

### Warrant for Annual Meeting

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Amherst, in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified

to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Amherst on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for same.

3. To elect one Selectman for three years.

4. To see if the town will vote to elect at the town meeting to be holden in March 1930, a Constable with full power of the police department and the appointment of subordinate officers. (By petition.)

5. To elect one delegate to the Constitutional Convention.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1951.00 for construction work on Ponemah road, State to raise \$1463.00 OR, Town to raise \$3902.00 and State \$2926.00 to complete construction work.

7. To see if the town will wote to accept state aid on the highway leading from Baboosic Lake to the improved road to Amherst, and raise and appropriate money for the same. (By petition.)

8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1000.00 for permanent improvement of the road from Amherst to Baboosic Lake. (By petition.)

9. To see if the town will vote to accept a certain private way beginning at the S. W. Corner of Wenzel's Grove, running Easterly to the shore of Baboosic Lake by land owned by Wenzel on the Northerly side of private way and by land owned by Brooks, Severns, Nichols and Mackenzie on Southerly side of said highway. (By petition.)

10. To see if the town will raise and appropriate, or use from town road maintenance money, a sufficient sum to build a gravel road from Border street to Southern limit of Catholic Cemetery on Merrimack road. (By petition.)

11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to build a safe and reasonable width road on North street. (By petition.)

12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2000.00, the State to raise \$3000.00, to construct a road from the Ponemah state road to the Hollis line. (By request.)

13. To see if the town will vote to co-operate with the Men's Club of Amherst to purchase a power lawn mower and raise and appropriate money for the same. (By petition.)

14. To see if the town will vote to accept and adopt the names of the streets in Amherst village as given by Men's Club committee. (By request.)

15. To see if the town will vote to build a fence at Meadowview Cemetery and raise and appropriate money for the same.

16. To see if the town will vote to install a street light on road near Gustaf Peterson's and raise and appropriate money for the same.

17. To see if the town will vote to install a street light on Jail Avenue near the house of Mrs. Bliss and raise and appropriate money for the same. (By petition.) 18. To see if the town will vote to rebuild the Culvert near house of Walter Converse on Merrimack road and raise and appropriate money for the same.

19. To see if the town will vote to shingle the roof of town building and raise and appropriate money for the same.

20. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on taxes.

21. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

#### **REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS**

#### To the School Board of Amherst:

I herewith submit my eleventh report, which is also the twenty-first in the series of such reports.

#### **Supervisory Union No. 40**

No change has been made since the Union was formed in 1919. It still comprises Amherst, Brookline, Milford and Mont Vernon, with joint expenses divided respectively as follows: 25%, 10%, 60%, and 5%.

#### **Teachers and Instruction**

In recent years the turn-over in the High School staff has been much greater than in elementary rooms. So it has been this year. Mr. Emerson left to accept a position in Ashville School, North Carolina. Mrs. Harriman went to Woodsville. Their places have been taken by Mr. Ralph G. Reed, who is a graduate of Bates and who has had nineteen years experience in several High Schools, his last being at Milton, N. H. Mr. Reed teaches seven classes, namely, Bookkeeping I and II, Algebra I, General Science VII-VIII, Geometry, Chemistry, Arithmetic VII and Arithmetic VIII.

The new assistant is Miss Ruth Holt of Amherst. She graduated at Keene and has taught three years in Whitefield and Woodsville. Miss Holt has seven classes as follows: French III, English VII, French II, English III-IV, English VIII, English I-II, and French I.

The other assistant is Miss Piper, who has been with us many years. She also has seven classes as follows: Latin I, Latin II, Geography VII-VIII, History VIII, History VII, Modern European History, History of Civilization.

Even with the heavy schedules shown above it is necessary to combine certain grades such as Freshman and Sophomore English and to alternate certain subjects such as Bookkeeping and Commercial Geography, European History and U.S. Constitutional History, Chemistry and Economics, English III and IV. Furthermore, it is almost impossible to find sufficient time in Chemistry to do a full year's work or to meet state requirements. In addition to teaching duties, the headmaster has the general administration of the building, including keeping of high school registers and records. Every teacher should have at least one free or study period during the day and the headmaster at least two. In many schools the headmaster does not teach more than four periods out of seven. In Milford it is now two out of six. The only solution is the employment of another teacher. In addition to furnishing a much needed relief it may be possible to expand the program slightly or at least to better the combinations and alternations now necessary. The employment of another teacher for 1930-31 is recommended and has been planned for in the budget.

In elementary schools Miss Lorden has left the North and Miss Charlotte Boutelle has taken her place. Miss Violet Boudreau of Milford has replaced Miss Scott at Cricket Corner. Miss Berry, at Greeley, went to the Normal School at Keene February 1 to complete her work for a diploma: Miss Mary C. McGettigan of Wilton is finishing out the year. Miss Gogan at Border Street, Miss Jenkins in the Primary, and Miss Tingley in the Intermediate continue in the same schools as last year.

