Commissioner's Report.

To the Citizens of Belknap County:

Agreeably to the laws of the State of New Hampshire your commissioners present for your consideration their report for the fiscal year ending Dec. 31, 1904, and of the financial condition of the county at the end of the year, together with the reports of the Superintendent of the County Farm, Jailor, County Farm Physician, Chaplain at the County Farm, Solicitor, Sheriff, Clerk of the Superior Court, Treasurer and Auditors.

The County Farm, House of Correction and Jail have been under the care of Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Weymouth. We can only repeat what has heretofore been said in regard to the excellence of their management we are convinced that to their good judgment, ability and experience is to be attributed, to a large degree, the success of the institution as regards economy, health and cleanliness. While maintaining proper discipline they have contributed in every way within their power to the comfort of those under their charge. We congratulate ourselves and the County that we have been able to secure their valuable services for another year.

We still believe in the policy of caring for as large a number of the counties beneficiaries as practicable at the County farm, both from a financial and humanitarian standpoint, and while the buildings have not been crowded during the year, they have at all times been reasonably well filled with recipients of the county's bounty.

A reference to the County Farm account will show expenditures somewhat in excess of those of recent years, due in part to the fact that more than the average amount of repairs have been made during the year. The buildings have been painted both inside and out and the work of replacing the soft wood

floors throughout the house with hard wood ones, already begun, has been continued, the halls and several of the rooms on the women's side having been relaid early in the year. In addition to this about two thousand dollars have been paid out for cutting and sawing lumber and chopping wood. This growth had become fully matured and the land upon which it stood being needed for additional pasturage we thought it good business to operate the lot ourselves thus saving all the wood for the use of the county, the question of fuel at the county buildings being always quite a problem. Much of this wood and lumber is now on hand, which accounts in a measure for the noticeable increase of inventory of personal property at the county farm.

At the Court House we have expended a considerable sum in an attempt to remedy the faulty acoustical conditions of the court room and in improving the heating and plumbing arrangements throughout the building.

The amount paid for aid to poor off the farm during the year has been \$8,435.63. We have collected from individuals, towns and other counties chargeable with the support of certain parties found requiring aid within our jurisdiction the sum of \$498.41 which amount should be deducted from the \$8,435.63 to get the actual cost to the county of caring for his class of poor. We have indicated in the proper places in the report the amounts to be deducted from the totals standing against the different towns on this account.

The contract with the Art Metal Construction Co. for additional steel fittings for Court House vaults, mentioned in our last report, has been completed and the contract price of \$500.00 has been paid, making a total of \$990.00 paid out of the appropriation of \$1000 made for this purpose by the County Convention of 1903.

We herewith submit our fifteenth semi-annual report of the auditing of the several accounts of the County officers for the period ending June 30, 1904, as required by law.

We have examined the bills rendered by the County Commissioners for their services and expenses from January 1, 1904 to June 30, 1904, and are of the opinion that the sums charged for services are for time actually spent in the business of the county, and that the sums charged for expenses are reasonable.

We have also examined the Treasurer's account and find it correct, with proper vouchers for all payments made by him. We have compared the orders paid by the Treasurer with the record of orders drawn by the County Commissioners and find that they agree and that the Treasurer has paid all orders drawn by them.

The Treasurer had on hand Jan. 1, 1904, \$17,196.23. He has received from all sources \$4,575.68, making a total of \$21,771.91. He has paid out on orders drawn by the County Commissioners, \$11,878.33, coupons on bonds \$900.00, on orders drawn by the Court \$2,709.81, leaving a balance in his hands of \$6,283.72.

We have also examined the account of the Superintendent of the County Farm and find that he has received for board of inmates, prisoners in jail and all other sources, \$1,210.52 which he has on hand.

We have also examined the Treasurer's account and find it correct, with proper vouchers for all payments made by him. We have compared the orders drawn by the treasurer with the record of orders drawn by the County Commissioners and find that they agree, and that the treasurer has paid all orders drawn by them.

The Treasurer had on hand July 1, 1904, \$6,283.72. He has received from all sources, \$32,830.36, making a total of \$39,114.08. He has paid out on orders drawn by the County Commissioners, \$14,327.66; coupons on bonds, \$1,820.00; on orders drawn by the Court, \$4,012.93, leaving a balance in his hands of \$18,953.49.

We have also examined the account of the superintendent of the county farm, and find that he had on hand July 1, 1904, \$1,210.52, and that he has received for board of inmates, prisoners in jail and all other sources, \$873.86, making a total of \$2,084.38, which he has paid to the Treasurer.
