

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF WEARE, IN THE COUNTY OF HILLSBOROUGH, IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Weare Town Hall in said Town of Weare on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at seven of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1

To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
(By Official Ballot)

ARTICLE 2

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town's Building and Permit Ordinance as follows: To adopt by reference pursuant to RSA 674:52 a certain nationally recognized building code, the NFPA 101 Life Safety Code, 1994 Edition along with currently adopted additions, insertions, deletions and changes to said code. In addition, certain new additions, insertions, deletions and changes to this code have been made in order to conform to the NFPA 101 Life Safety Code, 1994 Edition with State laws, rules and regulations? (By Official Ballot).

ARTICLE 3

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town's Zoning Ordinance as follows: To generally amend Article 28, Wetlands Zone Land Planning Ordinance, Section 28.4, 28.5, 28.6 and 28.8. These amendments will clarify the definition of what are considered Wetlands, provide for the definition of wetland zone boundaries, provide for resolving disputes on the location of wetland boundaries and delete town regulation in favor of state regulation for separation of leachfields from Wetlands? (By Official Ballot)

ARTICLE 4

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the petition for the Town's Zoning Ordinance as follows: To amend the Weare Zoning Map in order to change the zoning designation of tax map parcel 202-60 located on the southerly side of Merrill Road. The proposed change would remove the Rural Conservation Overlay District, Article 30, from Lot 202-60 and the zoning of the Lot would revert to its underlying zoning, Rural Agricultural? (By Official Ballot). (Approved by the Planning Board)

ARTICLE 5

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4 as proposed by petition for the Town's Zoning Ordinance as follows: To amend the Weare Zoning Map by modifying the zoning for a certain parcel Lot 412-195 located at 160 South Stark Highway. The zoning for Lot 412-195 would be changed from Rural Agricultural to Commercial? (By Official Ballot). (Approved by the Planning Board).

NOTE: IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE VOTE OF TOWN MEETING OF MARCH 6, 1973, ARTICLE 6 THROUGH 36 WILL BE TAKEN UP AT AN ADJOURNED SESSION OF THIS MEETING ON APRIL 1, 1995 AT 10:00 A.M. IN THE MULTI-PURPOSE ROOM OF THE CENTER WOODS ELEMENTARY SCHOOL.

ARTICLE 6

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ONE MILLION (\$1,000,000.00) DOLLARS for the replacement and reconstruction and all necessary improvement to town bridges, and to authorize the issuance of ONE MILLION (\$1,000,000.00) DOLLARS of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33), and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to fix the date, maturities, denominations, the interest rate or discount rate in the case of notes, the place of payment, the form and other details of said bonds or notes and of providing for the sale of such bonds or notes; or to take any other action in relation thereto. (By Ballot) (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 7

To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following: "Shall we adopt an exemption for the totally and permanently disabled? The exemption, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers shall be \$30,000.00. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years and own and occupy the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by a spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$10,000.00 or, if married, a combined net income of not more than \$12,000.00; and own net assets not in excess of \$30,000.00 excluding the value of the person's residence." (By Ballot)

ARTICLE 8

To see if the Town will vote to have the Board of Selectmen appoint the Fire Chief for a term of one year. The Fire Department shall make nominations for Fire Chief to the Selectmen, which nominations shall be accompanied by recommendations of the Board of Firewards. The Firewards shall be a committee consisting of seven persons, six of whom shall be residents of the Town of Weare, who shall be elected for staggered three year terms at the Annual Meetings on the official ballot for the Town of Weare. The seventh member shall be the Fire Chief then in office. Of the elected members, three members shall be representatives of the Fire Department. The Fire Chief shall appoint the Deputy(s) within the Department, upon recommendation from members of the Fire Department. All other officers, with the exception of the Fire Chief and Deputy(s), shall be elected by members of the Fire Department, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 9

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate funds to accommodate a ten percent increase for current part-time and full-time Police Officers and the Administrative Secretary, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (By Petition)
(Not Recommended by the Board of Selectmen)

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,372,478.00 to defray general government charges for the ensuing year, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen)

(By Petition) (Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 12

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,019.95 to be added to the Cemetery Construction Capital Reserve Fund previously established. Of the 2,019.95, \$1,923.15 would come from the December 31, 1994 General Fund Surplus with the balance of \$96.80 would come from the timber harvest of Pine Grove and East Weare Cemetery, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 13

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$184,872.00 for reconstruction and resurfacing of roads, including \$77,770.00 for principal and interest payments on the Road Improvement Bond approved by the 1990 Town Meeting. Of the sum of \$184,872.00, the sum of \$145,759.00 would be received from Highway Block Grant Funds from the State of New Hampshire (pursuant to RSA 235), with the balance of \$39,113.00 to be raised by taxation, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 14

To see if the Town will vote to establish an expendable General Maintenance Trust Fund under the provision of RSA 31:19-a for the purpose of maintaining the Town of Weare gasoline system; to designate the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend; and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for that purpose, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 15

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$54,200.00 for the construction of all necessary improvements to Hodgdon Drive pursuant to any conditional layout subject to betterment assessments, with the costs of said improvements repaid to the Town through betterment assessments against those persons owning property on Hodgdon Drive, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 16

