

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

Hillsborough, ss.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Antrim, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town, on the 11th day of March, 1947 at 10:00 o'clock in the morning, to act on the following subjects:

The polls will open at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon and close at 4:00 o'clock in the afternoon.

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers, Agents and Trustees for the ensuing year.
- 2. To hear the report of the Auditors on the Town Officers' accounts, and act thereon.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower its Selectmen to borrow such sums as may be necessary in anticipation of Taxes.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$150.00 to assist the William M. Myers Post, No. 50, American Legion, and Ephraim Weston Post, No. 87, G. A. R., in properly observing Memorial Day.

- 5. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$605.17 in order to obtain from the State Highway Department the sum of \$2,420.66 to be used for Town Road Aid.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Dollars, (\$400.00) for the purpose of rebuilding and tarring Wallace Street, or take any action thereon.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) for the purpose of rebuilding and tarring Grove Street from North Main Street to the bridge on Great Brook.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 to rebuild and tar surface Jameson Avenue, or take any action thereon.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 for improvement of White Birch Point road so called or take any action thereon.
- 10. To see how much money the Town will appropriate for the repair of Roads and Bridges for the ensuing year.
- 11. To see how much money the Town will appropriate for snow removal for the ensuing year,
- 12. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for surface treatment and maintenance of tar roads.

- 13. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$65.00 to provide for the suitable care and maintenance of Public Cemeteries within its confines, which are not otherwise provided for, as required by Chapter 68, of The Revised Laws.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.
- 15. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to secure the assistance of the State Tax Commission in reappraising the taxable property in the town in order to secure greater equality as between taxpayers, and to insure the assessment of all property in the town on the same standard of value, and to raise and appropriate money to pay for the same.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to continue work on the Town tax map.
- 17. To see how much the Town will raise and appropriate for Town Bridge Aid for the ensuing year in accordance with chapter 188 of the laws of 1945 or take any action thereon.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Dollars, (\$400.00) for the control of White Pine Blister rust; the money to be spent under the supervision of the State Forestry Department and local help to be employed; the State to augment this amount by 25 percent or take any action thereon.

- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$124.00 to the Monadnock Region Association of Scenic New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with the other thirty-seven Towns in the Monadnock Region.
- 20. To see how much money the Town will vote for the care of Parks and Playgrounds for the ensuing year.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to reimburse Antrim Precinct for expenses of the Fire Department in amount of \$1,003.49 or take any action thereon.
- 22. To see how much money the Town will appropriate for Street Lighting for the ensuing year, or take any action thereon.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$184.27 to eradicate the poison ivy in the most infested places along the sidewalks or roadsides in town, or take any other action thereon.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$1,200.00) to rebuild the sidewalk on the west side of Main Street beginning at the Town Hall and extending to the Southeast corner of Goodell Company factory office building; the money to be raised and set aside in a special fund and expended as provided for in Chapter 160 of the Public Laws of 1943 as amended in 1945; or take any action thereon.

- 25. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to be used towards the purchase and installation of a new heating system in the James A. Tuttle Library.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to have the Invoices and Taxes printed, and raise and appropriate \$150.00 for this purpose.
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to have the Chief of Police appointed by the Selectmen or Town Officers instead of elected by ballot.
- 28. To see if the Town will vote to have all future tax bills itemized giving the amount of tax on each parcel of real estate as listed on the Town books.
- 29. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 to repair and redecorate the Post Office or take any action thereon.
- 30. To see how much money the Town will raise for statutory requirements and to carry the above Articles and Appropriations of the School Meeting into effect.
 - 31. To hear reports of Committees, and act thereon.
- 32. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE

JAMES H. TUTTLE LIBRARY

In the past year the Trustees of the James A. Tuttle Library have endeavored to improve the building and facilities for the benefit of all those in Town who enjoy them. The interior paint and windows have been washed and floors oiled. The shrubbery in front of the Library has been pruned and replacements made. We have disposed of several hundred old books no longer in delamand, thereby making room in the stacks for newer volumes.

