

TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF CONWAY, County of Carroll in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Kennett High School auditorium at Conway, New Hampshire, on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, 1978, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects hereinafter set forth. Voting on Articles 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 will be by official ballot and the polls shall open for balloting at nine o'clock in the forenoon or as soon thereafter as the Moderator calls the meeting to order and declares a quorum present. The remaining articles of the Warrant shall be acted upon at seven o'clock in the evening or at the closing of the polls if the meeting shall vote to keep the polls open to a later hour.

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary officers.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 72:43-b and 43-c for expanded exemptions on real estate which provide for a resident 65 years of age up to 75, a \$5,000 exemption; a resident 75 years of age up to 80, a \$10,000 exemption, and a resident 80 years of age or older, a \$20,000 exemption, provided that the resident owns the real estate individually or jointly with another or his spouse with whom he has been living for at least 5 years as man and wife; said resident had a net income of less than \$7,000 or combined income with spouse of less than \$9,000; and owns assets of any kind, tangible or intangible, less bona fide encumbrances, not in excess of \$50,000. Recommended by the Budget Committee, 14 ayes, 0 nayes, 0 abstentions.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a Flood Ordinance as prepared by the Saco River Steering Committee.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a Zoning Ordinance and that the vote be by ballot which shall read as follows: "Are you in favor of the adoption of the Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board?"

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to abolish the Town Planning Board, and that the vote be by ballot which shall read as follows: "Are you in favor of abolishing the Planning Board as proposed by Petition of the Voters of Conway?" Agreeable to a petition signed by Robert B. Dickson and others.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to abolish the Conway Police Commission and to return their powers to the Conway Board of Selectmen and the Conway Town Manager and that the vote be by ballot. Agreeable to a petition signed by Mark W. Wiggin and others.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to repeal the ordinance prohibiting street sales adopted at the special town meeting September 20th, 1977. Agreeable to a petition signed by Stephen E. Piane and others.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set offs against budgeted appropriations for the following specific purposes and in amounts indicated herewith or take any other action hereon:

Appropriation New Equipment Amount \$100,000.00

Recommended by the Budget Committee. 11 ayes, 0 nayes, 3 abstentions.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission on behalf of the Town of Conway, to acquire by purchase, gift, or otherwise, eighty-two (82) acres of land, more or less, which is land commonly known as the Irish Property located in Conway with 1100 feet frontage on the Saco River, such purchase not to exceed \$120,000.00 with a maximum cost to the town not to exceed \$50,000.00. Submitted without recommendation by the Budget Committee. 7 ayes, 2 nays, 3 abstentions.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission on behalf of the town to acquire by purchase, gift, or otherwise, thirty-six (36) acres of land, more or less, which is land commonly known as the Bancroft Property, (Rye Field) located adjacent to Whitaker Woods in North Conway, such purchase not to exceed \$25,000.00 with maximum cost to the Town not to exceed \$16,000.00. Submitted without recommendation by the Budget Committee. 7 ayes, 0 nays, 5 abstentions.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make application for and to accept on behalf of the Conservation Commission any and all Federal Funds which may be available hereinafter, and to expend said Funds as acquired toward

the purchase of either one or both lands described in the foregoing articles.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-seven Thousand (\$27,000.00) Dollars for an addition to the Town Hall. It would be a fireproof basement for storage of Tax Records and ground floor to be used for office space for Selectmen's Meetings. The addition would be 50 feet long and 12 feet wide. Not recommended by the Budget Committee. 8 ayes, 4 nays, 2 abstentions.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appripriate the sum of Twenty-three Thousand Three Hundred (\$23,300.00) Dollars for the Chester Ballou development on Prospect Road to install under-drainage and catchbasins to take care of drainage from Tasker Hill Road and land surrounding this area.