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 for the construction of all necessary improvements to Chevey Hill Rd. pursuant to any conditional layout subject to betterment assessments, with the costs of said improvements repaid to the Town through betterment assessments against those persons owning property on Chevey Hill Rd., including the Town, all according to a settlement agreement between the Town and certain property owners abutting said Chevey Hill Rd. in a matter entitled Erik Wheeler, et al vs. The Town of Weare, et al, Hillsborough County Superior Court, Northern District, Docket No. 93-E-486; or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 17

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for painting road centerlines on River Road, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 18

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 for the purchase of a Police Cruiser and Radio, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 19

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the architectural design to remodel the Police Department lower level town office building, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 20

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,500.00 for the purchase of a large air compressor for the purpose of refilling breathing apparatus, and installing proper electrical wiring for same, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 21

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for the purpose of purchasing a utility vehicle for the Fire Chief, to replace the present utility vehicle in use, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 22

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,500.00 to cover the costs of the Town's participation in a local Household Hazardous Waste Collection in 1995. Of the \$8,500.00, the sum of \$1,548.00 would be provided by State Matching Funds in the amount of 25-cents per capita from the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services, Waste Management Division, with the balance of \$6,952.00 to be raised by taxation, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen).

ARTICLE 23

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 to purchase a baler for the Transfer Station, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 24

To see if the Town will vote to establish an expendable General Maintenance Trust Fund under the provision of RSA 31:19-a for the purpose of maintaining the Town Municipal Sewer System and to designate the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend; and to appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for that purpose, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 25

To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Library Addition Capital Reserve Fund provided by RSA 35:16-a. If discontinued the Trustees of the Trust Fund holding account for said amount of \$1.69 plus accumulated interest shall pay all the monies in such fund to the Town, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen)

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$48,136.00 to be added to various Capital Reserve Funds previously established, shall include the following:

ARTICLE 28

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000.00 to be added to the *Recreational Field Development Capital Reserve Fund* previously established, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 29

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the purpose of resurfacing the Boat Ramp right-of-way and the unpaved section of the Exit driveway at CHASE PARK, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 30

To see if the Town will vote to establish an expendable General Maintenance Trust Fund under the provision of RSA 31:19-a for the purpose of maintaining the Town Municipal Access Channel and all equipment, and to designate the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend, and to appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for that purpose, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 32

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,100.00 for the purpose of Trail Development and Maintenance at Poor Farm and Ferrin Pond and to continue with the pine plantation at Felch Farm, and to further authorize the withdrawal of \$1,100.00 for this purpose from the Town Forest Account, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 33

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to spend up to \$50,000.00 from the Weare Town Forest Account for the purpose of acquiring Lot #11, Tax Map #410, this land to be added to the abutting Town Forest acreage as conservation land for use by the public, or to take any other action in relation thereto.
(Recommended by the Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 34

To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following: Permits shall be granted to any State of New Hampshire hunting/trapping license holder upon written request to the Board of Selectmen for the use of all town land for the purpose of hunting/trapping where a permit is required by State Law.

Applications for permits shall be submitted to the Selectmen's Office no later than the third Wednesday of July and will be approved and/or denied at the Board of Selectmen's Meeting on the second Wednesday of August.

The Board of Selectmen may deny or limit the number of permits in a given area, if they have legitimate reason to believe that the number of requests for that area may cause a hazard to human life, or a severe depletion of the species being sought.

If there are substantial number of permits being requested for a given area, a lottery shall be held at the time of the meeting. This lottery shall be run similar to the State's Moose lottery, with a certain number of permits allowed for a given area. The number of permits in an area shall be determined by the population of the species being sought in that area. All parties may enter this lottery each year with no penalty for having won in the past.

Upon denial of a permit, the party being denied, shall be notified in writing within 10 days of the August meeting of the reason for denial. All parties being denied for reasons other than loss in the lottery shall be entitled to a public hearing with the Board of Selectmen to discuss the reason for denial provided that the party ask for public hearing in writing within 20 days of the notice of denial. At the time of the meeting, the Board of Selectmen must show just cause for denial and if not able to do so, must grant the permit.

Each permit will be valid for a period of one year.

All names and addresses of permit holders shall be kept on file at the Town Office.

There will be no charge for permits or lotteries, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (By Petition)

ARTICLE 35

To see if the Town will vote to urge the Planning Board to devise a growth management plan for the Town of Weare, to be submitted to the 1996 Town Meeting, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (By Petition)

ARTICLE 36

To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

The polls closed at 7:00 P.M. The Moderator announced the results of the vote at 10:30 P.M. The Meeting was recessed by the Moderator to resume on Saturday, March 19, 1994 at 10:00 A.M. at the Centers Woods Elementary School to take up Article 8 through 37.

RECESSED SESSION OF TOWN MEETING
MARCH 19, 1994

The recessed Town Meeting of Weare was called to order at 10:05 A.M.

The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Jack Dearborn, Chairman of the Finance Committee. The meeting was asked to rise and remain standing to hear the reading of Town residents who have died during the past year. Special mention was made of Beverly Herman. The reading was followed by a moment of silence in their memory.

