TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Brookline in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Daniels Academy Hall in said Town of Brookline on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and all other officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relative to same.

4. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for highways and bridges.

5. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

6. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Public Library.

7. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Cemeteries.

8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute inventory blanks when assessing, instead of mailing.

9. To see if the Town will vote to allow any discount on taxes.

10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. 11. To see if the Town will vote to charge a twenty cent penalty on each Poll Tax remaining unpaid after September first, or take any action relative thereto.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500. for necessary equipment and replacements for the Fire Department or take any action relative thereto.

13. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to enter into contract for janitor service at the Town Hall or take any action relative thereto.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200. for the control of the White Pine Blister Rust, in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Department.

15. To see if the Town will vote to enact the following Building Code or take any action relative thereto.

In order to maintain the health, safety, convenience, morals, future beauty and general welfare of the Town of Brookline, the following ordinance be enacted:

All residential dwellings built or buildings converted for residential purposes within the boundaries of the Town of Brookline shall have:

- 1. A continous masonry foundation.
- 2. A chimney constructed of some masonry material, set upon a suitable footing in the ground and shall extend to a height at least two feet greater than the highest point of the dwelling.
- 3. A suitable permanent outside finish, other than paper, and shall be painted if of wood or other material usually painted.
- 4. A system of sewage disposal consisting of privy, cesspool or septic tank located at least seventy-five feet from any wells.

Enforcement:

1. It shall be the duty of the Board of Selectmen,

and the Board is hereby given power and authority, to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance.

- 2. There shall be an Inspector of Buildings, such office to be held by the the Second Selectman, ex-officio. Such Inspector of Buildings shall serve as such without compensation and any fees of any kind for permits required under this Ordinance shall revert to the Town Treasury.
- 3. The Building Inspector shall issue any and all building permits requested when such permit is in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinance or legally authorized by the Board of Appeals and then only. The fee for such permit shall be \$1.00.
- 4. After passage of this Ordinance it shall be unlawful to erect any building or alter the bulk of any building or relocate any building in the Town of Brookline without first obtaining a building permit from the Building Inspector.
- 5. Upon any well founded information that this Ordinance is being violated, the Selectmen shall, on their own initiative, take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance by seeking an injunction in the Superior Court or by any other legal means.

Board of Appeals:

Upon the adoption of this Ordinance and thereafter as terms expire or vacancies occur, the Town Meeting shall make appointments to a Board of Appeals of five members conforming in duties to the provisions of Chapter 42 of the Public Laws.

Amendments:

This Ordinance may be amended by a majority vote of any legal Town Meeting when such amendment is published in the Warrant calling for the meeting and when such amendment has received a public hearing which hearing has been advertised and given a legal fifteen days' notice.

Penalties:

Every person, persons, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be fined not more than ten dollars upon conviction for each day such violation may exist. Such sums to revert to the Town Treasury.

Saving Clause:

The invalidity of any provision of this Ordinance shall not affect the validity of any other provision.

When Effective:

This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum necessary to tar Spring Vale Road, Cleveland Hill Road and the Powers-Corey Road or take any action relative thereto.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum necessary for a street light on Spring Vale Road.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum necessary to secure State Aid for permanent improvement of highways or take any action relative thereto.

19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Melendy Pond Authority to incorporate as part of future leases the following: "All rentals received as a result of this lease shall be placed in a fund of the Melendy Pond Authority to be spent for improvement and maintenance of the Melendy Pond Development" or take any action relative thereto.

20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the

Melendy Pond Authority to plan and lease other property in the Melendy Pond tract in accordance with the general plan set forth in the 1950 Town Report or take any action relative thereto.

21. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the property known as the Town Forest or Melendy Pond Tract for the sum of \$1.00 to the Melendy Pond Authority as its agent or take any action relative thereto.

22. To see if the Town will vote to set up the six-man membership of the Melendy Pond Authority as follows: Five resident members to be elected by the Town Meeting, one of which shall act as Treasurer and one member to be selected by the Lessees or take any action relative thereto.

