THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Barnstead in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

[L. S.]

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Barnstead on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

4. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on property taxes paid two weeks after approval of tax rate by the State Tax Commission.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to buy liability insurance on town labor and pay same out of the Highway Department.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 for the Concord Hospital.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 for the Pittsfield Town Dump.

8. (BY PETITION) To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$4,000.00 to continue the repairs to the Town Hall. Specifically the ceiling, new flourescent lighting and tile flooring. Providing two Fire Exits, (Authorization made — this work to be subject to advertising public competitive bid, and to prepare contract specifications. (Not Recommended).

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the Town Clerk's Salary from \$100.00 to \$300.00 or do anything related thereto.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for one or more sanders for the Highway Department or do anything related thereto.

11. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers hertofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE OSCAR FOSS MEMORIAL LIBRARY

The trustees of the Oscar Foss Memorial Library are pleased to report that many important innovations have been introduced during the past year.

We feel that the most important event in the past year is the Library Survey that has been conducted for our library by members of the State Library. A long range program of improvements have resulted from this survey and in due time our library will be adequate for a community of this size.

The State Library has kindly sent several long term loan collections for our use and the Bookmobile has also left fine collections of fiction and reference material to help fill our shelves.

The students of the Barnstead Elementary School visit the library in a body one day a month under the supervision of several teachers to learn library procedure and to choose books for their class libraries.

Our library has made such progress in the past few years that we were honored to have one of our trustees lead a discussion group on "Libraries in Towns of 100 to 1200" at the N. H. Library Trustees Convention held in Concord in October using her experience as a guide for the discussions held.

An important factor in the upgrading of our library has been the formation of a Friends of the Library Group. They aid the library and trustees in many ways. They have made use of themselves as volunteer librarians to keep the library open for longer periods of time, they have purchased and installed new lighting fixtures and have held Story Programs for the smaller children of the community on Saturday mornings. They have given us the courage to keep on with our projected plans when it was most needed. This coming year we plan to add new reference material and subject matter books to better aid students in their reference work. We hope to enhance the appearance of the interior to make it more inviting to the student writing a term paper or the adult or child looking for recreational reading.

The work this past year has been most gratifying and we look forward to a more active and progressive year. Our sincere wish is to help our library meet the needs of the growing community.

The ever present threat of forest fires is the concern of all of us; the responsibility for preventing them is ours and the costs of extinguishing are ours. We can do something about this problem, by being aware of and alert to the danger and by cooperating with your warden.

Do the things that are required of you —

1. Follow the warden's directions.
2. Secure the required burning permit.
3. Keep your fires under control.
4. Completely extinguish your fires before leaving them.
5. See that your children are properly cautioned.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Barnstead:

I respectfully submit my first annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

Staff

School began in September, 1961, with two new teachers. Mrs. Charles Kipp, of Oil City, Pennsylvania, was hired to teach grade three. Mrs. Kipp replaces Mrs. Mary Louise Robinson who resigned in June. Mr. Parker Tobin, of Chichester, New Hampshire, was hired as principal and teacher for grades seven and eight. Mr. Tobin replaces Mr. Robert Hopewell who resigned to accept a teaching position in Alton.

There is one factor that every parent should recognize as contributing most to the success or failure of our schools. This is the quality of teaching. We are indeed fortunate in having the majority of our teachers remain with us to give the system stability, which will ultimately reflect in the quality of instruction. I hope we may continue to strive toward maintaining a stable teacher situation through both friendly relationships and salaries competitive with other New Hampshire School Districts.

Enrollment and Space Needs

We presently have a total enrollment of 147 children in grades 1-8. Previous enrollment projections have not held up according to our most recent census figures. The reason for this is due to the unanticipated influx of new families whose children have naturally increased our enrollment. A revised projection is provided below:

From the chart you will notice that the 1962-63 enrollment will reach 159 in the first eight grades. This is 16 more children than was anticipated in any previous projection. These numbers certainly justify an additional teacher if we are to continue providing proper instruction for our children. The most desirable solution would be to add one teacher and assign the classes as follows:

Grade 1 — 25 children) Teacher A — 25 students

Grade 2 — 16 children) Teacher B — 26 students

Grade 3 — 10 children)

Grade 3 — 10 children) Teacher C — 22 students

Grade 4 — 12 children)

Grade 4 — 13 children) Teacher D — 27 students

Grade 5 — 14 children)

Grade 6 — 18 children)

Grade 7 — 22 children) Teacher E and F — 59 stud.

