This picture, which was taken about the year 1900, shows the old hotel and livery stable which was located where the Pierce School now stands.

It was built in the year 1839 and consisted of the hotel, a store, barber shop, poolroom and livery stable. There was also a bar room in a separate building back of the hotel.

The picture has a nostalgic atmosphere of the horse and buggy days when that was the only mode of transportation.

One night in April of 1915 it was destroyed by one of the worst fires in the history of Bennington. Some years later the land was obtained by Arthur J. Pierce who had the present school building erected on the same site.

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bennington in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Bennington on Tuesday, the 7th of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for highways and bridges.
3. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for Class V roads and raise and appropriate money for the same. The Town must raise \$304.68 and the State will contribute \$2,031.23.
4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.
5. To see what action the Town will take in regard to real estate purchased by the Town for non-payment of taxes.
6. To see if the Town will vote to transfer any balance in the Fire Department appropriation to a Capital Reserve Fund to be used toward the building of a new fire station.
7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$528.00 for the purchase of twelve coats for the Fire Department.
8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$191.00 for the support of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service Clinic in Keene.
9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$385.00 to support the services of the Monadnock Community Visiting Nurses Association, Inc.

10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,100.00 to paint one side of the Town Hall and the Town Barn.

1. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate an additional \$6,500.00 for the Town Police budget in order to provide for a full-time professional Police Chief.

12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the property formerly used as the Town Dump, being the property conveyed to the Town by deed of Guy O. Hollis, dated April 4, 1934, or take any other action relating thereto.

13. To see whether the Town will vote to constitute a committee consisting of the Selectmen and members of the Planning Board to prepare with representatives of any one or more of the Towns of Deering, Francestown and Hancock proposed agreements between the Town and any one or more of such Towns of Deering, Francestown and Hancock providing for use of the solid waste disposal facility (Town Dump) by residents and property owners of such towns, or take any other action in relation thereto.

14. To see if the Town will vote to ratify and confirm the regulations for the operation of the new landfill facility.

15. To see if the Town will vote to become a member of a regional planning commission now proposed to be organized within planning region number 11, as delineated by the Office of State Planning, pursuant to authority conferred by RSA 36:45-53, or take any other action in relation thereto.

16. To see if the Town will vote to adopt an ordinance regulating the keeping of farm animals and poultry as recommended by the committee authorized at the last Annual Town Meeting together with the Selectmen, or to take any other action related thereto.

17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of providing ambulance service to the Town under the provisions of RSA:151-B, or to take any other action related thereto.

18. To see if the Town will vote to petition the Legislature to repeal, modify or postpone the application of RSA:151-B passed by the 1971 Legislature related to ambulance service.

19. To see if the Town will vote to recommend to the Selectmen that the use of Town equipment for the maintenance of highways be limited to use for Town purposes, except for such reciprocal arrangements with other towns as are wise and necessary.

20. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for Statutory requirements and to carry the articles and appropriations of the School District into effect.

To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

We would also call to the attention of the voters that in accordance with the vote of a prior Town Meeting the articles of the Warrant will be taken up for action at 1:30 P.M. the afternoon of March 7, 1972.

It will be proposed by the Board of Selectmen and Planning Board that consideration of Article 17 requesting an appropriation for the provision of ambulance service be postponed to a Town Meeting at a later date. This will provide the necessary basis for recommendation of action in the event that the Legislature fails to repeal, amend or postpone the application of RSA:151-B. In such an event, it may be possible that action will be necessary in order to adequately provide ambulance service for the community.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

LEST WE FORGET – IT CAN HAPPEN HERE

Disastrous forest and brush fires that destroy hundreds of homes are more prevalent on the west coast with their dry seasons and strong dry hot winds but 25 years ago this fall is

Status and Recommendations Related
to Current Major Projects

TOWN SEWAGE PROJECT:

The project status of our town sewage problems as outlined in the 1970 report has not changed too much since that time. We have had many joint meetings, including Antrim representatives, with the State and Federal authorities (both the Farmers Home Administration and the Environmental Protection Agency) as well as several meetings with representatives of both towns and the engineers. We have been encouraged that this project is well up on the priority lists of the State and Federal Government and that the basic concept of this joint approach meets with the approval of both the State and Federal agencies.