23. To see if the Town will vote to approve a rate of one dollar per hour for firemen on chimney fires, or take any action relative thereto.

24. To see if the Town will vote to increase the salaries of the volunteer firemen to twenty dollars per year and raise and appropriate \$200. for the purpose, or take any action relative thereto.

25. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200. from David Charait the income to be used for perpetual care of the Willoby-Kilduff Lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.

26. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200. from Ruth Andrews the income to be used for perpetual care of the John Andrews Lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.

27. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to extend Pine Grove Cemetery.

28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100. to repair and paint the Town clock. 29. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for liability insurance on the fire trucks.

30. To see what action the Town will take with regard to insurance for firemen.

31. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Municipal Court.

32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150. for cutting and removing trees, or take any action relative thereto.

33. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for a Capital Reserve Fund for a Tax Map.

34. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to increase the Capital Reserve Fund for Town Hall Repairs.

35. Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of beano be adopted in this town.

36. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

37. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE MELENDY POND AUTHORITY

Your Authority, acting on last year's vote of the Town Meeting, drew up regulations for the lease of the land around Melendy Pond. After publishing the plans in the Townsend Times and the Milford Cabinet, as required by the vote of the 1950 Town Meeting, proceeded to formalize the leases.

Since no objections were registered to the lease and general plans as published, the Authority received applications for leases. The first of the year saw three lots of land leased. All of these were shore-front property. Since the first of the year one more lot has been leased. From the incoming inquiries the Authority expects to lease several more lots this spring and summer.

In addition to leasing activity, the Authority has started a road around the property under development. It is hoped that this road can be completed within the next year.

The Authority also would like to have a survey made of the sections now under development and have the leases registered at the Registry of Deeds.

It is hoped that the money acquired from leases this year will permit both extension of the road and the survey, and no money is being requested from the Town.

It will be noted that the Authority has four Articles in the Warrant. The article to transfer title of the land at Melendy Pond to the Authority is to eliminate any legal complications that may come up in years to come. This action is recommended by legal counsel. The article on the composition of the Authority recommends that the Town vote to have a six-man Authority composed of five residents of the Town, one of which shall be the Treasurer, and one to be a Lessee of property at Melendy Pond. This will in effect give the people leasing the property at Melendy Pond voice in actions of the Authority but will leave control in the hands of actual residents of the Town. The article on rentals was put in the Warrant to insure that the Town would be protected from the possibility of having to pay from the General Fund future maintenance and development costs as well as assuring the Leasee that the future plans of the Authority will be accomplished. The Article requesting authority to lease property in the Melendy Pond tract other than that which was authorized for lease last year is a result of interest expressed by several people in this property and is in accordance with the overall plans.

The lease form and the overall plan of development are on file with the Secretary of the Authority and may be seen on request.

The Melendy Pond Authority feels that the aim of turning the Melendy Pond tract into a worth while and paying project is well underway. All indications point to an excellent summer colony. In a short time the camps now scheduled and under construction will produce a constantly increasing revenue for the Town in the form of taxes.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

The Planning Board was set up in Brookline as a result of action taken at the Special Town Meeting held on This board, authorized under Community Planning Enabling Act, Chapter 53, Revised Laws of New Hampshire 1942, will investigate measures which in the future may tend to improve the welfare, health and living conditions of the community.

To see that certain standards of living are met, the Board has prepared for vote an ordinance which will establish a building code. This code does not affect buildings now in existence, but will insure only that future dwellings, additions or alterations meet certain minimum requirements. Provisions have been made in this ordinance to establish a Board of Appeals for those cases where it would appear that the code works undue hardships.

Looking to the future this Board will prepare for the information and consideration of the Town various longrange plans as well as other regulations. Among such plans that the Board feels should be considered are:

- 1. Official map showing possible income-producing developments.
- 2. Laws governing sanitation.
- 3. Community recreation.
- 4. Town water supply.
- 5. Extension, improvement or abandonment of roads.

Other plans may come up as the work of the Board progresses.