Grade 8 — 19 children)

Under this plan we would propose departmentalizing the sixth, seventh, and eighth grades in order to better meet the needs of the junior high school student.

The elementary school curriculum has traditionally stressed the skills and attitudes basic to learning, as well as that knowledge which has itself been considered basic. The pressure has increased toward stressing further the knowledge aspect of the curriculum. This has been accomplished by introducing more content from academic fields such as science, mathematics, and social studies. Elementary teachers, particularly those who teach the upper elementary grades need substantial knowledge of the subjects they teach. Departmentalizing, therefore, appears attractive. By departmentalizing, or sharing the teaching between two teachers in grades 6, 7, and 8 we would, in effect, be able to provide the student with more specialized instruction and at the same time relieve the class size in any one subject. One teacher would teach all the social studies and English, the other would handle all mathematics and science, thereby enabling both teachers to specialize in a specific area rather than trying to prepare in all curriculum areas for their particular class.

I strongly recommend that the citizens of Barnstead give this proposal their careful consideration. There is no provision in the new budget for adding another teacher which would be essential if we would follow this plan.

The best arrangement of classes with the present number of teachers would be as follows:

Grade 1 — 25 children)	Teacher A — 30 students
Grade 2 — 5 children)	
Grade 2 — 11 children)	Teacher B — 31 students
Grade 3 — 20 children)	
Grade 4 — 25 children)	Teacher C — 39 students
Grade 5 — 14 children)	
Grade 6 — 18 children)	
Grade 7 — 22 children)	Teacher D and E — 59 stud.
Grade 8 — 19 children)	

You will recognize that the numbers in each class exceed that which is considered to be desirable, especially in a multigrade situation such as we have in Barnstead.

The problem with space is naturally evident, and I can only suggest that when a teacher is added we convert the present All-purpose room to a classroom, until such time that an additional room can be provided.

School For Exceptional Children

Barnstead is now in its second year of participation in the South Wolfeboro School for retarded children. This school was started in September 1960 and is now in its second year of operation.

The assignment of pupils to this special class followed the administration of special tests, intensive study of each pupils educational record, teacher consultations, and parent conferences. The pupils selected are being provided instruction according to their ability and level of achievement. This type of instruction could not be provided in regular classrooms without taking a disproportionate amount of time from the regular course of study.

We now have two classrooms at South Wolfeboro and two specially trained teachers. The present enrollment is 24, and is made up of children from Pittsfield, Barnstead, Alton, New Durham, Wolfeboro, Tuftonboro, and Ossipee, with the costs shared equally according to the number of students sent from each district.

The cost may at first appear high when compared to educational costs for regular students, however, if an exceptional child can be trained to provide his financial needs as an adult, there is a great saving to society, not only in terms of manpower and human resources, but in terms of cold cash which some form of taxation must provide to otherwise care for an unproductive citizen. Exceptional children can be trained to be self supporting and with reasonable protective laws they can make their contribution to society.

Repairs and Replacements

Our school, being relatively new, is in very fine condition. Last summer we did have the outside doors painted as they were beginning to show some effects from the elements. Some touching up inside the building was also done, along with the general cleaning during the summer months. I recommend that we continue to put a reasonable sum of money into the upkeep of our building each year so that we may continue to keep the school and equipment in the best condition possible.

Finances

I trust that every one will study the tables of statistics regarding expenses and income carefully. The School Boards requests are minimal and have been arrived at

by not only considering educational needs, but also with full recognition of the cost to the individual taxpayer. Pittsfield has raised the tuition for high school students to their actual per pupil cost. The tuition for next year will be \$435.00 per pupil. This is not unreasonable when we look at costs in neighboring towns. The Pittsfield tuition rate is based on their actual cost and also corresponds to the State average for high school education.

We should all recognize that larger enrollments, increased instructional costs, and the inflated dollar require a larger appropriation than last year even if we are to maintain the same services that we are presently providing.

I am most grateful for the confidence you have shown me in allowing me to return to this area as your Superintendent of Schools, after having lived with you as a neighbor, a teacher, and a principal. I will continue to place foremost the welfare of your children in fulfilling my duties to the best of my ability.
