Article 1. To vote by Australian Ballot for all necessary Town Officers.

Article 1-A. To vote by ballot on amendments to the Zoning Ordinance.

Article 2. To determine the method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 4. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and act thereon.

- Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$483.00 (six cents per \$1,000.00 of the Town's equalized valuation) to the Monadnock Regional Association, an agency to advertise, promote and preserve the natural advantages and resources of the Town in cooperation with the other 37 Towns of the Monadnock Region. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)
- Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$702.00 in support of the Elliot Community Hospital for the year 1968. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)
- Article 9 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appriate the sum of \$1,391.10 for Town Road Aid, thereby receiving and additional \$9,273.99 from the State. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)
- Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,500.00 for winter maintenance of roads. (15,000.00 approved by the Budget Committee.)
- Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,500.00 for summer maintenance of roads. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)
- Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the repair and upkeep of Highway Equipment. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)
- Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the continuation of Road Improvement of our Town Highways. The location of the work to be under the supervision of the Selectmen in cooperation with the Road Committee. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)
- Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 to complete the widening and resurfacing of the North Shore Road leading around Spofford Lake known as "Namaschaug Hill." (Approved by the Budget Committee.)
- Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and approprite the sum of \$7,000.00 to gravel and blacktop the road leading to the residence of Henry Hellus, seven tenths of a mile, or act thereon. (\$4,000.00 approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to replace the present wooden bridge over the Gulf Brook on the Mountain Road, near Riverside Cabins, with a sectional Plate Pipe Arch, the cost not to exceed \$4,500.00; \$1,500.00 to be raised by 1968 taxes and the balance to borrowed on long term notes of \$1,500.00 each, payable in 1969 and 1970. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500.00 to improve the so-called Old Swanzey Road beginning at Route 9. This improvement to be black-topped. (Not approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 to gravel and blacktop the Edgar Road from the residence of Kendall Morse to the residence of George Basso. (Not approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appriate the sum of \$890.00 to by 10 fire department monitors for use by the West Chesterfield Fire Department, to supplement the present Fire Alarm System, or act thereon. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$42.00 for the purpose of installing a street light at the junction of old Route 9 and Lincoln Road. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and approthe sum of \$42.00 yearly, to install one street light at the intersection of Route 9 and Welcome Hill Road. (Approved by the

Budget Committee.)

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be added to the \$1,900.00 raised last year to install a furnace in the Town Hall. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to have a permanent restraining order on dogs from Jan. 1st. to April 30th. to protect the deer herd during these critical months.

Article 24. To see if the Town will authorize its Board of Selectmen to file, on behalf of the Town, an application in form and manner required by the United States, and in conformity with Public Law 560, 83rd. Congress, as amended, and to enter into such negotiations and do whatever else may be required for an advance, in an amount not to exceed \$14,500.00 to be made by the United States to the Town of Chesterfield for studies, designs, surveys, soil borings and preparation of a study and report, including preliminary plans, for sewage collection and treatment facilities for the Town; to enter into an agreement for engineering services; and to execute the required assurance

of compliance with the Department of Housing and Urban Development Regulations under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to accept a deed from Otto and Emma Richter, deeding a tract of land for a road leading off from the Tuttle Road in said Chesterfield.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the purpose of erecting a fence on some portions of the boundary lines of the Morris Friedsam Cemetery where none exists. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 27. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to call a special Open House Town Hearing to be held in the month of July each year.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from George E. Joslin, income from same for perpetual care and upkeep of the Charles F. Joslin burial lot in Spofford Cemetery.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Henrietta J. Dragoon, income from same for perpetual care and upkeep of the Amos R. Judson burial lot in Spofford Cemetery.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$50.00 from the Chesterfield Cemetery Commission, income from same to be paid annually to said Commission for perpetual care in the new annex to Spofford Village Cemetery and to be known as the John Smith Trust Fund.

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from the Chesterfield Cemetery Commission, income from same to be paid annually to said Commission for perpetual care in the new annex to Spofford Village Cemetery and to be known as the Fred Korradi Trust Fund.

