Commissioner's Report.

To the Citizens of Belknap County:

Agreeably to the laws of the State of New Hampshire your commissioners most respectfully submit their report for the fiscal year ending Dec. 31st, 1903, and of the financial condition of the county at the end of the year, together with the reports of the Superintendent of the County Farm, Jailer, County Farm Physician, Clerk of the Superior Court, Solicitor, Sheriff, Treasurer and Auditors, and also a copy of the records of the clerk of the County Convention.

The County Farm, House of Correction and Jail have been under the care of Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Weymouth. Their services have given excellent satisfaction. They have been untiring in their labors for the sick and afflicted that have come under their charge and the Commissioners consider themselves and the County fortunate in securing their services for the coming year.

Mr. Lucian A. Ladd, who for many years has served the County so faithfully as Chaplain at the County Farm having resigned during the year, the Rev. W. H. Getchell of Lakeport has been appointed to that position and has lately entered upon his duties. The Commissioners desire in behalf of themselves, and of the officers and inmates of the farm, to publicly express their thanks to Mr. Ladd, the Rev. Mr. Getchell, and all others who have so kindly assisted in promoting the spiritual welfare of all connected with the institution.

An examination of the annexed records of the Belknap County Delegation in the Legislature, assembled in convention, discloses the fact that the appropriation made by that body for each of the years ending Dec. 31st, 1903 and Dec. 31st, 1904, for the ordinary expenses of the County was \$30,000.00, with an additional amount for the first named year of \$1,000.00 for metallic vault furniture for the Court House. The Commissioners received bids from two well-known manu-

facturers of steel fittings, the bids being submitted under the conditions that any or all might be rejected and were made by each party for any part or all of the pieces required. A contract was closed with The Office, Bank and Library Co. for a large case for the Clerk of Courts' vault and the case has been delivered and paid for, the cost being \$490.00. A contract was also made with the Art Metal Construction Co,, for five other pieces to cost \$500. This contract has not been completed so that the balance of the appropriation remains in the treasury.

The report of the treasurer shows that the cash in his hands at the beginning of the year was \$11,360.34, that he received from County taxes \$31,000.00, from the County of Merrimack on account of cost to this county of the Geo. H. Greenleaf trial \$1,403.84, from the State License Commissioners \$3,030.70, from County note \$2,000.00, from the County Farm \$985.76, and from other sources \$297.94, making the total receipts for the year \$50,078.58.

He has paid on orders drawn by the Commissioners \$23,056.78, on orders drawn by the Court, including Court expenses \$5,902.80, and on note and interest, including coupons on Court House and Refunding Bonds \$3,922.77, making the total payments \$32,882.35, leaving the cash on hand at the end of the year \$17,196.23, being an increase of \$5,835.89 over the amount in the treasury, Jan. 1st, 1903.

The statement of the financial condition of the county Dec. 31, 1903, computed as required by the Public Statues, shows, as will be seen by reference to the proper page of the report, a gain in the net assets of the county during the year of \$7,563,77.

The summary of orders drawn by the commissioners shows the amount actually paid out under the several heads but does not give the net cost to the county in either the external poor or county farm accounts. To get the real net cost to the county incurred for the support of external poor, the amount of orders drawn, \$8,649.26, should be reduced by \$252.44, leaving the net cost to the county on this account \$8,396.82. This amount of \$252.44 represents the bills paid by the commission-

ers for the support of paupers chargeable to other counties and has been recovered from them and paid into the treasury, and to get the net cost, should be deducted from different accounts as indicated in the external poor account. At the county farm changes in the cooking arrangements, including the purchase of a revolving baker, and in the stable, re-arranging the horse stalls and making more room for other stock and the necessary outlay for additional furniture and clothing, incident to the care of a larger number of the county's wards at that institution, have caused some unusual expenditures under that head, some of which are credited to the farm in the inventory, others do not now appear directly, but we are satisfied that the policy of caring for the county poor at the county almshouse whenever it can reasonably and legally be done, will in the end repay any additional expense on that account and bring more comfort, at less expense, to those cared for.

We herewith submit our thirteenth semi-annual report of the auditing of the several accounts of the county officers for the period ending June 30, 1903, as required by law.

