TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Orford, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Orford, on Tuesday, the 12th of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year; also to choose one Selectman for three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds, one Library Trustee for three years.

Article 2. To hear the budget of the Town and raise and appropriate any money recommended therein or pass any vote relative thereto.

Article 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year.

Article 4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of Town Highways and Bridges for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for insurance purposes.

Article 6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the removal of snow and care of Town winter roads for the ensuing year.

Article 7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of electric lights.

Article 8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Orford Free Library and Orford Social Library.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectman to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to dispense with the distribution of inventory blanks until the Selectman appraise the property.

TOWN WARRANT — (Continued)

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectman to sell and administer property acquired by Tax Deed or otherwise.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the use of the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to accept the State Aid for the construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate the sum of \$555.97 for that purpose.

Article 14. To see what action the Town will take concerning the Orford Common and to raise and appropriate any money made necessary by such action.

Article 15. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of Common.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to cover the expenses of Memorial Day.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the control of Pine Blister Rust and \$150.00 for care of trees.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$100.00 to be paid over to the Federal Airport Project.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 annually in the years 1963, 1964 and 1965, to finance the celebration of the bicentennial of the Town of Orford.

Article 20. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for increased police protection.

Article 21. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to complete the Orford Free Library building.

Article 22. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to be turned over to the Trustees of Trust Funds for purchase of road equipment.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to place three historical markers on the Orford East and West Commons, and to see how much money it will vote to raise and appropriate for same.

TOWN WARNING — (Continued)

Article 24. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to be turned over to the Trustees of Trust Funds for fencing and smoothing of extension to West Cemetery.

Article 25. To see whether the Town will promote a planning and development program by:

(a) Voting to create a municipal planning board of 5 members with powers and duties prescribed by RSA Ch. 36 and other provisions of law; and

(b) Voting to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,800 as Orford's share of a planning program study carried out pursuant to section 701 of Act of Congress of August 2, 1954, ch. 649, Title VII, and conducted under the guidance of the N. H. Department of Resources and Development, the total cost of which shall be \$11,400.00.

(c) Taking such other action relating to planning and development as may be appropriate.

Article 26. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the Fire Department.

Article 27. To see what sum the Town will vote to be turned over to the Trustees of Trust Funds for purchase of fire equipment.

Article 28. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for purchase of a fire truck and other fire equipment.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1,500.00 to reimburse Lawrence Huntington for his loss of income due to injury while attending a Town fire.

Article 30. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 31. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

It was necessary to install a new heater in the Orford Social Library this year which we did. We are open every Tuesday afternoon, drop in and look over our new and interesting books on display, and also our new books for both adults and children. It would be worth your time.

REPORT OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE

The following is a report of the activities conducted for the town of Orford, by the Division of Public Health Nursing, for the year 1962.

A total of 9 Immunizations clinics were held from April through November. The following immunizations were given:

Diphtheria and Tetanus (school children) series 9 boosters — 53.

Tetanus (school children) series 12 boosters — 78.

Diphtheria, Tetanus and Whooping Cough (preschool age) boosters — 4.

Smallpox vaccinations (preschool and school age) — 10.

Salk Poliomyelitis vaccine:

A copy of all Sabin preschool cards have been sent to family physicians. If anyone has not completed three types of Sabin they should consult their family physician.

Several from the town attend the Chest X-ray Clinics at Lebanon. These are held twice a year, conducted by the N. H. Tuberculosis and Health Association and the N. H. Division of Public Health. Physicians in the area, School Nurses and patients involved are sent notices previous to the clinic dates by the State Public Health Nurse and reports are sent following the clinics. The chest x-ray program follows up the Tuberculin Sterneedle Testing programs carried out in the schools. It is planned to repeat these tests in early 1963.

My sincerest thanks to the following for their assistance in the Health programs throughout the year:

The School Nurse and School Personnel for their cooperation at the time of the school clinics,

The Trustees of the Orford Congregational Church for the use of the Church Vestry for the clinics, it was centrally located and very convenient place to hold a clinic.

The papers and radio for excellent publicity, and lay members of the committee assisting at the clinics.

