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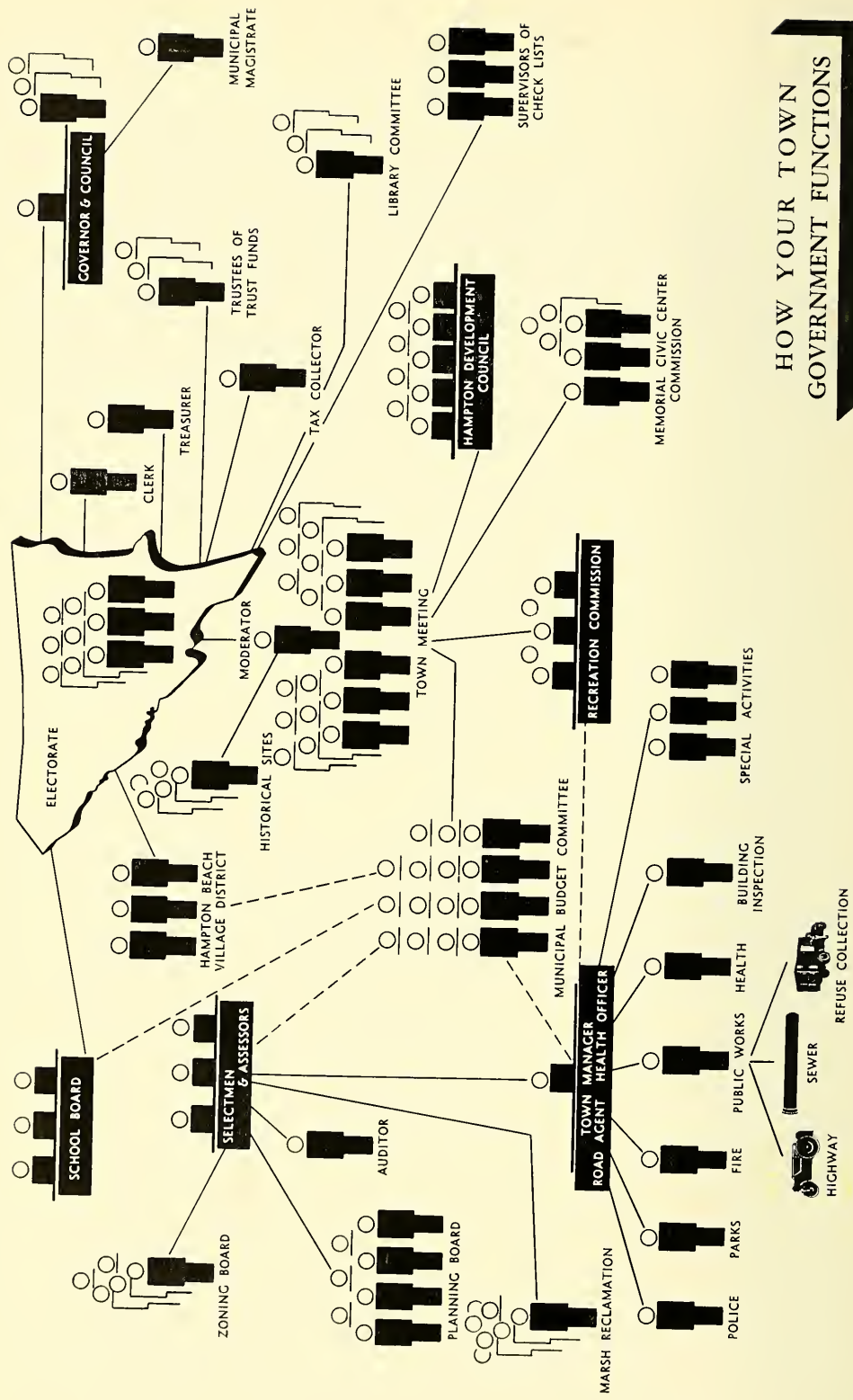

REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN and TOWN MANAGER

The financial picture for the fiscal year of 1958 indicates a successful year of operations. There was a budget surplus as of December 31, 1958 of \$54,308.54. The Board of Selectmen voted to reserve the sum of \$41,654.29 to complete projects already committed or under contract. The sum of \$12,654.21 remains as cash surplus which will be used to reduce the 1959 tax rate.

The Board of Selectmen hold a regular weekly meeting each Friday at the Town Offices from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. In addition their attendance is required at many special meetings during the course of the year, as well as frequent trips to Concord to represent the interests of the Town of Hampton. The problems of Hampton are not those of the usual New Hampshire town but rather

are more comparable to the cities. The assessed valuation of Hampton is higher than many of the cities in the State. The constantly increasing population of the Town, which is expected to top the 6,000 mark in the 1959 census, has brought with it increasing demands for municipal service, and presented many complex problems to the governing body. Following are highlights and some of the programs which were completed in 1958:

JANUARY

Special Town Meeting January 22, 1958 approved sale of a portion of the High Street parking lot making possible the construction of the Hampton National Bank.