Included in our recent purchases are sixty childrens' books, two hundred and sixty-one adult fiction and sixty non-fiction. Among the new reference books are "Who's Who in America", "Oxford Companion to American Literature," "Webster's Dictionary of Synonyms" and "Webster's Biographical Dictionary". We are especially proud of our juvenile magazine collection of eight good periodicals.

In observance of Book Week in November a story hour was enjoyed by the younger children and a Book Week play was presented by the Brownies. Later in the week Miss Pauline Whitney spoke to the older group on New Hampshire authors and some of the new books.

Our circulation figure of 8,385 divided among 275 borrowers is gratifying, and we hope many more Townspeople will take advantage of the Library's services' in the coming year.

Further improvements in the near future are being planned. It is hoped that we can tie in with the school to provide added reference material for the students and an attempt will be made to bring our scientific material up to date.

Urgently needed in the immediate future is a new heating system to provide adequate coverage of the whole building, including the stack room, which at present is barely useable in cold weather. With proper heat throughout the building the second floor can be used to more advantage for reading rooms, group study and story telling.

In addition the interior of the reading rooms and the rooms upstairs should be completely redecorated. These two projects, at an estimated cost of \$4,500 would require about \$2,500 more than is now available in Library funds, and for that reason an article has been inserted in the Town Warrant to see if the Town will appropriate \$2,500 to be used for a new heating plant and renovating the Library.

Our Town's Library should be for everyone's enjoyment and edification. Any suggestions for additional books or material improvement will be carefully considered.

I herewith submit my report as Headmaster of Antrim High School.

Joanne Griffin entered the University of New Hampshire in September; Jacqueline Miner is attending the Hickcock Secretarial School in Boston; Shirley Fuglestad is employed by the telephone company in Peterboro; and Natalie Hollis has employment in Waltham, Massachusetts.

It is generally accepted that the purpose of the schools is to prepare the pupils to take full and active part in the life of the community and state. If this is to be carried on successfully, attention must be given to what is taught. Hence, a continual program of curriculum revision is required in order that the materials in use may be changed in response to fundamental changes in society outside the school, or may be changed as research finds new materials of social significance for school use.

In pursuing our policy of providing the greatest possible educational opportunity for the boys and girls of Antrim, after considerable research and thought it was found advisable to revise the program of studies on the high school level and to departmentalize the instruction for the seventh and eighth grades. These changes met with the commendation of the State Board of Education and now we have, in addition to a Class A Senior High School, a state approved Junior High School. The major changes were the addition of two new departments of

instruction, namely home economics and industrial arts. The school board and superintendent deserve credit for providing adequate facilities for such instruction. A complete list of course being offered in Antrim High and Junior High Schools with their enrollment follows:

Additional courses in science, social studies, mathematics, home economics, industrial arts, language, and commerce will alternate with certain of the above, providing as broad a course of study as is found in many considerably larger schools in the state.

Instruction in vocal and orchestral music is provided weekly by Mr. Herman Hills. Last spring under the direction of Mr. Kenneth Jewett of Sharon, the Antrim High School Glee Club was organized. This group had the distinction of becoming the first federated High School Glee Club in New Hampshire. The club has become an important activity and has appeared publicly in Antrim and nearby towns on numerous occasions. Much credit is due Mr. Jewett and Mr. Hill for their interest and efforts in carrying on this project.

Early in the fall term the Junior High and elementary school enrollment was augmented by the arrival of 34 pupils from the North Branch. We were pleased to have them as a part of our school body and in a remarkly ably short time they adjusted themselves to our program.

The scope of our high school athletic program has been considerably broadened in the past year. Baseball was added and a series of games was scheduled and played. In addition a softball team for the girls was organized as a spring activity. This fall the boys played touch football on an informal basis. This winter the boys and girls basketball teams became members of the Southern New Hampshire Interscholastic League. This has greatly stimulated interest and participation in the sport.

Other highlights in extra curricular activities have been a series of six school dances, an evening of one act plays, educational trips to Concord, Manchester, Boston, Fox State Forest, picnics and a mountain trip.

"'Snews" continues to play an important part in the development of English composition and affords extensive secretarial practice.

