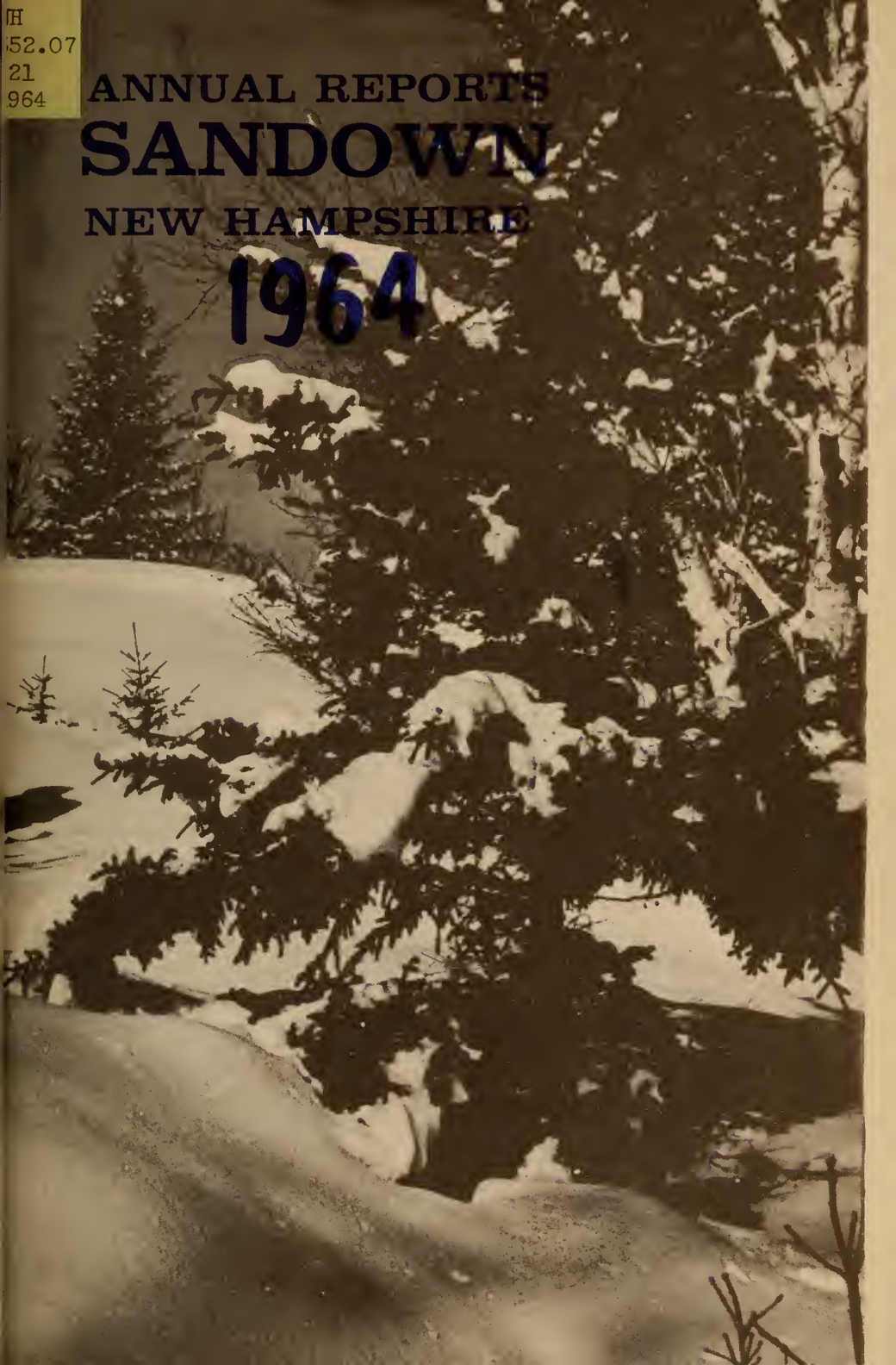

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT FOR 1964

It gives me great pleasure to make the annual report for Sandown Free Public Library.

The great increase in the number of books loaned and visitors using our Library during the past year has more than surpassed our expectations. The loans for 1963 had doubled the 1962 figure and this year's total is more than double that for 1963. Circulation is up more than 500% from 1962.

We applied for and received another State Aid Grant. \$200.00 was awarded our Library this year which, with State Library discount, allowed us to purchase about \$280.00 worth of reference material for all ages.

Sandown Parent-Teachers Group purchased for the Library a set of sixteen True to Life books by Encyclopedia Britannica for primary grades. PTG also purchased the Year Book for the Compton's Encyclopedia given by them in 1963.

Our Friends of the Library group has proven to be just that -- an invaluable aid to Library function. Friends have assisted the Librarian on Monday evenings with cataloging and book processing. Mrs. Lloyd Lessard, chairman, has been on duty for each of the semi-monthly visits of Central School children to the Library. I wish to express thanks to all the Friends who have assisted Mrs. Lessard and myself. The Friends have purchased book jackets, a three-drawer section of Card Catalog, non-fiction books for the reference project and an island book section for the Library. These are just a few of the things which have helped to make ours a better Library.