Dedication of Lane Memorial Library addition January 5, 1958.

FEBRUARY

Awarded contract for reconstruction of manholes at Hampton Beach.

Received results of soil tests for Marsh Highway

from New Hampshire Department of Public Works and Highways.

Revised system of accounting for gasoline and oil supplies.

Established Public works garage for equipment repair.

Two major snow and ice storms caused power failures; emergency generator at Marston School provided heat and light for several families evacuated to the school.

MARCH

Advertised for bids for the construction of an addition to the Town Office and awarded the contract to John Breen.

Advertised for bids for a tractor-loader and awarded contract to R. C. Hazelton.

Purchased replacement engines for the 1951 and 1955 Ford trucks.

Completed reconstruction of a portion of the Winnacunnet Road drain.

Purchased spray machine for Dutch Elm disease spraying and mosquito control.

APRIL

Received bids for purchase of police cruiser and dump truck and awarded contract.

Completed reconstruction of Mace Road from Five Corners to Mill Road, using TRA funds.

Completed removal of several thousand cubic yards of sand from parking lot and comfort station area at Hampton Beach.

MAY

Awarded purchase of tax anticipation notes to Rockingham National Bank for interest rate of .80%.

Procured several hundred rock maple trees from State Forestry Nursery for roadside planting.

Completed installation of new pumping unit at Hampton Beach sewer plant.

Completed manhole reconstruction program at Hampton Beach.

Awarded contract for sidewalk reconstruction on High Street.

Awarded contract for repaving of the Depot Square area.

Opened Municipal Parking Lots at Hampton Beach.

Began spraying program for Dutch Elm disease control.

Fire Department training program started under direction of State Deputy Marshal, H. G. Whitney.

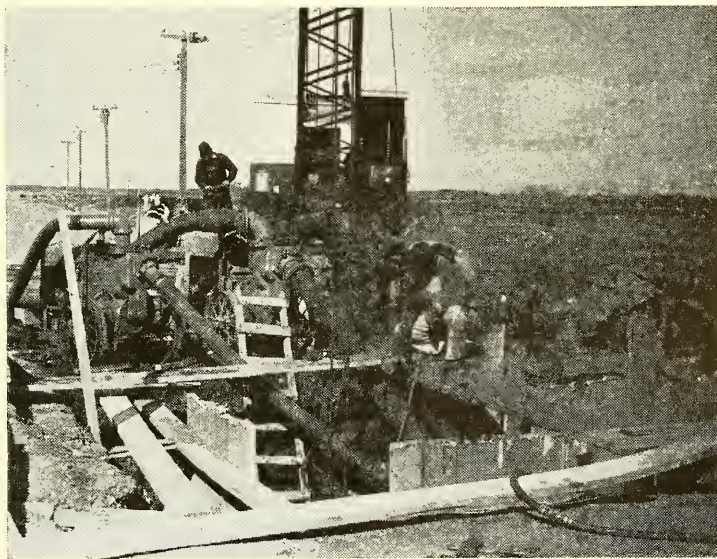
Erected flag pole in Depot Square Park.

JUNE

Signed lease with School District Union for lease of "Martel" house on Academy Avenue.

Completed storm drainage system in Surfside Park.

Recruited approximately 100 additional employees for seasonal requirements.

JULY

Purchased bridge steel and piling for Tide Mill Bridge.

Completed landscaping of Town Office lawn.

Started annual road tarring program.

Received bids for repair of bulldozer.

Acquired "Sno-Go" machine from federal surplus property.

AUGUST

Formed Regional Water Rate Committee to protest rate increase proposed by Hampton Water Works Company.

Requested the Coast Guard to revise buoy system in Hampton Harbor following meeting of local boating interests.

Attended meetings of the Seacoast Regional Beach Erosion Committee. Town Manager Batchelder appointed as chairman.

Authorized construction of sidewalk from High Street parking lot to Lafayette Road.

SEPTEMBER

Approved retirement of Chief George Lamott and Bernard Felch from the Fire Department.

Attended first of a series of hearings before the Public Utilities Commission relating to the Hampton Water Works Company rate case.

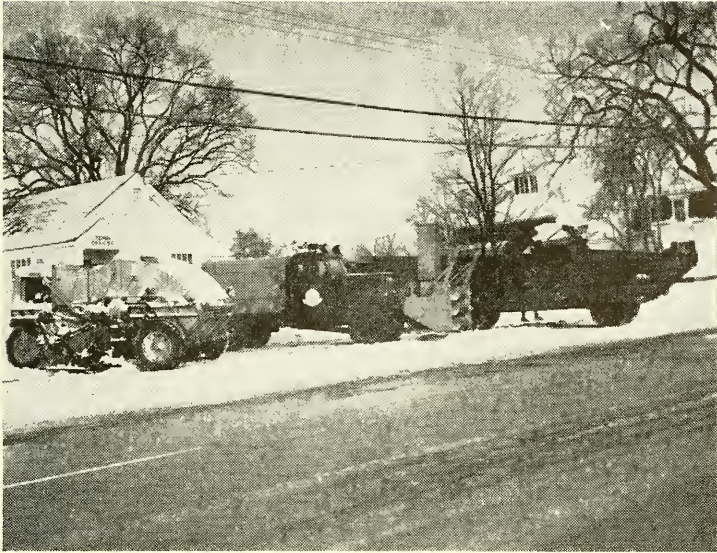
Appointed Perley George as Chief of the Fire Department.

