To the Inhabitants of the Town of Chesterfield in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Chesterfield on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next at 6:30 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects. (Polls will open at 1:00 P. M. — close not earlier than 9:00 P. M.)

Article 1. To vote by Australian Ballot for all necessary Town Officers.

Article 1-A. To vote by ballot on amendments to the Zoning Ordinance.

Article 2. To determine the method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 4. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and act thereon.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the following sums, as approved by the Budget Committee for:

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,150.00 for street lighting. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$650.00 (six cents per \$1,000.00 of the Town's equalized valuation) to the Monadnock Regional Association, an agency to advertise, promote and preserve the natural advantages and resources of the Town in cooperation with the other 37 Towns of the Monadnock Region. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$836.00 in support of the Elliot Community Hospital for the year 1969. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,379.92 for Town Road Aid, thereby receiving an additional \$9,199.48 from the State. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,500.00 for winter maintenance of roads. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$22,500.00 for summer maintenance of roads. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the repair and upkeep of Highway Equipment. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the continuation of Road Improvement of our Town Highways. The location of the work to be under the supervision of the Selectmen in cooperation with the Road Committee. (Approved by the Budgt Committee.)

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for repairs and improvement (blacktop) of the road which connects Atherton Hill Road to the Old Swanzey Road. The road for improvement is four tenths of a mile and would require two culverts. Located on this road are the Erbhof Motel, the Alpendorf, two homes owned by R. L. Shepherd and Kurt Bishoff, and several building lots belonging to private owners. This road is extremely hazardous when wet and at times is impassable. We feel that since the buildings and business on this

road brings approximately \$2,300.00 in taxes and a tourist trade to our Town each year it would be an asset if the Town would improve said road. (Not approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to accept a deed from Alfred H. Schiewe and Raymond E. Butler, deeding a 900 foot gravel road leading off from Route 9, presently known as Wilde Road, and providing access to 4 residences, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 to blacktop this road. (Not approved by the Budget Com.)

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$4,633.00 to buy two plate pipe arch bridges (culverts.) One would replace the old wooden structure over Pattridge Brook near the residence of Mr. Greene for \$2,969.00, and the other to replace a similar structure over Hubbard Brook near Howard Kaiser's residence for \$1,764.00. (\$1,764.00 approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 each year for a new Town Truck, so that the Town can purchase a new truck every four years. Submitted by the Road Committee. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 each year to build a fund for a new road grader (\$3,000.00) and a new loader (\$2,000.00) Thereby the Town would be able to buy new equipment each 10 years, approximately. Submitted by the Road Committee. (\$4,000.00 approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$33,000.00 for a new grader, turning in the old grader toward the cost, and the balance to be borrowed on long term notes of \$5,000.00 each. Payable in 1970-1974 inc. (Not approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to repair the culvert at the corner of Church and Cross Streets in Spofford Village. (Not approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to lower the road and replace the culvert in front of the shop of Arvid W. Pearson on Spring Street in Spofford Village. (Not approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$42.00 to install a light at the western end of Route 9 &9A on Spofford Lake. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the purpose of erect-

ing a suitable memorial for the veterans of the Korean war. This sum to be placed where it will draw the most interest. A committee to be composed of veterans, the chairman of the board of Selectmen and three citizens will be selected. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 for the preliminary work of establishing a land filled dump. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a gift from Sallie S. Friedsam, widow of Morris Friedsam, the balance of the so-called Wetherbee Hill Lot and the so-called B. C. Thatcher Lot to be used by the Town as a Park, except that the Town may use such portion of the above premises as may be needed to enlarge the Town Cemetery. The Park shall be known as the Morris Friedsam Memorial Park.