Article 32. To see if the Town wil vote to accept the sum of \$50.00 from the Chesterfield Cemetery Commission, income from same to be paid annually to said Commission for perpetual care in the new annex to Spofford Village Cemetery and to be known as the Octave Savard Trust Fund.

Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$50.00 from the Chesterfield Cemetery Commission, income from same to be paid annually to said Commission for perpetual care in the new annex to Spofford Village Cemetery and to be known as the Ernest Scharles Trust Fund.

Article 34. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$50.00 from the Chesterfield Cemetery Commission, income from same to be paid annually to said Commission for perpetual care in the new annex to Spofford Village Cemetery and to be

known as the William Moehle Trust fund.

Article 35. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Henrietta Chickering, income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for perpetual care and upkeep of the Carroll Chickering burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Article 36. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Irene Weissenbach, income from same to be paid to Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for perpetual care and upkeep of the Robert Weissenbach burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Article 37. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$150.00 from Warren and Emma Fredette and Stella Bora, income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for perpetual care and upkeep of the Bora-Fredette burial lot in the Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Article 38. To see if the Town will vote to acept the sum of \$200.00 from Upton P. Lord, income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for perpetual care and upkeep of the Burbank-Lord burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

TOWN MEETING 1967

Proceedings of the Annual Meeting of the Voters of the Town of Chesterfield, New Hampshire, called at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, March 14, 1967.

The meeting was called to order at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon by the Moderator, James E. O'Neil, who read the Warrant through Article 1, and declared the polls open for voting by Australian Ballot for all necessary Town Officers. Gerald Knickerbocker and Mildred Gauthier took their oaths of office as Assistant Moderator and Assistant Clerk respectively.

At 6:30 o'clock the Moderator called the meeting to order again and asked that everyone stand for a moment of silent prayer in memory of Howard Walker Kaiser and declared the meeting dedicated to him.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Robert Callahan that the reading of the remainder of the Warrant be dispensed with. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. The Articles were then disposed of as follows:

- Article 2. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Robert Callahan to continue the same method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year as last year. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.
- Article 3. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Leonard Laskowski to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.
- Article 4. Robert Callahan, Chairman of the Budget Committee, gave a report for that Committee. He stated that they met twice besides the Public Meeting and that their report was to be found on pages 18-20 of the Annual Town Report. Voted on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by George E. Joslin to accept their report as given. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 5. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Lester Chickering to raise and appropriate the following sums, as approved by the Budget Committee:

Article 7. Voted by voice vote on a motion made by George E. Joslin and supported by Agnes Chickering that the sum of \$714.00 be raised and appropriated in support of the Elliot Community Hospital for the year 1967. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 8. Voted by voice vote on a motion made by George E. Joslin and supported by Robert Callahan to raise and appropriate the sum of \$482.94 (six cents per \$1,000.00 of the Town's equalized valuation) to the Monadnock Region Association, and agency to advertise, promote and preserve the natural advantages and resources of the Town in cooperation with the other

37 towns of the Monadnock Region. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 9. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Arvid Pearson to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1248.95 for Town Road Aid, thereby receiving an additional \$8,326.34 from the State. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 10. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Robert Callahan to raise and appro-

priate the sum of \$12,500.00 as approved by the Budget Committee for Winter Maintenance of roads. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 11. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Robert Callahan to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,500.00 as approved by the Budget Committee for summer maintenance of roads. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 12. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and supported by Leonard Laskowski to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the repair and upkeep of Highway Equipment. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 13. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by H. Claude Mowry to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 as approved by the Budget Committee for the continuation of Road Improvement of our Town Highways. The location of the work to be under the supervision of the Selectmen in cooperation with the road Committee. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. It was suggested that the amount might be spent on Streeter Hill. The question was asked "Who is on the Road Committee"? The answer was the following: Forest Hall, Carl Houghton, Leland Fox, William Mitchell, Newton Darling and Donald Underwood.

