#### TOWN WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Barnstead in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs: (L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Barnstead on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

4. To see if the Town will vote to allow a two percent (2%) discount on property taxes if paid within two weeks after the mailing of the tax bills by the tax collector.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to buy liability insurance on town labor and pay same out of the Highway Department.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 for the Concord Hospital.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 for the Pittsfield Town Dump.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of five hundred dollars to pay the town's share in the purchase of a new Civilian Defense warning device for the Center Barnstead area. This device to be purchased by matching funds through the Civilian Defense and specifications and location to be given by the Center Barnstead Fire Department. By Petition. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$350.00 to have the books of the Town of Barnstead audited for the two years ending December 1961 to December 1962 respectively; and to instruct the Selectmen to petition the State Tax Commission to have such an audit made by the Municipal Auditing Division; and further to request that the Selectmen draw up the petition at their first meeting after this March Town Meeting and forward the petition immediately thereafter to the State Tax Commission. By Petition.

10. To see if the Town will vote that on the last day of the year any surplus money remaining in the Forestry account be turned over to the Fire Departments for the purpose of purchasing new equipment. By Petition.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise the salary of the Tax Collector from \$900.00 to \$1,000.00. This sum to be in addition to any head tax discounts received by him. By Petition.

12. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

#### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE OSCAR FOSS MEMORIAL LIBRARY

In 1961 a Library Survey was conducted by the New Hampshire State Library and many of their recommendations have been followed. One of the most important was that a qualified librarian be found. Among the qualifications was that she be a college graduate. The trustees are pleased to announce that the post has been filled by the appointment of Mrs. Henry Grau. Mrs. Grau has attended one summer session at the University of New Hampshire on Library Procedure with three more to follow.

The trustees and librarian, with the welcome help of male members of the community, have rearranged the shelf space in the library, installed a book drop and resurfaced the floors. Several of the young people in the town have helped the librarian move and replace books and help when needed.

During the year, the library has been open more hours to permit full use of the materials at hand for the benefit of the citizens of the town. A new set of Encyclopedia Americana has been purchased to aid in reference work of the student or adult in search of specific information. Books for young adults, school children and preschool children have been purchased for their reading pleasure. These books have been acquired with the needs of the school in mind. Many reference books have also been added to the shelves.

The Friends of the Library are an important factor in the maintenance of our library. Through their generosity we have been able to purchase a children's book catalogue and a variety of children's books, they volunteer to tend the library two evenings a week and they have raised money to benefit the library with added lighting fixtures.

The trustees and librarian meet each month to discuss the needs of the library and how best they can serve our community. They have been encouraged to see the number of borrowers increase over the past year. Library cards are now being issued to readers because of this. In this way the librarian can easily check on books when the need arises. Another of the important recommendations in the Survey was that the books be catalogued. This is a long range program, but a good start has been made in that direction. This is being done according to the Dewey Decimal system. The trustees feel that great strides have been made during the past year and that the library is well on its way to being an integral part of the community. The library is a part of the town, is supported by tax funds. Stop in and see what your money is doing for your benefit. A good library is a definite asset to a community. Help make ours a VERY good library. We can with your help and cooperation.

#### PREVENTING FOREST FIRES IS OUR

#### RESPONSIBILITY

Costs of suppressing carelessly set outdoor fires in New Hampshire in 1962 cost the persons responsible \$5,545.00. In the same period, the cost to the cities and towns for control of such fires for which no responsibility could be placed cost another \$24,634.00. What utter waste of tax money and what shameful and needless loss of timber and esthetic values in the 2,200 acres burned. Residences, farms, and other business places were threatened with possible total destruction.

Carelessly set man caused fires can be prevented if every citizen remembers his responsibility in regard to any source of fires in the open. We can help to keep our fire loss low by remembering these simple rules.

- 1. Dispose of burnable waste at the town dump.
- 2. If waste or brush is to be burned on the premises, obtain a permit from the forest fire warden. Seasonal permits may be issued for approved incinerators and sites.
- 3. Burn safely by picking a clean site, avoiding dry windy weather and preferably burning late in the day.
- 4. Have something to keep the fire under control pails of water, garden hose, sprinkling can, broom for grass fires or shovel will help.
- 5. Be sure your fire is dead out before you leave it.
- 6. If the fire gets out of control or if you see a fire out of control, report promptly to your warden or fire department. Continue to fight it until help arrives.