The Farmers Home Administration, who have funds available for grants to small communities (which both Antrim and Bennington are considered to be) towards the cost of the town collection system as versus the main sewers and treatment plant, have told the group that they believe funds for this project could be available in late 1972.

However, it now appears that the whole project — together with many similar projects in the state — will be held up awaiting new Federal legislation which is expected sometime this year. It is anticipated this new legislation will increase appropriations in this field and will also substantially increase the proportion of Federal Aid that would be available for these projects. Under present law the Federal Government furnishes 50% of the cost of approved projects for main sewers and treatment plants and the State furnishes 40% of the cost. (This is separate from and in addition to any grants received through F.H.A. for the town collection systems.) It is our understanding that the total aid available will not be increased beyond 90% and that, therefore, any increase in the proportion of Federal aid will result in a reduction in the amount of State aid. Because of this, the State has not processed any new projects with the Federal Government on the basis of a state commitment of 40% aid since July 1, 1971, and intends to wait in the hope and expectation that their commitment will be substantially reduced. I think as citizens of New Hampshire we cannot quarrel with this approach, but it does mean that no new projects are being funded right now.

In addition to the possible funding changes, it appears that the expected new Federal legislation may change substantially the law and the approach under which this basic project com-

bining both municipal and industrial waste was planned. What these changes may turn out to be is unknown and whether the project will be financially feasible and practical under the new legislation is also unknown.

It was the initial recommendation of Town Council of both towns that we include in the Town Warrant an article very similar to that included in the 1971 Meeting Warrant but with the intention that any consideration be deferred to a Postponed Meeting for later in the year. However, Bond Counsel, who represents the Bank and who must approve all of the actions that we take in order that a future bond issue be qualified and sold, has raised questions related to the requirements for a hearing prior to consideration of any Warrant article such as this in view of the fact that we cannot at this time make a complete presentation to the voters. In view of these problems, Town Council revised their recommendations and now suggest that we use, if suitable and necessary, the approach of a Special Town Meeting sometime later in the year which would be preceded by a hearing or hearings with the required legal notice, etc., so that there could be no question that the action taken by the voters at such a meeting would fully satisfy the legal requirements of Bond Counsel. Whether such a Special Town Meeting will be justified or required both in terms of the time element involved and the possible changes in scope of the whole project is completely unknown at this time.

We recognize that this project has been in process for quite a long time and that although there have been brief reviews each Annual Town Meeting, the voters have not had the opportunity to get as full and complete a report as we would have liked to have made. We had hoped, of course, that we would be holding hearings sometime during the year just past and would have made the review at that time. In view of the effect of the expected Federal legislation which may be very substantial related to this project, it is difficult to answer the many questions which the voters may have. However, the Selectmen and the Planning Board at the portion of the Town Meeting devoted to "any other business" will attempt to answer questions on this project and its current status.

JOINT DUMP — BENNINGTON AND ANTRIM:

Both the Selectmen and Planning Board are particularly pleased to be able to report on the successful completion of the project of a sanitary landfill facility for the joint use of the two towns. We had two Adjourned Town Meetings this fall, the first of which authorized the purchase of the required land and the second approved the agreement with Antrim whereby both the cost of establishing this facility and the future operating costs

would be shared between the two towns. This arrangement has proved of substantial financial benefit to both towns.

As of January 1st of this year the old dump was closed and the new joint facility was opened, although there still remains the task of installing suitable gates, additional necessary signs, the tarring of the road leading to the dump and the consideration of fencing the front area. The necessary funds to complete the project are available from the prior year's appropriation and the contribution from Antrim and will be used for that purpose.

