#### WARRANT

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

- To the inhabitants of the town of New Durham, in the County of Strafford, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:
- You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said New Durham, on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:
- Article 1. To choose the necessary town officers for the ensuing year, one selectman for three years, one trustee of trust funds for three years, one fire commissioner for three years, one chief of police, one tax collector, one clerk, one treasurer, one road agent, one library trustee for three years.
- Article 2. To vote for delegates at large, alternate delegates at large, delegates and alternate delegates to the national conventions of the various political parties to be held to nominate party candidates for president and vice president of the United States.
- Article 3. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to hire money on credit of the town to pay its just debts.
- Article 4. To see what discount, if any the town will allow on property taxes and on what dates same shall be allowed.
- Article 5. To see if the town will raise and appropriate fifty-one dollars for the Lakes Region Association.
- Article 6. To see if the town will vote to accept state aid for construction on King's highway, the town to raise and appropriate seven hundred and sixty-nine dollars and fifty cents, the state to give one thousand five hundred and thirty-eight dollars.
- Article 7. To see if the town will allot all rents from town hall to its upkeep.
- Article 8. To see what action will be taken in regards to hourly pay for hand labor.

- Article 9. To see if the town will vote to rescind its action in regards to having road surveyors appointed for each district.
- Article 10. To see if the town will vote to elect a road agent and fix hourly pay.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to place that portion of the town shed that is used as a fire station under jurisdiction of the fire commission.
- Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate two thousand dollars on serial notes to complete payments on grader.
- Article 13. To see if the town will accept Meader road, so called. By request.
- Article 14. To see if the town will accept Jones road, so called. By request.
- Article 14A. To see if the town will vote to hold town meeting in the evening hereafter.
- Article 15. To see if the town will vote to accept the budget estimates as recommended by the budget committee.
- Article 16. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year.
- Article 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

#### FOREST FIRE PROBLEM SERIOUS

The year 1947 was one of the worst periods of drought and forest fire occurrence in eastern United States history. Lack of water ruined crops, lowered water levels and dried up brooks everywhere. Three months of deficient rainfall and abnormally high temperatures resulted in many fires which were mostly well controlled and kept within bounds. Only the high winds beginning on October 23rd caused a few fires to escape beyond immediate control. These few fires resulted in burning some 15,000 acres and the loss of 63 or more buildings in four New Hampshire towns.

All October fires were costly. They burned deeply in the ground and required day and night patrol of large crews of men until the rains came late in October. Towns which escaped from serious fires might easily have been in the midst of the most serious conflagrations we had.

Governor Dale closed the woods effective at midnight of October 15th. With the blow-up of October 23rd, a second proclamation closed all back roads and authorized towns to inaugurate patrol. The effect of this was to cut down subsequent fires for the rest of the dry period.

Local fire warden forces performed an admirable job to hold the more than 200 fires that occurred during this October period. Many men were taxed to the utmost as the emergency continued. To them and all those who did their work, the people of New Hampshire owe a debt of gratitude. The state forest fire control agency based on local town wardens and town crews wherever adequately equipped rose to the occasion and met the test in whatever town their services were needed.

It is now time to take stock everywhere of our fire fighting facilities for the season ahead and to make them adequate where necessary. To this end town fire plans, and training programs for wardens, deputies and other key men in each district are being arranged or in progress. If equipment and tools are insufficient properly to equip the available man power in each community

with the right tools for the job, they should be provided for at once. The yearly addition of fire tools to the town supply will generally need to be built up. The state sells tools to the towns and shares one-half their cost. Good equipment is important and can help greatly to keep both damage and fire costs at a minimum.

For many years we have requested our wardens not to issue burning permits except on rainy days. This regulation will be in effect again this year as it is one of the best means of assuring such fires from getting out of control. Nine out of every ten fires can be prevented, 98 per cent of all fires being due to human carelessness. Be sure to get a permit for any fire in or near woodland when the ground is free from snow. Be sure your fires are always out before you leave them. Help us in getting the travelling public to keep from throwing out lighted matches or cigarettes. Be careful of all fires in or near woodland.

# Report of the Superintendent

As I prepare my annual report, I remind myself, as I should like to remind you, that this is a report of YOUR public schools, a vital part of our way of life. They must be maintained at a high level of operation and efficiency if we are to produce the educated, intelligent electorate so essential to the preservation of our democracy. The fact that our area is typical of 80% of our country should show us that we cannot relax and rely on the large centers of population to produce our future leadership.

# 1. Problems and Conditions General to the Union Teachers:

Acquiring and maintaining a superior faculty continues to be the most pressing problem. At no time this year have all of the children in this Union been under the direction of regularly assigned teachers. Some students have had as many as four different teachers. Twenty-seven new teachers of fifty-five in the Union were needed for the opening of schools this past fall. Six additional vacancies have occurred during the school year. Three additional teachers were required to meet increased enrollments.