Acquired U. S. Army "Dukw" from federal surplus property for life saving operations at Hampton Beach.

OCTOBER

Completed permanent surfacing of 3/10 miles of Mary Batchelder road.

Completed installation of efficient and low cost communication system. Two-way radio now connects Police

Headquarters, Fire Station, Town Office and maintenance shop with eight mobile units, available in case of any emergency. Monitor units in Headquarters enable contact with State Police and all seacoast police departments from Rockport, Mass. to Portsmouth.

Completed construction of sanitary sewer on Ann's Lane.

NOVEMBER

Received bids for removal of diseased elm trees and awarded contract.

Received bids for annual supply of rock salt for winter highway maintenance.

Acquired street sweeper from federal surplus property.

DECEMBER

Received bids and awarded contract for construction of Winnacunnet Road sewer.

Completed construction of sanitary sewer into Leavitt Road.

Street lighting modernization program for the business section of Lafayette Road was completed utilizing modern mercury vapor lighting.

Received notice from New Hampshire Public Utilities Commission that Hampton Water Works Company had been granted a rate increase, however, the effective date was advanced from July 1, 1958 to January 1, 1959 thereby giving a temporary saving to water customers of approximately \$14,000.00.

Engaged Mr. E. N. Roberts, C. E. to prepare a report on municipal ownership of the Hampton Water Works Company.

Highlights of Important Municipal Programs Proposed For 1959

1. Continuation of storm drainage replacement at Tuck Memorial property.

2. Construction of storm drainage at Philbrook Terrace.
3. Construction of sanitary sewer systems in Leavitt Road, Blake Lane, and Philbrook Terrace.
4. Major repairs to the Municipal Court building, and the Comfort Station.
5. Increased fees at parking lots and comfort station to produce greater revenues.
6. Purchase of closed garbage truck to provide better service in refuse collection.
7. Tree planting program to replace street trees destroyed by Dutch Elm disease.
8. Completion of harbor marking system by U. S. Coast Guard to provide safer navigation in the harbor.
9. Construction of Tide Mill Bridge in cooperation with the Department of Public Works & Highways.
10. Continuation of sewer line repair program at Hampton Beach.

The foregoing represents not only completed projects in 1958 but also projected projects to be completed in 1959.

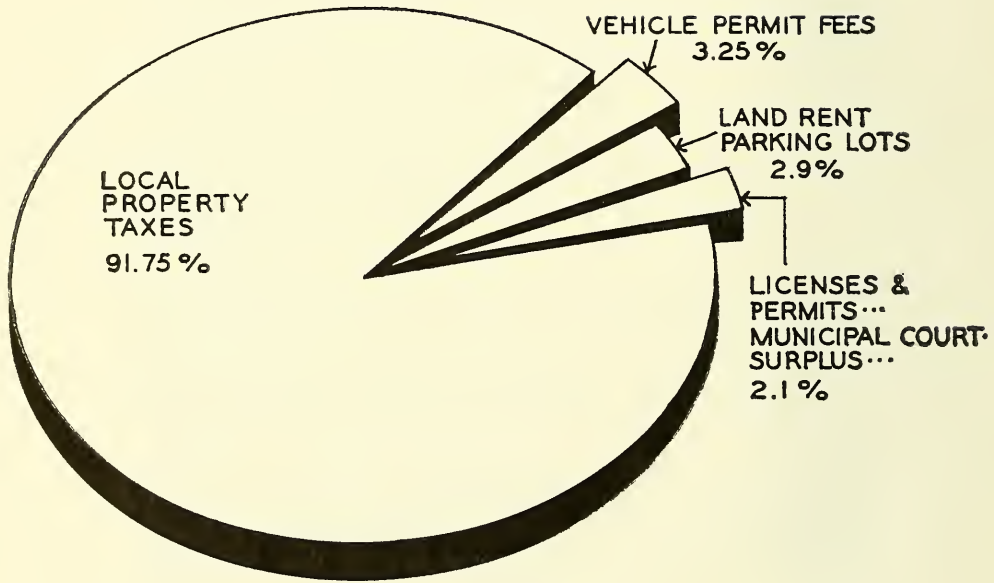
Hampton is a rapidly growing community and many problems lie ahead. We believe that the funds requested to provide municipal services are in line with good municipal government practices.