A change in music supervisor for the Union has been necessary due to Miss Cotton's accepting a position in Lebanon. She is replaced by Miss Josephine MacKinnon of Greenfield, Mass., a graduate of Keene Normal School. Miss MacKinnon substituted for Miss, Cotton last year and so was familiar with our needs.

#### Enrollment

Complete tables showing conditions on January 31 will be found on another page. In addition to those listed, tuition is provided for four pupils at South Merrimack, for seven at No. 6 school in Merrimack and for four in Milford. All of these tuition pupils would have to be transported to Amherst schools if this arrangement was not in effect. For next year the total number of children to be in Grade VII-XII will be larger than at present and will require more seats on the upper floor of the high school building. However, there is room for about thirty more seats which may require purchase of some new furniture. Should the North School be closed another year due to small enrollment caused mainly by several of the pupils completing Grade VIII, there will be ample room to accommodate these pupils at the village.

#### **Transportation**

The situation has changed considerably since last year due to the School Board having definitely adopted the policy of assigning all children below high school to the nearest school, either village or rural, with the privilege extended to seventh and eighth grade pupils only to attend at the village if they provide their own transportation. The result has been that the large south transportation route has been discontinued, pupils either attending the Cricket Corner school or becoming tuition pupils at Merrimack schools. The original causes for the large south route were crowded condition at Cricket Corner and lack of eighth grade in Merrimack schools. Present routes are arranged to provide for children from Ponemah, from the north part of Amherst, from the Lake section, and two or three scattered cases.

#### **Buildings and Equipment**

Last year's report reviewed at length the condition of all school property and gave certain recommendations. Of those recommendations the following things were done last summer: slate blackboards installed at the North, more Forse window shades purchased for the village building, book closet built at high school and main room refinished, roof shingled and well built in cellar at Border Street, Coppus blower attachment installed on boiler at village to control heat and save fuel.

Things which remain to be done are as follows: Border Street, repairs to clapboards and painting exterior, regular school room heater with ventilation attachment; Cricket Corner, better ventilation; Greeley, better toilets; Village, ventilation and lighting.

The situation in the Village building seems most important of all, particularly ventilation of school rooms and toilet rooms. The toilet rooms have no ventilation whatever. The school rooms could be greatly improved. Visits to the various rooms at the Village, week by week, by Superintendent and School Board members and others, have disclosed a condition of very foul air. It is utterly impossible for children to do their best work under such conditions nor is it possible for them to maintain a proper standard of health. The correct condition is for rooms to be supplied with fresh heated air which, once used, should be removed through exhaust ducts. A "univent" adaptation of heating and ventilation would solve the problem completely, using present boiler and radiators. The advice and recommendation of an expert should be sought and some plan adopted without delay.

Lighting in the Village building has been improved as much as possible with the present arrangement of windows and auxiliary electric lights. However, new fixtures for ceiling outlets would diffuse the light more evenly than at plesent and be much better for pupils' eyes. Floor or wall plugs should be installed in each room and teachers provided with a small independent desk lamp in order to have better service at their desk and to save burning room lights when only a desk light is needed.

In accordance with vote taken at the annual district meeting last March, No. 10 schoolhouse was sold at auction for \$155. The purchaser, Mr. Pherson, has removed the building from the premises.

#### Costs

A comparison of local and state costs for the school year 1928-1929 may be of interest and is shown in the following table. Figures indicate cost per pupil in average membership.

An important figure to know is the amount of money needed for schools in proportion to the wealth of a district. For Amherst \$10.53 for each \$1000. of equalized valuation was required. Of this amount \$6.24 came from local district funds for elementary, \$1.41 from State Aid, \$1.91 from local funds for high school, and \$.97 for other expenses. Amherst stands one hundred thirty-ninth among the 244 districts of the state, the lowest district being Livermore at \$3.61 and the highest Acworth at \$20.94. This shows that in proportion to the valuation Amherst costs for schools are about average.

Conclusion

Calvin Coolidge once said "it is not enough merely to know how to get a living; it is necessary to know how to live." Such a statement expresses the purpose of public schools, especially the last part. The constant effort of every teacher, who makes of her teaching a profession and not just a job, is to teach children by instruction and by example how to live. This part of a pupil's education is not measurable in the same way as arithmetic or grammar, etc., but is equally if not more valuable. A good school citizen will make a good adult community citizen. By daily practice in living we learn how to live and grow—hence our motto of this year—"Education is Growth."

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#### **REPORT OF HEADMASTER OF HIGH SCHOOL**

To the Superintendent of Schools, School Board and the Citizens of Amherst, N. H.:

I herewith submit for your consideration my first annual report as Headmaster of Amherst High School.