The Moderator read the results of the Town, Weare School District and John Stark Regional School District elections held Tuesday, March 8, 1994, and the result of the votes on Article 2 through 7 of the Town Warrant. He announced that those who were elected may come forward at the close of Town Meeting to be given the Oath of Office.

The Moderator stated the rules for today's meeting would be Garfield Jones' Parliamentary Procedures at the Glance as interpreted by the Chair. There are eleven additional rules that are appropriate for this meeting.

1. All remarks should be addressed to the Chair or through the Chair to another person - no running debate
2. If you wish to be heard, please approach the microphone, wait to be recognized, give your name and proceed with your remarks. It is important to use the microphone and give your name for two reasons: first, it allows everyone to hear what you have to say; second, it allows your remarks to be recorded through the public address system.
3. If you proposed an article, you will be recognized first. If you make a motion, you may claim the floor to speak to that motion in preference to others.
4. You are not entitled to the floor a second time in debate on any motion as long as some one who has not yet spoken wishes to speak. You may not speak a third time unless you get permission from the group.

5. A vote or warrant article is not subject to statutory protection against reconsideration. This is a new law. If, after an ordinary warrant article vote is taken, a motion to restrict reconsideration is passed, a subsequent motion to reconsider, if it is passed, will only actually result in reconsideration at an adjourned meeting at least seven (7) days in the future.
6. Lengthy or technical motions or amendments must be presented in writing.
7. If you have doubts about the Chair's decision on which side prevailed, please ask for a standing vote. If you wish a written ballot on any questions, you must put the request in writing and you must have five signatures.
8. In addressing the meeting, please keep your remarks focused on the motion before the meeting. If it is an amendment, focus your remarks on the amendment, not the main article. Remarks which are not germane to the motion or which involve personalities will be ruled out of order.
9. Legally registered voters only shall be recognized to speak.. They would be displaying voter identification badges passed out at the door by the Supervisors of the Checklist. Those who are not legally registered voters may not address the meeting without it's consent.
10. After each article dealing with the raising and/or appropriating of monies has been moved and spoken to, the Chair will recognize the Finance Committee so it may present its recommendations to the meeting.
11. There is no smoking allowed anywhere in this building. If you wish to smoke, you must go outside.

The Moderator introduced Stephen Buckley, Town Counsel; Terry Knowles, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen; Merrill Shepard, Selectman; William Herman, Selectman; Evelyn Connor, Town Clerk; Joseph Kelley, Town Administrator.

The Moderator asked if there was any objection to Town Counsel, Stephen Buckley, as a non-resident being allowed to speak at this meeting. Objection was raised and Mr. Buckley was not allowed to speak.

William Herman, Selectman, was recognized to give the State of the Town Address.

Terry Knowles presented James Carney with a Life Saving Commendation.

William Herman recognized Paul Hague for his dedication and service on the Conservation Committee.

Merrill Shepard presented Terry Knowles with an Award of Service in recognition of 20 years of service for the Town of Weare.

The Moderator recognized Jack Dearborn, Chairman of the Finance Committee, who in turn introduced his committee members and explained the duties and functions of this board. He also stated that they would be looking for committee members.

The Moderator asked if no objection that the reading of the Warrant in its entirety, at this time, be waived and that each article be read as it is taken up. There being no objection, the Chair ruled it affirmative.

ARTICLE 8: To see if the Town will vote to accept Birchwood Drive as a Class V Town Highway, consisting of 923' of road from River Road to the end of the existing pavement, conditioned upon the Selectmen undertaking a Conditional Layout of this existing Private Right-of-Way pursuant to the procedures described in RSA 231:28 et seq., said acceptance shall not be effective until such time as the Conditional Layout procedures have been completed and Birchwood Drive has been brought up to the Town's present road construction standards or to take any other action in relation thereto.

William Herman moved the adoption of Article 8 as read.
The motion was seconded.

ARTICLE 34: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75,000.00 for the purpose of renovating the Town Office Building and grounds to meet the standards of the federally mandated Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and life safety codes, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

William Herman moved the adoption of Article 34 as written.

The 13 appointed members shall, on an annual basis, elect a chairman, vice chairman and secretary from among themselves.

Structurally, the Finance Committee shall be organized into two six member units. One unit will be charged with focusing on the budget for the Town of Weare, while the other will focus on the budget of the Weare School District. The elected Chairman of the Finance Committee will chair both units.

The two sub-units will report their recommendations to the full 13-member Finance Committee for review and discussion. It will require a majority vote of the full committee to advance any recommendation to either the Town Meeting or School District Meeting. A quorum of four members is required for the two sub-units to conduct a meeting, while a quorum of seven is established for either of the two committees (sub-units).

The Finance Committee should be informed of any article requiring its attention 30 days prior to any Town Meeting or School District Meeting, but not less than one week prior to either meeting. In order to allow the Finance Committee sufficient time to evaluate and advise on the upcoming budget, the Selectmen and School Board shall be encouraged to present a budget request for the ensuing year during the fourth quarter of each year, but not later than January 15th of each year.

It shall be the duty of the Finance Committee to:

1. Explain the tax impact of monies raised at each Town or School District Meeting.
2. Review and evaluate warrant articles based on short and long term ramifications, and make recommendations pertaining to the same.
3. Withhold recommendations only if there is insufficient information.

