To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for, accept and expend on behalf of the School District all glfts, advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be available or forthcoming from the United States government, the State of New Hampshire, or any other Federal, State, and local or private agency.

Article 8: To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of School District officers and agents and for statutory obligations of the District and to authorize the application against such Aid Fund, together with any other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

Article 9: To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Education has received a considerable amount of state and national attention during the 1982-1983 academic year. Approximately 30 reports on the status of education have been issued by commissions, task forces, and individuals. While the reports often make common recommendations and occasionally differ, one message is consistent. Excellent education is basic to the future of our country.

The communities which comprise School Administrative Unit #48 (Campton, Holderness, Plymouth, Rumney, Thornton, Waterville Valley, and Wentworth) should be aware that some of the recommendations cited have already been implemented or are being implemented in our schools. More can and will be done to assure a brighter educational future for our students and continued economic, intellectual, and cultural vitality for our state.

There are no easy solutions to the very complex problems of revitalizing education. Vision is needed to enlist capable thinkers from the school community, colleges and private and public sector agencies to help identify curricular goals for the variety of students served by the public school. Flexibility of offerings, organizational patterns, and scheduling are paramount issues at the building level which can assist in meeting the needs, abilities, and learning styles of a differentiated school population.

School Administrative Unit #48 continues to place much emphasis on goal-setting activities. During the 1982-1983 academic year refinement focused on: (1) improving student performance in language arts (reading and composition), mathematics, and U.S. and NH history and government; (2) improving curriculum coordination amongst the seven elementary schools and articulating with the Plymouth AREA High School; (3) progressing with programs in vocational education, special education, and giftedness; (4) identifying resources which can enhance inservice training opportunities for teachers and administrators; and (5) disseminating and employing the findings of "effective schools" research.

Our teaching staff also continues to keep abreast of contemporary developments. Computer awareness, gifted and talented opportunities, writing and mathematics instruction, and vocational skills receive considerable attention. Interest has been maintained at a high level, and we constantly attempt to utilize in-house expertise and share information.

In conclusion, School Administrative Unit #48 will continue to provide the leadership which nurtures the development of partnerships which are designed to improve educational opportunities for all students.

A school cannot exist independently of the community served. This administration will exemplify a commitment to reach out and establish itself as a focal point of the community. Our schools are still our greatest single natural resource.

Your continued support and cooperation is cherished. It can only serve to contribute to our quest for evolving excellence.

EXPLANATION OF SUPERINTENDENT'S AND ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY FOR 1982-1983

Chapter 189, Section 48 Revised Statutes Annotated of the State of New Hampshire requires that the school district annual report show the total amount paid to the Superintendent of Schools as per the following quotation: "Reports. Each Superintendent of a School Administrative Unit shall annually prepare a report of the total salary paid to the superintendent, showing in detail the amount paid by the state and each local school district and their share of same...Said report shall be included in the annual report of the respective school district as a separate entry. A like report and entry shall be made for each assistant superintendent, teacher consultant, and business administrator, if any is in service in the unit."

One-half of the School Administrative Unit expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the unit on the basis of adjusted valuations. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the school for the previous school year ending June 30th. The salary of \$32,940 which was received by the SuperIntendent of Schools of School Administrative Unit #48 during 1982-1983 was prorated among the school districts comprising the School Administrative Unit. Allowance for \$2,200 travel within the Unit was also prorated as stated above.

The salary of \$27,324 for the Assistant Superintendent during 1982-1983 and travel allowance within the Unit of \$1,700 was prorated as stated above.

The table below shows the portion of salary and travel charged to each school district.

PRINCIPAL'S ANNUAL REPORT 1983-84

Please accept my tenth report as the Principal of Plymouth Area High School.

On October 23, 1983, the formal dedication of the 30,000 square foot vocational wing was held, thus culminating nine years of planning. Six vocational programs are housed in this facility: Distributive Education, Culinary Arts, Automotive Mechanics, Building Trades, Office Occupations and Special Needs Training. The facility is one of which the entire community can be proud.

Faculty changes for 1983-84 include: Len Toledo replaced Janice Froncek in the Mathematics Department; Diane Finlay replaced Julie Moore in the Special Services Department; and in addition, Susan Torrey has been employed to teach the vocational program Culinary Arts.

The enrollment of the high school this year is 510, down 14 students from 1982-83.

Laura Blair and Mark Spencer, members of the Class of 1984, have been notified that they are Commended Students in the National Merit Scholarship Program. Sharon Fletcher was chosen recipient of the Bausch and Lomb Science Award and JoAnn Clark was chosen as the school's D.A.R. Good Citizen.

Academically, our graduates continue to qualify for higher education. Fifty-seven per cent (57%) of the Class of 1983 elected to attend some type of post-secondary education; five per cent (5%) entered the military; and thirty-eight per cent (38%) entered the world of work.

Some of the institutions of higher learning being attended by the Class of 1983 are:

Plymouth State College University of New Hampshire Bradford College Hofstra University University of Vermont Elmira College U.S. Air Force Academy Pennsylvania State University Hesser College Johnson and Wales College Colby Sawyer College Hesser College

Most recently Plymouth Area High School was invited to participate in the Secondary School Effectiveness Project which is co-sponsored by the New Hampshire State Department of Education and the Northeast Regional Exchange.

