# WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING MARCH 9, 1943 AT 10 A. M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of South Hampton in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said South Hampton on Tuesday the ninth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1.—To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- Art. 2.—To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- Art. 3.—To raise and appropriate money for the support of highways and bridges.
- Art. 4.—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to secure State Aid for the permanent improvement of Class V Roads.
- Art. 5.—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for snow removal.
- Art. 6.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for insurance and Town Officers' bonds.
- Art. 7.—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$125.00 for the Public Library.

- Art. 8.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Public Welfare.
- Art. 9.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Care of Cemeteries.
- Art. 10.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay taxes on property bought by the town.
- Art. 11.—To see what action the town will take in regard to real estate deeded to town for non-payment of taxes.
- Art. 12.—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10.00 for the Sibley Relief Fund and \$10.00 for the Amesbury Police Fund.
- Art. 13.—To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

February 1, 1943

To the School Board and Citizens of South Hampton:

It is with pleasure that I submit my first annual report as Superintendent of your Schools.

Although I have been working with your schools for only two months, an endeavor will be made to present the usual interesting statistics for 1941-1942 as well as some of the activities of the present school year. You are fortunate in having two experienced teachers; not being new teachers they need no introduction.

During my visits to the schools, I find them well managed and neat, the pupils seem to be well behaved, the lessons well prepared by the teachers and a general atmosphere of happiness and industry on the part of everyone. All pupils in the first and second grades have been equipped with the most modern of reading materials, replacing out moded and worn books. Several minor repairs were effected during the past summer. The school is in good condition generally, and is functioning efficiently. All parents and other citizens are encouraged to visit their schools to see the work that is being done.

School subject content is being effected in many ways by war conditions. Teachers are keeping the pupils well informed of current activities through current events, encouraging them to purchase war stamps and bonds and making regular work as practical as possible by bringing into discussions up-to-date problems dealing with present conditions. The teachers have taken their additional part in the war effort by working on rationing programs. Teachers and pupils are to be commended for the extent to which the pupils have purchased stamps. In the elementary grades twenty one children have purchased \$150.-60 worth of stamps since September and in the upper

grades fifteen pupils have invested \$105.90 in like manner. This makes a total of \$257.50—an average of \$7.15 per pupil.

The cost of text books and supplies is increasing. Shortages in materials are getting more noticeable. We must attempt to conserve on their use by steady effort to prevent any waste or abuse of materials.

An article in the January issue of the School Executive magazine states concisely and emphatically regarding Education after the war in Great Britain that, "of all the State's activities, education is the basic activity, because it conditions the future character of the entire community.—in peacetime no temporary economic crisis should be permitted to have any effect at all upon educational services. In wartime the maintenance of these services at a level of high efficiency should have maximum priority". This thought should continue to prevail in our own country.

The greatest task before the American people is to win the war. To this end our utmost energy and our best thoughts are dedicated, but we must not be unmindful of the peace and world reconstruction which must follow. We are confronted now with decisions that will determine the kind of citizens who will inherit this country of ours. We must keep constantly before us the fact that children can not delay the growing-up process. "What they will be, they are now becoming."

Your attention is directed to attached reports of the school nurse, Mrs. Constance Cooper and the music teacher, Miss Jean Beaton, both of whom seem to be doing a good job at their respective duty of helping to maintain and improve the physical welfare of the children, and teaching some music appreciation and developing and bringing out whatever talents the children may have along those lines.

### REPORT ON MUSIC FOR SOUTH HAMPTON

February 8, 1943

To the Superintendent and School Board of South Hampton:

I hereby submit a report of activity in music for the year 1941-42 as well as this present year.

The time allotted to South Hampton is one half hour a week for each room. This is divided as follows; grades

J-II fifteen minutes, grades III-IV fifteen minutes, grades V-V-III thirty minutes.

In grades 1-III there seem to be more than the average number of uncertain singers making progress slow at best: I wish to congratulate Miss Gilmore on the careful patient work she has done with this group to show such marked improvement over last year.

For grades III-IV we have new texts this year. "We Sing" from the series "The Singing School." This is a fourth grade book and the work accomplished is very satisfactory indeed.

In the upper grades this year I notice more enthusiasm for music than at any time since I have been here.

In grades I-II singing is entirely by rote to acquaint the child with his singing voice to give him a repertoire of songs upon which to build note reading and of course for pleasure. From grade II on we try to maintain a balance between note reading and rote singing. Note reading, so that over a period of years they may learn to sing independently with speed and accuracy. Rote singing, so as to maintain spontaneous singing to provide songs that can be sung from memory and to give immediate pleasure.

Music appreciation or lessons in listening have been carried on with the aid of the phonograph and records. While it is impossible to find time to carry on all phases of music education I believe listening is becoming more and more important when any kind of auditory entertainment may be had at the turn of a dial.

In grade four there is a successful rhythm band. If there were a phonograph in the school it would contribute greatly to the band and provide a better opportunity for folk dancing. Possibly there is one in the district not in use that could be donated.