We have examined the bills rendered by the county commissioners for their services and expenses from January 1, 1903 to July 1, 1903, and are of the opinion that the sums charged for services are for time actually spent in the business of the county, and that the sums charged for expenses are reasonable.

We have also examined the Treasurer's account and find it correct, with proper vouchers for all payments made by him. We have compared the orders paid by the treasurer with the record of orders drawn by the County Commissioners and find that they agree and that the Treasurer has paid all orders drawn by them.

The Treasurer had on hand, January 1, 1903, \$11,360.34. He has received from all sources \$4,290.50, making a total of \$15,650.84. He has paid out on orders drawn by the County Commissioners \$11,411.63, on orders drawn by the Court, \$2,274.98; coupons on bonds, \$1000.00; making a total of \$14,686.61, which leaves a balance on hand of \$964.23.

We have also examined the account of the superintendent of the county farm and find that he has received for board of inmates, prisoners in jail and all other sources, \$486.67, which he has on hand.

We have also examined the books of the County Commissioners and find that they have drawn orders on the treasurer as above stated, of which \$5,252.04, was for the support of external poor and the balance was for purposes as follows:

The Commissioners exhibited vouchers for all orders drawn by them corresponding in amount to the orders.

While the value of an article depends upon the quality, which the auditors have had no means or opportunity of examining or knowing, they are of the opinion that the sums charged therein for articles purchased, are according to the market value, and have been used for the benefit of the County.

The Commissioners have filed with the auditors a sworn statement of the outstanding indebtedness December 31, 1903, which is hereto annexed.

We have in addition visited the County Farm and looked over every part of the house, jail, insane ward, barn and outhouses. We find them all neat, clean and in good condition. We find the inmates well taken care of and apparently happy. There should be some inexpensive repairs made on the buildings this coming season. We find a stock of 47 head of cattle, some of them registered having been lately purchased, which we think a move in the right direction. The improvements which have been made in the cooking arrangement is a great saving over the old arrangement and one to be commended.

The auditors have constantly advocated the removal of those of the external poor who were without homes and in a feeble condition to the farm, where we believe they can have more comforts and better food, care and nursing; and we are glad to note that the Commissioners have adopted the same view, during the last eight months, having taken many to the farm. While this may increase the expense of the farm, it will reduce the expense of support of external poor, and will materially increase the health and comfort of the unfortunate poor.

Belknap County Delegation met at the Court House, Laconia, as per vote at Concord, Jan. 28, at ten o'clock a. m., with the following representatives present: Potter, Clough, Fecteau, Smith, Davis, Morrill, Hull, Quimby, Chase, Sanborn, Sargent, Prescott, and were received by County Commissioners Smith and Morrill. The Court House was inspected by the delegation, after which, barges were taken for a drive to the County Farm. The large barn and herd of cattle were first inspected, the large farm house was next visited and the delegation were received by Supt. and Mrs. Weymouth, who

served a very fine dinner to the party. The different buildings were inspected by the party. Meeting of the delegation called to order by Chairman Sargent. On motion of Davis, it was voted to extend a vote of thanks to Supt. and Mrs. Weymouth, also to include waiters, for our entertainment. Remarks were made by Commissioner Smith in regard to the appropriations, which the Board had prepared and recommended as follows, for each of the coming two years:

External poor, \$11,000; County Farm, House of Correction and Jail, \$8,000; County officers, salaries, \$2,500; Court House account, \$1,500; Court expenses, \$5,000; interest on bonds, \$2,000. Total, \$30.000.

On motion of Clough of Gilmanton, it was voted that the sum of \$31,000 be raised the first year, and \$30,000 the second year, \$1,000 of the first amount to be used for metallic vault at the Court House. On motion of Davis, it was voted to give the same power to the new Board of Commissioners, as has been given in the past few years to sell the County wood lot at the head of the bay. Remarks were made by the Commissioners in regard to the boilers, who seemed to agree that the boilers were safe and all right. Hull moved that the Commissioners Report be accepted and it was so voted. No other business appearing, it was voted to adjourn. Barges were taken for the city, and each expressed himself as being very well pleased with the trip.