Article 26. To see if the Town will authorize the Trustees of Trust Funds to establish a single Trust Fund for the Morris Friedsam Cemetery and all income from this fund be allocated to the Morris Friedsam Cemetery for care and upkeep of the Cemetery.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$150.00 from the Chesterfield Cemetery Commission, income from same to be paid annually to said Commission for perpetual care in the new annex to Spofford Village Cemetery and to be known as Lawrence O'Kelly Trust Fund.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$50.00 from Chesterfield Cemetery Commission, income from same to be paid annually to said Commission for perpetual care in Spofford Village Cemetery Annex, and to be known as the Richard Goodell Trust Fund.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from the Chesterfield Cemetery Commission, income from same to be paid annually to said Commission for perpetual care in Spofford Village Cemetery Annex and to be known as the Thomas Doyle Trust Fund.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100 from Paul Penning, income from same to be paid to C.W.C.A. for perpetual care of the Penning-Cutler lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery and to be known as the Penning-Cutler Fund.

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Ruth Estler, income from same to be paid to C.W.C.A. for perpetual care of Estler Vault and lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$150.00 from Viola V. Tuttle, income from same to

be paid as billed annually to Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for care and upkeep of the York-Yeager burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery. Said fund to be known as the York-Yeager Fund.

Article 33. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

#### TOWN MEETING 1968

Proceedings of the Annual Meeting of the voters of the Town of Chesterfield, New Hampshire called at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday March 12, 1968.

The meeting was called to order at ten o'clock in the forenoon by the Moderator, James E. O'Neil, who read the Warrant through Article 1 and declared the Polls open for voting by Australian Ballot for all necessary Town Officers and also by ballot on amendments to the Zoning Ordinance.

Carl Johnson and Mildred Gauthier took their oaths of Office as Assistant Moderator and Assistant Town Clerk respectively.

At 6:30 the Moderator called the meeting to order again to act upon the remaining Articles of the Warrant.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid W. Pearson and supported by Lester M. Chickering to dispense with the reading of the remainder of the Warrant as most of the voters had the Warrant as given in the Annual Town Report and could follow along with the Articles. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 2. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Agnes Chickering and supported by John McKeon to use the same method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year as was used last year. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 3. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by John McKeon to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 4. Voted to wait for the report of the Budget Committee until the Chairman, Robert Callahan arrives.

Article 5. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Lester Chickering to raise and appropriate the following sums as approved by the Budget Committee for the following purposes:

Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative and the said sums to be raised and appropriated.

Article 6. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Anna Hubner to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,916.00 for street lighting. Vote declared by the moderator to be carried in the negative and did not pass. After lengthy discussion voted by a show of hands on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Leonard Laskowski to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,916.00 as approved by the Budget Committee for street lighting. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 7. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and supported by Robert Callahan to raise and appropriate the sum of \$483.00 (six cents per \$1,000.00 of the Town's equalized valuation) to the Monadnock Regional Association, an agency to advertise, promote and preserve the natural advantages of the Town in cooperation with the other 37 Towns of the Monadnock Region. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 4. Robert Callahan having arrived was called upon to give a report of the Budget Committee. He stated that the Budget Committee had held three meetings, one of which was a public meeting. They had more discussion, especially on highways. Their report could be found on pages 17, 18 and 19 of the Annual Town Report. Voted by voice vote to approve this report.

Article 8. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by George Joslin to raise and appropriate the sum of \$702.00 in support of the Elliot Commun-

ity Hospital for the year 1968. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 9. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Robert Callahan to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,391.10 for Town Road Aid, thereby receiving an additional \$9,273.99 from the State. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 10. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Arvid Pearson to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 as approved by the Budget Committee for winter maintenance of roads. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 11. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Wallace Bronson and supported by Lester Chickering to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,500.00 for summer maintenance of roads as approved by the Budget Committee. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 12. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by John McKeon to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the repair and upkeep of Highway Equipment. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 13. Motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Glenn Chickering to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the continuation of Road Improvement of our Town Highways. The location of the work to be under the supervision of the Selectmen in cooperation with the Road Committee. A motion by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Leonard Laskowski to amend the Article and include that we have a report of the Road Committee in the Town Report next year was voted on by voice vote and declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. Voted on the motion as amended by voice vote and was declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Callahan and supported by H. Claude Mowry to take up Article 15 before Article 14. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 15. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Graham Morse and supported by Henry Hellus to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 as approved by the Budget Committee to gravel and blacktop the road leading to the residence of Henry Hellus, seven tenths of a mile. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 14. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and supported by Clifford Chickering to raise