It is hoped that the various organizations already established in Brookline will feel free to present suggestions that will assist the Board in cooperating with them and that this work will help in the future development of the Town.

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL SCHOOL MEETING

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Brookline qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Daniels Academy Building in said district on the 12th day of March, 1951 at 8:00 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officers, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

8. To see if the district will vote to discontinue the payment of High School transportation for pupils over 14 years of age and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 to be loaned as needed to students financially unable to provide their own transportation, such funds to be administered by the School Board. (See No. 16 of Budget)

9. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town. (See Nos. 1-19 of Budget)

10. To see how much money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for special repairs, alterations, insurance, treasurer's bond and new equipment. (See Nos. 20 and 23 of Budget)

11. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to enter into contracts for transportation for a period of three years if it appears advantageous to so do.

12. To see if the district will consider the formation of a Cooperative School District with Amherst, Hollis and New Boston for Grades 7-12 inclusive.

13. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the district, such advances, grants in aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States government or any state or private agency.

14. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

SCHOOL ADMINISTRATION

Instruction

Since the teacher is the most important factor in the classroom and nearly three-quarters of the budget is earmarked for Instruction, we must pause to discuss a few items under this head.

Since the close of the last school year, Mrs. Cogswell has resigned and a reshuffling of teachers took place with Mrs. Pickering going to the first two grades, Mrs. Fisher and Mrs. Varney employed to take the next four grades. Hence, we have three teachers for the local grades instead of two and the teaching load greatly reduced.

I wish to mention briefly only a few of the instructional fields to acquaint you with our aims or some of the changes being made. Reading is still our most important subject. Without the ability to read and interpret the printed page, the child's training is very incomplete. Neither teacher nor parent is satisfied with less. Therefore, we still lay great emphasis on this ability. The basic reading series used is the Scott, Foresman and is one of the best now available. Its use of phonics in the teaching of word recognition is according to the best practices of good teachers. Handwriting has suffered from the lack of emphasis. For the past three years we have been starting a new system called Basic Handwriting which is manuscript in Grades 1 and 2 with the transfer to Cursive in Grade 3. The results so far in the grades effected have been gratifying. Letter formations are much better with resulting improvement in leaibility.

Health

We are rather proud of the completeness of our Health Program. To comment at length would be boring. However, let me call your attention to some of the features. Every child is given a health examination by the doctor and nurse. Possibly a more complete examination four to six times during his course would be preferable. Sight testing goes on in all grades, with Snellen charts and Telebinocular, hearing tests with audiometers in Grades 3 and 5. Weighing and measuring and skin examinations are going on throughout the year. All this with home visits and the corrections secured makes for better attendance. Dental and other clinics are either carried on or sponsored by local organizations.

Another concern has been artificial lighting. The district has already installed fluorescent in two rooms.

Next year a Supervisory Union Nursing Organization is to be set up. It is our belief that the results will be even better than those we have experienced in the past mainly because of more time devoted to the service.

Finance

Transportation

This occupies a substantial place in the budget. There are some 80 children to be carried. They are both high and elementary pupils. We feel that today it is as essential to educate the high school people as it used to be to graduate the eighth grader. Hence, pupils of all grades are transported. This item requires some \$60 per pupil.

Costs, 1949-50

The average per pupil costs of Current Expenses may be of interest to you. Expenditures for transportation and tuition were excluded in making these computations for this Union. Capital Outlay is not included in Current Expenses.

Since overhead is spread over a small or large enrollment, the figures vary from town to town and the larger the town the more nearly it approaches the State Average. Tuition rates in Amherst and Milford for 1951-52 have been established in \$120 each for Grades 1-8 and \$250 and \$225 respectively for Grades 9-12.

State Aid

Whether we are to get more state aid or not is now under discussion in the General Court. Since the real estate tax is not adequate to finance the school and other local departments, we must seek the broader base of state support. State aid must be provided to equalize the costs of education wherever the children are found. The inequality of dollar support from town to town borders upon discrimination and the state, whose responsibility education is, must attempt an adjustment.