There is potential danger when matches fall into the hands of children. It is never too early for parents to install in the child's mind a respect for fire.

Keep our town safe from fire.

In 1962 we had 3 fires. We burned 9 acres. Permits issued, 160.

#### B. REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Barnstead:

I respectfully submit my second annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

#### Staff

School opened in September 1962 with one new teacher, Mrs. Marguerite Kingsley, of Durham, New Hampshire. Mrs. Kingsley is presently teaching grade four and five, and replaces Mrs. Kipp who resigned in June. Mrs. Dorothy Cotton transferred to grade two and three, with Mrs. Alma Pitman taking over grade one. Mrs. Rachel Kidder and Mrs. Mary Cayes, our Principal, have cooperatively handled grades six, seven and eight as a departmentalized unit.

The teaching staff continues to dedicate themselves toward assuring a quality education for our children.

#### Curriculum

We have continued to move forward in revising the curriculum with new approaches to the teaching of mathematics and a new method for teaching reading. Both of these basic areas have undergone considerable study and it is already showing dividends. The reading program is a combination of the best from the phonetic approach and also from the more modern "look-say". Our children are progressing more rapidly than in previous years and comprehension or understanding has gained.

So far as mathematics is concerned it can be summed up in one short phrase: "It is time that someone did for mathematics what Ford did for cars when he produced his model T."

#### School for Exceptional Children

The South Wolfeboro School is firmly established and is now in its third year of operation. Next year, however, Pittsfield will begin a program of the same quality for pupils in this area. Your School Board has approved the transfer of the children who are now attending the South Wolfeboro School from Barnstead to the class in Pittsfield. This will be a saving on time spent in traveling for the children involved, and will also result in a considerable savings in transportation costs.

#### Finances

Costs of education have continued to increase; however, your School Board's proposed budget is one that I am certain you will consider reasonable. The proposed budget is less than 3% above the current year's and well below the average annual increase for New Hampshire School Budgets of 8%. The major savings may not be evident at first glance, but should one study the enrollment figures it would readily be seen that we are operating our school with five teachers where six could be justified. This leads me to the next area of concern, that of space needs and what problems we will be faced with in the future.

#### Facing the Future

In last year's report I called your attention to the need for adding an additional teacher and space within the near future. To remedy the situation this year we departmentalized grades 6, 7, and 8 with two teachers. This allowed us to provide the students with more specialized instruction and at the same time relieve the class size in any one subject. Mrs. Cayes and Mrs. Kidder share the teaching in these three grades.

Next year in order to accomplish the same end in holding class size to a reasonable level we will have to take half the fifth grade and include them in the departmental organization. This will definitely cause an added load on both upper-grade teachers and is not the best situation. It should be recognized by all that this must be considered as only a stop-gap measure and can only be educationally justified as such.

The solutions to the problem as I see them are two: first, add another room to the school and employ one additional teacher. The second, and most desirable educationally, is to send grade eight, and eventually both grades seven and eight to Pittsfield where they would receive a more comprehensive junior high school program than an elementary school can allow. With the new facilities and added rooms to the Pittsfield High School your children could be accommodated in 1964. This would allow the Barnstead School to operate a six grade elementary school with ample space and without the need to add rooms for the foreseeable future.

I wish again to take this opportunity to express my sincere appreciation to the Barnstead School Board, to all school personnel, and to the citizens of Barnstead for their cooperation and support of our school.

#### IV. REPORTS

#### A. REPORT OF PRINCIPAL

Barnstead Elementary School opened its doors September 11 to 152 students. There was great anticipation among students as well as faculty. This year would promise to be a new experience for all involved.

Teacher's assignments were changed. Mrs. Pitman welcomed her first graders to their new routine. Mrs. Alden substituted in Grades 2 and 3 until Mrs. Cotton returned. Mrs. Kingsley, a new teacher, is teaching Grades 4 and 5. Mrs. Kidder and Mrs. Cayes began working with a departmentalized program. Mrs. Kidder is teaching Language, Social Studies, Sixth Grade Reading. Mrs. Cayes is teaching Science, Mathematics, Junior High Reading and Music. Both teachers are sharing Spelling and Art. Mathematics, Language and Social Studies are being taught five times a week. Reading is twice a week. The three classes have Science three times a week. Each group meets each day with their instructor for Spelling. The Bel Choristers enjoy singing and listening together once a week.