Special thanks to the Leaders, mothers and members of the Connecticut Valley 4-H Club for their efficient and outstanding assistance in sponsoring and assisting with the Sabin Clinics. The Public Health Nurse met with members and Leaders explaining the Sabin Program. The Club took on this project as a Community Service activity. Boys and Girls of the Club visited the homes in the town explaining their project and signing up interested individuals. Their results were excellent. I was very proud of the assistance these club members were able to give at the clinics. They did an outstanding service to their community. The help of each and everyone was greatly appreciated.

Your Public Health Nurse regrets the death of Dr. John Hammond, physician and Local Health Officer. He was extremely interested and cooperative and was a great asset to the Health Program in the community. I assure you he will be greatly missed by all concerned.

Preventing Forest Fires is Our Responsibility

Costs of suppressing carelessly set outdoor fires in New Hampshire in 1962 cost the persons responsible \$5,545. In the same period, the cost to the cities and towns for control of such fires for which no responsibility could be placed cost another \$24,634. What utter waste of tax money and what shameful and needless loss of timber and esthetic values in the 2,200 acres burned. Residences, farms and other business places were threatened with possible total destruction.

Carelessly set man caused fires can be prevented if every citizen remembers his responsibility in regard to any source of fires in the open. We can help to keep our fire loss low by remembering these simple rules.

1. Dispose of burnable waste at the town dump.
2. If waste or brush is to be burned on the premises, obtain a permit from the forest fire warden. Seasonal permits may be issued for approved incinerators and sites.
3. Burn safely by picking a clean site, avoiding dry windy weather and preferably burning late in the day.
4. Have something to keep the fire under control — pails of water, garden hose, sprinkling can, broom for grass fires or shovel will help.
5. Be sure your fire is dead out before you leave it.
6. If the fire gets out of control or if you see a fire out of control, report promptly to your warden or fire department. Continue to fight it until help arrives.

There is potential danger when matches fall into the hands of children. It is never too early for parents to install in the child's mind a respect for fire.

Keep our town safe from fire.

In 1962 we had 2 fires.
We burned 3.1 acres.

Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To choose a member of the School Board for three years, and to fill any vacancies which may occur on the School Board.

Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board, and Truant Officer and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.

Article 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relative thereto.

Article 7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District, and to authorize application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town.

(This will include \$800.00 for the National Defense Education Act.)

SCHOOL DISTRICT WARRANT — (Continued)

Article 9. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate, in addition to the original appropriation for 1962-63, the sum of Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700.00) to be made available to the School District prior to July 1, 1963, in order to meet obligations due primarily to an unanticipated increase in transportation costs.

Article 10. To see if the School District will adopt as its school check-list the Town check-list, as provided in RSA 197: 12a, as inserted by Laws of 1957, Chapter 57; this provision to be effective for School District meetings held subsequent to the date of this vote.

Article 11. To see if the District will authorize a planning committee of six, three of whom will be School Board members with the other three elected or appointed at this meeting, to study the educational problems of this District in conjunction with such surrounding Districts as may be interested to determine the feasibility of forming a regional school district.

Article 12. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred Seventy-Seven Dollars (\$777.00) for the purpose of engaging the services of professional educational consultants and to defray the costs of reporting the finding of the above planning committee to the public and authorize the committee in conjunction with such surrounding districts as may be interested to engage such educational consultants.

Article 13. To see what action the district will take to increase the membership of the Orford School Board to six, as may be done under the provisions of section 197:15 of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated.

Article 14. To see what action the district will take to require the School Board to prepare and publish a complete set of regulations to govern the conduct of all teachers, pupils and school officials and employees, and the use of school buildings and grounds.

Article 15. To see what action the district will take to require the School Board to call for bids on the sale of any school property and to post notice of such call for bids in three public places in the Town.

SCHOOL DISTRICT WARRANT — (Continued)

Article 16. To see what action the district will take to require the School Board to call for bids for any work to be done on the school buildings or grounds which would exceed \$50.00 and to post notice of such call for bids in three public places in the Town.

Article 17. To see what action the district will take to require the School Board to engage a public accountant to examine annually the records on all school funds spent in Orford and render a detailed account thereof for inclusion in the Annual Town Report.

Article 18. To see what action the district will take to require the School Board to pay no money to teachers or employees that is not specifically covered by written contract.

Article 19. To see what action the district will take to require the School Board not to pay any money directly or indirectly for the transportation of tuition students until and unless all Orford students are given free bus transportation.

Article 20. To see what action the district will take to require the School Board to provide adequate liability insurance for members of the public when using the school facilities for purposes other than school activities.