The Finance Committee shall be required to work cooperatively with the Selectmen, Town departments and School District to ensure that all the respective budgets will best serve the community's needs.

The Finance Committee shall report, in writing, any and all warrant articles and operating budget recommendations no later than one week prior to each Town or School District Meeting. This written report shall include:

1. The total amount requested by the Selectmen or School District for any given warrant article.
2. The total amount recommended by the Finance Committee for the same.
3. The tax impact of both recommendations.
4. The reason(s) for the Finance Committee recommendation.

Further, the Selectmen and the School District shall be notified of any and all relevant Finance Committee recommendations as soon as such recommendations are finalized, but no later than two weeks prior to each Town or School District Meeting.

The Finance Committee Report shall be made available to any and all interested persons at the Town Office prior to each Town or School District Meeting, and again at the voter check-in table during the Town or School District Meeting.

Being a public body, the Finance Committee is subject to the Right-to-Know Law (RSA 91) and is required to conduct all of its meetings in a manner which is open to the public; post notices of its meetings; keep minutes of its meetings and to have those minutes available for public inspection in the Selectmen's Office within 144 hours of its meetings.

The Town Moderator is encouraged to ensure that the Finance Committee members represent a cross-section of the community, giving preference to those individuals with business management experience.

Any member of the Finance Committee who seeks a local elected office shall be disqualified from serving on the Finance Committee during the duration of that year's budget discussions. The Moderator shall be empowered to appoint a temporary replacement for that member during that time.

The vote of this Town Meeting shall supersede prior recorded votes establishing the Finance Committee and its duties from the 1929, 1938, 1939, 1945, 1950, 1952, 1976, 1978, 1979, 1990 and 1991 Town Meetings.

Merrill Shepard moved the adoption of Article 35 as read.
The motion was seconded.
The Finance Committee had no recommendation.
The vote was in the affirmative.







TOWN ADMINISTRATOR

As Weare enters the last five years of the decade, the Town is faced with an ever present growth demand on Town services. Presently, the population stands at 6,399 and according to the 1994 Master Plan, the Weare population is estimated to be 8,500 by the year 2000. As the Town continues to grow the additional burden on all town services will increase.

The Board of Selectmen, along with department heads and committee chairpersons, will have to meet these demands and at the same time keep the burden stable for the property taxpayers.

In the last two years, the highway department has had to replace five trucks, which will enable the Road Agent, Lloyd Bailey to operate the highway department more efficiently.

The ongoing projects started in previous years like the reconstruction of Colby Road will continue through 1995. The highway department has worked on these projects without any increase in personnel over the last five years.

The Fire Department continues to provide first rate services to the Town. The department operates without any full-time fire or rescue personnel. The Chief and Department personnel train on a regular basis to better protect the citizens of Weare. As a reminder, the Fire Department and Rescue Squad are always looking for responsible volunteers.

The Police Department has experienced a turbulent year with the changes in personnel. The Board of Selectmen, with the assistance of a citizens advisory Committee will be going forward to provide a Police Department all citizens can take pride in. The main focus will be on having personnel who participate in community policing. The Interim Police Chief and the only full-time officer have shown these objectives are obtainable.

The Town Clerk has completed the first year of being able to register motor vehicles. Sometime in 1995 the Town Clerk hopes to be able to give out license plates. This service has been requested for many years by Weare Citizens.

We depend on volunteerism and other citizen participation to provide necessary services. We are always looking for responsible citizens. Working together, we can make Weare a better place to live and work.

All of us at the Town Office hope that you will take the opportunity to stop by and visit with us and convey your opinions throughout the year. Your comments are important to us.

I would like to thank the Board of Selectmen, all boards and committee members, department heads and fellow employees, for all their hard work, dedication and assistance during the past year.

During the year of 1994, the "Red Network" received 1,030 phone calls. This figure represents an approximate increase of 1.0% over 1993 calls received. These are broken down into the following categories:

To save valuable time and lives, please use the emergency number for all fire and rescue calls. Police are dispatched separately. School cancellation questions should be directed to the School Board.

Goodwill Services: Members of the Weare Fire Department again volunteered their time to help with the John Stark Regional High School graduation ceremonies held in June at the High School. Parking and assistance with traffic control were handled by these dedicated volunteers, making the event more orderly and enjoyable by all in attendance. Members volunteering their time for this event totaled eight for a total of 32 man hours.

There were also several members who volunteered to assist with the Fourth of July Celebration held in Town on July 2 and July 3, 1994. These members assisted with the truck pulls and lineup for the parade and also lining up judges for the parade. Bill Tiffany again supplied a great fireworks display with the assistance of the Weare Fire Department. The Weare Fire Department was fortunate to receive further assistance for this event from area towns that included Dunbarton, Goffstown, New Boston and Deering Fire Departments. Our thanks to all the participating departments and members for their assistance.

Other members volunteered time to assist Knoxland Equipment with parking for their Open House.

Total volunteer hours for trainings, equipment checks and public activities assistance totaled 1,666.75 hours for 1994.