Our Board of Selectmen generously gave a large fluorescent light which had been intended for their office, for installation in the Library. Also, they arranged for a separate thermostat to be installed in the Library which has greatly added to the comfort of those visiting and working during the cold months.

The card catalog is in use and a good part of the collection is cataloged. A picture reference file has been started and a pamphlet file is available for use.

Mrs. Richard Sanborn, State Library consultant, has assisted with classifying and book selection. A large number of books have been borrowed from the State Library upon request of individuals.

The Board of Trustees and Librarian are making an effort to make our Library as good as possible and hope for the continued support of everyone. We cordially invite all to visit and use our Library.

To see if the District will authorize the School Board to request the Municipal Accounting Division of the State Tax Commission to audit the accounts of the District as of June 30, 1965, the cost of said audit to be paid out of any balance of the appropriation for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1965.
6. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to convey to the Timberlane Regional School District, by Quitclaim Deed, the present Sandown Central School together with the contents thereof, and all land owned by the District.
7. To see if the District will vote to direct the Treasurer to pay over to the Treasurer of the Timberlane Regional School District any cash balance in her hands or money due the District as of July 1, 1965, less any outstanding bills or debts; any sum so transferred to be used as a credit against the Regional School District assessment to be raised by the pre-existing Sandown District to defray its share of the cost of operation of the Regional District during the first year of operation.

8. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

It is with mixed emotions that I submit this, my annual report and as such, the final one to ever be submitted by a Union #14 Superintendent. This ends a series of reports which date back to more than forty years, back to the time when Laura J. M. Talbot, Sarah P. Lovering, and Celia M. Colby were on the school board and Mr. Fred E. Pitkin was Superintendent of Schools.

Throughout these many years, numerous local educational changes have taken place, the greatest change being made in 1954 when Sandown voted to build a new central elementary school. This was also the year when Mr. Ernest Pillsbury joined Mrs. Nellie Geisser and Mrs. Marguerite Drowne on the school board, by replacing Mr. Charles Clark. Also, Mr. Louis Ramsay, presently Associate Professor of Student Teaching at Keene State College, was serving as your school superintendent.

From 1954 to 1964, Sandown's educational problems seemed to be at a minimum with relatively few, if any, major conflicts. Generally speaking, your school board membership remained rather constant and your teacher turnover, small. However on June 11, 1964, this tranquility was broken. The choice to become a member of the Timberlane Co-operative School District will undoubtedly prove to be the greatest single educational change ever made by you. For the first time ever, you now have a voice in choosing the kind of secondary education you want for your children. Since, in my report to you last year, I strongly encouraged you to take advantage of such an opportunity, I now rejoice with you. In our rejoicing, however, let us not become complacent. We must realize that to create and then to maintain an altogether new educational system is a tremendous task, one which will continue to require the total co-operative efforts of everyone concerned. Thus, my final recommendation to you is simply this -- please continue to take an active part in your schools, especially as it pertains to your representation on the co-op school board. It is through these representatives, and through them only, that your small voice will be heard -- a voice so vital in determining the type of education your children will receive. Incidentally, you have an excellent start with Mr. Edward Deveau and Mr. Wilmar Higgins.

In closing, I want to express my thanks to all the people in Sandown who have helped to make my work so enjoyable during the past three years. In particular, it has been a privilege to work with Mrs. Nellie Geisser, who is now completing her nineteenth year as a school board member. Last but by no means least, a sincere thanks to the teachers and children of Sandown who, without exception, have been most courteous when I have visited their school. You are indeed fortunate to have such capable people associated with your children's education -- see to it that this good fortune continues!

Dental hygiene was discussed with the lower grades and through the courtesy of a leading toothpaste concern, we were able to distribute toothbrushes and toothpaste to the third grades.

The Parent Teachers Group again very generously donated their time and money toward a successful Dental Clinic and here the classroom dental health program was integrated into the education of the children.

Personal cleanliness was the subject of discussion for the sixth, seventh and eighth graders this year.

All the children received routine checks on height, weight, hearing and vision. The steri-needle test was given for T. B. with no positive reactions and the Sabin oral vaccine for polio was made available free of charge to everyone.

Home calls were made to discuss problems with parents and it is through this personal contact that a greater understanding and better solution of problems can be reached.

At this time, I wish to thank all organizations and individuals in Sandown for their unselfish donation of time and money, without which, we would be unable to carry out our projects.

The heaviest work load has been on the Curriculum, and the Building and Site Committees with their associated staff members. 3. The Board discussed the provisional space requirements of 134,000 square feet for a 1000 pupil building. Based on current enrollment projections, this would be adequate through the 1970-71 year, on an optimum capacity basis, and probably a year longer on a maximum capacity basis.

4. The Board discussed the adequacy of the statutory debt limit. It was conceded that this limit would not be adequate to cover the provisional space requirements of the proposed 1000 pupil school. In addition the Board conceded it still was faced with another immediate problem of elementary facilities. Various alternative short-range and long-range solutions were discussed.