Article 14. Voted on motion made by Lester Chickering and supported by Wayne Winn to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to make a water hole for fire purposes on the land of Lyle Chickering, adjacent to the home of Lawrence Chickering; and to put in a dry hydrant on Pond Brook near the junction of Curt Chickering and Lasky roads. After considerable discussion this motion was voted in the negative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Leonard Laskowski to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 as approved by the Budget Committee for the dry hydrant. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 15. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and suported by Winford Chickering to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 as approved by the Budget Committee to repair and reconstruct the section of Streeter Hill Road from the Fairbanks corner to the Hartt residence. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 16. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Clifford Chickering and supported by Robert Callahan to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 to widen and resurface that part of the North Shore Road leading around Spofford Lake known

as "Namaschaug Hill". Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 17. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by George Joslin to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 to gravel and blacktop the Holman Hill Road to the residence of Richard Wood, four tenths of a mile. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 18. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Russell Johnson to pass over this Article concerning raising and appropriating the sum of \$9,000.00 to gravel and blacktop the road to the residence of Henry Hellus, seven tenths of a mile. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative and the Article passed over.

Article 19. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and supported by Ronald Guyette to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the purpose of clearing up and leveling off the parcel of land deeded to the Town by the Harry Allen Estate, thereby making lots available in the Spofford Cemetary. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 20. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Arvid Pearson to authorize the Road Agent to repair two culverts in Spofford; (1) on Cross Street near the junction of Sping Street, and (2) on Spring Street near the pond known as Lake Elizabeth; funds for this to be taken from the maintenance acount. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 21. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and supported by Arvid Pearson to instruct the Selectmen to move the extra street light on the west side of Spring Street and Route 9 to a point near the intersection of Route 9 and Route 9A East of Spofford Village. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 22. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Winston Cray and supported by Clifford Chickering to raise the sum of \$125.00 to install 3 street lights between the residence of Imogene Chickering and the residence of Paul Stalk. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 23. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Winston Cray and supported by Henry Chickering, Jr. to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,900.00 to install a furnace in the Town Hall. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 24. Vote by voice vote on motion made by E. Davies Allen and supported by R. Willard Beebe that the Town appoint a Citizens Action Committee the purpose of which shall be

to bring to the attention of the Board of Selectmen all violations of the Chesterfield Zoning Ordinance, said Committee shall also initiate necessary follow-up action so that either compliance, penalty, or other resolving action will be effected. Written or verbal reports of alleged violation, not previously directed to the Selectmen, may be directed to said Committee for investigation, said Committee shall be appointed by the Moderator and shall consist of no more than three members, none of whom shall be Selectmen. The Moderator being in doubt asked for a hand count. This resulted in "Yes" 32 and "No" 49. The Moderator declared the motion was lost.

Article 25. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Agnes Chickering and supported by George Joslin that the World War II Memorial Fund in capital reserve be used to pay for the Monument authorized by the Memorial Committee. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 26. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Robert Callahan to accept the sum of \$100.00 from the estate of Florence R. Bennett, the income to be used for the care of the T. N. Robertson Cemetery. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 27. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Agnes Chickering and supported by H. Claude Mowry to accept the sum of \$200.00 from George L. Fuller, the income to be used for the perpetual care and upkeep of the George L. Fuller lot in the Spofford Cemetery Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 28. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Winston Cray and supported by H. Claude Mowry to amend the Article so that it would read "To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Wilfred H. Richardson, Sr. and Helen E. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Clifford Chickering and supported by H. Claude Mowry to accept the Article as amended. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative, and the sum accepted.

Article 29. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Winston Cray and supported by Clifford Chickering to amend the Article so that it would read "To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Eva G. Robbins Kingsbury, the income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the perpetual care and upkeep of the Herbert E. Robbins lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery". Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Clifford Chickering to accept the Article as amended. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative and the sum accepted.

Article 30 Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Winston Cray to accept the sum of \$200.00 from John Orr and Arvid Pearson the income from same to be paid annually for perpetual care in Spofford Cemetery and to be known as the Orr and Pearson Trust Fund. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 31. Leonard Laskowski asked for a report on the new Friedsam Cemetery. Clifford Chickering reported that this Spring they expected to have some lots available if any one wished them. No other business appearing the meeting was recessed by the Moderator at 8:10 P.M.

