To the inhabitants of the Town of Windsor in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Windsor on Tuesday, the 8th day of March, 1977, the Town Meeting to open at the conclusion of the School District Meeting; which is called for at 6 P.M., to act upon the following subjects.

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To hear reports of Auditors and Agents heretofore chosen and to pass any vote in relation thereto.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,150.00 for highways.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$100.00 for Town mapping.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid on its highways and raise and appropriate \$22.76 as the Town's share.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$250.00 for Police and Fire expenses.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$300.00 for the upkeep of the Town House.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$45.00 for Street Lighting.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$150.00 for the upkeep of the Town Cemeteries.
- 11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.
- 12. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to use all or any amount of surplus to alleviate the tax rate.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$50.00 to donate to the Hillsboro Rescue Squad.

- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,500.00 to be paid to the Town of Hillsboro for the use of the public sanitary receiving station in Hillsboro, N. H.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize with-drawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as setoffs against budget appropriations in the amount indicated, and, further to authorize the Selectmen to make pro rata reductions in the amount if estimated entitlements are reduced or take any other action thereon:

- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$100.00 for legal expenses.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$54.40 as an annual membership fee in the Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and reappropriate \$300.00 to help pay the cost of printing a bicentennial commemorative issue of the History of Windsor.
- 19. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$80.00 to support the Fuller Library in Hillsboro.
- 20. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$30.00 requested by the Contoocook Valley Mental Health Center.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for Fire expenses and to raise and appropriate \$250.00 to be applied thereto, or take any other action in relation thereto.
- 22. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

Since its beginning in 1893, the State Forestry Department has recognized the fact that forest fire prevention and suppression is a joint state and town or city responsibility. Local authorities recommend names of persons to the State Forester, who appoints one person as town or city fire warden and several other persons as town or city deputy fire wardens to a three year term.

The local forest fire warden controls the kindling of all outside fires, when the ground is not covered with snow, by issuing a written permit for kindling a fire. Permits are only issued at such times and in such places as the fire warden deems as safe.

The State Forest Fire Service trains the local forest fire organization in modern forest fire prevention and suppression tactics. The State also provides backup personnel and equipment for suppression and prevention activities.

The combination of State and local forces has resulted in one of the smallest acreage loss due to forest fires in the United States for the past 20 years.

MESSAGE FROM THE WINDSOR SCHOOL BOARD

During the past two years the number of students being tuitioned from Windsor to the Hillsboro-Deering School District has increased from thirteen to sixteen. No additional increase in enrollment is anticipated for the coming year.

Our cost per student has increased only slightly over the same two year period, primarily due to a large savings in the cost of transportation. We negotiated a school bus contract with Hillsboro which has enabled us to save the Town \$2,283. in school expenses, and reduce the total annual assessment by \$1,753. for the 1977 fiscal year. We have also established a clear-cut written formula for determining bus transportation costs in the future. The cost will be determined each year at the beginning of September, based on the total number of miles travelled in Windsor, multiplied by the transporter's cost per mile, plus \$100. per Windsor student transported.

The Windsor tuition cost per student is based on State average tuition figures plus a local administrative cost, and has increased from \$936.16 to \$1,000.79 at Elementary level, and from \$1,172.16 to \$1,271.79 at High School level.

Our contribution to the administration cost of Supervisory Union 24 has remained constant.

We are pleased to report that a good tutoring program was arranged for Charlotte Houghton during her long recovery after a serious operation. We are happy to report that her recovery has been faster than expected and that she is doing very well. Special thanks go to Peg Marriott for her conscientious work as supervisor and teacher in the tutoring program, and to Keith Marriott and Steve Hahn for their generous contribution of teaching time.

As Board members we have been active on several SU 24 committees. Mildred Houghton has served this year as a representative to the Special Education Committee, while Richard Herman has been working as a member of the Staff Development and Building Study Committees, the latter formed for the purpose of assessing the need for renovation and/or construction of new school facilities in Hillsboro.

SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS REPORT

Although the national economy has been in constant flux with increasing prices and heavy unemployment, the public services have continued uninterrupted. The public schools reflect, to an extent, our economy with emphasis on tight budget control, stringent salary negotiations and keeping at a minimum educational program changes and capital expenditures for new equipment.

Our schools are operating very well with an excellent professional and para-professional staff, good instructional programs and objective evaluation of student progress. We again have an overall increase in enrollment with facilities severely strained in some instances.

As has been the case for years, legislation, court decisions and funding have created changes in educational operation. Title IX has at last guaranteed equal rights with equal opportunity for girls in school and women in teaching and administration including equality of pay. Court decisions have placed responsibility for special services for learning handicapped children upon the local school district with very limited availability of State funding to assist multiple handicapped cases. The question of Federal funding for Title programs and School Lunch programs persists year after year pending the whims of Congress. However, in spite of inconsistent funding, many extremely important changes have come about greatly benefiting our children by providing programs and assistance for special needs.

At the conclusion of this school year I will be terminating my duties and responsibilities as Superintendent of Supervisory Union #24. The five year tour has gone by rapidly and I look back with mixed emotions on these years. Many good changes have come about and so many things need to be done but I have had the good fortune to have dedicated school administrators and staff in the several schools working hard to improve instructional programs and educational opportunities. I thank you the overall citizenry for your interest, concern and willingness in funding and assisting educational improvement.