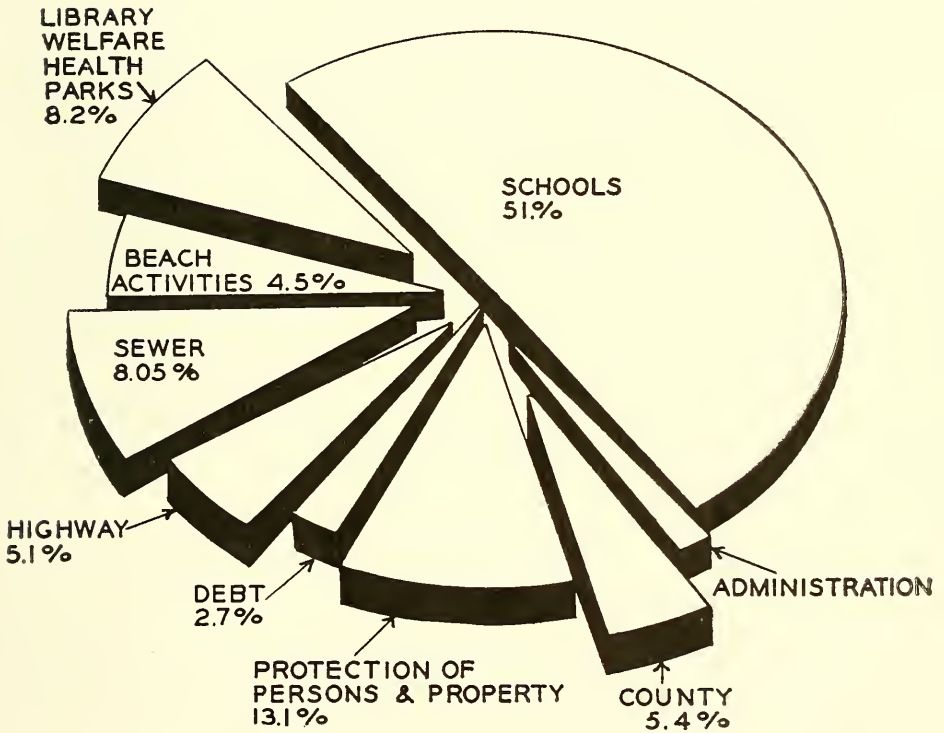

TOWN CLERK

The Town Clerk, who is an elective official, has custody of the Town Records and public documents, the Town Seal, maintains Vital Statistics, is responsible for Election and Primary Returns which must be certified to the Secretary of State, has charge of Absentee Voting, and records the minutes of all Town Meetings.

She also has custody of the Jury List, the selection of Jurors, administers oaths, and furnishes certified copies of any public record or document requested.

Because of Hampton's unique ownership of land — the Town Clerk prepares Town Leases and has charge of recording and filing same: records Maps and Plans, Utility Licenses, Writs, Liens, Attachments, Conditional Sales, Bills of Sale, Personal Mortgages and Town Appointments: Issues Sewer Entrance Permits, Burial Permits, Miscellaneous Business Licenses, Marriage Licenses, Dog Licenses and Motor Vehicle Permits. Many things which a Town Clerk does do not bring revenue to the Town, but are required of all Clerks, by State Statute.

A report and copy of all Vital Statistics recorded must be made and sent to the State Registrar at the end of each month.

Vital Statistics showed a marked increase in number over previous years.

During the last three weeks of March, which is the period of heavy registration of automobiles — the Secretary to the Town Manager assists with Motor Vehicle Permits, part time, and also takes the place of the Town Clerk during her vacation.

Town Reports and Records of Births, Marriages and Deaths have been permanently bound.

The Town Clerk also acts as Registrar for Selective Service Board No. 8 of Exeter, for "The Hamptons." This was requested, but is a voluntary service.

TAX COLLECTOR

The Tax Collector's Office, composed of an elected Tax Collector and the part time help of the Manager's Secretary, is charged with the responsibility of collecting and receiving the real and personal property taxes essential to the operation of the Town. The Tax Collector in Hampton is also charged with the responsibility of collecting land rent fees for the leased lots at Hampton Beach.

During the year 1958 the entire structure of the tax collector's office was thoroughly studied, recommendations were made by the auditors and put into practice to provide better service to the public.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

The aim of the Police Department is to prevent crime, maintain peace and order, enforce laws and ordinances and protect lives and property from malicious damage and injury. It is a twenty-four hour a day task and not an easy one. The Town of Hampton Police Department performs more investigations than most city departments in this State. The week end population at Hampton Beach during the summer is approximately 85,000 persons in residence. The permanent force of Chief John Malek, Sergeant Lloyd C. Ring and four patrolmen is expanded during the summer months by the employment of approximately thirty special officers. Life saving operations are directed by the Chief of Police with a force of approximately fifteen life guards during the summer season. The Hampton Department

in cooperation with the Federal Bureau of Investigation conducted a week long training school for approximately 30 officers. The school was concluded by a full days firearms training at the pistol range constructed in the gravel pit.