and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 to complete the widening and resurfacing of the North Shore Road leading around Spofford Lake known as "Namaschaug Hill." Vote declared

by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 16. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Clifford E. Chickering and supported by Wallace Bronson to replace the present wooden bridge over the Gulf Brook on the Mountain Road, near Riverside Cabins, with a sectional Plate Pipe Arch, the cost not to exceed \$4,500.00; \$1,500.00 to be raised by 1968 taxes and the balance to be borrowed on long term notes of \$1,500.00 each, payable in 1969 and 1970. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 17. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Leonard Laskowski and supported by Robert Mills to pass over this Article concerning raising and appropriating the sum of \$3,500.00 to improve the so-called Old Swanzey Road beginning at Route 9. This improvement to be black-topped. This was not approved by the Budget Committee. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative and the Article passed over.

Article 18. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Arvid Pearson to amend the Article by striking out the appropriation of \$2,500.00 and instead of to the residence of George Basso to continue on to the junction with the Westmoreland Road, so that the Article will read "To gravel and blacktop the Edgar Road from the residence of Kendall Morse to the junction with the Westmoreland Road." Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. The Article as amended was declared passed in the affirmative.

Article 19. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert T. Mills and supported by John L. McKeon to pass over the Article. Vote declared by the Moderator as carried

in the Negative.

A motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Arvid Pearson to amend the Article and raise \$801.00 instead of \$890.00 to buy fire department monitors for use by the West Chesterfield Fire Department was withdrawn.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Wayne Winn and supported by Leonard Laskowski to amend Article 19 to read: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$890.00 to be used with \$350.00 furnished by the West Chesterfield Fire Dept., to buy 10 fire department monitors, at a total cost of \$1240.00, for use by the West Chesterfield Fire Dept. to supplement the present Fire Alarm System, or act thereon. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative and the Article amended. Voted by voice vote on the Article as Amended and the vote

was declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 20. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Robert Callahan to raise and appropriate the sum of \$42.00 for the purpose of installing a street light at the junction of old Route 9 and Lincoln Road. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 21. Voted by voice vote on motion by Arvid Pearson and supported by William Mitchell to raise and appropriate the sum of \$42.00 yearly, to install one street light at the intersection of Route 9 and Welcome Hill Road. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 22. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by William Mitchell to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be added to the \$1,900.00 raised last year to install a furnace in the Town Hall. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. It was suggested that the bids be put out earlier and that they should look into the idea of putting electric heat in the ceiling.

Article 23. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Wallace Bronson and supported by Arvid Pearson to have a permanent restraining order on dogs from January 1st. to April 30th to protect the deer herd during these critical months. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 24. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Winston Cray and supported by Clifford Chickering to pass over this Article concerning authorizing the Board of Selectmen to file, on behalf of the Town, an application in form and manner required by the United States, and in conformity with Public Law 560, 83rd Congress, as amended, and to enter into such negotiations and do whatever else may be required for an advance, in an amount not to exceed \$14,500.00 to be made by the United States to the Town of Chesterfield for studies, designs, surveys, soil borings and preparation of a study and report, including preliminary plans, for sewage collection and treatment facilities for the Town; to enter into an agreement for engineering services; and to execute the required assurance of compliance with the Department of Housing and Urban Development Regulations under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. Vote declared carried in the affirmative and the Article passed over.

Article 25. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Wallace Bronson to accept a deed from Otto and Emma Richter, deeding a tract of land for a road leading off from the Tuttle Road in said

Chesterfield. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the Negative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Leonard Laskowski to pass over the Article. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative and the Article passed over.

Article 26. Voted by voice vote on motion made by William Mitchell and supported by Arvid Pearson to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the purpose of erecting a fence on some portions of the boundary lines of the Maurice Friedsam Cemetery where none exists. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the Affirmative.

