RESOLVED, That the County Commissioners of Sullivan

County in the State of New Hampshire are hereby authorized under the provisions of a Special Act of the legislature approved January 23, 1933, authorizing an issue of bonds or certificates of indebtedness in the name of and behalf of the County of Sullivan to an amount not exceeding \$160,000. Said bonds or certificates of indebtedness to be in denominations of \$1,000 each and payable in such sum at such times not exceeding twenty years from their date, as the County Commissioners shall determine. They shall bear interest not to exceed 41/2% payable semi-annually and have interest coupons attached to each bond. Such bonds shall be signed by the County Commissioners and countersigned by the County Treasurer and registered by the County Clerk and the coupons attached shall bear facsimile of the signature of the County Treasurer and payable at such place or places as the County Commissioners shall designate and shall be deemed a pledge of faith and credit of the county.

The Treasurer shall keep an account of each bond, showing the number thereof, the name of the person, persons, corporations or companies to whom sold, the amount received for the same, the date of sale and the time when payable.

The County Commissioners in selling such bonds shall appoint a time and place when and where they shall receive such proposals for the sale of such bonds, which sale shall be not less than par and shall publish a notice in some newspaper published in the County, setting forth the time and place when and where they shall receive bids for the said bonds. Such publication shall be at least fourteen days before the day appointed for opening such bids. At the time and place appointed, the County Commissioners shall open the proposals or the bids received and the highest responsible bidder shall be entitled to receive the amount of bonds, for which he bids, providing his bid equals or exceeds par and accrued interest upon the payment thereof.

Dear Mr. Chairman:

The executive Committee of Claremont Taxpayers' Association have considered the situation and it was the sense of the meeting that the following recommendations be made:

- 1. That the salary of the commissioners be fixed at \$3.00 a day not to exceed \$1,000 in any year and that all other county officers and employees be cut 25% of their 1932 salaries.
- 2. That the county delegation be requested to introduce appropriate legislation to carry out the foregoing recommendations.
- 3. That the county delegation interview the Superior Court and request the justices to lend their aid and cooperation in reducing such county expenses, as may be within the scope of their authority, to the amount of at least 25%
- 4. That the county adopt the commissary system of poor relief for the county poor not at the farm.
- 5. That the delegation give special attention to the administration of charities and corrections for the purpose of making expense reductions of at least 25%.
- 6. That the delegation give special attention to reducing by at least 25% the item of miscellaneous expenditures; this item being \$3,953.22.

No doubt the delegation has all these items in mind. It seemed best however to state to the delegation the things that chiefly arrested the attention of the committee.

the attention of the committee.

Notwithstanding the constitutional point that may be involved we thought it wise to call the attention of the delegation to the desirability of reducing the compensation of jurors to \$3.00 a day and to a provision that parties insisting upon jury trial shall pay the clerk a fee of \$15.00 in all actions at law or in equity, before a jury is drawn. The constitutional point applies only to the jury fee.

The delegation inspected the buildings including the root cellar, children's building, new slaughter house and piggery, the cattle buildings and the new barn.

After inspection the meeting again reopened and Senator Whitcomb and Mr. George Warner, incoming county commissioner, were called upon for remarks.

On motion of Mr. Harry Rowell, duly seconded, it was unanimously voted and carried that a rising vote of thanks and appreciation be extended to Mr. and Mrs. Grout for the excellent dinner and entertainment today and for their loyal, untiring and painstaking work for and in behalf of the inmates of the County Home and the county as a whole. It was moved by Mr. Etsler that the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.) be appropriated to carry the water project to a temporary completion, with the understanding that the job will be completed in 1934. Motion carried unanimously. A vote of thanks was given to Mr. and Mrs. Grout for the excellent dinner which was served to the members of the Delegation.

### Commissioners' Report

In accordance with the Public Laws of the State of New Hampshire, the Commissioners of Sullivan County, herewith present the annual report of the County Commissioners, the County Home and House of Correction, Treasurer, Auditors, Solicitor, Clerk of Court, Sheriff, Chaplain, and Physician of the County Home for the year ending December 31, 1933.