Question 3. Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of beano be adopted in this town? "Yes" had 166 votes and "No" had 75 votes. Therefore the above provisions for playing games of beano were adopted.

SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

Chesterfield Central School Chesterfield, New Hampshire

March 11, 1967

The Moderator called the meeting to order at 3:02 P.M. and the Clerk read the Warrant through Article 1. The Moderator, Harry E. Winn, then declared the polls open for balloting for the necessary District officers.

Prior to the meeting, the following were appointed ballot clerks by the School Board: Agnes B. Chickering, Anna C. Hubner, and Phyllis Henchey. They took the oath of office from the Moderator. A count of the ballots showed 693 ballots.

Seconded by Leonard Laskowski. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 8. Voted by voice vote on a motion made by Lillian Lane that the district vote to authorize the school board to enter into tuition contract with the Frances Hicks and Austine Schools. Seconded by James E. O'Neil. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 9. Voted by voice vote on motion made by James E. O'Neil that the district vote to raise and approboard with sufficient funds to install a new sewage line priate a sum not to exceed \$1,000 to provide the school from the kitchen to the septic tank at the rear of the school. Seconded by Agnes B. Chickering. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 10. Voted by voice vote on motion made by James E. O'Neil that the district vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$247,771.67 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for the school district officials and agents and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the district. Seconded by Carl Johnson. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 11. Voted by voice vote on a motion by James E. O'Neil - Resolved that the Chesterfield School District direct the School Board, on behalf of the voters of the District, to express to the members of the New Hampshire General Court in Concord, New Hampshire, the hope and the necessity of implementing more fully the various forms

of educational aid that are presently on the statutes; further resolve, that the New Hampshire General Court take whatever steps are necessary to implement more fully the forms of aid to education. Seconded by Agnes B. Chickering. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin that the following resolution be adopted unanimously: (See attached resolution) Seconded by James E. O'Neil. Motion was unanimously carried in the affirmative.

No other business coming before the meeting, the Moderator recessed the business meeting at 8:55 P.M. Balloting continued until 9:00 P.M.

At 9:01 P.M. the Moderator declared the polls closed. A count of the ballots resulted as follows: Number of votes cast 156.

For Moderator for the ensuing year: Harry E. Winn had 136 votes and H. Claude Mowry had 6 votes. The clerk declared Harry E. Winn elected Moderator for the ensuing year. He took the oath of office from the clerk.

CHESTERFIELD SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM REPORT

July 1, 1966 To June 30, 1967

The goal of the National School Lunch is "to safeguard the health and well being of the nations children"

The need for contributing to the adequacy of children's diets has been met by providing a School Lunch planned to supply a great part of the student's daily nutritional requirements. School administrators and health workers recognize the fact that school lunch can be used as a means of promoting nutrition education. It gives children the opportunity to know and like foods that they have not seen or eaten before.

It is the hope that real progress will result from a serious, determined effort on the part of all school people and parents to exploit the great potential of school lunch services.

The Hot Lunch Program opened September 12, 1966, with Mrs. Louise Scharles as Manager and Mrs. Marion Berry as her assistant.

The reimbursement rate from Federal Funds remained at 4c for each Type A meal served to children. Surplus Commodities received from the government made it possible to keep up the old price of thirty cents for children and thirty-five cents for adults.

Under the Special Milk Program, we received four cents reimbursement for each half-pint of milk served, so children could buy milk for two cents each half-pint.

About 200 to 225 balanced meals are served daily.

Menus of the School Lunch Program are made up in advance for the entire month and copies are given to each child and teacher; thus the parents know what the children are eating each day.

Thanksgiving Day Turkey Dinners with all the trimmings were served.

The Hot Lunch Program was managed without financial help from our township.

Monadnock Children's Special Services Center

Many of you are familiar with the Monadnock Children's Special Services Center because of the information provided to you last year, either in the form of town reports or in notices sent home by the school to you as parents, or as interested board members. I would just like to review this briefly with you, and then tell you some of the activities that are in progress within the Center and within the four supervisory unions served by the Monadnock Children's Special Services Center.