Article 21. To see what action the district will take to make available free bus transportation for all members of school teams, cheerleaders, etc., attending school games away from town.

Article 22. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Orford:

I present herein my report for 1962, my ninth annual report as Superintendent of Schools in Orford. The report of the Principal, Mr. Richard C. Hamilton, follows my report.

The year has been successful and forward-looking. The High School has again been approved by the State Department of Education as a Comprehensive High School.

Two things were of special significance:

1. The marked increase in the number of tuition pupils over the previous year: 53 as of November 1, 1962 as compared with 43 on November 1, 1961; on January 1, 1963 there were 50 as compared

with 38 on January 1, 1962. The number fluctuates, of course, during a year because of drop-outs or additions.

The increase is due very largely to the excellent efforts of Mr. Hamilton who visited schools and homes to let pupils and parents know what Orford High School is offering. Members of the School Board and other citizens helped in this good effort. They, of course, had something to sell, namely, the good over-all program that Orford, as a small high school, is offering. I wish to commend Mr. Hamilton for this effort and for the many other evidences of his good leadership.

This increase has been of real financial as well as educational benefit. At the time of writing this report, it looks as though we will receive about \$6,000.00 more tuition than budgeted for 1962-63. Of course, more tuition pupils may drop out or more may come. Whatever is the balance as of June 30 over the amount budgeted will remain in School District treasury to apply against the 1963-64 tax levy.

We hope that we will have even more tuition pupils for 1963-64, but we cannot, of course, be sure.

2. The approval by the State Department of Education of Orford High School as an Area Vocational Agriculture School. This means that approved pupils from school districts not maintaining high schools will have their transportation paid to and from Orford. At present there are 13 tuition pupils in the Vocational Agriculture program.

School Finances

I devoted almost my entire 1961 report to the financing of education in Orford and in New Hampshire. We cannot tell what the current session of the legislature will do about more state aid. I am not at all optimistic about Orford getting any more, but I sincerely hope that I am wrong. Whether or not there will be more general state aid to education depends in large measure upon how voluminously

and how strongly the people of New Hampshire bring pressure upon their legislators and at legislative hearings. If more state aid is really wanted, the job of getting it cannot be left entirely to the several lay and professional organizations that are working for the betterment of New Hampshire education. They are doing splendid work. Local school boards, local finance and budget committees and the local taxpayers, must, however, become much more aroused and much more vocal in letting their feelings be known.

The 1963-64 School Board budget will show an increase over 1962-63. It is inevitable that it will continue to increase. I am confident that we cannot continue to get and retain good teachers unless the salary schedule is materially increased. It now seems likely that we will lose several of the high school teachers and one elementary teacher. For the current year, in spite of many letters and telephone calls, beginning in the Spring of last year, we could not get any candidates for our science vacancy. Fortunately, two of the men teachers had preparation that would enable them to divide the work. We appreciate their spirit of cooperation in being willing to do so when they were hired for other assignments.

The special School District meeting held last April voted overwhelmingly to continue to support a high school in Orford. I hope that we can continue to do so. I am sure, however, that if we do, the citizens must face higher taxes unless we can get either or both more tuition pupils and materially increased state aid. Mr. Hamilton deals further with this question in his report.

CONCLUSION

In conclusion, I want to again express my thanks for the help, cooperation and support of the School Board, the faculty and the citizens of Orford.

Staff Assignments

The grades have been assigned as follows:

- Mrs. Flanagan — first and one reading group from second.
- Mrs. Wack — second and third, minus one reading group.
- Mrs. Donnelly — fourth and fifth.
- Mrs. Woodward — sixth and seventh.
- Miss Lavoie — eighth and library assignment (1 hr. per day).

High school subjects and extra duties have been assigned as follows:

- Mr. Guptill — vocational agriculture, math, Assistant Principal, Future Farmers of America.
- Mrs. Clarey — College preparatory English, public speaking, senior class play, cheerleading advisor.
- Mrs. Conrad — business courses, library, office girls, Future Business Leaders of America advisor.
- Mr. Germino — social studies, physical education, soccer coach, student council advisor.
- Mr. Levasseur — mathematics, chemistry, girls' basketball and softball coach.
- Mr. Parent — English, French, publicity (replaced Mrs. Slipp).
- Mr. Pickering — science, physical education, athletic director, basketball and baseball coach.
- Mrs. MacGinnis — art and music.
- Mrs. Jenks — school nurse.