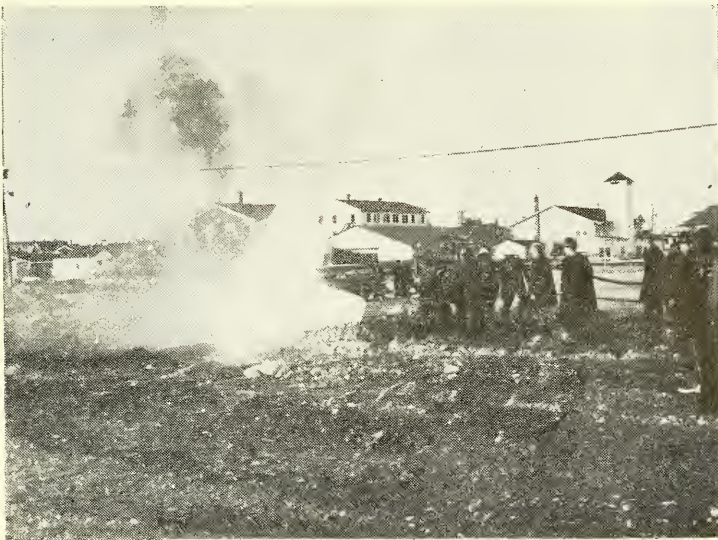

FIRE DEPARTMENT

The chief mission of our Fire Department is to protect buildings in our Town valued at approximately thirty million dollars (based upon replacement costs). In order to accomplish this mission there is a permanent force of ten men consisting of Chief Perley R. George, Deputy Chief Victor A. Bogrett, Captain Laurice H. Brown, and seven firemen. The Department could not function efficiently without the active support of forty-two call men who are available at any hour of the day or night.

The staff of the Fire Department and all the town's people regret this year the retirement of Chief George Lamott and Bernard Felch, both of whom rendered many years of efficient service in the Fire Department.

The work assignments in the department do not only concern fire fighting but the men are also responsible

for equipment maintenance, building maintenance and most important of all, the maintenance of the fire alarm system. The ice storms in February, 1958 took down several miles of fire alarm wire which was replaced by the members of the department. In addition to that, the line on Mill Road, and also on High Street, both of which were many years old, were replaced. The department has had a long range program of fire alarm box replacement and each year five boxes, most of which are thirty or more years old, are replaced with modern equipment.

The department acquired a foam generator, one hundred cans of foam powder, a field range, lanterns, stretchers, fire extinguishers and hand tools from federal surplus property during the year.

The State Fire Marshals office and members of our local department inspected all hotels and commercial establishments for possible fire hazards during the month of June. We again called upon the Fire Marshal's office to institute a training program for all members of the department. Regular drills have been held in addition to the week long course supervised by Deputy Fire Marshal Whitney.

MUNICIPAL COURT

Regular sessions of the Municipal Court are held every Saturday morning at 9 o'clock at the Municipal Court room. Traffic, criminal and civil cases are heard by the Judge of the Municipal Court who is appointed by the Governor and Council, and a complete and accurate record of all proceedings is kept by the clerk. All regular sessions of the court are open to the public.

During the year ending December 31, 1958 a total of 538 cases was heard by the court. Fines collected and retained by the Town of Hampton amounted to \$3,936.85.

Town Warrant For 1959

TOWN OF HAMPTON

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hampton, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Junior High School Auditorium in said Hampton on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, 1959 at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose by Australian Ballot one Selectman for Three years, one Town Clerk, one Town Treasurer, one Collector of Taxes, four members of the Budget Committee for three years.

ARTICLE 2. To choose all other necessary officers for the ensuing year.

(The polls for the election of officers and to vote on any other articles which may appear on the ballot, will be open at ten o'clock in the forenoon and will not be closed earlier than six o'clock in the afternoon of the same day.)

ARTICLE 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the Budget as submitted by the Budget Committee and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$501,572.00 for Town purposes.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen and Town Treasurer power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen power to administer, sell or otherwise dispose of any real estate acquired through tax deeds.

ARTICLE 6. On petition of Virginia Dunbrack and sixty other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of sixty-five hundred dollars (\$6,500.00) for the installation of storm drainage along Ashworth Avenue.

ARTICLE 7. On petition of Donald A. Ring and ten other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of sixty-five hundred dollars (\$6,500.00) for the installation of a sanitary sewer system and fixtures on Hobson Avenue at Hampton Beach.

ARTICLE 8. On petition of Harry I. McDormand and thirteen other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the town will appropriate the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) for the purpose of levelling of land to be used as a Town Parking Lot, located in the rear of the Hampton Co-Operative Bank, extending from bank to Post Office.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) to begin the construction of a Public Works garage in the vicinity of the town-owned gravel pit on Landing Road.

ARTICLE 10. On petition of Brendan R. Sullivan and seventeen other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00) for the installation of storm drainage and fixtures on Lamson Lane.

ARTICLE 11. On petition of James Rush and ten other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) to install a fire alarm box on Island Path at a centrally located position on Leavitt Island.

