TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L. s.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bedford, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

ARTICLE I. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ART. II. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.

ART. III. To raise and appropriate such sums of money for the support of the poor, for Memorial Day, highways and bridges, and for any other necessary expense of the Town.

ART. IV. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand one hundred and eighty-eight dollars and fifty cents (\$2,188.50) for State Aid Construction, the State to furnish two thousand one hundred and eighty-eight dollars (\$2,188).

ART. V. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand one hundred dollars (\$2,100) for State Aid Maintenance, the State to furnish three thousand one hundred and fifty dollars (\$3,150).

ART. VI. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand three hundred dollars (\$2,300) for Trunk Line Maintenance, the State to furnish four thousand six hundred dollars (\$4,600).

ART. VII. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 to gravel the Jenkins Road, so called, beginning at the end of the present gravel and continuing south.

ART. VIII. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 to gravel the road between Farley's Shop and Whitney's Corner.

ART. IX. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 to gravel the road leading by Gustave Pearson's, beginning at the Merrimack line and going north.

ART. X. To see if the Town will vote to paint the Town Hall and raise and appropriate money for the same.

ART. XI. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 for the purpose of continuing the control of the white pine blister rust.

ART. XII. To see if the Town will vote to buy additional snow equipment and raise and appropriate money for the same.

ART. XIII. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50 more than is required by law for the Town Library.

ART. XIV. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15 for the care of the clock on the church.

ART. XV. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for the care of the New Cemetery.

ART. XVI. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10 for the care of the Old Cemetery on the Back River Road.

ART. XVII. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7 for the care of the South Cemetery on the Beal's Road.

ART. XVIII. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50 as compensation for a Clerk of the Municipal Court.

ART. XIX. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15 for the care of Joppa Cemetery.

ART. XX. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 to pay up on notes.

ART. XXI. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of money necessary to maintain street lights for the ensuing year.

ART. XXII. To see if the Town will vote to use the Australian Ballot system in voting hereafter for its Town Officers.

ART. XXIII. To hear the report of the committee on investigation of the advisability of having a public health nurse and to raise and appropriate money for same.

ART. XXIV. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on early payment of taxes, and if so, to fix the time and rate.

ART. XXV. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money if needed.

ART. XXVI. To see if the Town will vote to pay for the bonds required for Town Officers.

ART. XXVII. To see if the Town will vote to buy 500 feet of fire hose, and raise and appropriate the sum of money necessary for same.

ART. XXVIII. To see if the Town will vote to enact the following ordinance:

BE IT ENACTED BY THE TOWN OF BEDFORD IN
ANNUAL MEETING ASSEMBLED:

1. **SALE OF FIREWORKS PROHIBITED.** No person, firm or corporation shall sell, offer or expose for sale, any fireworks, toy pistols or other toy firearms for the explosion of percussion caps or blank cartridges, without first obtaining a license therefor as hereinafter provided.

2. **APPLICATION FOR LICENSE.** Any person, firm or corporation may apply to the Selectmen for a license to sell fireworks, toy pistols and toy firearms, such application being in writing and containing the full name and address of the applicant and a description of the premises upon which it is proposed to sell fireworks, toy pistols or toy firearms, and such other information as the Selectmen may from time to time designate.

3. **LICENSE.** If in the opinion of the Selectmen the applicant is qualified to receive a license and the premises where the fireworks are proposed to be sold will not in their opinion constitute an undue hazard or nuisance to others, then the Selectmen, upon receipt by them of a fee of \$10, may issue a license permitting the applicant to sell fireworks, toy pistols and toy firearms, upon the premises specified in the application, but not elsewhere.

4. **RECORD.** The Selectmen shall keep in a book provided by them, the names and addresses of all such licensees, the date of issue of the license and a description of the premises where the fireworks are licensed to be sold.

