## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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To the Inhabitants of the Town of Woodstock, in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Woodstock on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire such sums of money as may be necessary to defray expenses in anticipation of taxes.

4. To see what discount will be allowed on taxes paid on or before the first day of September and if the sum of twenty cents shall be added to each poll tax not paid on or before September 15th.

5. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as posted.

6. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to sell property taken on tax title.

7. To see if the Town will vote to accept sums of money received from persons for perpetual care of cemetery lots.

8. To see if the Town will vote to move the library from the High School Building.

9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the construction of a new hospital in Plymouth, N. H.

10. To see what action the Town will take towards increasing the capacity of the North Woodstock Reservoir.

11. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a curfew.
12. To see if the Town will vote to build roads to the river for fire fighting purposes.
13. To see if the Town will vote to extend the summer water line from the Fairview Hotel to the residence of Harry Nelson.
14. To see what action the Town will take in regards to rescinding the vote taken at the Annual Town Meeting of March, 1947; "To appropriate \$1000 for a monument to the service men and women of World War II" and vote to expend this sum towards the erection of the Athletic Building for a Memorial to the service men and women of World War II.
15. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

8. To see if the District will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the District, as determined by the School Board in its annual report.
9. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the purpose of insulating the High School Building.

10. To see if the district will authorize the school board to study the feasibility of the Woodstock School District becoming a member of a cooperative school district request the State Board of Education to assist in the preparation of a plan for the proposed cooperative school district and prepare a complete report to the school district for presentation at either a special meeting called in accordance with the New Hampshire Revised Laws, Chapter 139, or at the next annual school district meeting.

11. To see if the district will raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$150.00 to be used by the school board in the preparation of the report so voted in Article 10.

#### Scholarships

For pupils wishing to get better than passing marks home study is necessary. The eight period day used by Woodstock High School allows the pupils to do some of their studying in school, but studying should and must be taken home in order to receive credit marks or better. A ninth period is now conducted for all of those pupils who receive warnings. This period is for the purpose of studying and extra help from the teacher if necessary.

#### Extra Curricular

Touch football, volley ball and deck tennis were played by the majority of the pupils during the Fall months. A skating rink has been constructed and will be in use as soon as the weather permits. A skiing team for both boys and girls will be organized and skiing lessons will be given if conditions permit. Thanks to the Lincoln School Board, we are able to have the Lincoln Gym one night a week for basketball. This is not to organize any team, but merely a period for instruction and intramural games. Baseball

for both boys and girls will be played in the spring. Due to the ruling of the New Hampshire Headmasters Association, no pupil is allowed to participate in any sport who is failing more than one subject.

The annual Senior play, "Hello Trouble," was presented in November.

The school socials have picked up in attendance during the past months. Square dancing as well as ballroom dancing is part of the evening entertainment. The socials are chaperoned by the teachers of the school.

#### Graduates

There were seven graduates last June. One is attending college, one married, three are employed, and two unemployed.

#### Teachers

We are most fortunate this year to have a fine group of teachers throughout the building, and it is my hope that the salaries will be sufficient to induce them to stay.

For the teaching staff and myself, I wish to thank everyone connected with the schools for their helpful cooperation.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

---

To the Woodstock School Board:

My sixth annual report as superintendent of Woodstock schools is now submitted for your consideration. In it you will find a discussion of school problems and information that may be helpful in shaping future school policy.

For the second consecutive year we began the term with a complete change in the High School faculty. Lack of continuity of service is usually a severe handicap in the administration of any school but fortunately its effects have not been felt this year. It is a pleasure to report that in my opinion your high school is being more efficiently operated than at any other time since 1943. There seems to be a more enthusiastic interest in the community, and, in general, pupils seem to be more appreciative of the opportunities that are made available to them. Leadership and sincerity on the part of the headmaster have contributed largely to this situation.

While the high school is being operated efficiently it is not, and cannot be, operated economically with a student membership as limited as ours. The per pupil cost of operation is high. That cost will always be high so long as certain fixed charges are spread over a small pupil base. Those charges would be no greater if incurred for a maximum pupil registration. These are some of the considerations that make me hesitate to suggest some additions to our school program that would be entirely praiseworthy and advisable in a larger school. We cannot be unmindful that schools like businesses should maintain a proper balance between investment and output, between stock in trade and their clientele.

Over the state as a whole more and more thought is being given to ways and means of making school dollars buy more services and greater educational re-



turns. One of the ways in which it can be done is by a pooling of resources by several school districts instead of continuing individual and isolated efforts. A law permitting the establishment of cooperative school districts was passed by the 1947 Legislature and seems to offer one solution to the problem. Perhaps by the time this report is in print, Woodstock people will have given careful thought to this way of enlarging school returns as delineated in the above mentioned law. If such is not the case, then those possibilities ought to be thoroughly explored.

The School Board is to be commended for progressive and constructive thinking which grew into an offer to increase by one hundred dollars the salary of any elementary teacher who completed approved work in a 1948 summer school. Every elementary teacher completed such work with benefit both to themselves and to their pupils. Summer school attendance, with proper financial recognition, might profitably be required of all teachers once in every three year period.

School districts, like families, sometimes find that increasing numbers overtax both living quarters and budgets. That realization has come to Woodstock in at least two schools. Registration at the Center and in the primary room at North Woodstock cannot be increased beyond present numbers without serious consequences. In fact, this is the second year that grade one and two membership at North Woodstock has gone beyond the number one teacher should be expected to direct. 1948 census returns indicate that large entering classes may be expected for several years.

The unused room at the Center School gives us space in which to absorb some of the increase in school population if another teacher can be employed. The use of that room may well lead to transportation problems and decisions that will be unpopular but it seems to offer the only immediate solution to the problem of serious overcrowding. Temporary inconvenience is to be preferred to permanent loss that may come to pupils who are assigned to lower grade groups of unworkable size. Unless we so expand our school space

it may be necessary to adopt half-day sessions in some schools.

Music instruction in six of the seven towns in Supervisory Union No. 48 is being given by Stephen E. Childs of Rumney who devotes his entire time to that work. Since his whole time instead of half of it is now available for work in this Union, our children are receiving more instruction in this important branch of education. We hope the same plan may be followed as long as present arrangements remain mutually satisfactory. It is with great satisfaction that I see Woodstock pupils benefitting from a kind of training that would have meant so much to me if my own school experience had afforded me the opportunity that is now theirs.

Your attention is directed to reports written by Headmaster Gilman and the School Nurse in which specific needs and suggestions are presented.

My continued service in your schools confirms earlier estimates of the interest of Woodstock parents, willingness of the town to meet its full educational obligations, and the sincere efforts of the school board members. For all assistance and courtesies extended to me my appreciation is here expressed.