Under the continued direction of Mr. and Mrs. L. M. Grout, Superintendent and Matron, the County Home has been operated in a most satisfactory manner. The Commissioners appreciate the splendid work of the Superintendent and Matron, and take this opportunity of extending our thanks for their efforts. We also desire to express our appreciation for the excellent services of the Chaplain, Physician, and all connected with the Home.

Several minor improvements have been made at the Home. The only major project of the year was the start on a new water system. The shortage of water in August, 1932 and again in June and July, 1933, made it necessary to take advantage of the vote of the Delegation appropriation of \$15,000, upon plans and recommendations submitted to the Delegation at the February meeting held at the County Home, by Mr. Loyal Barton, Civil Engineer, the plans and estimates being made by Mr. Barton at the request of the former Board of Commissioners. Work was started July 16th, using all county dependents for the common labor. All material was purchased in the County at the lowest bid. Every difficulty known to man was encountered during the progress of the work. Early in September it was evident that the appropriation would not complete the project and a special meeting of the Delegation was called for September 26th. After an inspection of the Water Project by the delegation, the following vote was passed: "That the sum of three thousand dollars be appropriated to carry the water project to a temporary completion, with the understanding that the project will be completed in 1934." This added appropriation carried the project until cold weather.

On November 20, the Commissioners received a contribution

from C. W. A. Government Funds, to employ 20 men, a timekeeper and foreman, and to purchase certain materials. With this assistance, the project was continued until February 15, 1934 using Claremont dependents for the labor. The County had to furnish certain labor, material, and trucking in order to receive the C. W. A. assisantce, amounting to approximately \$1,300. It is the hope of the Commissioners that more assistance from C. W. A. funds will be available in order that the whole project may be completed by May 15. The County will be asked to furnish all materials under the next C. W. A. allotment.

On July 1, 1933, the State took over the supervision of all outside relief cases under what was known, during the last session of the Legislature, as House Bill No. 417 and is now known as Chapter 160, Laws of 1933. This law sets up a Director of Poor Relief appointed by the Governor, who has general charge of the administration of all outside poor relief in the State. The Director divides the State into districts, but not cutting cross county boundaries, and appoints a trained welfare worker known as the County or District Supervisor. The Supervisor has general charge of the administration of all outside poor relief in that county or district. All employed, excepting the supervisors, shall be residents of New Hampshire. Under Section 4 of the law. supervisors are directed to consult with, and employ in the administration of the act, County Commissioners, Selectmen, Overseers of the Poor, and other agencies, so long as reasonably competent services are rendered by the above officers.

Under the act, the Governor and Council are authorized to receive from the Federal Government or other agencies, any money advanced to, or placed at the disposal of the State for the relief of the distressed. Also, the Governor and Council are authorized,

for the purpose of financing this act, to issue bonds to the amount of \$600,000 for the balance of 1933 and \$1,200,000 for the year 1934. All moneys so received, are directed under section 7 to be deposited with the State Treasurer, and are to be known as the Emergency Relief Fund and to be paid out only on warrants drawn by the Governor for purposes of this act alone. All expenditures for outside relief are, in the first instance, paid out of this Emergency Relief Fund, and then from time to time, the cities, towns, and counties reimburse the State to the extent of 25 per ceent of the total cost of outside poor relief.

We do not care to comment but little on the administration of the act. In our judgment, more use should be made of the Commissioners, Overseers, and Selectmen, as some of these officials have had many years of experience with poor relief in their respective towns and counties. This experience should be most valuable to the supervisors and social workers, and if all connected with welfare relief will cooperate 100 per cent, the law will work successfully until its termination December 31, 1934.

While the act has not operated just as all of us expected and wished it might have operated, it has nevertheless been of great financial assistance to real estate tax payers in the county. The bill received by the county for the months of July, August, September, October, and 15 days in November was approximately \$28,000, our portion being approximately \$7,000. Finance:

The County closed the year of 1933 with sufficient funds in the treasury to pay all bills presented up to March 15, 1934, or until the Delegation can act upon a balanced budget for 1934. In our judgment, it is not good business to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, until a balanced budget is acted upon by the delegation.

