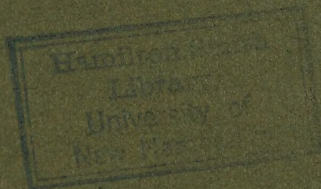

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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To the School Board and Citizens of Surry :

I herein submit my ninth annual report as superintendent of schools.

These days of business depression forcibly impress on us conditions that are difficult to meet. However, we can cope successfully with our environment if we adopt the slogan of economy, thrift and efficiency.

Let us remember that renewed interest should be focused at this time upon the need of efforts to encourage and assist the young people to remain in school. Let us remember the splendid spirit put forth by the teachers of our entire country during this period when financial conditions have caused great hardships. Their attitude has been one of the bright spots in the depression.

Let us not forget functions of our schools must revolve about the creative interests of the child. In the words of President Hoover, "We approach all problems of childhood with affection. Theirs is the province of joy and good humor. They are the most wholesome part of the human race, the sweetest, for they are fresher from the hands of God."

These beautiful words should give us courage and inspiration to carry on and prepare the growing generation in such a way that it may successfully cope with the conditions that await it.

Stanford's Achievement Tests were given; one at mid-year and one at end of year in June. The Otis Standard Graduation examination for elementary schools was given to the eighth grade. All the pupils maintained creditable standing in their respective grades.

The results in all tests showed a normal year's growth in mental attainment and the classes well graded.