ARTICLE 12. On petition of Lawrence M. Douglas and eighteen other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven thousand dollars (\$7,000.00) for the installation of a sanitary sewer system on Philbrook Terrace.

ARTICLE 13. On petition of Lawrence M. Douglas and seventeen other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) to pay for the cost of installing a storm drainage system for Philbrook Terrace.

ARTICLE 14. On petition of Harry I. McDormand and nineteen other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of sixteen thousand dollars (\$16,000.00) for the extension of the Leavitt Road sewer from the end of the street to High Street.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Hampton, adopted at the Annual Town Meeting on March 8, 1949 and amended at subsequent Town Meetings, as follows:

A. By adding after Sub-Section 2, Section 4, Article III, the following: A. Trailers, Trailer Camps, Mobile Homes, or Mobile Home Sub-divisions, shall be permitted only in the General District and only in conformity with the requirements herein provided under Sub-Section 4, Section 3, Article I.

B. By amending Sub-Section 4, Section 3, Article I, by striking out the word "Area" and inserting in place thereof the word, "district" and to amend the words "general residential district" as it appears in the Zoning Ordinance so that it shall read "general district", these changes being made to make the ordinance conform so far as terminology is concerned.

C. By adding in Section 4, Article IV after the word "erected", the words "placed, moved or otherwise located", and after the words, "in area" the words "and which does not include a street frontage of at least 100 feet", and by striking out the words "or less than 100 feet in width" and inserting in place thereof the words "and which does not have an average width of 100 feet", and by adding at the end of the Section the words "and no lot shall be reduced in size by division into component lots with less than 100 feet in average width and with less than 100 feet of street frontage, and with less than 10,000 square feet in area for each such component lot", so that Section 4 as amended shall read as follows:

"In a Residence A District no dwelling shall be erected, placed, moved or otherwise located, on a lot containing less than 10,000 square feet in area, and which does not include a street frontage of at least 100 feet, and which does not have an average width of 100 feet unless such lot is on record in the Rockingham County Registry of Deeds prior to the adoption of this section; and no lot shall be reduced in size by division into component lots with less than 100 feet in average width and with less than 100 feet of street frontage, and with less than 10,000 square feet in area for each such component lot."

D. By amending the Zoning Ordinance by striking out of the ordinance Sub-Section 7, Section 3, Article I (as it is already covered by Sub-Section 2 of said Section 3).

E. By amending Sub-Section 8, Section 3, Article I by striking out the words "or variance" in both the third and the fourth lines thereof (since this section only applies to exceptions).

F. By adding at the end of Article III the following new Sections:

Section 7. When a lot contains frontage on more than one street, any business establishment situated on such lot shall be so arranged that:

(1) its front elevation shall face whichever street frontage is zoned for commercial use, and

(2) the principal access to said lot shall be provided from said street zoned for commercial use, and

(3) any parking space provided on said lot shall be furnished with an appropriate hedge or other approved landscaping device so as to screen the parking and service area from the nearest street or streets, and

(4) a plan for satisfactory compliance with the foregoing requirements shall be approved by the Building Inspector.

Section 8. When a business zoning district boundary parallels a street, and in crossing any other intersecting streets thereby includes in the business district any lots fronting on a street zoned predominantly for residential purposes, said lots, if developed for business purposes, shall be so arranged that:

(1) the front elevation of the principal structure shall face the street zoned predominantly for business purposes, and

(2) the principal access to said lots shall be provided from the street zoned predominantly for business purposes, and

(3) any parking space provided on said lots shall be furnished with an appropriate hedge or other approved landscaping device so as to screen the parking and service area from the nearest street or streets, and

(4) a plan for satisfactory compliance with the foregoing requirements shall be approved by the Building Inspector.

G. By creating a new district "Residence AA" and adding the same to the Zoning Ordinance after "Residence A South of Winnacunnet Road" said District to be defined as follows:

RESIDENCE AA — Exeter Road (North Side)

Beginning at the intersection of the centerline of Exeter road with the town line separating Exeter from Hampton; thence following said town line in a generally northeast direction to the intersection of said town line with the town line separating North Hampton from Hampton; thence following said town line generally easterly to the intersection of the easterly side line of the Hadley's Garage parcel projected northerly to said town line; thence generally southerly following the projection of the easterly side line of the Hadley's Garage parcel to a point 500 feet north of the centerline of Exeter Road; thence generally westerly at a distance of 500 feet parallel to the centerline of Exeter Road and on its north side as far as the westerly lot line of the Exeter and Hampton Electric Company right of way; thence southerly a distance of 500 feet along said westerly lot line to the centerline of Exeter Road; thence westerly along the centerline of Exeter Road to the point of beginning.