Rcommendations:

The installation of a sprinkler system in the new County Home building will reduce the insurance cost more than 50 per cent and pay for itself in a few years, and at the same time give added protection.

That a committee be appointed to investigate the advisability of moving the County Jail located in Newport to a site near the County Home Almshouse, and sale of the jail property in Newport.

In closing, we wish to thank the Overseers and Selectmen in the several towns for their cooperation in conducting county affairs, and to all people and organizations that have interested themselves in the welfare of our county dependents, we desire to express our appreciation.

### Report of Superintendent and Matron

We respectfully submit to the Sullivan County Commissioners our report for the year 1933.

There is not much of interest to report for the past year. We have tried to carry on with the least expense possible and did so with a cost to the County of about four thousand dollars less than the previous year—1932.

Because of the expected rise in prices we took advantage of the lower prices quoted the beginning of the year and stocked with clothing, sheeting, blankets, hospital and other supplies, thus making our expenditures higher than they would have been with normal buying. Therefore we have nearly enough merchandise bought at that time to carry us through the coming year.

We were obliged to make some changes in our bakery and kitchen because of fire hazards from a pipe running from the kitchen through a closet and the hall to the bakery. The bakery was changed to the room next to the kitchen, formerly used as the women's dining-room, and the old bakery utilized as a women's dining-room, thus making a very light and attractive room for them, and a more convenient bakery, as well as reducing the fire hazards. This work was done by our carpenter, electrician, and plumber, at a minimum cost. Considerable painting has been done throughout the institution and the usual repairs made to keep the buildings in condition.

We wish to thank you, Commissioners, for your co-operation with us in our work. We would like to call attention to the neverfailing interest and kindness of our Chaplain, Miss Ellingwood, and to the efficient and conscientious services of Dr. H. C. Sanders. To the several organizations from Charlestown, Claremont, and Newport we extend our thanks for entertainments given our people. They were appreciated by all. We regret that owing to ill-health our good friend Mr. E. B. Osgood was unable, for the first time in thirty years, to make his annual visit to the County Home, and his cheery greetings and gifts were missed.

We are grateful to our co-workers in and about the institution for helping us to carry on.

### Report of County Solicitor

February 6, 1934.

To the Commissioners of Sullivan County:

Gentlemen:

I submit herewith a report of my duties as Solicitor for Sullivan County from January 1, 1933 to January 1, 1934.

At the February term of Superior Court of 1933, it was necessary to try four cases by a jury, one case being for stealing in which a conviction was obtained, another case for malicious injury to animals in which a conviction was obtained; there was also an appeal case from the Claremont Municipal Court on aggravated assault in which a conviction was obtained; there was an arson case tried and the respondent was acquitted. The acquittal was satisfactory to me as I was never fully satisfied as to his guilt.

During the summer months, there were a large number of liquor cases disposed of in the municipal courts and each one was either a plea of guilty or a conviction. I have had considerable work with various organizations in the matter of dependent and delinquent children and have received a great deal of pleasure from the disposal that was made in these cases.

The coming term of Superior Court will occupy some time in the disposal of several cases of fraud and stealing; there will be a case of attempted rape and possibly a murder case. We have a respondent under arrest at the present time charged with murder in the first degree, as a result of the death of George L. Thomas at Charlestown, New Hampshire. In the investigation of this crime, I was assisted by Mr. Caswell of the State Department and he was very helpful.

At the September term of Court, we had a very interesting trial of two respondents charged with breaking, entry and larceny. These men were both convicted and sentenced to serve from four to six years in the State's Prison.

There has been a large amount of petty crime committed in this county in the last year but the major offenses have been fairly well disposed of and I am satisfied that criminals will think twice before going very far in the county.

I wish to acknowledge the assistance of the Sheriff and his deputies and the various police departments during the past year.