5. The problem of space requirements vs financial limitations was referred back to the educational consultant.

6. The Board was informed that the Newton School District had voted against having the Newton School Board petition the Timberlane School Board for annexation.

Dec. 30, 1964
Regular Meeting

1. The Board Discussed estimated space requirements of 115,000 square feet for an 800-pupil building. Based on current enrollment projections this would be adequate through the 1968-69 year on an optimum capacity basis and through the 1969-70 year on a maximum capacity basis. The educational consultant was directed to provide provisional space requirements for an 800-pupil building.

2. Upton, Sanders and Upton of Concord was appointed the Board Counsel on all matters pertaining to the formation of the District.

Jan. 4, 1965
Special Meeting

1. The Superintendent was authorized to procure professional and clerical help needed to proceed with Spaulding-Potter Fund financed pupil-profile studies.

2. The Board discussed the provisional space requirements of 111,045 square feet for an 800-pupil building. These were approved by the Board after an amendment to 115,800 square feet. The amendment provided additional space in three areas where the building would become crowded first.

Jan. 7, 1965
Regular Meeting

1. Assistant Superintendent O'Shea reported that the pupil-profile data part of the Spaulding-Potter Fund Project had been compiled and was being forwarded to the educational consultant's office. School administrative and clerical staff worked on this also.

2. A Finance Committee Report of a preliminary estimate of the amount of bond issue, was accepted by the Board. This estimate includes the provisional elementary housing needs program, as well as the High School needs, and is for \$2,300,000.

3. The Board approved a policy on entrance age for the Special Education Class.

4. The Board approved a policy on school accidents and accident reports.

5. The Board worked on the 1965-66 Budget.

Jan. 14, 1965
Regular Meeting

1. The Board voted to authorize its legal counsel, Richard Upton to take the necessary steps to petition the N. H. General Court to validate the organization of the Timberlane Regional School District. (This is a precautionary action, recommended by the bonding authorities.)

2. The Board voted to authorize Mr. Upton to petition the New Hampshire General Court to permit the School District to exceed the statutory debt limit by 2%. (This is also a precautionary action, deemed necessary by the Board, in the event that the 1964 Assessed Valuations as equalized figures for the state are not validated by the legislature prior to District approval of a bond issue.)

3. The Board voted to request former members of the Timberlane Planning Board Publicity Committee to assist the School Board in a similar manner. These members are Elmer G. Kutzelman, Atkinson, Aram Melkonian, Danville and M. A. Plant, Plaistow.

4. The Board appointed an advisory committee for the Spaulding-Potter Fund financed planning project for the high school. These members are Mrs. Jane Ingalls, Timberlane School Board Curriculum Committee Chairman, Dr. Nicholas Engelhardt, Educational Consultant, New York, Dr. Roland Kimball, University of New Hampshire, Mr. Jack Adkins, Phillips Exeter Academy, Exeter, Mr. Damon Russell, State Department of Education and Seth O'Shea, Assistant Superintendent of Schools in Union #55 and Howard Kimball of the State Department of Education.

Jan. 20, 1965
Special Meeting

1. The Board worked on the 1965-66 Budget.
2. The Board reviewed preliminary sketches of the proposed High School, with the architect and the consultant. A second draft will be presented to the Board at the February 4th meeting, following planning sessions between the architect and the consultant. A developed plot plan was requested for the same meeting.

Jan. 21, 1965
Regular Meeting

1. The Board discussed reports from the Building and Site, Publicity, Curriculum and Finance Committees.
2. The Board worked on the 1965-66 Timberlane Budget.
3. The proposed 1965-66 School Calendar was approved.
4. The Board voted to set the time for 1965-66 Teachers' Contracts at 185 days.

Jan. 28, 1965
Regular Meeting

1. The Board was informed of a new policy adopted by the State Board of Education on December 30, 1964, having to do with special approval of building plans before State Building Aid is granted on proposed buildings which fail to meet certain minimum housing needs.
2. The Board approved the provisional housing recommendations for elementary schools, and directed Dirsa and Lampron, Architects, to prepare preliminary sketches for this elementary housing. The estimated cost is \$259,750.
3. The Board discussed a Building and Site Com-

mittee report on a private appraisal of land and buildings included in the general high school building site.

4. The Board discussed a preliminary Curriculum Committee report of Pennsylvania and Florida high school visits. These visits are part of the Spaulding-Potter project.

5. The Board discussed a rough draft of this report.

6. The Board adopted a policy on the retention of non-tenure teachers.

Feb. 3, 1965
Special Meeting

1. The Board worked on the 1965-66 School Budget.

2. The Board discussed a preliminary Curriculum Committee report on high school visits in the Connecticut, New York, New Jersey area. These visits are part of the Spaulding-Potter project.

The Timberlane Regional School Board sincerely hopes that this, its first progress report, answers many questions such as "What has the Board been doing?" or "What has the Board accomplished?" Hearings are planned on the proposed 1965-66 Budget, and on the preliminary plans for the proposed high school, and will be imminent by the time you receive this report. Board Members are also being scheduled to speak at other meetings.

Your suggestions and constructive criticisms are solicited.