5. **EXPIRATION OF THE LICENSE.** The Selectmen may revoke the license provided in this by-law at any time provided that if such revocation takes place before July 1 of the calendar year in which the license is issued, they pay or tender to the licensee, the sum of \$10; if revoked on or after July 1, they shall pay or tender to the licensee the sum of \$5. The license issued under this by-law unless sooner revoked as here-

inafter provided, shall expire at midnight on December 31 of the calendar year in which it was issued.

6. PENALTY. Any person selling fireworks, toy pistols or toy firearms in the Town of Bedford, without having previously obtained a license as herein provided, except duly authorized agents or servants of a licensed person, firm or corporation, shall be fined not more than \$10 for the first offense and not more than \$50 for any subsequent offense.

7. TAKES EFFECT. This by-law shall take effect upon its passage.

ART. XXIX. To see if the Town will vote to accept one hundred dollars (\$100) in trust from the late Imogene M. Buswell, the interest to be used for the care of the Eugene Buswell lot in the New Cemetery.

ART. XXX. To see if the Town will vote to accept one hundred dollars (\$100) in trust from the late Charles E. Bursiel, the interest to be used for the care of his lot in the New Cemetery.

ART. XXXI. To see if the Town will vote to accept one hundred dollars (\$100) in trust from Dennis R. Chase, the interest to be used for the care of his lot in the New Cemetery.

ART. XXXII. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money for Firemen's Relief for Manchester and Merrimack.

ART. XXXIII. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the old Mill Road, so called, from a point near E. K. Wheeler's, to the Joppa Hill Road at C. F. Jordan's.

ART. XXXIV. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the cross-road leading from a point near John Royer's to the Wire Road, so called.

ART. XXXV. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Holbrook Road, so called, leading from Edward Reidel's to the road leading by Arthur Lull land.

ART. XXXVI. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Schwartz Road, so called, leading from the Joppa Hill Road to the Amherst line.

ART. XXXVII. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road leading from the Fred Parkhurst place, northwest to the Amherst line.

ART. XXXVIII. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, and all other officers heretofore chosen, and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

ANNUAL MEETING, 1930

The annual meeting of the Bedford School District was held at the Town Hall on Wednesday, March 4, 1930, at 2 P. M. The following officers were re-elected for the ensuing year:

Moderator, William Melendy.

Clerk of School District, Alice G. Fosher.

Treasurer, William S. Manning.

Mr. A. J. McKelvie was elected a member of the school board for three years, and the town auditors were elected school auditors for the ensuing year.

The district voted to adopt the budget of \$12,591.93 recommended by the school board.

The Medical Inspection Act was dismissed on recommendation of the school board.

The district voted to repair the roof of No. 2 school house.

The district voted to authorize the school board to sell the land and buildings of the Nos. 2, 3, 4 and 5 schools.

Meeting adjourned until March 12, at 2 o'clock, in the Town Hall.

THE SCHOOL YEAR

A meeting of the new school board was held after the district meeting. The board organized for the year 1930-1931, with Mr. H. S. Wonsou as chairman and Mrs. Bertha E. French as clerk.

A meeting of the supervisory union was held at the Goffstown High School building on May 13. Mr. J. Byron Tarney

was again unanimously re-elected superintendent of schools in the union at the same salary of \$3,400.00. Each district pays one quarter, or \$350.00, of the excess salary of \$1,400.

The year 1930 closed an important era in the history of the schools of Bedford. With the completion of the new three-room Peter P. Woodbury School every school child in the Town of Bedford could attend one of three modern buildings—the Stevens Buswell School in Bedford Center, built in 1921, and serving districts 1, 2, part of 5, 9, and 10; the unnamed new No. 6 school, built in 1923, serving districts 6, 7 and 8; or the new Peter P. Woodbury School, built in 1930, and serving districts 3, 4, part of 5, and 11.

