TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Warren in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Warren on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1 To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3 To hear the reports of selectmen and other Town Officers and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 4 To raise and appropriate money for the support of town poor.
- 5 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for construction on the Lake Tarleton Road, provided the State shall appropriate \$3,000.00 for the same purpose.
- 6 To see if the town will accept State aid for Class II construction, and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$844.50; or will accept State aid for the construction of Class V roads, and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$274.24.
- 7 To see what action the town will take in regard to a bonus for Dr. F. J. Kasheta and to pass any vote relating thereto.

- 8 To raise and appropriate money to maintain highways and bridges, and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- 9 To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for White Pine Blister Rust control.
- 10 To raise and appropriate money for town library.
- 11 To raise and appropriate money for Memorial Day.
- 12 To raise and appropriate money for cemeteries and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- 13 To raise and appropriate money for support of fire department.
- 14 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum sufficient to purchase tools and equipment for the town forest fire wardens.
- 15 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum sufficient to paint the town hall.
- 16 To raise and appropriate money to maintain street lights, and to authorize the installation of a light 140 feet west of the Lahue bridge.
- 17 To see what sum of money the town will raise to pay on notes held by F. B. Little.
- 18 To vote on the following question, to-wit: Is it expedient to revise the constitution?
- 19 To see if the town will approve the acquisition by the United States Government of approximately 390 acres of land situated in the town, forming an additional purchase unit of the White Mountain National Forest, and described as follows:

Starting at the southeast corner of Lot 12 Range 2, 2nd Division which is also a point in the 1929 proclaimed Forest Boundary;

Thence westerly along the south line of Lot 12 Range 2 to the southwest corner of said Lot;

Thence northerly along the west lines of Lots 12, 13, 14 and 15 Range 2, 2nd Division to the East Warren Road, so-called;

Thence southwesterly along the East Warren Road to the south line of Lot 14 Range 1, 2nd Division;

Thence westerly along the south line of Lot 14 Range 1, 2nd Division to the southwest corner of said Lot;

Thence northerly along the west line of Lot 14 Range 1, 2nd Division to the northwest corner of said Lot which is also a point in the proclaimed Forest Boundary;

Thence easterly and southerly following the proclaimed Forest Boundary to the point of beginning;

Containing 390 acres, more or less.

- 20 To authorize the selectmen to distribute inventory blanks at the time they examine and appraise taxable property.
- 21 To see if the town will vote to allow discount on taxes on real estate and personal property if paid on or before such time as the town may vote.
- 22 To authorize the selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 23 To raise and appropriate money for other town charges.
- 24 To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

I am glad to call your attention to the fact that the per cent of attendance was higher than for the previous year, and only a little under the state average of 94.75. This record might be improved still further if children having communicable diseases were more strictly kept from others. Below is an extract from Chapter 123 of the Public Laws:

"The parent, guardian, or other person having the custody of a child who is infected with or who has been exposed to a communicable disease shall not permit him to attend either a public or private school.

"Any person who violates any provision of the two preceeding sections shall be fined ten dollars."

Our buildings are in good condition and apparently only in need of the usual minor repairs. If the same number of pupils continue to attend the school in Glencliff, a few more new desks should be purchased.

This year I am glad to report that a hot dish is being served to those pupils in Glencliff who bring their lunches. This activity has been financed and managed through the efforts of the teacher and pupils together with friends in the community. It is a very worth-