As authorized by the Town Meeting, the Selectmen established the necessary operating regulations for this facility recognizing that some revisions may be necessary as we gain more experience. It is the recommendation of Town Counsel that the town adopt these regulations and there is an article in the Warrant to this effect.

This project solves for both towns the problem created by the unsuitable areas of the previous dumps, the lack of adequate space for a long-term solution and the necessary arrangements so that we can conform to both new and coming legislation which will more closely control the disposal of waste. We have been particularly pleased at the very fine spirit of cooperation and good faith in negotiations which has been shown by representatives of Antrim in setting up this project and we are firmly convinced it represents a practical and long-term solution suitable for both towns. In addition, there has been interest expressed in this project by other surrounding communities and it is possible that they may wish to join us.

REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION:

The Planning Board and the Selectmen have been conscious for a long time that the need for Regional Planning would not only be growing but would also be pushed very strongly by both the State and Federal Government. Many of the Federal programs for assistance to towns and cities are requiring the concurrence and approval of a Regional Planning Commission as a prerequisite to the Federal Aid. The State has established the boundaries for planning districts throughout the State and while we might well quarrel with the boundaries of some of these districts, it could well be that we and the other communities of this area may have to accept this in order to qualify for future aid.

We have included in the Warrant this year, as have other towns in this particular area, a request for authority to join a prescribed Regional Planning District in the event that this project develops sufficient interest and backing in this particular area. There will be no request for an appropriation at this time but sometime in the future, if a majority of the towns within the prescribed district vote to participate in such a Planning

Commission, it is probable that there will be a cost which will have to be shared by all the towns.

REGIONAL AMBULANCE SERVICE:

The State passed legislation in 1971 which will bring about substantial changes in both the requirements and the availability of ambulance service in this area. If this legislation is not revised or repealed prior to its effective date of September 1st, many of the ambulance services in the area will discontinue. The legislation provided for the formation of town groups who could jointly establish ambulance services that are required by the area.

There have been and there continues to be meetings on this particular subject and what may be proposed and required we cannot tell at this time. We are including in the Warrant an article on this subject and we will probably ask that it be carried over to a Postponed Town Meeting. Then, if it should develop that ambulance service will end for this community on September 1st, there will be the necessary legal basis to recommend further action for the protection of the community.

The arrangements that the Bennington Fire Department has made to assist in the support of the Hillsboro Rescue Squad deserve the total support of the community. They will be on call for any rescue or emergency work but, being a volunteer group, it is understandable that they do not feel they can cover the total requirements for ambulance service.

ORDINANCE RELATED TO FARM ANIMALS:

At the last Town Meeting the townspeople voted to have the Moderator appoint a special committee who, together with the Selectmen, would review and make a recommendation related to an ordinance as to the housing of farm animals within the constricted areas of the town. With the advice and assistance of Town Counsel, we understand that that committee will bring in a recommended ordinance. We also understand that it is being provided that appeals for exceptions from this ordinance would be handled by the Board of Adjustment which is an integral part of the Planning Board and Subdivision establishment.

The following is the ordinance as proposed by that committee:

No person shall keep or maintain poultry, farm or other animals of any kind, except cats and dogs kept or maintained for domestic purposes only, unless a suitable pen, building, stable, or barn for such animals or poultry shall be erected or maintained more than 50 feet from any abutting lot line and and more than 50 feet from any highway.

Any person aggrieved by the requirements of this ordinance may appeal to the Board of Adjustment and said Board shall

have the same powers to grant variances from the provisions of this ordinance as are granted in New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 31:72.

The Board of Adjustment is empowered to grant special exceptions provided that

1. the poultry or animals to be kept or maintained on the premises are not expected to cause noxious odors or create excessive noise, and

2. provided that the dwellings and lots of abutting owners are located so that the maintenance of poultry or animals will not cause a nuisance to such abutters.