Perhaps the greatest advancement of the year has been the establishment of a noon lunch program. This program, since its instigation in January, has accommodated more than a hundred pupils from all grades each week. Children for a small fee are able to obtain a well-balanced meal. Credit is due the Odd Fellows, Mrs. Howard Humphrey, Mrs. George Warren, their School Board and Superintendent McCormack for their efforts in establishing and maintaining this program.

GENERAL REPORT

At this time of year when we are considering appropriations and plans for the next school year, it is well to consider carefully what we have accomplished with the current budget, in terms of the educational goals of the community. It has been said that there is a purpose, conscious or unconscious, behind every act of the schools which our pupils attend. In every lesson which is taught, every new problem or course introduced, every field trip, every game taught, every group meeting of pupils, every public meeting, every board meeting, some purpose is served. Commonly, the great difficulties of the school is the fact that its purposes are often not clearly though through. There is probably no way, in which schools can be improved nor at less cost than through intelligent discussion which develops and clarifies sound purposes. My plea to all is that as these reports are studied, each person determine for himself. to acquire a clearer understanding of the purposes of American education and make sound application of such knowledge to thoughts and practices at the local level.

Education in Antrim has made considerable progress during the past year when compared with modern goals. The nearly lethal effects of the defeatist prep-school adherents has been somewhat overcome although it will still take time to heal all the wounds in this important heritage of Antrim children—their school. The major accomplishments of the year have been well accepted by grateful parents. Mr. Dresser in his usual masterful manner has ably covered most of them in his Headmaster's report, which allows this report to shift to future plans.

The important thing is of course the budget. This is necessarily larger than before because of tremendous-

ly increased costs and also due to the need of hastily overcoming a backlog of needs such as the motion picture projector and record player and new courses. The Home Economics Laboratory and the Shop also need considerable more equipment to be effective learning units. The voters of the District showed us clearly that they wanted an energetic school program and that is what we're planning on. The teachers have been not too well paid this year. Their work has been exceedingly satisfactory and they should be retained. The budget provides for salaries which will more nearly insure their return or give us funds with which to fairly well compete with other schools in the teacher market.

The question of the purchase of the building now housing our shop needs to be considered carefully. It serves our purpose well and could be used more extensively if we owned it. Certain fundamental insulating and heating problems could be solved if it were purchased by the District. Even if a new schoolhouse is built soon, the purchase price of the shop could always be redeemed and our improvements would be salvaged through a higher price. Too many communities are forever putting such problems aside with the idea that someday things will be different. Progress can be more definite when it is the result of definite action.

The problem of a new schoolhouse is constantly recurring. An able committee to thoroughly study the problem could do the community a tremendous service at this time. There are so many contributing issues involved that such a committee would need at least a year to show any results. Such a study should precede any large expenditure of money on the present building which must soon be expensively overhauled if it is to be long continued in service.

We are exceedingly grateful for the outstanding contributions in good-will and funds made by local organizations, to the school. This cooperative spirit gives pupils, teachers and school board areat inspiration and aspires them to higher achievement. Remarkable contributions have been made by the Women's Club, Antrim W. R. C., the Grange, the I. O. O. F., and the American Legion. We should acknowledge also the close cooperation of the Selectmen and particularly the Highway Agent, Elmer Merrill, Then there is Mr. Kenneth Jewett, Mrs. Howard Humphries, Mrs. Mary Warren and numerous other individuals. Mr. Carroll Johnson, chairman of the Board, contributed innumerable hours of skilled labor in intricate electrical installations and in building the Home Economics Laboratory. The teachers and townspeople have all gone "overboard" to give the Antrim School the boost it so sorely needed. It takes more of this kind of enthusiasm to keep modern schools in operation. We should not let them slump because of lack of our attention now.

In conclusion I wish to thank-the voters of the district for electing to their board such capable and sincere people as Chairman Johnson, Miss Brooks and Mr. Swett. It has been a joy to work for them. Thanks also, to the parents who have cooperated to make the year pleasant for the teachers, so that the associations of the pupils in school may be profitable and stable.
