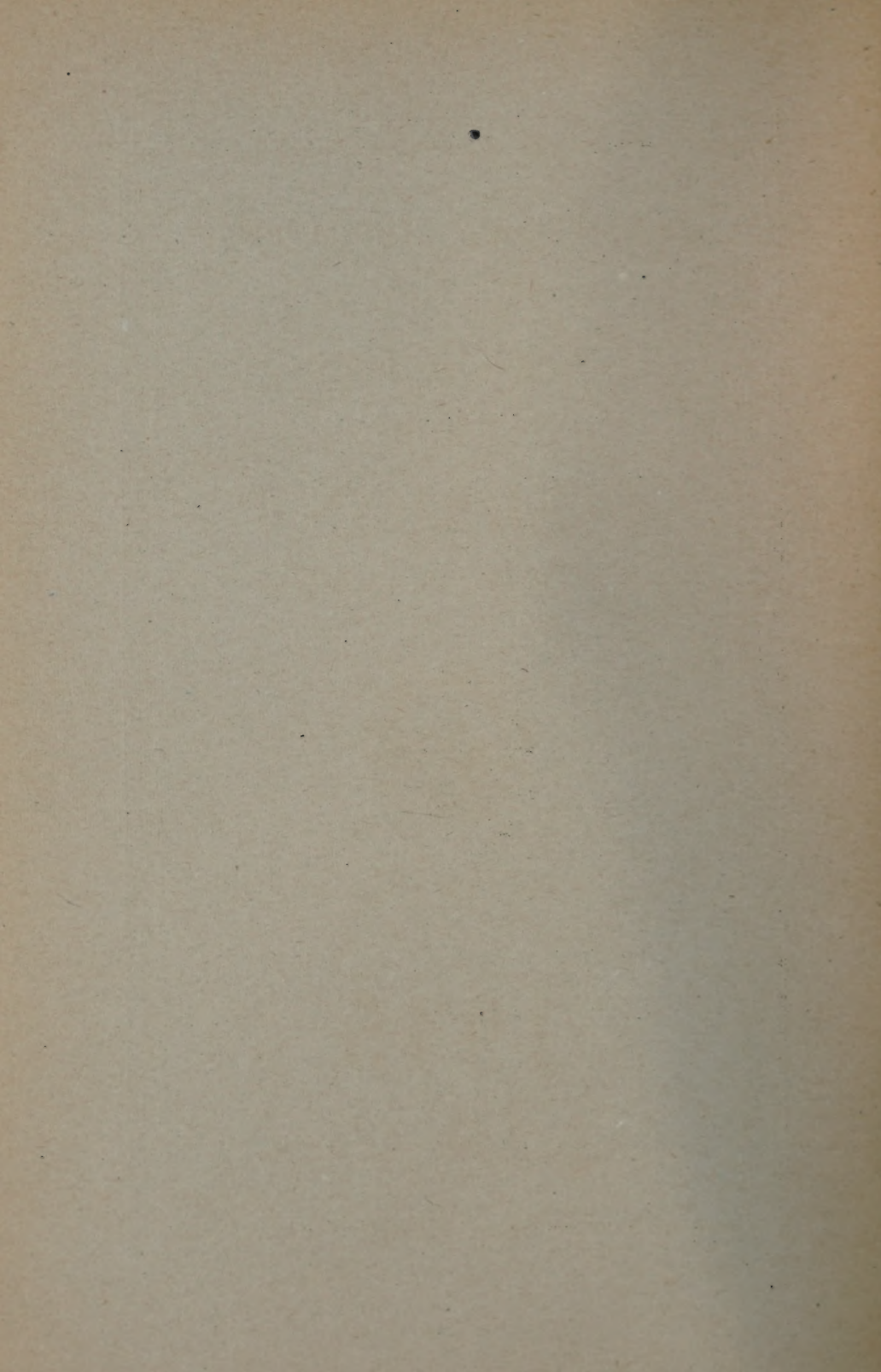

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Piermont, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hail in said Piermont on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriations of the same.
3. To raise and appropriate money to maintain Highways and Bridges.
4. To raise and appropriate money to maintain street lights.
5. To raise and appropriate money for the support of Library.
6. To raise and appropriate money for the support of the Fire Department.
7. To raise and appropriate money for the relief of poor and old age assistance.
8. To raise and appropriate money for Memorial Day and choose committees for same.
9. To raise and appropriate money for State Aid new construction on River and Lake Tarleton Road.
10. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

11. To raise and appropriate to the White Mountains Region Association, for its program of advertising, etc., as a part of the co-operative investment by regional towns, an amount equal to 10c per \$1,000 of the assessed valuation of the Town for 1945.

12. To raise and appropriate money for Pine Blister Rust Control, with State Aid; the State asks for \$400.00.

13. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time they examine the taxable property.

14. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by Town through Tax Collector's deeds or otherwise.

15. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

16. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Teachers and Pupils. We were very fortunate in this emergency in education to retain the services of all of our teachers. Accomplishment tests given in May showed that our pupils' work compared favorably with the norms for the various grades. The continuance of the services of Mrs. Robb as Music Supervisor has shown not only the wisdom of the Board in adding music to the curriculum, but also the contribution that it makes to joy and pleasure of the pupils which will be appreciated more and more as they grow older.

Buildings and Grounds. The most serious problem yet unsolved is an adequate source of water supply. I am aware that a plan to solve this problem is contemplated. I sincerely hope that some adequate plan will be adopted in the near future. The building is in a good state of repair, but there are two matters that should be considered before another year:

1. The windows should be tightened or fitted with weather stripping, or both.

2. The foundation should be pointed up.

These two improvements would save fuel and add to the comfort of the pupils.

New seats were installed in the grammar room and a 12-foot slide has been ordered for the playground.

I wish again to express my appreciation to the School Board, teachers, pupils and citizens of Piermont for their loyalty and cooperation.