RESIDENCE AA—Exeter Road (South Side)

Beginning at the intersection of the centerline of Exeter Road with the town line separating Exeter from Hampton, thence following the centerline of Exeter Road generally easterly to its intersection with the westerly lot line extended of the Exeter and Hampton Electric Company right of way; thence following the westerly lot line extended and the westerly lot line of said right of way southerly a distance of 500 feet; thence proceeding generally easterly parallel to the centerline of Exeter Road and at a distance of 500 feet from it to the centerline of Timber Swamp Road; thence following the cen-

terline of Timber Swamp Road generally southerly to its intersection with the centerline of Old Stage Road; thence following the centerline of Old Stage Road generally southwest to its intersection with the town line separating Hampton Falls from Hampton; thence following said town line generally northwest to its intersection with the town line separating Exeter from Hampton, thence following said town line generally northeast to the point of beginning.

H. By adding after Section 4, Article IV the following three new sections:

Section 4a. Residence AA Districts. In Residence AA Districts, the maximum height of any structure shall not exceed three stories or 40 feet in height, nor shall any residential structure contain less than 900 square feet at the ground floor level.

Section 4b. No structure in a Residence AA District shall be erected, placed, moved or otherwise located closer than 20 feet to the nearest lot line, or closer than 15 feet to any other building on the same lot. Steps or ground level terraces shall not be considered a part of the structure for the purpose of this section, but all porches, piazzas, and other similar elements shall be considered a part of the structure.

Section 4c. In a Residence AA District, no dwelling shall be erected, placed, moved or otherwise located on a lot containing less than one acre in area, and which does not include a street frontage of at least 200 feet, and which does not have an average width of 200 feet unless such lot is on record in the Rockingham County Registry of Deeds prior to the adoption of this section; and no lot shall be reduced in size by division into component lots with less than 200 feet of street frontage and less than 200 feet in average width and with less than one acre for each such component lot.

I. By adding in Sub-Section 7, Section 3, Article I, and in Article II, and in Section 1, Article III, and in Section 1, Section 3 and Section 5 of Article IV-A after the words "Residence A" the words "Residence AA" so to add to each of these six sections the words "Residence AA".

J. By creating a new Residential C Seasonal District, Nudd's Canal — Tide Mill Creek Area, and by adding the same to the Zoning Ordinance after "Residential C Seasonal District" said District to be defined as follows:

RESIDENTIAL C SEASONAL DISTRICT

Nudds Canal—Tide Mill Creek Area

Beginning at the point where the centerline of Nudds Canal extended northward intersects the Residence "A" zoning boundary near Hampton Landing, thence following said Residence "A" zoning boundary generally northeast to Tide Mill Road and further to the point where said boundary line intersects with the Business "B" zoning boundary line drawn parallel to and south of Winnacunnet Road; thence following said Business "B" boundary line generally easterly to its most easterly point near Ocean Boulevard; thence following said boundary line generally southerly and southwesterly successively to the intersection of said boundary with the northern boundary of the Residential C Seasonal District near the intersection of Church Street and Glade Path; thence westerly following said northern zoning district boundary of said Residential C Seasonal District westerly to Tide Mill Creek, then southerly by said Tide Mill Creek to the centerline of the Hampton River; thence westerly along the centerline of the Hampton River as far as its intersection with the centerline of Nudds Canal; thence northerly along the centerline of Nudds Canal to the point of beginning; mean-

ing thereby to change to Residential C all the marshland, so-called, situated east and northeast of Nudds Canal and now included in a General Zoning district.

K. And to authorize the Planning Board to properly integrate the above amendments into the Zoning Ordinance, to make the Zoning Ordinances conform where necessary so far as terminology is concerned and to change the zoning Map in accordance with the above-named Districts.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the town will vote:

a. to authorize the Board of Selectmen to investigate the advisability of the formation of a Water District and the purchase of the Hampton Water Works Company;

b. to authorize the Board of Selectmen to request the Legislature to authorize the creation of a Hampton Water Works District, said District to be operative when accepted by the voters of the Town of Hampton, and said District to be authorized to acquire the Hampton Water Works Company in accordance with the terms of the Enabling Act;

c. to authorize the Board of Selectmen to obtain from a competent engineering consultant a detailed report on the advisability of the District purchasing the Hampton Water Works Company;

d. to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) for the engineering expenses and the services of Bond Counsel to prepare the Enabling Act. Said twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) to be returned to the Town of Hampton upon capitalization of the bond issue.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eleven thousand five hundred dollars (\$11,500.00) to cover the expenses of the Marsh

Reclamation Commission. The proposed expenditures include funds for a tax map of the marsh area, the administrative organization of the Marsh Reclamation Authority, engineering, legal fees and public relations expenses.

ARTICLE 18. On petition of Donald A. Ring and ten other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000.00) to purchase land adjacent to the the town-owned gravel pit; twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) to be raised this year and the remainder to be raised over a six year period.

ARTICLE 19. On petition of Dean B. Merrill and twenty-four other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of forty-five hundred dollars (\$4,500.00) to build a police building at the intersection of Exeter Road and Lafayette Road.

ARTICLE 20. On petition of Donald A. Ring and ten other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) to purchase the land adjacent to the town parking lot, land known as Swain land; fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) to be raised this year and the remainder to be raised over a three year period.