Dr. Henderson — school doctor.

Mr. Messer — custodian.

Mrs. Corpieri — lunch supervisor (Street).

Mrs. Davis — lunch supervisor (Ville).

We of the Orford School System have been greatly saddened by the loss of a good friend — Dr. John Hammond.

One teacher was added to the staff this year. Mrs. Elton Woodward was hired for the 6th and 7th grades with Miss Lavoie taking over the 8th grade from the high school staff.

I expect the elementary teacher assignments to remain the same for the 1963-64 school year. Whenever feasible, slight modifications will be made.

I thoroughly believe that an elementary teacher is not working at maximum efficiency when teaching more than one grade. Orford in the past has done well under the present set-up because of the type and caliber of elementary teacher employed. Mrs. Woodward, added this past year, is a real asset to our staff.

I hope that if and when another teacher is added, it will be to the elementary school. A classroom of sufficient size would be easily available by partitioning the present Orfordville School cafeteria.

Assignments at the High School level are quite rigidly controlled by teacher qualifications and our maintaining a Comprehensive High School rating.

Improvements

Under the National Defense Education Act the following instructional apparatus was purchased:

- (1) Overhead projector
- (2) Slide projector
- (3) 16MM movie projector

One-half of the cost of the above items was paid for by the National government.

A slide was purchased for the Ville school with a large

portion of the money being raised by Ville students and teachers.

A five-hundred dollar scoreboard was obtained for Memorial Hall at no expense to the taxpayers. The money was raised by students and staff members.

The cannery which served no useful purpose has been razed.

The FFA sugar house was moved by volunteer help.

The high school drive was hardtopped — the actual labor being done by volunteers.

The old teachers room in the high school has been converted to a classroom. The teachers room is now in the old cafeteria.

A combination nurse's room and storeroom has been added from part of the old cafeteria.

In April of 1962 the Town, at a Special School District meeting, voted overwhelmingly (162-9) to retain its high school.

Continuance of our high school is based primarily on finances. Finances will go as the number of tuition students fluctuates — the more tuition students we have the less the pupil cost, and, therefore, less money must be raised by taxation.

The number of tuition students we have depends on a number of factors. Among these are:

- (1) Our curriculum
- (2) extra-curricular activities offered
- (3) transportation
- (4) morale of the student body
- (5) morale of the community as a whole

The State requirements for a Comprehensive High School rating are extremely demanding for a school of our size. Subjects offered in attaining and maintaining this objective plus good teaching will insure us a good solid curriculum.

Despite distances involved, overworked members of the staff, and the limited number of students available, we offer a varied and highly successful extra-curricular program.

Our student council has become an integral part of the school. Our clubs and athletic teams by their achievements and interscholastic records indicate not only a high degree of success, but also a large percentage of students participating.

We do recognize a need for further offerings in the fine arts, intramural athletics, and possibly a Fall sport for girls. The problem here is not financing but personnel.

Further changes in the transportation of tuition pupils will have to be made as the need arises.

The morale of the student body in my opinion is very high. The lack of discipline problems, increased student participation in extra-curricular activities, attendance at school functions and an overall attitude of cooperation and enjoyment are factors upon which I base the above.

The morale of the community as a whole is very refreshing to me in my job. I have enjoyed the cooperation and encouragement given me by the vast majority of townspeople.

I sincerely hope that another year will bring us more success as we attempt to provide quality education for Orford and its surrounding communities at a reasonable price.

I wish to thank you, Mr. Pierce, for your patience, understanding and assistance. It is an honor and an education in itself to work for you.

I certainly would also like to thank the School Board for its support and consideration during the past year.

Chapter 15, Laws of 1959 amends RSA 76 by inserting after section 11 the following new section: 76:11-a **Information Required.** The tax bill which is sent to every person taxed, or his agent, if known, as provided in section 11, shall show the rate for municipal, school and county taxes separately. Any town, through its selectmen, may request that the tax commission compute the rates which will appear on the tax bills as provided hereunder and upon said request the tax commission shall furnish the required information.

A combined or total rate is shown above for those towns with a single school district and with no precincts or village districts. It is recommended that the combined rate be shown on each tax bill in addition to the separate rates. Precinct and multiple school district towns and cities should also arrange their tax bills so that each taxpayer will know his total tax rate as well as the rate breakdown.