A physical fitness program began in connection with the President's Physical Fitness Program. Each morning, at the beginning of the school year, pupils met with Mrs. Kingsley for their "work-out". During the winter each teacher takes care of her own program in the class room. At noon each teacher and her class join together in group games. A highlight of the fall program was the day Mrs. Pitman and the first graders had lunch at "Inspiration Pines".

During the school year the pupils in the first grade will be using Phonetic Keys to Reading in addition to the readers that have been used in the past.

Through the use of Phonetic Keys to Reading the first grade pupils will learn to read in a manner entirely different from the methods formerly use. The reading program developed in Phonetic Keys to Reading is based on the assumption that the pupil should have a knowledge of the letters and their sounds before he is introduced to formal reading on pre-primer level. In addition to this auditory training, he will also learn to apply a few simple yet powerful phonetic principles before the introduction of any pre-primer reading. Thus, at the outset, the first grade pupil will be given a basis and a means of attacking words independently, and this ability will give him a feeling of pride and superiority. This year the Phonetic Keys to Reading is also being used in Grades 2 and 3. They too will receive a basic training in letter sounds and practice in sounding out words Next year this program is being extended into the fourth grade.

A library has been established on a small scale in the study hall. The library is being capably handled by Junior High students. All books have been cataloged and each child borrowing books has an individual library card. Librarians are on duty one period a day for the purpose of loaning books. It is the hope of all involved that this procedure will stimulate students to read and use reference materials more in their work. Several new sets of books have been acquired. A fine science encyclopedia for the lower grades is now part of the library. Recently we added a 20 volume set of science encyclopedias for the older students. Also available is a new set of Science Research Association books covering reading for pleasure, biographies, and many other subjects. There is a definite need for more up-to-date reference material.

Throughout last year the Barnstead teachers participated with other teachers of Supervisory Union No. 49 in a curriculum study. The first draft of this study is now available. Elementary teachers in the area have concentrated their efforts along the lines of mathematics. There is need for a more modern program. In September, along with many other teachers, Mrs. Kidder and Mrs. Cayes began a course called Fundamentals of Modern Mathematics taught by Mrs. Findell from the University of New Hampshire. At the same time Barnstead began its program of modern mathematics for the junior high. It has proved to be of great interest to all who have worked with it.

Mrs. Pitman, also in September, began a course entitled Team Learning, taught by Dr. Helen Murphy and Dr. Donald Durrell of Boston University. We, too, must become students to better handle our classrooms and our subjects.

Students, faculty, and parents do not complete the picture of our school. It is not by accident that Barnstead School shines from top to bottom. Nor is it by accident that from September to June it remains a pleasant, clean building for our youngsters. It just wouldn't be the same place without Mr. Eastman, as any youngster can tell you. "Charlie" as he is known to everyone, is the most popular person around the school.

Many programs are scheduled for the school year. Mrs. Pitman opened the year with a very interesting Columbus Day program. The group in Mrs. Kidder's homeroom presented an outstanding Thanksgiving Day program. Christmas was very simply celebrated by the school with a program of the Christmas Story and carols. Our open house for American Education Week was very successful with a good turnout of parents going to classes. All programs at the school are open to any interested citizens of the community and we welcome your presence. An Art Exhibit is being planned for the Spring. The Junior High has enjoyed their parties and so have their parents. The Christmas Banquet was the highlight. Moving pictures taken at these parties will be shown at a P.T.A. meeting during the year.

Like every other school, Barnstead is busy and crowded. Every effort is being made to give the best possible education to each student. Only time can tell if this is being accomplished. Parents and teachers working together form the strength of the school.

# TENTATIVE SCHOOL WARRANT THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the town of Barnstead, New Hampshire qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 8th day of March, 1963, at eight o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.

2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the school district will vote to elect its officers by an official ballot and to adopt the non-partisan system as provided in Chapter 59:73, 79-86 RSA.

10. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.