Article 27. Motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Russell Johnson to pass over the Article was withdrawn by both after discussion.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Wallace Bronson to authorize the Selectmen to call a special Open House Town Hearing to be held in the month of July each year. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 28. Voted by voice vote on motion made by William Mitchell and supported by Glenn Chickering to accept the sum of \$100.00 from George E. Joslin, income from same for perpetual care and upkeep of the Charles F. Joslin burial lot in Spofford Cemetery. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 29. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by William Mitchell to accept all the Articles from 29 and including 41. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative, and the following Trust Funds were accepted.

Article 29. Accepted the sum of \$100.00 from Henrietta J. Dragoon, income from same for perpetual care and upkeep of the Amos R. Judson burial lot in Spofford Cemetery.

Article 32. Accepted the sum of \$50.00 from the Chesterfield Cemetery Commission, income from same to be paid annually to said Commission for perpetual care in the new annex to Spofford Village Cemetery and to be known as the Octave Savard Trust Fund.

Article 33. Accepted the sum of \$50.00 from the Chester-field Cemetery Commission, income from same to be paid annually to said Commission for perpetual Care in the new annex to Spofford Village Cemetery and to be known as the Ernest Scharles Trust Fund.

Article 34. Accepted the sum of \$50.00 from the Chester-field Cemetery Commission, income from same to be paid annually to said Commission for perpetual care in the new annex to Spofford Village Cemetery and to be Known as the William Moehle Trust Fund.

Article 35. Accepted the sum of \$200.00 from Henrietta Chickering, income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for perpetual care and upkeep of the Carrol Chickering burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Article 36. Accepted the sum of \$100.00 from Irene Weissenbach, income from same to be paid to Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for perpetual care and upkeep of the Robert Weissenbach burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Article 37. Accepted the sum of \$150.00 from Warren and Emma Fredette and Stella Bora, income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for perpetual care and upkeep of the Bora-Fredette burial lot in the Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Article 38. Accepted the sum of \$200.00 from Upton P. Lord, income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for perpetual care and upkeep of the Burbank—Lord burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Article 39. Accepted the sum of \$100.000 from Rena R. Butler, income from same to be paid to Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for perpetual care and upkeep of the Rawson lot No. 65 in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Article 40. Accepted the sum of \$200.00 from Clifton Bradish, income from same for perpetual care and upkeep of the Bradish burial lot in Spofford Cemetery.

Article 41. Accepted the sum of \$75.00 from the Chester-field Cemetery Commission, income from same to be paid annually to said Commission for perpetual care in the Joslin annex to Spofford Cemetery and to be known as the Alfred Davis Trust Fund.

Article 42. Under this Article Wallace Bronson spoke on the Atomic Nuclear Power Plant being built in nearby Vernon, Vt., and his concern about Air Pollution from it.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry

and supported by Robert Callahan that the Town go on record showing its concern of the possibilities of danger from the Vermont Nuclear Power Plant in Vernon and convey to the County Delegation Committee our concern. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

A standing vote of thanks was given to Wallace Bronson for his work and time spent in regard to pollution in the Connecticut River.

Voted by a show of hands on a motion made by Leonard Laskowski and supported by Robert Callahan that those present, by their support of this motion, (1) go on record as being in favor of the Pisgah Wilderness State Park and (2) by their expression of vote so delegate the Selectmen of Chesterfield to do all within their authority to develop lines of communication with the State Officials in favor of the state park and (3) appoint a committee of six (two from each end of town), none of whom would be Selectmen, to work cooperatively with the Selectmen of Chesterfield and any such committee that may come from the Towns of Hinsdale and Winchester, New Hampshire. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by John McKeon that the Moderator should appoint the above mentioned Committee. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

H. Claude Mowry supported by George Joslin asked for a show of hands to express feeling for a Broad Base Tax. This resulted in 50 for the Tax and 0 against it. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by William Mitchell that the meeting be adjourned. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative and the Moderator declared the Meeting adourned at 10:10 P.M. and the Ballot Box was closed.

- 1. Are you in favor of amending Article III, Section A, of the Zoning Ordinance to read: "A minimum land area for each dwelling shall not be less than 20,000 square feet with a frontage of no less than 120 feet on a public right of way," "Yes" had 188 votes and "No" had 179 votes. Therefore the Amendment was adopted
- 2. Are you in favor of further amending Article III, Section A, of the Zoning Ordinance by adding: Exception—So called "isolated plots of land" existing prior to this

amendment, may be permitted for building sites by the Board of Adjustment. "Yes" had 231 votes, "No" had 100 votes. The amendment was declared by the Moderator to be adopted.