Building Maintenance: Building maintenance again consisted of annual checks and cleaning of all furnaces in each station. The roof on the Center Station was stripped and reshingled, along with the roof over the back office. Solutions are being looked into for repairs to South Station due to improper drainage that caused the building to heave from the frost accumulating around the footings of the building.

Repairs: Vehicle repairs to apparatus within the Fire Department depleted much of the allotted amount for this item. The alternator in the ambulance had to be replaced due to failure. Engine 3 was put out of service on October 3, 1994 due to failure to pass inspection. This truck is thirty years old and requires new brake lines at an estimated cost of approximately \$1,000.00. Discussion is ongoing regarding this problem. The tanker was sent to Valley Fire Equipment in Bradford, NH, for refurbishment and installation of a new poly tank. This was done in October of 1994 and approved at Town Meeting in March of 1994.

Training: This year, the Fire Department changed their training requirements for new Firefighters. A forty-hour course was designed to train new personnel in the basics of firefighting, allowing them to decide if the fire service was something they were really interested in. This course was held at the Center Station

and instructed by Captain Carl LaBuda, Firefighter Mark Haynes, Firefighter Mark Kendrick, and Captain Scott Dinsmore. The first class was attended by five new firefighters, Steve Dunham, Russ Freeman, Jr., Michael Melvin, Jr., Bill Boulanger and Ron Bourque.

Other training was also completed by members that consisted of a Flagging Course sponsored by the N.H. Municipal Association. This course was designed for persons involved with traffic control at incidences. Live burn drills, and ice rescue and water rescue drills were also presented.

Live burn drills allowed firefighters to burn actual buildings within the town and train for intense heat and smoke conditions. Three buildings were burned in the latter part of winter - Poor Farm Road, Craney Hill Road and another on East Shore Drive. Unfortunately, due to new regulations which are forthcoming, this practice may no longer be allowed.

Firefighters also received a 24-hour course on Hazardous Materials. This was presented by Chief Dick Ritter of the Hillsboro Fire Department.

Many hours of volunteer training were completed by members of the Weare Fire Department this year. These training sessions were attended by members on their own time at no cost to the Town of Weare. Total training hours for personnel within the department reached 1,391.5 hours.

Members are also required to attend monthly meetings and equipment checks. Total man hours for equipment checks reached 441 hours from January through October. Again, this is on a volunteer basis at no cost to the Town of Weare.

Four members of the Weare Fire Department volunteered to help with a Fire Prevention program in the elementary school in October. This was presented by Lieutenant Gary Bisson of the Manchester Fire Department, who is also a member of the Weare Board of Firewards.

Business Hours: Non-Emergency business is handled daily at the Central Fire Station between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. Tuesday through Friday, and between 6:00 p.m. and 10:00 p.m. every Monday. Summer hours are 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. Tuesday through Friday, and 6:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. on Mondays. The telephone number for the

business line is 529-2352. A department secretary is on hand during these hours to answer questions or receive information. The Weare Fire Department would like to take this opportunity to thank all persons, committees, organizations, and departments for your continued support.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

In calendar year 1994, our three leading causes of fires were no permit, children and rekindles of fires where the fire was not properly extinguished.

Violations of RSA 224:27 II, the fire permit law, and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by a fine of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Fire Officials, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required. This also helps to prevent unnecessary response to a controlled burn.

This has been a particularly active year in our Town Forest. With western logging reduced, our region has been enjoying excellent lumber markets. We completed the largest timber sale in our history. Over 1.5 million board feet of mature pine was harvested in the Felch Farm Forest. The selective cutting was distributed over nearly 200 acres. It is hard to understate the success of the harvest. The fortuitous combination of an extremely competent operator on the site, great markets for the medium and poor grades of lumber, and a heavy seed year in both white pine and red oak, combined for the success. The residual stand looks very good; we were very lucky with the exceptional seed year. The soils of the Felch Farm are very productive for forestry. We have an outstanding resource.

The Poor Farm Forest trail system was completed and open for hiking this fall. Every address in town received the attractive map locating the trails. This project has been many years in the making. This summer was especially good for ground nesting yellow-jackets, the stinging kind. This writer took his share of stings locating and eliminating the most aggressive nests. Despite this problem, the trails were well used. I encourage everyone to see the beauty in our Poor Farm Forest. There are maps available through the Conservation Commission.

The 40 acre acquisition to Bartlett Brook Forest (now 106 acres) was completed during the summer. The 40 acres include productive forest land and a 15 acre wetland pond. This adds an attractive resource to the property. The pond is beautiful. The sellers were exceedingly generous to the town and we have another diverse forest property.

We are also in the process of having Robert Todd revise and expand our management plan for the Felch Farm Forest. Robert Todd has been our consulting forester for the past 16 years and author of the original management plan. The Forest Stewardship Plan is following the specifications set by the UNH Cooperative Extension, according to ACP SP-44 Stewardship Plan format. With one remaining harvest on an approximately 70 acre piece our 1979 management plan goals are met. We are now formulating the next stage of activities. The report should be in final form by June 1995. The Town of Weare is blessed with an extraordinary Town Forest system of over 1000 acres.

