GILE FOREST

Springfield citizens played a major part in the "grass roots" political movement during 1973 that created the Gile Memorial State Forest and thus disposed of a potential threat to orderly town growth.

In late 1972 Jeff Milne heard of the proposed sale and told the Planning Board, the Conservation Commission, and other town groups. While everyone was concerned, it was Arnold Nichols who decided that what we needed was time enough to find a solution, and the way to buy time was to get an option. He called Dartmouth, bought a one-year option for \$15,000, and then paid for it with a combination of his own ingenious financing and the willingness of local people to pledge their personal money for the cause.

A committee, formed largely of Springfield people, took charge of the option. The Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests acted as option holder and helped provide some of the working capital for the committee as well as valuable guidance and advice. The ideal buyer for the tract of land had to be one who would keep the land open, avoid a call on the town for services, and continue paying taxes. With these requirements in mind, the committee visited Commissioner Gilman of D. R. E. D. and suggested the state buy the land as a state forest (not a park, because a state park needs services and doesn't pay taxes) together with Fish and Game. "Gus" Gilman and Director Corson agreed, Congressman Jim Cleveland found federal matching funds, and the committee set to work on the political problem of obtaining legislative approval and appropriation.

A leading Democrat, Senator Spanos of Newport, and Senator Jacobson of New London, a leading Republican, co-sponsored a bill. The first hearing, before the Senate Resources Committee, was held in the New London Town Hall April 17. Springfield residents formed a large part of the crowd that completely filled the hall

TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Springfield in the County of Sullivan in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Springfield on Tuesday, the fifth day of March, next at eleven of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- I. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money on notes of the Town in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to allow a one and one-half percent discount on taxes paid within thirty days after tax mailing date.
- 6. To see what the Town will vote to do about additional equipment and the continuance of a capital reserve fund for the purpose of purchasing new (or used) equipment for the highway Dept., when and if necessary.
- 7. To see what the Town will vote to do about additional equipment and the continuance of a capital reserve fund for the purpose of purchasing new (or used) equipment for the Fire Dept., when and if necessary.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw funds from capital reserve for the purpose of purchasing new (or used) equipment for the Fire Dept., or Highway Dept., when and if necessary.

- To see if the Town will approve the continuance of the survey of Town Forests and the sale of timber.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow up to \$10,000.00 for a new dump in Springfield or jointly with other towns of the UVPDC if such becomes necessary during the fiscal year.
- 11. To see if the Town will appropriate \$800.00 to be used to match funds in the hands of the Bicentennial Committee and the Harland Heath War Veterans Memorial fund for the purchase of the War Veterans' Memorial proposed by the War Veterans' Memorial Committee.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act for the use as a set-off against the following Debt Service incurred for priority expenditures since January 1, 1972—

Purpose—Town Beach Property 1972 \$1,000.00
—Loader 1972 1,000.00
—School Repairs 1973 2,000.00
—Truck 1973 2,000.00

- 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the reappropriation of the funds from Revenue Sharing Trust Funds established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 of \$1,000.00 from funds allocated for the purpose of installing new toilets in the Town Hall to improvements to the Firehouse.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from Revenue Sharing Trust Funds established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as a \$2,000.00 set-off against budget appropriations for the purpose of remodeling Memorial School.
- To see if the Town will raise \$500.00 for the preambulation of Town Lines.

- 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, contract for, request, accept, receive and expend any and all federal, state, and other grants, aids, funds and assistance relative to any future disasters whenever the same shall be declared by the President of the United States or by his authorized representative.
- 17. By Petition—To see if the Town will vote to raise \$25,000.00 for a new fire truck to be paid over a five year period, \$5,000.00 of which to be raised this year—the rest as a debt committeent.
- 18. By Petition—To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint the Road Agent, instead of electing him by vote.
- By Petition—It is petitioned that the voters approve a request 19. to the Selectmen to reopen and maintain the old town road now subject to gates and bars running from 4A at the Heath Sugarhouse and then southerly and easterly parallel to 4A as far as the bridge; that this be done without requiring the property owners to rebuild the road so as to meet the requirements for a subdivision. The property owners, Dr. and Mrs. Robert Klein propose to build their domicile upon the property and to maintain the property as a farm and sugarbush and have no intention of developing the property as a subdivision. Because of the topography, it would be next to impossible to create a 30 foot roadway meeting subdivision standards even if this were reasonable. Proper ditching and grading with the possible addition of some soil and gravel would easily make the road adequate for fire trucks, construction vehicles as well as providing access for the householders. The road was made subject to gates and bars when no one was living on the property served by the road for economy with the understanding that it would be reopened if someone built a domicile upon the property. The current owners plan to do so in the summer of 1974.
- 20. By Request—To see if the Town will vote to establish a Cemetery Trust Fund for the purpose of enlarging the Pleasant View Cemetery when it becomes necessary, money for this Trust Fund to be derived from the sale of Cemetery lots.