- 3. Are you in favor of adding the following areas to Residential District No. 1 (Article 1, Section 1 of the zoning Ordinance); The land to a depth of five hundred feet on each side, from the center line of all paved Public Roads and Highways from:
  - a. Henry Putnam's Corner to Lasky's turn;
  - b. Holman Hill Road from the junction of Route 9 to the Richard Wood residence;
  - c. Edgar Road from the junction of Maple Lane (Old Route 9) to the Kendall Morse residence;
  - d. Welcome Hill Road from Valentine Vascik's to the Ralph Yeaw residence;
  - e. Streeter Hill Road from Alice Fairbank's to the Leroy Hartt residence.

"Yes" had 219 votes, "No" had 122 votes. The Amendment was declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative and accepted.

- 4. Are you in favor of amending Article IV, Section b, of the Zoning Ordinance to read: "A single Trailer or Mobile Home may be located anywhere in Town except in the area specified in Article III, Section D, or in any other area in Residential District No. 1, provided it meets the minimum standards as follows:" "Yes" had 202 votes, "No" had 136 votes. The Amendment was declared by the Moderator to be accepted.
- 5. Are you in favor of amending Article IV, Section B, Sub Title I, to read: "It (Trailer or Mobile Home) be located on a lot with a minimum of 20,000 square feet, with a 120 foot frontage." "Yes" had 203 votes, "No" had 133 votes. The Moderator declared this Amendment accepted.
- 6. Are you in favor of adding to Article III, Section F, of the Zoning Ordinance as follows:
  - a. To prohibit any sign to be erected in Residential District No. 1, within 500 feet of any residence (the distance to be measured along the Public Highway) and at least 50 feet from the center of the Highway, except signs pertaining to the residence or business conducted by taxpayers of the Town, provided the business is located in the Town.
  - b. No sign erected in accordance with Section A, shall be larger than 4' by 8' in over-all measurement.

- c. Any sign larger than 4' by 8' in over-all measurement must be erected at a minimum distance of 200 feet from the center of the Highway and 500 feet from any residence. "Yes" had 270 votes, "No" had 68 votes. The Amendment was declared to be accepted.
- 7. Are you in favor of amending Article I, Section E, of the Building Ordinance by adding: "Exception: Wood shingles or shakes may be used as roofing materials." "Yes" had 229 votes, "No" had 99 votes. The Amendment was declared accepted.

### SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

Chesterfield Central School Chesterfield, New Hampshire

March 9, 1968

The Moderator called the meeting to order at 3:02 p.m. and the Clerk read the Warrant through Article 1. The Moderator, Harry E. Winn, then declared the polls open for balloting for the necessary District officers.

Prior to the meeting, the following were appointed ballot clerks by the School Board: Anna C. Hubner and Mildred E. Gauthier. They took the oath of office from the Moderator. A count of the ballots showed 514 ballots.

The Moderator appointed Lester M. Chickering assistant Clerk and Wayne Winn assistant Moderator. They took the oath of office from the Moderator.

At 8:00 p.m., the Moderator again called the meeting to order, and the Clerk read the remainder of the Warrant.

The Articles were then disposed of as follows:

Article 2. Clare B. Wellington moved that the Article be passed over. Seconded by Lillian B. Lane. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Clare B. Wellington moved that James J. Cusick, Assistant Superintendent of Schools be allowed to speak before the meeting, James E. O'Neil being unable to attend the meeting due to his illness. Motion seconded by Lillian B. Lane. Motion carried by voice vote in the affirmative.

Article 3. Lillian B. Lane moved that the Article be passed as printed: i.e., that the report of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen be accepted as printed in the Town Report. Seconded by Clara B. Wellington. Motion carried in the affirmative on a voice vote.