GENERAL SERVICES DEPARTMENT

Changes in responsibilities led to the creation of this departmental name in the summer of 1994. This department now includes the functions of Animal Control, Transfer Station and Recycling Center, and the Wastewater System. Changes have occurred during the year in each of these individual areas.

Early in July the Animal Control functions were transferred to the Transfer Station Manager and staff. Calls for assistance have been numerous and varied in nature; concerns about rabies are still very prevalent and have required considerable time and action by the officers. Residents should remember that Weare's ordinance requires that dogs, in particular, be under the control of the owner or keeper at all times. All requests for assistance or reporting of problems should be called to the police dispatch number, 529-2323, and the on-duty officer will be notified. The cooperation and assistance of the Police Department helped greatly during the transition and continues when the need arises.

The volume of materials handled for disposal and recycling, as in past years has continued to increase. We have handled about 6 percent more than last year. Residents have accepted changes in procedures, items, and staff very well allowing operations to continue with few problems. Attention to quality of operations and materials, and appearance of the areas, has been increased by the staff; favorable comments have been received and are appreciated. At this writing, a documentary and instructional video of operations is being prepared. It will be on the Weare TV Channel 46 and will be available for other presentations.

Management of the wastewater system in Weare Center came under our jurisdiction at the beginning of the year. Due to the age of the system, conditions at the middle school, and NH Department of Environmental Services requirements, an evaluation and analysis of the facilities has been conducted; the results will provide information and guidance for maintaining service in the years to come.

Informational and training sessions have been attended in the areas of responsibility; this is on-going and is an important aspect of being able to provide services to the community.

As always, the support and assistance provided by the staff, other town employees, and the community is recognized and appreciated.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

Thank you to the citizens of the Town of Weare for your continued support. 1994 was a very productive year for the Highway Department.

Snowfall this winter was extremely heavy with little icing and ice related problems. Although many salt applications were needed after snowfall, the roads were kept clear.

Mud season began with tree cutting and stumping on the Twin Bridge Road reconstruction project. Spring started with the making of crush, minor road grading work and getting equipment ready for the state surplus auction. May and June announced the arrival of 3 new trucks. Abijah Bridge and Bart Clough roadwork continued to keep the highway department busy.

Summer brought the completion and final paving of Abijah Bridge Road, Twin Bridge Road, Newman-Wilson Road and Bart Clough Road. Reconstruction of Birchwood Drive began with drilling and blasting of ledge, installation of drainage channel in August and finished with the final paving in September.

Fall began with the Colby Road reconstruction work, roadside mowing and grading of various roads. Minor road repairs, tree trimming and the screening of sand were done in preparation of the coming winter.

We are proud to announce that the two teams who competed in the NHMA/PLIT Plow Rally took first place in the wing slalom and front plow mounting event. They also took first place and third place in the general knowledge quiz. The teams consisted of Ken Bailey, Jason Williams, Carl Knapp and John Merrill.

WEARE PUBLIC LIBRARY

A fax machine and photocopier are in the library for public use with a small fee charged.

Programs for children are held on a regular schedule and the Writers Group meets on the second and fourth Monday of the month in the Emma Sawyer Community Room.

The Friends of the Weare Public Library have contributed books and furnishings as well as sponsored programs for public enjoyment. A successful book sale was held by the group and another is scheduled for September 16, 1995.

Residents served through the library's own resources and through inter-library loans continue to increase in number as does the total circulation for 1994 which is 33,987.

PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION

The park opened a week earlier than usual because of zealous swimmers which caused parking problems on the roadway. The summer had temperatures that were higher than normal and lasted well into August. The weather then changed to an abnormal pattern with cooler temperatures, breezy to windy days and showery to rainy days. The park's usage from August to Labor Day weekend was below average.

From the opening of the park on Memorial Day weekend to the closing on Labor Day weekend, the Weather averaged 80.1 degrees with only 6 days rained out; 11 days below 70 degrees; 38 days above 80 degrees; 12 days above 90 - 102 degrees; 9 days of misty to showery. Anticipated revenues and attendance were up considerably due to the increased seasonal temperatures.

Statistics from our daily sales report revealed the following:

- 987 Residential Family Vehicles including second vehicles
- 40 Residential senior citizens
- 701 Non-residential adults and children
- 126 Residential boat launchings
- 128 Non-residential paid boat launchings
- 8 Non-residential jet-ski launchings
- 4 Canoes

We received five application requesting the use of the facilities for one family function, one organized group, one outing and two for bass fishing club competitions.

Enrollment for the American Red Cross Swim Program was 192 students. Levels 1-7 enrolled 168 students while water safety, community first aid and basic life guarding had 42 students. Certification for Lifeguard, First Aid and adult CPR, enrolled six; basic water safety, enrolled twelve.

There were two pre-registration dates in May to determine the number of students interested in the program. It was decided that two instructors were needed, who were assisted by advance swimmers and older students. Private lessons were also offered. Due to increase in students, hours needed for instruction and the desire to provide a manageable program, the cost of the program had increased. A \$5.00 fee per student with a capped \$20.00 fee per family was this year's charge.

We would like to see this program continue in the 1995 season.