Despite the fact that the average district in this Union raised its teachers an average of four hundred dollars over a year ago, several very fine teachers were lost to schools, both in and out of New Hampshire, paying four to six hundred dollars more than was offered in this area. The continued inflationary trend has tended to offset this increase which seemed such a forward step a year ago.

The shortage of teachers continues. New Hampshire institutions will graduate 167 teachers in June and, at this time, 197 vacancies are known. Fortunately, teachers do not seek salaries alone. With your help in providing adequate housing facilities, in making teachers feel that they are welcome members of the community, and by supplying them with equipment and pleasant places in which to work, we have been able to secure for your children a fine corps of teachers. Mothers' Clubs have helped materially. Interested parents mean a great deal to any teacher. In several cases, former teachers have returned to help keep your schools operating. It is to be hoped that this fine group of teachers can be retained for another year.

# Buildings:

During the past year all districts have made some strides in repairing and painting buildings neglected during the war years. In two districts all class-rooms were redecorated. Some floors were resurfaced. New heating units were installed in two schools. Two districts provided additional space. Four districts began to replace poor lighting and one other district is prepared to start its program this year.

# School Lunches:

Five of the six districts in this Union have Hot Lunch Programs in operation. In one district this was made possible through the Mothers' Clubs soliciting six hundred dollars for permanent equipment.

# Text Books:

Text books, worn and out-dated, since they could not be replaced during the war years, are rapidly being discarded as new text books can be selected and secured.

# Transportation:

While transportation is being provided for all children legally entitled to receive it, only one new vehicle was secured during the entire year. However, of the twenty-eight vehicles operating, only two can be considered to be substandard, and both of these are operating on routes over which it would be impractical to place better equipment so long as the roads are as bad as they are.

#### Recommendations:

School boards must continue to be provided with adequate funds to attract qualified and capable teachers if instructional standards are to be kept high.

Parents and interested citizens must continue to press for state and federal legislation in behalf of the schools.

Desirable living quarters must continue to be made available to teachers.

Minor repairs must continue to be made to restore long neglected buildings to protect the buildings, as well as the health and safety of the children.

Transportation facilities should be improved when equipment becomes available.

## 2. Our local situation

Definite improvement of the instruction of your children has been made possible by the additional classroom space provided. The third classroom has reduced the load each teacher has to carry by lessening the number of pupils and number of grades in each room. At the same time, all of your children have been kept together so that they can share the facilities of the moving picture machine, the library, the hot lunches and assemblies.

Your Grange has been generous in providing the sound moving picture projector and screen as well as new lights for the room in the town hall.

Your librarian has been helpful by making the facilities of the library available to the children one af-

ternoon each week.

Through the cooperation of the selectmen and school board, improved heating and toilet facilities have been installed in the town hall. These facilities benefit not only the children but all who use the town hall.

Slightly more than fifty per cent of the pupils are

buying the hot lunches served at school.

The two rooms in the Plains school have been

painted in attractive pastel shades.

The playground equipment has been reconditioned, and the new jungle gym, purchased the previous year, has been set up.

Mrs. Drew took courses at the University of New Hampshire last summer, including a course in Visual Aids, which prepared her to operate the moving picture machine.

To the school board, board of selectmen, members of the Grange, parents, interested citizens and teachers, I should like to express satisfaction with the progress which has been made as a result of your cooperative effort.

# PART V. AUXILIARY ACTIVITIES and SPECIAL REPORTS

# (a) Report of School Health Work

To the Townspeople, School Board and Superintendent of Schools:

While trying to get a serious tonsil case operated upon, the child came down with scarlet fever. This made it necessary to watch the situation very carefully. The tonsils could not be removed until summer. About two months later, two other cases appeared in another family, but there was no other trouble with scarlet fever.

Very little epidemic sickness was reported other than this. There was one case of chickenpox, and very recently two cases of mumps threatened the school.

One child with a bad skin infection was gotten under treatment and another badly cut hand was gotten treatment by a physician. A bad burn case was given first aid and taken to the doctor. Such cases are promptly reported by the teachers so that adequate treatments can be given promptly.

Audiometer tests of hearing were given both by the Western Electric group testing machines and by the Maico clear tone individual testing method. Only one child was found bad enough to need treatment by a

specialist and this was promptly secured.

Several problem cases were discussed with parents and officials and were finally satisfactorily solved. Corrective work was planned for the summer vacation

months and all necessary details were arranged.

A talk was given at the New Durham Grange where several school and community problems were discussed. Most of these problems are being worked out by the school officials and the community. The overcrowded condition in the school has been solved for the time being. The problem of hot lunches has been very difficult to plan but they are now being started with the cooperation of public spirited citizens. Hot lunches will be very beneficial to the pupils and it is hoped they can be successfully served.

A dental clinic was discussed but it was decided to leave this program until the hot lunch program has been

# PART VII. WARRANT FOR SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the school district in the town of New Durham, N. H., qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall, in said district on the ninth day of March, 1948, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects.

Article 1. To choose a moderator for the coming year.

Article 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