ARTICLE 21. On petition of Everett W. Mann, Commander of Hamptons' Post No. 35, American Legion, and seventeen other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the town will vote to reserve the lot of land between the present Memorial Lot in the High Street Cemetery and George Avenue, to be used for Memorial Day and other Memorial exercises.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the town will vote to accept the street known as Mooring Drive, subject to the approval of the Selectmen.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the town will vote to accept the street known as Hobson Avenue, subject to approval of the Selectmen.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the town will vote to accept the street known as Naves Road, subject to the approval of the Selectmen.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the town will vote to accept the street known as Red Coat Lane, subject to approval of the Selectmen.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the town will vote to accept the street known as Quinlan Lane, subject to approval of the Selectmen.

ARTICLE 27. To receive the reports of the special committees which were authorized to report at the Annual Town Meeting.

ARTICLE 28. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The newly renovated Library and the addition were dedicated on Sunday, January 5, 1958 with appropriate exercises, after which refreshments were served by a caterer.

On January 6, after a closing of four months, the usual days of opening were resumed until after the town meeting, when an increase in appropriation made it possible to have the Library open every weekday at the same hours, 2:30 to 5:00 in the afternoon and 7:00 to 9:00 in the evening.

On March 16, at a meeting of The Friends of The Library, a silk flag was presented to the Library by the American Legion, the presentation being made by Commander George Barwick and accepted by the chairman of the Board of Trustees, Dr. Harold Pierson.

Hampton Public Library entertained the New Hampshire Library Association for the Fall Workshop session on Thursday, September 25. The meeting was held in the Goody Cole Room of Lamies Tavern, with registration at 9:30 A.M. Nearly 100 were in attendance. The session was under the direction of William Weitzel, President, and greetings were given by Dr. Pierson, chairman of the Trustees and Mrs. Helen Hayden, Town Clerk, for the town officials. Films, under the direction of Miss Marjorie Stroud, were shown during the morning. Luncheon was served at 1:00 o'clock. The speaker for the afternoon was Dr. Lowell A. Martin, Dean, Graduate School of Library Service, Rutgers University. His theme was State-Wide Library Action. At 4:30 Open House was held at the Library and light refreshments were served by The Friends of the Library.

Book Week was observed from November 2 to 8 with a display of new Juveniles. The Poster bore the slogan, "Let's Explore With Books." This year marks the 40th anniversary of Book Week.

Books have been loaned to teachers for use in the classrooms and the Bookmobile has left collections at the Library. We thank the donors for several gifts of books.

The displays on the Peg Board and in the display cases have been under the direction of Arthur Johnson, Chairman of the Art Committee of The Friends of the Library, who has spent considerable time, thought and energy on planning and arranging the displays. These displays, which are changed every month, have been varied and of much interest to the public. Descriptions of them have appeared in the Hampton Union. Many thanks are due to Mr. Johnson for his untiring effort.

The Reading Room and the Teen-Age Room for study are a decided improvement and the separate Children's

Room is much appreciated both by the children and the Library staff. Many new residents are enrolled among the patrons of the Library.

The attractive Christmas Tree was donated by Mr. Johnson and decorated by Girl Scouts. The Christmas Wreath was given by the Garden Club.

We are grateful for the enlarged space provided by the addition, for the excellent lighting system and the overall improved appearance of the Library. Many thanks are due to Mr. Wheaton Lane and to the Town of Hampton for their interest and generosity.

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Hampton for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1958, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Municipal Court, Library, Cemetery Association and Trustees of Trust Funds.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets — Dec. 31, 1957 — Dec. 31, 1958
(Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1957 and December 31, 1958, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$26,783.58 in 1958.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

**Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures
Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 & A-4)**

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1958, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of \$331.42, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$12,322.79, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$12,654.21.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1958, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1958, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Statement of Bonded Indebtedness: (Exhibit I)

A statement of bonded indebtedness as of December 31, 1958, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit I.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) increased by \$5,283.58, from \$105,265.54 to \$110,549.12, during 1958, as indicated herewith:

Overstatement of Assessed Valuation:

When the 1958 tax rate of the Town was approved by the Tax Commission, the total valuation of taxable property as submitted in the "Summary Inventory of Valuation", upon which the tax rate is based, was overstated by approximately \$414,000.00. This was due to an error which occurred in arriving at the total valuation figure. As a result the actual amount of property taxes committed in the original warrant fell short of the budgetary requirements by \$21,185.72. This was partially offset by added taxes which amounted to \$8,286.22 (Exhibit A-4).

Collector's Excess Credits:

It is noted that the Collector's accounts indicated net excess credits of \$4,904.22. Therefore the amount of uncollected taxes, as of December 31, 1958, as indicated in Exhibits C-1 and C-2 and in the Balance Sheet (Exhibit A-1), is subject to changes which may be occasioned by the return of tax verification notices.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, require that the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) of this report shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Hampton for their assistance during the course of the audit.