Article 4. Clare B. Wellington moved that the district vote to accept the provisions of Public Law 89-10 (Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965), and to appropriate such funds as may be made available to the district under said Federal Act for such particular projects as may be determined by the school board. Further, to see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for such funds and to expend the same for such projects as it may designate. Seconded by Lillian B. Lane. Motion carried by voice vote in the affirmative.

Article 5. Lillian B. Lane moved that the district vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept and use in the name of the district such advances,

grants in aid or funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any department or agency thereof, or any federal, state or private agency. Seconded by Leonard Laskowski. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 6. Clare B. Wellington moved that the district vote to raise and appropriate a sum of two hundred seventy four thousand, two hundred dollars (\$274,200), for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the district. Seconded by Lillian B. Lane. Motion carried by voice in the affirmative.

Article 7. Clerk, H. Claude Mowry asked the privilege of the floor. The privilege was granted. At that time the Clerk presented to Moderator Harry E. Winn a framed resolution in appreciation of Evelyn E. Winn for her forty-three years as Treasurer of the Chesterfield School District. A copy of this resolution to be printed in the Town Report for 1968.

Gerald Knickerbocker moved that the school board be asked to re-enstate the "late" school bus from Keene High School on a two (2) day a week basis, leaving Keene High School at a suitable time to be worked out between the school board and the administration of Keene High School for the remainder of this school year. Seconded by Robert Gowdy.

Leonard Laskowski moved that the motion be amended to read five (5) days per week. Motion seconded by Wesley Darling. Motion carried in the affirmative.

The Motion as amended was carried by voice vote in the affirmative.

At 9:18 p. m. the Moderator declared the polls closed.

Leonard Laskowshki moved that the extra (late) bus from Keene High School be continued on a five (5) day a week basis through the 1968-69 school year, money for its operation to be taken from the existing 1968-69 budget. Seconded by Wayne Winn. Motion carried by voice vote in the affirmative.

Leonard Laskowski asked that the meeting go on record commending James J. Cusick for the excellent job he has done for the school district during his first year with us. It was so done.

A count of the ballots resulted as follows: Number of votes cast 70.

For Moderator for the ensuing year; Harry E. Winn had 62 votes; Albert Bradstreet, Kenneth Wiggin, H. Claude Mowry, and James E. O'Neil each had 1 vote. The Clerk declared Harry E. Winn elected Moderator for the ensuing year. He took the oath of office from the Clerk.

For Clerk for the ensuing year; H. Claude Mowry had 64 votes; Paul Penning and William Mitchell each had 1 vote. H. Claude Mowry was declared elected Clerk for the ensuing year. He took the oath of office from the Moderator.

For School Board Member for three years; Clara B. Wellington had 62 votes; Gerald Knickerbocker had 2 votes; Floyd Fuller & Inez Laskowski each had 1 vote. Clara B. Wellington was declared elected a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years. She took the oath of office from the Moderator.

### REPORT OF THE SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM

July 1, 1967 to June 20, 1968

The National School Lunch Program helps provide wholesome, appetizing lunches to the nation's school children every day. These lunches make an important contribution to good nutrition so vital to both mental and physical growth during the child's formative years. Educators and nutritionists agree there is a direct relationship between adequate nutrition and good scholastic performance.

The school lunch program can be used as a means of promoting nutrition education. It gives children the opportunity to learn to like foods which they have not previously

tasted.

The hot lunch program opened September 6, 1967, and Mrs. Marion Berry continued as my assistant.

The reimbursement rate from Federal Funds remained at four cents for each Type "A" meal served to children. Surplus commodities received from the U. S. Government made it possible to maintain the old price of thirty cents for children, and thirty-five cents for adults. Under the Special Milk Program we received a four cent reimbursement for each half-pint of milk served. Children were able to purchase milk at two cents a half-pint.

We continue to serve between 200 and 225 meals daily. Two hundred sixty-five turkey dinners with all the trimmings were served prior to Thanksgiving recess.

Menus continue to be prepared a month in advance, and

sent home to parents.

A District appropriation of \$1,000.00 was made this fiscal year.

### PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

The 1968-1969 school year began with an enrollment of 288 children. By January 14, the enrollment had increased to 304. All available classroom space is being utilized with the exception of the auditorium, which has been used as a classroom in the past. The auditorium is now being used

as a cafeteria, and a multipurpose room.