- 21. By Request—To see whether the Town will vote to direct the Selectmen to appoint a committee of not less than five (5) or more than ten (10) voters to study land use controls including zoning for the Town of Springfield, N. H.
- 22. By Request—The Planning Board of the Town of Springfield deems it in the interest of the public health, safety, and general welfare of said Town to establish a comprehensive plan for the future development of said Town, and taking due consideration of the importance of future development. NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

For the purpose of promoting public health, safety, and general welfare; to conserve and protect property and property values; to secure the most appropriate use of land; and to facilitate adequate but economical provision for public improvements, all in accordance with a comprehensive plan, the Planning Board of this Town recommends the enactment of a temporary ordinance as follows:

The Planning Board is authorized to approve applications for subdivisions which would result in the creation of no more than three lots for each parcel of land situate in the Town, said approval to be subject to the general standards already employed pursuant to Ordinances, Regulations and Statutes presently in effect.

This Ordinance shall become effective upon passage, and remain in effect until such time as a comprehensive plan has been developed and approved, or until the 1975 Annual Meeting of the Town of Springfield, unless reinacted at that meeting.

This Ordinance shall apply to all applications submitted to the Planning Board on or after its effective date.

23. By Request—To see if the Town will vote to establish a Historic District Commission under R. S. A. 31:89.

- 24. By Request—To see if the Town will vote to close subject to gates and bars that portion of Prescott Hill Road from Grafton Line to Southwesterly Boundary Line of Sidney Stockwell and refer maintenance of said gates and bars to Sidney Stockwell.
- 25. By Request—To see if the Town will vote to change the Town Hall Committee to Town Buildings Committee to help develop best use and maintenance of Town Buildings.
- 26. By Request—Shall the provisions of RSA-55:9a and 55-9b be adopted by the Town of Springfield as provided in RSA 55:9c (new voter registration which would enable Town Clerks to register new voters at any time during the year).
- 27. Recommendation—To see if the Town will vote to establish a Community Energy Committee to assist residents of Spring-field during the energy shortage.
- 28. To see if the Town will vote to continue a committee to be made up of five (5) to look into the problems of the Town Dump and take action when ready or necessary.
- 29. To hear the reports of Officers and Standing Committees.
- To see what the Town will vote to do about the continuance of Standing Committees.

REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN

1973 has been quite eventful, and beneficial for Springfield.

The Committee of Citizens from Springfield, New London, Sunapee, Wilmot, etc. looking to preserve the Gile Forest has to be congratulated for its work getting the Bill through the N. H. Legislature and signed by the Governor during the 1973 season.

During the summer, we received a deed from K.R.S.D. for Springfield Memorial School at a cost of one dollar. Many thanks go to our School Board member, Edwin Sanders for his help. We did shingle the roof of the school during fall, but further repairs and painting are a must.

Although we are still working to establish the bounds of the Town Forest and classify size of lots, the work is slow, and Stan Rastallis has found conflicts that call for the aid of Town Counsel.

Our equipment committee found a new truck for our Highway Department after Miller Ford could not meet the contract they were awarded earlier in the year.

A new fuel tank (1,000 gal.) was placed between Town Hall and Town Garage to be used to fuel our diesel equipment and to be connected to furnace in Town Hall next spring.

Needless to say, we can't give enough credit to all the departments and committees that helped with making our town government run as smoothly as it does. We hope you'll read their many reports for '73.

The primary reason for our taxes increasing from \$3.20 to only \$3.28 was a smaller than usual increase in the School Budget,

many new and vacation homes and \$10,000 in Revenue Sharing Funds.

Our future holds many more problems which are going to call upon everyone in Town for their ideas and support.

Our Dump is still No. I as of this writing and every alternative has to be explored and weighed against cost.

The bridge at Bog Brook is due to be replaced and will cost the Town not less than \$10,000.

We have to consider hiring outsiders to have a tax map drawn up to meet the requirements of N. H. R.S.A. 1970-71 30:95. While the cost of this project is presently unknown to us, it may be in the neighborhood of 16,000+/-.

There have also been frequent requests for a town-wide total re-evaluation by an outside firm. There is probably more to favor this than meets the eye and should develop better harmony among taxpayers. This, unfortunately, has been an area where the selectmen have often been criticized.

Last of all, a fully qualified Health Officer to inspect sewage problems and systems (new or old) give assistance or recommendations where necessary and available for inspections of new systems when they are ready. Since this is not expensive, it would be a convenience and the best possible protection the town could have.

Progress has been difficult this past year for many reasons, but be of Good Cheer!