The purpose of the project is to assist a select group of secondary schools in strengthening their capacity to improve learning climate and student achievement. One high school in New Hampshire was selected to participate in this effort. We are proud of our past achievements and are pleased to accept this project in an effort to further strengthen our high school.

Your continued support for our high school is encouraged. May I again thank the Plymouth School Board, Mr. Cabral and Dr. Bourgeois for their support and encouragement.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

New faculty this year are Mrs. Maureen Clark, grade two, Mrs. Lynn Haust, art, and Mr. Richard Couch, language arts, grades seven and eight. Mrs. Ross and Mr. Bourque are on a one year leave of absence and are replaced by Mrs. Donna Zeras and Mrs. Julie Andrews.

Goals which have been established this year include a continuation of progress and refinement of programs in the area of gifted and computer education, transition/first grade curriculum, and writing. We have added seven computers at the junior high level this year, along with a substantial amount of software for grades one through eight.

An enrichment program for grades four, five and six, under the direction of Katy Fralick, was begun this year with hopes of expanding in the future.

We have also continued emphasis on the implementation of an "effective schools" program with a focus on; teaching skills, learning strategies, school climate, curriculum resources, pre-school awareness, and students time on task. The NET-WORK, Inc., a regional education project based in Andover, Massachusetts, along with a local team of teachers and parents, are in the process of evaluating us. We were one of twelve New England schools selected and will have information ready for dissemination in July. The state has classified Plymouth Elementary as a school with a 1A rating, which means that in addition to having a kindergarten program, we also meet all 44 standards in the state classification system.

Our parent group, PEOPLE, has been active this year sponsoring programs for the students and parents. The big project this year being to finish the playground for grades Kindergarten through second this spring. We will need many hands to finish this and ask that you help, if you are available when we ask. The chairperson for this year are Kathy Adams and Jo Goodwin.

As you can see, this has been another busy year with Plymouth striving to make the education for your child profitable. We thank you for your continued support.

PLYMOUTH SCHOOL NURSE'S REPORT

The following is the 1983 report of the health program for the Plymouth schools.

Assessing the health concerns of all of the students remains the chief goal of the program. Particular attention is paid to those children with identified handicaps. This includes learning as well as physical handicaps. Keeping health records and immunizations updated is also important to ensure a proper health program. Over the past year many referrals were made for vision and hearing defects as well as referrals for orthopedic, dental, and a variety of physical or emotional problems.

In 1983 our school physician, Dr. Craig, performed 85 physical examinations for sports.

The Dental Health Program, sponsored by the local organizations and administered by the Rev. Bayard Hancock, provided dental care for eight children. Dr. Steven Birkitt performed the dental work. Last Spring a Dental Prophylaxis and Topical Flouride Application Program was offered in the elementary school for grades K-6. Fifty two children participated for a fee of \$4.00 apiece. The Plymouth Rotary Club sponsored children who needed financial assistance. Mrs. Pamela Scerra was the hygienist. She is employed by the New Hampshire Bureau of Dental Health.

In April, the Plymouth Lions' Club sponsored the Pre-School Vision and Hearing Screening Program in conjunction with the New Hampshire Department of Health and Welfare and assisted by the Plymouth Area High School Student Council members. A total of 72 children were tested. Several referrals were made to physicians.

In January a blood drive was held in the school library. Students 17 years and older were eligible to give blood. A total of 153 pints were collected. This was a 51 pint increase over last year. This event was sponsored by the Plymouth Education Association.

Vision and hearing exams, along with heights and weights, were performed on students in grades K, 1, 2, 4, 7 and 9. Other children were tested upon request of a teacher, parent or the child himself. Blood pressures were taken for all children in grades 5 and for all sports physicals. Children with hypertensive tendencies were checked periodically. Scoliosis screening was performed on students in grades 5-8.

General inspections for head lice or dental programs were administered as necessary.

Medicines were dispensed per doctors orders for a total of 121 students.

First aid was administered to approximately 5,600 students.

Many counselling sessions with students and teachers ensured that the students perform in school at their optimum level.

Thanks to all who cooperated with me this past year.

ACCOUNTANT'S REPORT ON FINANCIAL PRESENTATION

To the Members of the School Board Plymouth School District Plymouth, New Hampshire

We have examined the combined financial statements and the combining fund and account group financial statements of the Plymouth School District as of and for the year ended June 30, 1983, as listed in the accompanying table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1B, the combined financial statements referred to above do not include financial statements of the General Fixed Asset group of accounts, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset group of accounts results in an incomplete presentation as explained in the above paragraph, the combined financial statements and the combining fund and account group financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the Plymouth School District at June 30, 1983 and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements taken as a whole. The combining fund and account group financial statements and supplemental schedules listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the combined financial statements of the Plymouth School District. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the combined financial statements and, in our opinion, is stated fairly in all material respects in relation to the combined financial statements taken as a whole.