Needs

The principal need, as I see it, is to change the lighting in the 5-6th grade room and improve the seating.

Personally I am very anxious to extend Art Education to every child. We have seen it start in Hollis and realize its possibilities. I hope your pupils may sometime receive the benefits of such instruction. Two other towns in this Union are requesting funds to give it a trial.

Interior Decorating

It seems that I am constantly urging this. But the desire is to make schools attractive and pleasant to children as one method of influencing learning and to improve their future standards of living.

My Job

Everyone knows the functions of the sheriff, the judge, the selectmen. But who knows about the superintendent of schools! His duties are as varied as the opinions of people may be. Everything that pertains to children is his business and then some. The state board has listed a few of his duties, school boards add to the list. I am not complaining but I sometimes wonder if people realize the magnitude of this job. I have often been told how easy they think it is. Just to touch upon the larger phases of the work: I have credit for 637 teacher visits during the 180 days of school last year, for 70 school board meetings (practically all at night) attended in 12 months. In addition, I have attended various Conferences and meetings - all to keep abreast of the changes in school administration and supervision. I can never forget the hours involved nor the distances covered in order to locate teacher replacements. Then I must spend sufficient time in the office to keep that important task operating efficiently. To summarize, I emphasize the teacher visits, the board meetings, replacements, office, and other meetings. My secretaries who have worked in other offices, marvel at the number of items which pass through this office in the course of a day, a week or a vear.

I do appreciate the members of this Supervisory Union. They have made great strides in pulling the loose ends together. We now act on major problems as a whole and that is a help to me.

Appreciations

The work you accomplished in the Primary School has been a vast improvement. The new organization, as a result, is the best I have known since coming to Brookline.

I am grateful to the Board, the teaching staff, and your citizens for the interest and consideration you have shown in the progress of the schools.

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DANGER FROM FIRES IN WOODLANDS

WOODLAND LITTER, WHEN DRY, IS HIGHLY INFLAMMABLE AND FIRES CAN QUICKLY GET OUT OF CONTROL. WE REQUEST YOUR COOPERATION TO CONTROL ALL FIRES SO THAT LIVES AND PROPERTY MAY NOT BE ENDANGERED OR DESTROYED, AND FOR-ESTS BE KEPT GREEN TO FURNISH THE NATURAL BEAUTY WE ALL ENJOY AND TO GROW TIMBER WE WILL NEED.

WHAT IS "WOODLAND"?

The term "woodland" is defined by law to include "cut-over land, slash and such other land as bears a sufficient amount of wood growth, wood, weeds, grass or other growth as to be likely to be burned over." When in the woods, you are expected to exercise caution in the use

of fire and to remember that

IT IS UNLAWFUL TO

Throw down lighted matches, cigarettes, or other burning substances from vehicles or otherwise.

Burn brush, rubbish, grass or other materials when the ground is not covered with snow, without written permission from the Forest Fire Warden.

Kindle a camp or cooking fire on land of another without permission from the owner or his agent.

Leave an open fire burning unattended.

Fail to report a forest or brush fire that is out of control.

VIOLATORS ARE SUBJECT TO THESE PENALTIES

Anyone letting a fire escape from control, whether or not he has a permit to kindle the fire, is liable for the costs of extinguishing the fire. Anyone found guilty of dropping inflammable material in or near wood-land shall be fined not more than \$25.

A person failing to report an uncontrolled brush or forest fire is liable to a fine of not more than \$10.

For kindling a fire in woodland of another without permission of the owner, or for kindling any fire without a permit when a permit is required, a person may be fined not more than \$200, or imprisoned 60 days.

DAMAGES

Every person who shall set fire on any land, that shall run upon the land of another, shall pay the owner all damages done by such fire.

BE SURE --- GET A PERMIT

Incinerators should be tight, with a close mesh screen, and be on clean ground.

Open fireplaces used to burn rubbish are classed as incinerators.

Always clean a space about any open fire to prevent its spread.

Never burn in dry, windy weather. Have incinerators inspected by the Forest Fire Warden and get his written permit.
