You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, on Tuesday, the 11th day of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To vote and bring in ballots for election of Town Officers to be elected by ballot for the Town of Columbia for the ensuing year.
- 2. To see if the Town will instruct its Selectmen to appoint all other Town Officers as required.
- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the Poor for the year ensuing.
- 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the Old Age, Blind and Disability Assistance for the year ensuing.
- 5. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the repairs of highways and bridges.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to take such action regarding plowing or otherwise keeping Winter Roads open in said Town for the year ensuing, as in their judgment seems conducive to the best interest of the Town, and appropriate money for the same.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for Construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$559.73, the State to contribute the sum of \$3,731.54.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply any surplus remaining in their hands at the end of the fiscal year 1968 to the defraying of Town Charges for the fiscal year 1969 in order to effect a proportionate reduction of the amount to be raised by taxes.
- 9. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the upkeep of cemeteries
- 10. To see what action the Town will take with reference to hiring the Colebrook Fire Precinct and the Stratford Fire Department for the purpose of extinguishing fires in said Town, and in the event of favorable action to make necessary appropriation for the same.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to incur debts for temporary loans in anticipation of the taxes for the ensuing year, and to pay such debts out of tax money when the same is received.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deeds.
- 13. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the support of Town charges for the ensuing year.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise money for the purpose of uniting with the 45 other Towns in the White Mountains Region Association in publicizing and otherwise promoting the natural and commercial factors upon which the economy of the North Country is based.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to contribute to the North Country Community Services, Inc., and appropriate for said purpose the sum of \$441.00.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the old Town Truck.

With the allocated "grace period" granted by the State Board of Ecucation, it has become especially important that Supervisory Union No. 7 analize its school systems, determine their status, and plan for the direction that these schools will take in the immediate future.

These are not decisions that can or should be made by your appointed school personnel and elected administrative boards alone, for in the last analysis it is you, the voter and taxpayer, that will determine the course and direction that your schools will take.

These decisions become even more complex when considered in light of recent events. Our texts still relate on Columbus's three month voyage over the ocean blue, yet in the past few months three men retraced this historic voyage in fourteen minutes and thirty two seconds and repeated this fantastic accomplishment one hundred and thirty two times in eleven days. Even more recently man compounded this feat by traveling to the moon and observing sights never before seen by man. God's greatest mystery, the secret of life, is now revealed to man with his understanding and duplication of the DNA molecule. The moral, social, and religious implications of this scientific discovery are yet to be realized. More history and scientific advancement has been made the last forty years than during man's entire previous span on this planet. Man is no longer concerned with "why" and "how" but with "when" and "how soon".

We can not ignore that these events are having and will continue to have a tremendous impact on education and society, and we are fortunate that we have time to meet this challenge. With the advent of elementary school standards, goals and long range plans will have to be examined and re-examined. What educational services and needs that can or can not be realistically provided

must be determined with the greatest thought and community effort. Whether we can afford to prepare our children for a jet and space age orientated society or whether we can afford not to is a decision that each of us will be involved in making.

To meet this challenge through individual community planning and action, and if need be, through inter-community planning and sharing, can and will result in the assurance of maintaining our excellent educational standards and schools and preparing our youngsters for a realistic future.

School Health

The objectives of a school health program are to perform the necessary functions to maintain and promote good health of the pupils in our schools.

Services performed include: pre-school clinics every spring for in-coming first graders; checking heights and weights, vision and hearing yearly; physical examinations for all students in grades 4, 8, 11 and athletics; immunizations as necessary; T B skin tests as recommended by the state T B Association and continuous supervision of general health.

January through April, a dental health clinic sponsored by the local towns and the state in what is called a Matching Fund Program, was held in Groveton one morning a week. Due to transportation difficulties and cancellations from weather conditions, only twenty-two youngsters from the whole district were treated this year.

We were fortunate to have a dental hygienist from the state department of Dental Health come and visit all the elementary schools in the area. She gave us interesting instruction in the ways of achieving and maintaining good dental health.

Generally, the overall program of school health in this area is adequate, but there is always chance for improvement. It is hoped that by working together, these improvements can be realized to the mutual benefit of our students and the community as a whole.

VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURE

Vocational Agriculture is a four year program at Colebrook Academy. Beginning with the ninth grade, students in the program receive introductory instruction informing them of basic agriculture and opportunities available in that field. Second year students are instructed in the basic principles of agricultural sciences involving shop, laboratory, and field trips. The objective of the first two years is to give the student an understanding of the economic importance of agriculture and a chance to learn of careers that the industry offers.

Third and fourth year students receive specialized instruction in dairy and forestry and are required to perform practical work in both fields. In addition, fourth year students are also required to take a course in farm mechanics to develop skills ranging from woodworking to engine rebuilding. A 40 acre school woodlot also provides an area for third and fourth year students to do practical work in forestry and sugar bush management.

Since this is a year round program all students are required to do supervised summer placement work in a field of their choice and to keep records of the same.

The local chapter of the Future Farmers of America has been active since 1931. This is an intra-curricula organization that teaches students leadership, good citizenship through association, and development of skills through field and judging trips. The chapter also sends delegates to the national FFA conventions where skills are further displayed and more skills obtained.

Budget

The School Board has requested for its budget an appropriation of \$61,886.00 for fiscal year 1969-70. A sum of \$28,900.00 has been determined as the estimated income, leaving a balance of \$32,986.00 to be appropriated through taxes. This represents as of 26.6% in comparison to the current fiscal year.

The principal reason for said increase is contributed to the higher cost of education. Over the past two years the schools in the surrounding area have seen a sharp increase in their per pupil expenditure. Therefore the schools are compelled to raise their tuition rates to keep in line with their per pupil expenditure. Additional increase is due to an increase in Columbia's apportionment to the Supervisory Union costs.