SPRINGFIELD VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The Fire Department has taken great steps forward this year. Sixteen volunteers have each amassed 50 hours, and three officers over 100 hours of basic fire fighting training at the State and Civil Defense training schools.

We were able to purchase some needed equipment, but much more is needed to up-date our department.

Since the trucks we now have are 20 years or older, which accounts in part for our high insurance rates, we feel it is necessary to purchase a new truck which could be bought with Revenue Sharing Funds (no increase in taxes). With a new truck and equipment, approved by the State Board of Underwriters, if you live within 3 miles of the firehouse, your fire insurance would reduce from \$6.10 to \$4.10 per thousand and from \$8.00 to \$5.20 per thousand on

contents. Within the next two to three years, this could extend to a 5 mile area.

We had six calls in 1973 (double last year) and rescued one parakeet from a treetop.

REPORT of the FOREST FIRE WARDEN and DISTRICT CHIEF

The New Hampshire Forest Fire Service is represented in every town, city or unorganized place in our state by the forest fire warden. Anyone wishing to kindle an outside fire when the ground is not covered with snow must first obtain the written permission of the fire warden. Except for cooking fires, no fire can be kindled between 9:00 A. M. and 5:00 P. M. unless it is a commercial or industrial burn or it is raining. The fire warden is assisted in his work by the District Forest Fire Chief who works for the Department of Resources and Economic Development Forest Fire Service.

Fire prevention was, again this year, the most important part of the Forest Fire Warden's job. Fire statistics show the need with 72% of the fires caused by smoking, debris burning and children. Smokey the Bear is an important prevention tool but he still needs much help from the public. Parents should warn their children of the hazards of playing with matches. Children tend to forget that a lighted match held in their hand is a potential forest fire.

KEARSARGE VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION REPORT

For 31/2 years, the Kearsarge Visiting Nurse Association has provided many services to the residents of Andover, Bradford, Danbury, New London, Springfield, Sutton, Warner and Wilmot. These services range from nursing care and physical therapy to counseling and teaching on family planning, financial assistance, pre-natal and newborn care, and guidance in individual and family problems.

In many cases, the individual or family was referred to one or more of the following: hospital, physician, nursing home, mental health clinic, alcohol and drug abuse program, crippled children's services, surplus food program, welfare and selectmen. These are just a few of the resources available to all of us. 618 visits were made for this type of service with no fee charged.

484 visits were made for direct nursing care which includes care of catheters, colostomies, dressings, heart/lung exams, blood pressure check, injections and medications. 36 physical therapy visits were made in the home. Occupational therapy officially began Nov. I with one evaluation visit. These three services involved a fee that was determined on an individual basis, according to patient's income, frequency of visits, etc.

Regardless of ability to pay, service was provided.

Statistics for 1973: Total visits 1,102
Mileage 12,030

Our immunizations clinics, held in Jan., Mar., May, Sept., and Nov. continue to demonstrate the need for more adequate immunization of our children. 1,021 immunizations were given to 618 children ranging in ages 2 mos. to 18 years (double 1972).

Our loan closet continues to grow due to generous contributions. The medical equipment is used for patients who are receiving KVNA services.

Springfield had a resident population June 30, 1973 of 319; the assessment based on \$1.25 per capita totals \$398.75. There was a total of 86 visits made in Springfield.

YOUR REPRESENTATIVE REPORTS

The last legislative session was a busy one. I was appointed to two committees: Constitutional Revision and Claims, Military and Veteran Affairs. In order to keep up with the vast number of bills in committees effecting towns and cities, I used the services of the two research assistants from the New Hampshire Municipal Association.

Being a strong believer of home rule, I worked to stop passage of all bills that would erode the tax base or give the state the powers that should remain at the local level. I introduced and got enacted HB 755 conferring immunity on city and town officials.

Other bills I either co-sponsored or worked to pass for the good of local government: HB 686 - Towns have lien for uncollected property taxes on houses, trailers and mobile homes.

HB 851 - Emergency zoning bill which gives towns and cities some control over developers.

I worked with Representative Nutt of Hanover to keep the resident tax monies in the cities and towns. I helped to pass SB 104 - the Gile Forest Bill. I was responsible for killing HB 500 - a very restrictive bill which would give the management of cities and towns and the school boards no power to negotiate with employees.

On many occasions I have met with the Governer to discuss municipal problems which seem to compound every year. I met with the Governer and Commissioner Duval on the problems of our public works department in getting used to OSHA (Occupational Safety & Health Administration) type regulations and getting help through educational process concerning the enforcement of them, thus eliminating fines.

As Finance Chairman of our county delegation, I am working to see that our tax dollars are spent for fullest value.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

The Springfield Planning Board is nearing completion of its third full year of activity. The regular monthly meetings have been supplemented by a great many special meetings in order to take care of the many items of business presented to the Board for its review.