Weare Center Park and Gazebo - The Weare Garden Club continues to beautify the grounds. The Gazebo received a fresh coat of paint to preserve the flooring. Ten applications were received for the use of the Gazebo for one wedding, seven sales and two latch key field days. The biggest event of the year is the Fourth of July Celebration.

Hood Memorial Tennis Courts - The courts were resurfaced in May and the bark mulch was replenished. The courts were used extensively by the John Stark High School and by a month long instructional program. A Weare volunteer instructor supervised 24 students. Achievement certificates were awarded to all students. Parents were very supportive and attended many of the instructions. Hopefully, next year there will be a competitive program for the advance levels.

Purington Memorial Field - The field located on Salmen Road is used extensively by little league and soccer program, as well as by other groups. Local business advertising still enlightens the appearance of the outfield fence. A flower box was installed along with a hanging sign at the entrance of the parking area.

Romanus Property - The Selectmen have delegated 16.5 acres of the Romanus property for the purpose of development and use by the Park and Recreation Commission for recreational and athletic fields. An engineering study and design have been requested for this property. This information will include soil test pits, water table, ledge, etc.. Studies for dual use, site(s) for roadways, buffer zone to abutting properties, public hearings and any other action taken will be in compliance. This plan is to be presented to the Planning Board as a conceptual plan.

PLANNING BOARD

This past year has been a very productive year for the Planning Board. The resignation of the new Planning Board Clerk resulted in the hiring of the Board's fourth clerk in three years. The Board's new clerk, Tia Merrill who started in August, has done an excellent job keeping up with the Board. Tia will be working in the Planning Board office to help with your planning inquiries.

The past year is keeping pace with 1993 with an increase in commercial projects and a slight decrease in residential subdivisions. The Board has approved 9 site plans, 23 lots and held 17 discussion sessions. The Board has completed many administrative projects started last year including the adoption of a new Master Plan and completely revised Subdivision Regulations for the Town. The Board is also working on revisions to the Zoning Ordinance which should be completed for Town vote in March.

Drafts of all ongoing projects and copies of all plans are available for public review in the Planning Board office during regular scheduled office hours. All Planning Board meetings are open to the public and the Board is always seeking public input and participation.

I would like to recognize and thank the Board members for taking part. The ability of the Board to serve the Town depends on its volunteers.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

On December 12, 1994, the Board of Selectmen appointed me as an Interim Chief of Police to oversee the day to day operation of the Weare Police Department while the Board plans its recruitment process for a new administrative head and other police employees.

During the past couple of months I have had a chance to analyze the police department and the services it should be providing. Based on the square miles in area, the resident population, and the work force which enters or passes through each day, the calls for service and the many other facets of law enforcement duties that should be performed, I will recommend that enough certified, full-time staff be added to make the Weare Police Department a full-time department.

A full-time department would consist of the Chief of Police, second in command (perhaps a Sergeant in rank) and four full-time certified officers.

In a year or two the addition of a Juvenile Officer who would specialize in that field along with criminal investigations, the DARE program and other community public relation programs such as community policing would enhance the services to be provided.

There are some intelligent reasons for the recommended full-time department. First, it brings continuity in the services provided. There will be better follow-up on cases that require more time to investigate. That eventually, the Town of Weare will have better qualified and trained officers to meet the public's needs.

With good quality police persons on staff the confidence by the public in its police department will greatly increase and this will create good public relations between the officers and the community.

These are some of the elements that need to be addressed in the very near future by the Town of Weare.

II. 1994 marked our fifth complete year of successful operations. Some items which may be of interest follow:

The tonnage delivered to the plant by the Cooperative this year was 116,510. This was an increase of 9,621 tons over 1993, or a 9% increase over 1993. 1994 was the second straight year that the Cooperative went over GAT. Our GAT for 1994 was 105,634 tons and 116,510 tons were actually delivered. A total of 67,765 tons of ash were delivered to the landfill for disposal. The landfill continues to operate well.

The 1995 budget reflects a decrease in the tipping fee of \$.50 per ton. This is the first time that the Co-op has been able to reduce the tipping fee for the communities.

The ash paving demonstration project in Laconia continues to be monitored by UNH. The final report and permitting are to be completed early this spring. All is going well with the project.

The maintenance building which was budgeted in 1994 was completed in March of 1994. The project cost was on budget and is providing the maintenance and storage space we hoped for.

SOUTHERN NH PLANNING COMMISSION

The Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission has a wide range of services and resources available to help dues-paying members deal with a variety of municipal issues. Technical assistance is provided by a professional staff whose expertise is, when necessary, supplemented by consultants who are selected for their specialized skills or services. Each year, with the approval of your appointed representative, the Commission staff designs and carries out programs of area-wide significance that are mandated under New Hampshire and federal laws or regulations, as well as local or site-specific projects which would pertain more exclusively to your community.

Technical assistance is provided in a professional and timely manner by staff at the request of your Planning Board, Board of Selectmen, and various municipal department heads. The Commission conducts planning studies and carries out projects that are of common interest and benefit to all member communities, keeps your officials apprised of changes in planning and land use regulation, and offers training workshops for Planning and Zoning Board members on an annual basis.