Because of the importance of the matter and the small number of voters present at the regular school meeting held on March 5, action on Article 10 of the warrant “to see if the district will vote to build a new schoolhouse for the Nos. 3, 4, 5 and 11 districts and raise and appropriate money for the same” was postponed until after the annual town meeting. A special meeting, for which every effort was made to secure full attendance of the voters of the town, was held in the Town Hall on March 12, at 2 o’clock in the afternoon. After con-

siderable debate the district voted to build the new school and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$18,000 for the purpose.

A Building Committee was elected consisting of the School Board—Mrs. Bertha French, Mrs. McKelvie and Mr. Wonson—together with the committee which had assisted in the selection of the site for the new building—Mrs. Clarence Crowell, Mrs. William Melendy and Mr. Edmund B. Hull. Mr. Lyman Kinson and Mr. Clarence Crowell were afterwards added to the committee by the vote of the committee itself, and the Superintendent of Schools, Mr. J. Byron Tarney, also served as an *ex-officio* member. At the first meeting of the committee Mr. Edmund B. Hull was elected chairman.

After careful consideration of all suggested sites, the committee selected a lot of land amounting to two acres owned by Mr. John Parkhurst and situated near Porter's Corner on the Back River Road. Four prominent Manchester architects competed for the design of the building and the plans submitted by Mr. Frank Whitcher were finally selected by the committee. These plans were submitted for competitive bids to a number of contractors. The work of building the school was awarded to Mr. Anatole Caron, and the actual construction of the building was soon under way.

Throughout the period of construction the committee, the architect and the contractor worked in the finest spirit of harmony and co-operation, as the result in the excellent building itself and the fact that it was ready for occupancy at the beginning of the school year testify. Much credit is due to the leadership of the chairman, Mr. Hull, who from the first gave most of his time to the work of the committee. His fellow committee members cannot praise too highly his unselfish work for the good of the Town of Bedford.

The selection of a name for the new school was not difficult, and the committee logically chose a name from one of the finest of the town's old families. A copy of the program of the dedication exercises, attended by a very large number of the friends and residents of Bedford, follows:

Biographical Sketch of

PETER PERKINS WOODBURY, M. D.

Born August 8, 1791

*The First Supervisor of the Public Schools of Bedford,
Elected by the Town*

Dr. Peter Perkins Woodbury came to Bedford July 3, 1815, from Goffstown, N. H. His ancestor, John Woodbury, known as the "Old Planter," came from Devonshire, England, and landed at Cape Ann in 1624. His grandfather, James Woodbury, was at the Siege of Quebec, toiled up that huge cliff to the top, faced the enemy on the Plains of Abraham, engaged in a hand to hand conflict, was near to Wolfe when he was mortally wounded, and helped to carry him to a place of safety.

He was a Doctor of the Old School, riding over the hills in the dark and in the light, in the sunshine of summer and in the bleak storms of winter for forty-five years, with his saddle-bags equipped for any emergency.

He was a man of iron constitution and of untiring industry. He believed and acted upon the principle that man was created for God's purpose, and his duty was to make the world better for having lived.

For this he sacrificed ease, pleasure, health and at last life itself in the very martyrdom of overtaxed powers, strained until the strings of life were broken in the service of his fellowmen.

He entered into rest December 5, 1860.

The Building Committee are deserving of the "Thanks of the Town" for the faithful and efficient services in finishing the task committed to them.

Mr. Fred W. French, the popular Baritone soloist of Bedford, presents his services to the Peter P. Woodbury School with his compliments and best wishes.

Mr. John H. Parkhurst of Amherst, formerly of Bedford, has generously given one-half acre of land adjoining the school house as a playground for the children.

The Flag to be dedicated today is of historic interest. It has been raised over the old mansion of George Washington and was procured from the Mount Vernon Ladies' Association of the Union by the Vice Regent of New Hampshire, Mrs. Gordon Woodbury.

