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

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Harrisville:

I herein submit my third annual report as superintendent of your schools.

Horace Mann, the father of the free system of public schools in New England, once said:

"Whatever ground of confidence there may be for the perpetuation of our civil and religious liberties; whatever prospect of the elevation of our posterity; whatever faith in the general Christianization of the world—these aspirations and this faith depend upon teachers, more than upon any, more than upon all, other human instrumentalities united."

Whether we accept this statement in its entirety or not, there is no doubt that millions of children now have a better chance in life because of the work of Horace Mann. Our Democracy is surer, our ideals of living and of serving are higher because of his leadership. Our great American public school system owes to him a debt larger than to any other single man.

As is the teacher, so is the school, is a long standing maxim of American life.

We trust in this report we may furnish some reasons that will compensate the tax payer and make the citizens of Harrisville feel that the chances of the rising generation of boys and girls are better because of the service that their schools have rendered unto them during the past year.

This was Miss Guild's second year of service in this school. Miss Guild proved herself an efficient instructor. Her school was always well organized and doing good work. She was not only alive to her duties in the school room but also took an active part in the playground activities. A school of twentyfour pupils with six grades demands not only good organization but also strenuous effort on the part of the teacher to conserve the utmost economy of time during school hours, much time outside of school hours for preparation and strict conformity to modern types of teaching.

Miss Hickey continued her services throughout the year ending June 30. Miss Hickey proved herself efficient in instruction and alert to the interests of the children, not only in the school room but also on the playground. The children always appeared responsive to all the activities of the school life.

The following standard tests were given: Ayres Spelling, Charter's English, Woody-McCall Arithmetic, and Stanford's Achievement. The results showed a reasonable improvement over the year previous. Miss Helen Murphy, a graduate of Keene Normal, was elected for the year beginning Sept. 8th. Miss Murphy has the school well organized and is receiving the co-operation of scholars and parents. Through her motivated teaching, the school has taken on that additional industry in work, courteous bearing and polite manners that it is a pleasure to visit the school. Not only is efficient work being done in the fundamentals, viz., reading, spelling, numbers, geography, history and English, but also commendable work in music and drawing. Through the efforts of teacher and scholars a Victrola has been obtained for the school.

REPAIRS: The following needed improvements have been made to the school room: fresh coats of paint for the floor, walls and ceiling; seats cleaned and varnished and new hyoplate blackboards installed.

CHANGE IN HIGH SCHOOL TUITION LAW

The last legislature made a radical change in high school tuition. That all may become familiar with its basic principles, I herein insert an excerpt of the law: Chapter 120, Section 26: "Any district not maintaining a high school or school of corresponding grade shall pay for the tuition of any child who, with parents or guardian, resides in said district, and who attends high school or academy in another district in this state, and the parent or guardian of such child shall notify the school board of the district in which he resides of the high school or academy which he has determined to attend; provided, however, except as in section 21, that no district shall be liable for tuition of a child in any school, in excess of the average cost per child of instruction for the regularly employed teachers of that school or of all the public schools of the state, and the cost of textbooks, supplies and apparatus during the school year preceding and in senior high school work only."

In conclusion, I wish to acknowledge the cordial co-operation of citizens and parents, and to express my gratitude to the school board, who have given liberally of their time for the good of the school system.