Services that were performed for the Town of Weare during the past year are as follows:

1. Co-sponsored the Municipal Law Lecture meetings. These meetings were attended by Weare officials.
2. Conducted a six-hour training workshop for the planning board members. The Weare Planning and Zoning Boards were invited to that workshop.
3. At the request of the town officials, examples of growth management provisions from the zoning ordinance of several Towns were provided.
4. Conducted traffic counts on several locations in the Town of Weare.
5. A monograph for the Town was prepared. Copies have been sent to the Board of Selectmen and the Planning Board.
6. Updated the town road base map with corrections to the road index.
7. The Town was furnished with the "Suggested Schedule and Calendar" for the March 1995 Annual Town Meeting.

8. Provided technical assistance to the Planning Board regarding required utility installations in subdivisions.

CONCORD REGIONAL VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION

The Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association (CRVNA) continues to offer three major health services to the residents of Weare: Home Care, Hospice and Primary Care.

Home Care services respond to the health care needs of those patients with acute or chronic illnesses that require skilled professional and para-professional care so they may return to or remain in their homes. Emphasis is on promoting independence and maximum functioning of the patient within the least restrictive setting.

Hospice services provide professional and para-professional services to the terminally ill patient with a limited life expectancy. The goal is to enhance the quality of the patient's remaining life by helping him/her remain at home in comfort and dignity. Emphasis is on pain and symptom management and skilled intervention to meet the patient's special physical, emotional and spiritual needs.

In April of 1994 Hospice expanded its services to provide residential care with the opening of New Hampshire's first Hospice House. To date, this house has provided a home to approximately 30 terminally ill residents.

Primary Care and Preventive services will expand throughout FY 95 from a health promotion and prevention focus to a more comprehensive 24 hours a day, 7 days a week service including physician care, hospital admitting privileges, and other care generally offered through a medical office setting. This expansion requires the consolidation of many of the agency programs into a family health center, eliminating the current categorical service delivery. In August of 1994, Primary Care physicians (from Concord Hospital's new Family Practice Residency Program) joined the CRVNA team. The addition of the physicians has expanded prenatal care to the full term of pregnancy including delivery, as well as, primary care to adults. Primary care and preventive services include but are not limited to Child Health, Family Planning & Women's Health, Prenatal services and Health Promotion.

Health Promotion services focus on the low and marginal income families and individuals to prevent illness by professional assessment and screening for health risks and needs, by early intervention to prevent, eliminate, or minimize the impact of illness and/or disability, and by anticipatory guidance and health teaching. Emphasis is on promoting healthy children, families and individuals through early intervention and health teaching. Services rendered in the clinic setting are: child health, prenatal, family planning, sexually transmitted disease, adult screening, immunizations, and HIV (AIDS) testing and counseling.

Home visits are made in crisis situations or when needed health care cannot be given in the clinic. Senior health services are provided at congregate housing sites. Professional and para-professional hourly home services are provided on a private fee-for-service basis. Health education and instruction are part of each home visit or clinic visit.

Anyone in Weare may request service: patient, doctor, health facility, pastor, friend or neighbor. All requests are answered, but continuing home care will only be provided with a physician's order.

A call to Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association (224-4093) is all that is necessary to start services or make inquiries. The CRVNA office is open Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.. A nurse is on call for hospice and home care patients: (224-4093) 4:30 p.m. - 7:30 p.m. daily.

Federal regulations specify a charge is applicable to all visits. Fees are scaled for the individual without health insurance and/or who is unable to pay the full charge. However, to fee scale, federal regulations require a financial statement be completed by the patient or responsible person. Town monies subsidize those visits that are scaled or for which no fee is collectible.

COMMUNITY ACCESS TV - CHANNEL 46




Weare CATV Channel 46 has just completed its third full year of operation. Its town television message board is a familiar sight in 62.4% of all Weare homes, the subscribers to cable TV in Weare. It has become a vital channel for transmitting community announcements and news, so vital in fact that those who are responsible for its operation are beginning to notice the short comings of the program and the equipment. It is time to begin planning for a larger and better bulletin board system.

The portable cameras and their dedicated crew of volunteer camera people are a regular sight at many town and school functions. A number of these productions have been edited for rebroadcast and shown on Channel 46 throughout the year. A variety of programming has been available on Tuesday nights at 7:00 pm on a regular basis throughout the year.

The television studio construction at John Stark was completed with the installation of a lighting control panel and a permanent set background during this past year. The studio cameras and their control panels were rewired to accommodate these changes and to make them easier to operate and assemble. While a large part of this effort has been due to volunteer efforts and gifts, the designs and overseeing of the project were under the direction of Claude Van Orden. Claude joined Channel 46 as its program director during the late summer months as a trainee through the New Hampshire Job Corp.

He has also been responsible for undertaking training ventures since that time and for coordinating, more often carrying out, and for any taping that has occurred. His presence in the studio has meant a lot to individuals with projects to be done. He has also undertaken to instruct any John Stark student that has elected to take either Video Production I or Video Production II and will have a major role during the school's upcoming Intersession. He has clearly demonstrated the need for a full time coordinator at Channel 46. The presence of such an individual will make it possible for more towns people to become involved with the use of the equipment and with future Channel 46 productions, as well as continuing our upward spiral in the quest for technical quality.