Mr. Albert P. Horne, owning and operating the Bedford Nurseries on the Daniel Webster Highway, to show his interest in the Schools of Bedford and his appreciation of local

patronage will gladly furnish, without expense to the Town or the School Committee, all the trees, shrubbery and plants necessary to landscape and beautify the grounds of the Peter P. Woodbury School.

The Town of Bedford has dealt generously and wisely with its school problems, and its School Board and Building Committee are proud to have served so fine a community.

Through the kindly efforts of Rev. C. F. Hill Crathern all the schools have been furnished, in each building, with an upright piano.

The teachers and children of the Stevens Buswell School gave an entertainment in the Town Hall and raised \$54. Miss Martha Woodbury of the Woodbury Homestead added a generous amount and secured a piano.

The school in No. 6 district which has not yet been named was kindly remembered with a piano by Mrs. Sarah G. Allen and her daughter, Miss Ruth Allen.

The people and children of Bedford are grateful to their generous friends of the public schools.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Citizens of Bedford:

The current year has been a significant one in the history of Bedford schools. The completion of the Peter P. Woodbury building marked the end of what can be properly called "The Building Period". Now, all of Bedford's pupils are housed in comfortable, modern, ample buildings. This fact should be a source of gratification to all, and is material evidence of an earnest concern for the educational opportunities for Bedford children.

In addition to these splendid buildings these have other material expressions of constructive interest on the part of a number of individuals. This is heartening to officers and pupils as well as to teachers. Sometimes, teachers working with continuing faithfulness, wonder why parents seem so little in evidence. Now and then comes a criticism, perhaps, scarcely ever comes commendation. Teachers do not wait for or expect praise. But an appreciative word from a parent may mean a renewal of strength to be invested in the thought and purpose of the school.

Teachers and parents desire the final outcome for children—that of normal, wholesome, strong, purposeful lives. The home supplies the material needs of food, clothing, shelter, and beyond these the direction, both intentional and unintentional, of character formation. The teacher's task is to put these same young people in possession of certain "tools", which they will need in after life. Yet not only "tools", these boys and girls should have—they need also information—

something of acquaintance with great men and women, living and dead, to know something of great principles and ideas which are always living—must be taught to know standards for judgment and decision in the inescapable choices of life—to know the “high way” from the “low”. These are something of the outcomes desired.

To accomplish this, or even to approach such an objective, will be more nearly possible when teachers and parents are consciously working together. There should be a close alliance here. What children do—what they like or dislike—what their attitude in the home—their health—their habits of work—of play—of reading—of recreation—their hobbies—parents know, and can inform teachers who will profit by knowing these things.

And, too, the element of change needs to be taken into account. Schools are not what they were even ten years ago. This is not to disparage those which have been. Because of a better understanding of child abilities and development, schools have changed both in materials used and in the way in which they are used. Some materials have dropped out, others have come in. And schools like all else will keep on changing. But communities have changed, too. New standards or lack of standards, new factors and forces are vital and not always for good. And it is well to remember that children do not invent, but they borrow their standards from the adults in their respective neighborhoods, and from stories and magazines and practices and, perchance too, from the “air”. The training of the young is not a matter of tricks or devices or makeshifts, but requires an intelligent attempt to understand something of the fundamental laws and directions of growth.

A Parent-Teacher Association has just been organized in the No. 6 District. It is hoped and expected to foster a closer acquaintance among parents and teachers and with school matters.

To Col. H. S. Wonson, whose years of service on the School Board have now come to a close, the citizens of Bedford are

more deeply indebted than one can reckon. Any community is fortunate when it has a man, or men, of Mr. Wonson's ability, who will give so freely of time and energy and thought to public service. For years to come although he has gone away, his name will be associated with the splendid school buildings which he helped to plan—and build. Our appreciation and best wishes are with Mr. Wonson in his new undertaking.

To the School Board—and members of the Building Committee—these individuals who rendered such capable direction during the work of the year, goes my most cordial appreciation.