On May 15, 1973 the Board accepted with regret the resignation of Mrs. Mildred C. Davis. Mrs. Davis had been the extremely able and competent secretary of the Board since 1971, and she will be greatly missed. Mrs. Davis' vacancy on the Board was filled by Mrs. Dorothy B. Nodine.

During the course of the past year the Planning Board reviewed and gave final approval to 21 lots. In addition, preliminary approval was granted for 19 more lots. The 160 lot Eastman subdivision is currently being reviewed by the Planning Board and has been the subject of special meetings on May 1, October 2, and December 4, 11, 18. These meetings have been attended by large numbers of townspeople as well as representatives of various State, County and Regional Agencies. In addition to these meetings, the Planning Board has conducted numerous on-site inspections of the property. At the present time, representatives of Controlled Environment Corporation have presented solutions to numerous questions raised by the Board, but an ultimate decision regarding the overall density has yet to be reached.

On July 17, the Planning Board held a special meeting to discuss the pros and cons of Mobile Home development. The meeting was well attended, and Mr. William Lord, County Extension Agent, was on hand to show slides and answer questions.

The Planning Board followed closely the developments surrounding the Gile Forest, and are pleased to announce that the transfer of this 6,500 acre tract from Dartmouth College to the State of New Hampshire is very nearly complete. This large tract will be preserved as a State Forest.

During September of the past year, the Planning Board appointed a ten-member Advisory Committee to assist the Planning Board in carrying out its duties. This Committee drafted and sent out a planning questionnaire to all taxpayers within the Town. The final results are in, and were the subject of a special meeting held

on January 19, 1974. The Planning Board would like to thank the following townspeople who were members of this Committee:

TOWN HALL COMMITTEE REPORT

The Committee for the Betterment of the Town Hall met in the fall to look at the work which had been done on the building. At a later date, the Committee met with the Board of Selectmen to discuss what had been accomplished, and other recommendations which had been made last year.

Progress so far: The broken windowpanes reported last year have been replaced.

The contractor found the sills on the rear of the building to be rotted out, too, and repaired these in addition to those found last year.

The addition of more adequate ventilation has been made.

The attic and belfry areas have been cleared, thanks to the members of the church.

Wiring on the electric cross has been changed—and Fred Davis, Fire Chief, reports that a new 10 lb. fire extinguisher has been installed.

The committee discussed the oil storage tank with the Selectmen and understands that there is a new tank on hand which will be installed underground when ground conditions permit. When this has been accomplished, it will serve both the Town Garage and the Town Hall which will be the solution to the fuel oil storage problem in the Town Hall.

Following is a list of recommendations for 1974:

- Have a certified electrician check wiring and give cost estimate of rewiring where necessary. Get an estimate for the installation of better lighting in the Hall, keeping in mind the original style of the building.
- 2. Install a circuit breaker and accessories in the Town Garage so it will operate separately from the Town Hall.
- 3. Install a second 10 lb. fire extinguisher.
- Install Coconut Grove lights over the main exit door and, it possible, over the kitchen door. However, the latter can be installed next year.
- Remove catch from inside exit door and reverse latch and handle to the outside. Install an automatic closer on this door.

- 6. Exit signs placed consipcuously over all exit doors.
- 7. Install panic bar on the outside main door another on the kitchen door next year.

The Committee expresses its thanks to the Board of Selectmen for their interest and cooperation.

CIVIL DEFENSE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

During the past year we have been active in recruiting Volunteers and forming the Fire Dept./C. D. Rescue Squad which is now beginning a heavy training program.

We sponsored the 36 hour Civil Defense Fire Fighting Course 'S-A-F-E" given to the Fire Department and now hope to give the C. D. Course "Basic Rescue" to the Rescue Squad members.

In December, we were honored to have been one of the twelve towns invited to attend a Federal Civil Preparedness Seminar at UNH (2 days).

Thru the Surplus Property Program, we obtained 3 desks and chairs for the Town Office, the Portable siren for the Fire Department and other small items.

Our request for trucks, generators, etc. is still pending.

During the spring floods, we were in contact with N. H. C. D. Personnel which contact is being maintained during the Energy Crisis. This coming year, we hope to pre-plan the Town to meet almost any emergency which might arise. We also hope to continue our own training program thru home study courses, State and Federal workshops, seminars and to work with Town personnel when, as and if needed.

and testified to local support of the bill. From then on the bill had the reputation and momentum of a bill with strong support. The committee kept up the momentum, lobbying the bill through the stages and going to Concord with their Springfield neighbors to testify before three more committees.

Finally the bill was signed by Governor Thompson in the closing days of the session. The committee stayed on the job, shepherding the bill through the various necessary appraisals and approvals, until the title was passed on January 31, 1974, the last day of the Dartmouth option.
