THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of New Hampton in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said New Hampton on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of highways and bridges and make appropriations for the same.
4. To see if the town will vote to accept State aid and raise and appropriate \$2,368.00 for the same.
5. To see if the town will vote to accept class V road assistance and raise and appropriate \$727.76 for the same.
6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for Memorial Day and make appropriation for the same.
7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for Old Home Day and make appropriation for the same.
8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$300.00 for the support of Laconia Hospital to be used to pay for the care of needy residents of the town.

9. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$400.00 for control of Pine Blister Rust and make appropriation for the same.

10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds.

11. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$425.00 for the purchase of snow plow to be used on truck.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the improvement of old cemeteries.

14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$158.00 to the Lakes Region Association of New Hampshire for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region.

15. To see what action the town will take in regard to disposing of snow rollers.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to repair the town pound located in rear of town house.

17. To see what action the town will vote to take in regard to the purchase of a fire truck.

18. To see what action the town will take in regard to installing electric lights in the town house and raise and appropriate money for the same.

19. To see if the town will vote to extend the street lights from the residence of Karl Patten to Lewis Shaw's residence.

20. To vote on the following question: Is it expedient to revise the constitution?

21. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Citizens of New Hampton:

This, my third report as your superintendent, deals with the following subjects:

- (a) Statistics of our schools.
- (b) Our school buildings.
- (c) The Sanborn school.
- (d) Health and physical welfare.
- (e) Acknowledgments.

In the foregoing table, a few facts deserve special mention. New Hampton's school year was nearly four days longer than the state median. Our attendance record, with the exception of the Fiske school, was uniformly good, and the Sanborn school made an outstanding record for good attendance. Tardiness, on the other hand, was all too frequent in all the schools but one, the Sanborn School, which had no tardinesses at all.

Our School Buildings

We have six school buildings with a total capacity of 136 pupils. The following table shows the normal capacity of each schoolroom, and the number of pupils at present enrolled. It also shows the amount of window lighting, expressed as a percent of the total floor space. (The State Board requires that the window area in a schoolroom shall equal 20% of the floor area.)

Of the six school buildings now in use, the village school is the least satisfactory. Some years ago it was enlarged by lengthening it to include the entry as part of the classroom. This made a room about 22½ by 41 feet; but as it has a low ceiling, it proved impossible to locate the windows high enough to provide good light for the blackboards, or for the pupils seated on the opposite side of the room. The combination of low ceiling and extraordinary room length has also prevented

proper distribution of heat from the jacketed heater, so that one end of the room is apt to be much colder than the other. Playground facilities are conspicuously inadequate.

From time to time, in years past, the question of replacing this school by a more satisfactory building has been discussed; but we still have the condition described above. An article in the school warrant permits action on the question again this year. I hope that a committee may be appointed at the district meeting to study this question thoroughly, secure estimates, and make recommendations for later action by the voters.

The Sanborn School

It was suggested last summer that the Sanborn school be closed, and that its pupils be sent to Bristol. Several of the parents definitely favored such action. The school board, after a hearing which was well attended by parents and others, voted two to one against closing the school.

I understand that several years ago, when pupils in this neighborhood were attending school at Bristol, we were told by the Bristol school authorities that their schools were so crowded that they could no longer accommodate New Hampton pupils; hence the Sanborn school was reopened. The present Bristol board has voted to accept these pupils, but in view of the fact that the schools across the river are now even more congested than they were at that time, we are led to doubt that such an arrangement would continue to be satisfactory year after year. Knowing that Bristol is considering plans for enlarging its school facilities, it was thought best to postpone closing the Sanborn school for a year at least, in the hope that when more room is available, the Bristol board will be glad to accept tuition pupils from New Hampton as a permanent proposition.

Health and Physical Welfare

Because of accident and subsequent illness, Miss Helen Nichols resigned her position as school nurse last April, and we have been fortunate in securing in her place a woman of long experience in school work, Miss Eva M. Nelson. Miss Nelson does her work in an efficient and thorough manner.

A dental clinic last May, through the cooperation of Dr. Sargent and various organizations which assisted with sums of money, made possible the treatment of 39 pupils who had defective teeth. More work still remains to be done.

Our attendance this year, especially at the village school, has been very poor on account of many cases of mumps and measles.

Acknowledgments

The community served by the Old Institution school raised the sum of \$45.00 to purchase swings for the school playground. Further funds were raised by the same neighborhood to purchase music stands for their orchestra, which now has 10 enthusiastic members.

In the Plaisted school, prize money gained by collecting eggs and nests of tent caterpillars was used to purchase swings.

We are very grateful to the people who generously assisted in carrying pupils to and from the dental clinic last May.

Conclusion

This report has made no comment on the main every-day job which the teachers are doing—the job of building better citizens for the next generation. In mentioning the unusual details such as have been included here, I do not mean to suggest that the commonplace

task well done is not worthy of the highest praise. The teachers deserve our sincere commendation for their faithful efforts, as well as the parents and school board for their willing cooperation.