We presently have forty-seven children in grade one, thirty-seven in grade two, thirty-two in grade three, forty-one in grade four, thirty-one in grade five, thirty-seven in grade six, thirty-nine in grade seven, and forty in grade eight. Due to the large enrollment in the lower grades, it will be necessary to create two classes out of some of these grades. Teacher aides will have to be utilized in the large grades which we are unable to divide.

We have four new teachers on the staff: English, grade seven and eight, Mrs. Joyce Mattson; grade four and five, Mrs. Mary Butler; grade three, Miss E. Bette Oates; grade two, Miss Joyce Freese. We were fortunate in not having a large teacher turnover. Hopefully, we will not be faced with a large change of staff at the end of this year. It is extremely important for schools to retain their staff rather than be faced with a large turnover each year. When the staff remains the same, it insures better continuity of curriculum and adds stability to the total school program.

Our curriculum has been under study and we are in the process of updating it in all areas. We are presently offering modern math in all grades, and the new English in grades six through eight. Next year the new English will be offered in all grades. Our science program will be completed to include grades one and two. Grades five and six will have a new social studies program next year. With the money received from Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, we are able to provide individual instruction in reading for those children in grades two through five who are having difficulty. This program is under the direction of Mrs. Doris Parker.

Due to the increase in enrollment and the constant advances in education, it is necessary to have our school program under continuous review. Due to the many technological advances, there is now a great amount of equipment available to schools, which are aids to learning. We have begun a program, which over a period of years, will adequately equip our school and teachers. We now have the following equipment: three filmstrip projectors, three overhead projectors, 2 tape recorders, one motion picture projector, two audiovisual tables, and one Magnavox television set which is used for educational TV. Most of the rooms are equipped with phonographs. The P.T.A. purchased the television set for the school, and the pupils are now watching certain educational programs. These programs originate from the University of New Hampshire. Each teacher is furnished with a complete teacher's manual designed specifically for the program the class will watch. Our seventh and eighth grade science room serves as a centralized science room for the entire school. The room has a good basic collection of science equipment. Since it does serve the entire school, it is always in need of more and newer equipment.

School maintenance is a very important part of our program. This year, as in the past, we have continued a program to keep the school in good operating condition. Thanks to the able efforts of Mr. Merton Davis, the citizens of Chesterfield can be proud of their school. This year a new tile floor was put in the cafeteria, and in the fourth and fifth grade rooms. One of the first grade rooms was painted as well as the corridors in the old wing. A larger blacktop playing area, a new parking area, and two new sidewalks leading into the school were installed. We have four new cafeteria tables in the lunchroom. These tables make it easier to convert the room into an activity room when needed. We, also,

have a new storage shed for school maintenance equipment. This shed allows us to store equipment which was formerly

kept in the boiler room.

The school library has 4,045 volumes. These books have been completely processed and are cataloged according to the Dewey Decimal System. A record has been kept showing author, publisher, coypright date, and source. The library is open five days a week, from 8:45 a.m. to 9:45 a.m. A staff of eleven parents supervise the library. Many of the books which we have are old. Even if these books were discarded, the library would still not have adequate shelf space.

I would like to thank the citizens, teachers. Board of

Education, for their cooperation this year.

### ADMINISTRATIVE REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Chesterfield: More than half of the second school year of Chestereld's association with Supervisory Union 29 has now passed. We have had some successes and some problems, but overall, progress is being made.

Educationally, we have a very good staff of twelve classroom teachers and one principal. Four of the twelve teachers are new to us this year, as is Mr. Schiff, the principal. The new math series is now complete in grades one through eight; some new English books are in use in grades six, seven and eight; the two upper grades are presently using new social studies books.

Two teacher aids, the nurse, the reading teacher, and the music teacher add greatly to the work of the regular classroom teachers.

Several pieces of audiovisual equipment have been purchased to enable teachers to make copies, transparencies, etc. for instructional use. The P.T.A. purchased a television set for the school, and many classes participate in weekly programs aired by the educational channel in such areas as art, music, science, reading, and social studies. Support of this nature from the parents association is certainly appreciated.