The school year 1929-1930 began on September 4 with an enrollment of seventy-six pupils, forty-two of whom were in grades seven and eight. During the year some new pupils have enrolled and others have withdrawn and entered other schools so that our present registration is thirty-eight in the high school and forty in grades seven and eight, a total of seventy-eight. Of the pupils who were members of the school year, no pupil has withdrawn who is not now a member of some other school. The attendance record has been excellent. Practically every pupil seems to take pride in attaining a high attendance average. Tardinesses are very rare.

The curricula remain unchanged, and we are operating on the same program of studies as in recent years. Miss Piper is still teaching history, Latin and geography; Miss Ruth Holt teaches the English and French branches; and the headmaster is in charge of the mathematics and science departments. Each teacher is teaching every period in the day, which, it is unnecessary to state, is too much teaching for any teacher to do satisfactory work. Many students need individual attention but, under existing conditions, this is impossible. Much can be accomplished also by directed study, if each teacher could have at least one spare period daily.

As in the past two years, the "Triple Entente Association" is controlling all extra-curricula activities. A Hare and Hound chase was held in the early fall which was apparently much enjoyed by all participants.

One school dance has been held and the threeact comedy, "Miss Buzby's Boarders" was presented in November to a large and appreciative audience. The net proceeds were about sixty dollars. The annual Christmas entertainment this year took the form of an operetta, "Yanki San" which was given very successfully by a cast selected from the entire school. This being an innovation, much credit should be given those in charge; Miss Josephine MacKinnon who directed the presentation, ably assisted by Miss Holt in the musical numbers, dances, and costuming, and Miss Piper, in charge of the speaking parts.

Organized athletics, in the form of boys' and girls' basketball, was started in the fall. A schedule of thirteen or fourteen games was arranged and both teams have been victorious in half of their games. However, victory should not be too highly stressed. Physical exercise is the fundamental and essential aim of all forms of athletic activities. Pleasant associations with other schools and the development of school spirit and loyalty are also important objects of athletics that we try to emphasize.

Recently a boys' hockey team has been organized. Two or three games have been played and a very creditable showing was made, especially since it is a new sport here. Through the interest and cooperation of the Amherst Men's Club, a substantial sum of money was donated for the purchase of equipment. We certainly appreciate the interest in the boys and the school by this organization. Appreciation must also be extended to Mr. Ernest Kirby for his kindness in serving as coach.

The annual speaking contest, made possible

through the generosity of the Souhegan Grange, will be observed this year in a few weeks. Plans are now well in progress.

Miss Holt is directing a 4-H Club for the girls. Meetings are held on every other Saturday at the home of some member. Cooking is the project of the club at this time. This club is not large but ranks high in enthusiasm. An Audubon Club for the study of birds has also been organized by Miss Holt among the boys and girls of the seventh grade. Under her supervision manual work has been started in a room in the basement. The building of bird houses and feeding boxes will be undertaken.

Mr. Gibbs, the county leader, has recently aroused interest among the boys in a 4-H club, which is now organized and holds meetings in his charge.

National Education Week was observed in October by having speakers at assemblies to address the student body on some pertinent topics. We are grateful to the three pastors, Rev. Cannell of Milford and Reverends Sibley and Starie of Amherst, and Mr. Gibbs of Milford for their interesting and instructive remarks on that occasion.

All parents with whom we have had occasion to come in contact have been very desirous to co-operate with the teachers. Visits to the school on the part of parents and citizens should be more frequent and you are most cordially invited to come and familiarize yourselves with the work that is being done.

I wish to thank the school officials for their help, their interest, and their hearty co-operation.

## **REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE**

To Mr. Harold C. Bales, Superintendent of Schools, Amherst, N. H.:

The following is my third report of the health work in the Amherst schools, it being the eleventh year of this work.

The medical inspection was made in September by Dr. Burns, the nurse assisting. The eye and ear tests have been completed by the teachers. The results show twenty-two pupils to have defective eyes and two with defective hearing.

Class room inspections are made at intervals and short talks on personal health are given.

Since the number with defective teeth averaged approximately half the enrollment, this year a dental clinic, which is entirely a new project for Amherst, was held during the week of February 10th through the 15th. At that time eighty-nine children had teeth corrected. Through the kindness of Mrs. Cass a room was used at her home which served as a convenient and suitable location for the clinic. There are still a number of pupils who desire dental work done. The clinic will be continued on March 5th and 6th to complete the work.

Last spring there were several cases of septic throat among the pupils. All of these cases were followed up, however. The general health of the children has been good.

First aid supplies have been placed in each of the rural schools as well as the town school.

In the town school there seems to be some difficulty about getting the pupils out of doors for a tenminute period, at least during the recess. Under favorable weather conditions I see no reason why a child should not be required to be out of the school building for the above stated time unless there is suitable reason which should be supported by a written excuse from parents or Doctor.

I wish to express my appreciation to the school officials, teachers, pupils, and parents for their cooperation during the past year.

Dr. Burns' report gives a tabulated account of the medical inspection.