The Center, established under a Title III grant from the U.S. Government, diagnoses, evaluates, and provides follow-up activities for children with learning problems which make it difficult or impossible for them to function in the present classroom situation. This service is free to all

school children in the four school systems of Cheshire County. It has a well qualified staff who bring experiences from different parts of the country and includes two full time psychologists, one full and two part time social workers, one full and four part time educational consultants, three part time speech therapists, and consultants of pe-

diatrics, neurology, and psychtiary. As of October 31, 1967, the Keene Supervisory Union with its related towns, sent in 138 referral forms in which they requested specific answers to problems relative to a child. The majority of these children have been evaluated, conferences have been held at the Center with parents and teachers, and many of the children are now receiving periodic visits from members of the Center staff. The educational consultants go to the school and talk with the teacher and we also provide and remedial or diagnostic support that we can obtain. In many cases, we have made recommendations that children be changed to another class or another situation, so they will realize their maximum growth in the school. School personnel have been most willing to cooperate in following our recommendations. The parents provide helpful background information, and are receptive to suggestions made at the time of parent conferences.

The Center is providing speech therapy programs and has had workshops for teachers at the Center to explore new techniques and to inform them of additional resource materials available. Much of this material is on display at

the Center.

CHESTERFIELD SCHOOL DISTRICT 1966-67

The aims of a school health program are threefold. One - To protect and ensure the student's health Secondly - Demonstrate, teach and establish good health habits

Thirdly - Ultimate goal being: A healthy child is beter able to attain his full potential.

These aims and goals of our health program are accomplished through health services available.

Physical exams - every student every 2 years except 7th and 8th grade boys participating in sports these are examined each year.

Urine test - done in conjunction with physical 2. exams.

3. Vision Tests - on every student each year.

Hearing Tests - on 1st, 3rd, 5th, 7th grade, plus 4.

Immunization clinics: These are conducted for 5. pre-school, school youngsters, and adults to enable our population to receive needed boosters or series.

92 students and 8 staff were tested.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

To the Citizens of Chesterfield:

On September 6, 1967 Chesterfield School opened with an enrollment of 302 students, as compared with 295 students in September of 1966. We presently have 294 students and will undoubtedly have over 300 by the end of the school vear.

This year we have eliminated the use of the auditorium

as a classroom at the expense of having one large first grade instead of two smaller ones. To compensate for the large first grade, we have employed a teacher's aid. We also have large second, fourth and eighth grades. The other grades are at or near a ratio that is ideal and is recommended by the State Departement of Education. We are anticipating an enrollment of 36 students in grade one for next year. Thus, the trend appears to be set for larger classrooms in the future unless some type of building program is undertaken to relieve the situation. We are now able, however, to use the auditorium for educational activities.

Title I

The Title I Project under the Federal Act of 1965 is again being continued. However, due to a cut in appropriations we have had to modify the program. Mrs. Doris Parker is continuing as the teacher on a half day basis, but she is working with a smaller number of children in grades one through three and only in the areas of reading and phonics. By necessity, arithmetic has had to be discontinued. Despite the limitations placed upon the program it is proving to be of valuable help to the students attending.

Faculty

We are faced again this year with the problem of a large turnover of teachers that has been present for the past several years. We now have a staff of 12 teachers, seven of which are new. Through the efforts of Mr. Bellavance and Mr. Cusick we have been fortunate in finding capable replacements.

The following teachers are new to Chesterfield this year: Miss Beverly Kovacs in grade three, Mrs. Marilyn Jarvis in grade 4, Miss Lois Jacobson in grade 6, Mr. Samuel Hackler in grade 6, Mrs, Rosemary Ryll in grade 7, Mr. James Fletcher in grade 7, and Mrs. Joan Hurst in grade 8. Mrs. Doris Lemnah is working with Mrs. Lysitt as a teachers' aid. Miss Kovacs and Mrs. Hurst return after teaching in another community last year.

