THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Jackson in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Jackson on Tuesday, the eleventh of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To raise \$2,380.83 to rehabilitate Town Treasury for overexpenditures in 1951.

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the following purposes:

4. Maintenance of summer highways and bridges.
5. Snow removal from highways and dooryards and sanding highways.
6. Street lighting.
7. Old Age Assistance, J. H. Hodge account and poor relief.
8. Maintenance of Cemetery.
9. Memorial Day exercises.
10. Maintenance of parsonage.
11. Town library.
12. Fire Protection.
13. Police protection.
14. Memorial Hospital.
15. Sidewalk construction.
16. Jackson Ski and Outing Club.
17. Skating rink.

To see if the town will raise and appropriate sums of money as follows:

18. The sum of \$2,763 for State Aid Reconstruction on six-mile circuit, state contributing the sum of \$5,524.

19. The sum of \$212.87 to secure Town Road Aid, state contributing the sum of \$1,419.13.

20. The sum of \$200 to extend Tin Mt. Road.

21. The sum of \$92.16 for support of White Mountains Region.

22. The sum of \$847.93 to rehabilitate Town Treasury for money spent resurfacing Thorn Hill Road in 1951.

23. The sum of \$750 for a cement floor in Town Garage.

24. The sum of \$300 to install heat in the upstairs room in the schoolhouse.

25. The sum of \$200 to cut top of hill on Iron Mt. Road opposite resident of F. Dubie.

26. The sum of \$100 to be matched by an equal contribution by James Mursell to reconstruct approach from Black Mt. Road to his bridge across Great Brook.

27. To see if the town will vote to tar "Mill Street" in said town from its intersection with State Highway 16A to the cemetery and raise and appropriate money for same agreeable to petition by Edwin C. Meserve and others.

28. To see if the Town will vote to request the Trustee of the Georgia A. Wentworth Fund "Wildcat River" to contribute to the construction of a sidewalk South of the retaining wall on the South side of the Falls Hill Road, beginning at the lower end of said wall and continuing up the hill between said wall and the Wildcat River so far as money now available in said Trust will permit; the sidewalk to be constructed under the supervision of and in such manner as the Selectmen approve after the assent of the landowner, commonly known as the Wentworth Hall Company is by the Selectmen obtained. (The Trustee advises that there is available for such us an approximate amount of \$4,500.)

29. To see if the town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the town the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old-Age and Survivor's Insurance

as authorized by Chapter 234 of the Laws of 1951 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 to defray the town's share of the cost thereof.

30. If the foregoing article is adopted, to see if the town will authorize the selectmen to execute on behalf of the town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the town will designate the Town Treasurer as the Officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

31. To see if the town will vote to make a turn-out on the road leading from six-mile circuit to the residence of Fred Maynard and raise and appropriate money for same agreeable to petition by Fred B. Maynard and Beatrice C. Maynard.

To see if the town will vote as follows:

32. To impose summons of \$.20 on poll taxes uncollected after October 15th, 1952.

33. To authorize Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes.

34. To authorize Selectmen to sell real estate acquired by tax deeds.

35. To act upon any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDENS

In the past year your local forest fire organization did a very fine job of pre-suppression and suppression of forest fires. Our early spring was very dry and with extra high winds and all our fires were during that period. We find that the general public is still very careless with matches and cigarettes.

In the "Keep America Green" program there is a story of two bad boys who cause most of our forest fires. The first one we call, "I don't care." He is the person that builds fires anywhere, never gets a permit to burn brush or has a safe place for his home incinerator. He is also very careless with matches and cigarettes. The other one is called, "I don't know any better," and the best way to describe him is a plain dunce. It is only with your help that these two bad actors are controlled. Their carelessness can be the cause of our pretty and valuable woodland to be destroyed by fire. Even your own home can be burned by them.

It is up to you and you alone to report these two characters to your local forest fire warden whenever you see them operating. To have our woodlands green and our mountain streams clear, your co-operation is needed by:

1. Seeing that your incinerator is tight and is sitting on clean ground.
2. Always clean a space about any open fire to prevent it from spreading.
3. Never burn in dry windy weather.
4. In all cases a written permit is required from your local town fire warden.
5. Be sure that your matches, cigarettes and pipe ashes are out before discarding.

It is with your cooperation that this shameful waste of timber and money can be stopped.

Since dental care is a year-round program I am very happy to report an 82% correction of all dental cavities. This is a slight increase over the past few years, and parents should feel proud of their personal efforts.

We were unable to hold our customary Child Health Conference and Immunization Clinic this year, as our State Nurse has been at school preparing for her B.S. Degree. However, plans are under way to have the clinics this coming year.

I wish to express my appreciation for the help I have received from the members of the School Board, Superintendent, P.T.A., and State Sight Conservation Program. Their co-operation has made this program possible.