Whoever shall violate the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to fine in the amount of \$10.00. Each day that said violation continues shall be deemed a separate offense.

the anniversary of a disaster that devastated large areas of northern New England leaving villages in ashes with rows of cellarholes and chimneys in a number of summer vacation home locations. Many lives were lost on that destructive day of October 23, 1947 as nothing could stop the wind-driven flames.

It is true that such conditions are unusual for New Hampshire but they happened once, they can happen again. The fuel for fires is all around us. All it takes is a firebrand. Only by cultivating a habit of carefulness with fire at all times can we meet the challenge of protection when dry conditions prevail. Please let these reminders be your guide:

1. Never, either when walking, riding or driving, discard a firebrand — a lighted match or a glowing cigarette.
2. Always obtain a permit for any outside burning. The burning of household rubbish is not permitted if your town has rubbish collection. Burning of grass or garden litter can be dangerous. See your warden first.
3. If you camp or picnic, be sure open fires are allowed and if they are, put them dead out when leaving.
4. Most Important — Instruct your children in the danger of the lighted match. A lighted match and dry grass or forest litter is a dangerous combination which leads to destructive loss and can lead to tragedy.

The past year — 1971, was a favorable year for the control of fires. There were too many fire starts in some towns. We thank those who remembered and ask others to heed Smokey's message.

Number of fires reported and acres burned — 1971 season:

State: 463 fires, 160 acres; District: 82 fires, 27 and three-quarter acres; plus 2 R.R. fires and one-quarter acre.

BENNINGTON RECREATION COMMITTEE

The Bennington Recreation Committee is happy to report a most successful and productive year. Our activities this last year included a pre-teen dance, basketball, swimming lessons, summer recreation at the ball park, a float at the Greenfield Whing Ding, Old Home Night, Halloween hayride and costume parade, Crafts-Reation program for our senior citizens, skating rink, and a weekly recreation program at the Firemen's Hall.

Most of our time and energy was spent coordinating our summer program and getting ready for our Old Home Night Fair. Both these activities involved a great deal of preparation and participation.

After interviewing approximately ten applicants, we made our selections for lifeguard (Judy LaFortune — Dublin, N.H.)

and summer recreation director (Sue Temple — Bedford, N.H.). Judy's program included swimming lessons for about sixty Bennington youngsters, ages 5 to 14. We worked with the Selectmen all summer and with their help made several improvements at the beach, such as installing clothes hooks and toilet seats, and repairing the raft, benches and bathhouse. We also had an extensive litter crusade at the beach all summer long, which we hope, with the cooperation of the public, will continue this summer.

Sue's program at the ballpark included arts and crafts, sporting events, games and relays, and special days such as Costume Day, our Bicycle Rodeo, hiking, picnics and, of course, our float at the Greenfield Whing Ding, where we won second prize in the originality category.

One of our favorite projects this year was our Old Home Night Fair at the school grounds. Despite the chilly weather, everyone seemed to enjoy the Con-Val Band, our food, white elephant, fancy work and grab bags tables, and of course the game tables and basketball shoot. Our food table, raffle and balloons went well also. We are already pondering ideas for our next Old Home Day celebration and hope that even more will be able to attend this year.

The Crafts-Reation program for our senior adults is a huge success, especially since it offers not only arts and crafts projects, but also brings our senior citizens together for a day of stimulating conversation.

With the money we have raised we have supported all our projects, purchased a portable basketball net, a snorkel set, a volleyball, arts and crafts material and an equipment storage box.

Our hopes are that 1972 will be as successful as our last year. This can only happen if we unite as a community and work together for one goal: wholesome, educational and worthwhile activities for all our Bennington youngsters. We would like to take this opportunity to extend our thanks to all parents and friends who have helped in any way towards our various activities. We owe a special thanks to the teachers at Pierce School, to Dot and Paul Traxler and to the Bennington Selectmen. To everyone — we deeply appreciate your time, concern and support.