We are very fortunate in having Mrs. Lysitt in grade 1, Mrs. Scruton in grade 2, Mrs. Fuller in grade 3, Mrs. Haviland in grade 5, and Mrs. Dunn in grade 5 return for another year.

Supervisory Union

Effective July 1, 1967, Chesterfield became a part of the Keene Supervisory Union No. 29. Through the efforts of Mr. John Day, Superintendent, and Mr. James Cusick, Assistant Superintendent the changeover was smoothly performed. Due to the fact that our high school students attend Keene High School and that there is a close and cooperative relationship within the new Supervisory Union, I feel that our students will benefit considerably in the future.

What Are Our Needs For The Future?

Education is continually on the move. New developments, such as new methods, materials, and equipment are constantly arriving on the scene. We must continually study these to see which best suit our needs.

We need more facilities, such as classroom space, library space, an audio-visual center, physical education space, larger kitchen, and more and larger storage space.

Our Curriculum needs to be studied and revised continually and expanded to include an art, and guidance program. Music and physical education programs should be expanded.

Teachers are the most important phase of our education program. We must attract quality teachers and retain those that we have. Large turnover of teachers that we are accustomed to must be eliminated. To do this we must not only offer pleasant working conditions, ample supplies and equipment, but we must compensate them in a manner that will allow us to remain competitive within the area.

We need to provide educational opportunities not only for the average student but for the gifted and the students who have handicaps. To accomplish this we must have the services of specialized professional people and the necessary facilities.

We can accomplish this in two ways - Employing here at the school what is needed and is reasonable and also through the cooperation of other schools within the Supervisory Union.

I wish to take this opportunity to express my thanks to the pupils, teachers, parents, board members, citizens, and administrators for their assistance and cooperation during the year.

ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

TO THE BOARD AND CITIZENS OF CHESTERFIELD

It is with pleasure that I submit this, my first annual report, as Assistant Superintendent of Schools.

As most persons are now aware the Chesterfield School District and four other towns have joined together with the city of Keene to form a new Supervisory Union for purposes of state supervision and administration. Each of the six communities contribute a share to the support of the Superintendent's office, determined by the valuation of taxable property and the pupil enrollment. Chesterfield's share in 1968-1969 will be 6.47%.

Annual maintenance projects continued in your school this year, including new lighting in the corridor of the original building, re-tiling one classroom floor, installation of a new sink and new stove, a new sewer line, and others. Projects of this type seem to be never-ending, but the old adage "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure" certainly applies to this area of plant maintenance.

Preparation of the budget for the 1968-69 school year was begun by the teachers and principal early in November of 1967. They spent much time and effort, and since then the administrators and board members have carefully reviewed and revised it. Although the increase is substantial at first glance, much is caused by an almost \$17,000 increase in High School tuition alone. One additional elementary teacher is also proposed, and this cost, added to the tuition, account for about three-quarters of the total increase.

Again this year, as in several past years, the teaching staff is made up of a majority of new teachers to Chesterfield. Recruitment is highly competitive, and teacherturnover takes its toll on the quality of education.

The proposed amount of money does not merely pay thirteen teachers but principal, secretary, music supervisor, teacher-aide, and substitutes as well.

Teachers everywhere are sucessfully requesting and receiving not only higher salaries, but fringe benefits and established salary schedules as well, so that they will be able to foresee their financial future. This is a costly expenditure, but the most important educational expense we have, and presents an area for all of us to face up to a course of action for Chesterfield.

I would be remiss if I did not mention the fine work of supporting staff members: Mrs. Davis, Custodian; Mrs. Scharles and Mrs. Berry, Cafeteria; Mrs. Chickering, Nurse, and Mrs. Zuccale, Secretary.

I have found the teaching staff to be quite effective, knowledgeable, capable, understanding, and cooperative. Space permitting, each would deserve a paragraph of commendation. Suffice it to say that they are deserving of community support, and have my thanks and appreciation for not only their teaching but for assisting in bringing about smooth transition to the new Supervisory Union.

In closing may I express my sincere appreciation to all residents for their understanding and cooperation. Chesterfield has a school in which citizens may take justifiable pride. I look forward eagerly to continued educational work in the community.