One classroom and the hallway in the original building were painted during the summer. An equipment storage shed was purchased and installed, and both play area and parking area were paved. Painting is an annual project, and we are fast approaching the time when we can no longer afford to delay making major repairs to the roof of the original building.

Daily care and cleaning of the building continues to be excellent thanks to the efforts and concern of our custodian, Mr. Davis. A word of thanks and compliments are, also, due the employees of the lunch program.

One serious problem facing Chesterfield is that of enrollment. The school population is now in excess of three hundred. Presently there are two rooms with children from two grades in them. We have enough children in practically every grade to justify two sections at each grade level. This would require sixteen rooms, and we have only twelve rooms. Questions regarding an addition to the building, sending grades seven and eight to Keene, and the need for a public kindergarten cannot be put off much longer. We in the superintendent's office cannot answer these questions for Chesterfield; the citizens of Chesterfield must answer them.

Our school library, thanks to the efforts of volunteers, is well endowed with a substantial number of books. Some of these, however, came from attics and cellars of generous people, but they no longer compare favorably with new exciting, and colorful books now available. Space is a crucial problem in our library, and this should be considered in conjunction with the questions mentioned in the previous paragraph.

The State Board of Education will be asked this summer to approve "Minimum Standards for Elementary Schools." Some of the recommendations are: a kindergarten, a full time nurse, full time guidance person, a library of 7,500 square feet, and many others.

Local property taxpayers have been bending over backwards for years in this state to support all local services with local funds, and deserve much praise and thanks for doing as well as they have. Of a proposed budget of over \$300,000.00, less than \$3,500 will come from the State of New Hampshire, and only about \$5,700.00 from the federal government. Once again we are faced with requesting 95% of the budget from persons in the local community.

In terms of both dollars and percentages, the recent history of Chesterfield School District budgets is listed below:

Most of the budget, probably seventy-five or eighty percent, is set for us before either the school board or the bud-

get committee ever reviews it. Neither group has any control over such items as transportation, tuition, retirement, social security, heat, lights, supervisory union expenses, principal and interest payments on the buildings, and insurance. This leaves only those items such as salaries, library books, scholars supplies, and equipment—those areas that most directly affect education—for the close scrutiny of those who must watch the pocketbook. This is most unfortunate, since most people are very willing to recognize the need for these expenses, but feel unable to support them locally. May we urge you to plea for assistance from the State together with us.

All of us in the Supervisory Union office genuinely feel that Chesterfield is a fine place in which to work and that it does have a good school. Our thanks to the citizens, staff, and

school board for their cooperation and support.

- Article 5. ### REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

People cause fires. Our records show that the number of fires increase in an area as the population increases and our state is growing tremendously. This means that we all must be aware of fire causes and do our best to prevent their occurrence.

When we are very young the lighted matches is an adventure, burnt fingers and a dropped match is another fire. A little older we like to have a woodland cookout, or go out by ourselves for a smoke but fire and forests get together for another statistic. We adults like to clean up in the spring, burn the old debris and the dead grass, result —escaped fires and much personal expense.

With new homes and summer cottages located in woodlands and with abandoned fields and forests crowding the back yard of our villages' streets, it is necessary that everyone be aware all through the fire season, which comes with the disappearance of the snow, of the need to be careful with outdoor fires and fire sources.

The following action will help:

- 1. To teach our children the danger of lighted matches.
- 2. To *never* discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
- 3. To safely dispose of rubbish preferably at the town dump. If you must burn
  - a. You need a written permit from the town fire warden for *all* debris burning except when the ground is covered with snow. Cooking fires in outdoor fireplaces or in charcoal brasiers in your own back yard is permitted on notification of the fire warden.
  - b. The warden is forbidden by regulation to allow burning of household rubbish on *grass* by householders between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M.
  - c. Have equipment on hand to control the fire *before* you light the match.
- 4. Promptly report any fire out of control to your fire warden or fire department.

Help to keep our town out of the fire occurrence column and save your tax dollars for useful purposes.