Large amounts of water draining into this section is causing sewerage problems. Agreeable to petition signed by Leland Chapman and others. Not recommended by the Budget Committee. 11 ayes, 0 nays. 3 abstentions.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town of Conway will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Two Hundred (\$20,200.00) Dollars to assist the Conway Village Recreation Commission and the North Conway Community Center; \$9,500.00 to the Conway Village Recreation Commission and \$10,700.00 to the North Conway Community Center. Said sums to be allocated to the Conway Village Recreation Commission and the Board of Directors, North Conway Community Center. Agreeable to a petition signed by Maurice Geiger and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee. 9 ayes, 6 nays, 1 abstention.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, until directed to the contrary at a subsequent Town Meeting, to apply, negotiate and do all other things necessary to obtain such Federal, State, and other assistance as may be available for the report for, design of, and construction of a sewage disposal system and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of said assistance as outlined in NH RSA 33:7-b et seq., as amended, and pass any vote relating thereto. Submitted without recommendation by the Budget Committee. 10 ayes, 0 nays, 4 abstentions.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00), for the purpose of preparing a facilities plan on sewerage and sewage treatment facilities which are requirements contained in the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. 1251 et seq.) and will qualify the Town for Federal funds, such sum to be raised

by the issuance of Serial Bonds or Notes not to exceed \$15,000.00 under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (NH RSA 33:1 et seq., as amended) and authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Conway and to allow the Selectmen to expend such monies as become available from the Federal Government under Financial Assistance Program of the Construction Grants section of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. 1251 et seq.) and pass any vote relating thereto. Submitted without recommendation by the Budget Committee. 11 ayes, 1 nay, 2 abstentions.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town of Conway will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) towards the establishment of an infant nursery. This sum to be used for a pilot project. Agreeable to a petition signed by Kristine M. Cluff and others. Not recommended by the Budget Committee. 13 ayes, 1 nay, 0 abstentions.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to contract with John Strout to operate the Mount Washington Valley Incinerator for a three (3) year period and to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Four Hundred Two Dollars (\$12,402.00) for the current year. This amount of money to be expended as follows:

Contractor (John Strout) \$7500.00 Present Employee Expenses (Jan-Mar) 4902.00

Not recommended by the Budget Committee. 12 ayes, 1 nay, 1 abstention.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) for repairs to the hallway and two upstairs front rooms in the Town Hall, and authorize the withdrawal of Twelve Thousand One Hundred and Eleven (\$12,-111.00) Dollars from Anti-Recession Funds with the balance to be raised by taxation. Submitted without recommendation. 12 ayes, 1 nay, 1 abstention.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town of Conway will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand (\$12,000.00) Dollars for the Memorial Hospital, North Conway, New Hampshire. Agreeable to a petition signed by Arthur F. Brown, Jr. and others. Submitted without recommendation. 9 ayes, 4 nays, 1 abstention.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town of Conway will raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Eight Hundred Forty-four Dollars and Eighty-five cents (\$7,844.85) for the Visiting Nurse

Services of Northern Carroll County, Inc. (Formerly the Home Health Agency of the Memorial Hospital, Inc.) The said sum being equal to \$1.35 per person in the Town of Conway. Agreeable to a petition signed by John H. Small and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee. 15 ayes, 0 nays, 1 abstention.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixty-five Hundred Dollars (\$6,500.00) for the installation and maintenance of dry hydrants within the Town of Conway. Agreeable to a petition signed by Francis Deasy and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee. 12 ayes, 0 nays, 4 abstentions.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to become a member of the North Country Council, organized in July, 1973. The Council has been designated by the State Office of Comprehensive Planning to be the official planning commission for New Hampshire Planning Region One. The objectives of the Council are to prepare a comprehensive plan for the region, work for consensus on major problems of regional concern, encourage and assist in cooperative projects to solve problems involving more than one town, and help member communities in their planning programs.

The Council's authority is conferred by RSA 36:45-53. It is advisory to local governments in the region. Member representatives of the Council are appointed by the Board of Selectmen, as provided by State Law. Two representatives will be appointed from this Town. Agreeable to a petition signed by Robert L. Johnson and others.

ARTICLE 25, To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Eight Hundred and Five Dollars (\$4,805.00) as the Town's share for operation of the North Country Council for one year, beginning July 1, 1978. These funds will be used for financing staff, office and general operating expenses; regional planning studies; technical assistance to member communities; coordination with local, State and Federal agencies; and other programs of the Council. These are used in conjunction with State and Federal funds. A Town must appropriate the entire amount requested in order to be a full member in the North Country Council. Agreeable to a petition signed by Robert L. Johnson and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee. 9 ayes, 5 nays, 0 abstentions.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand (\$4,000.00) Dollars for cemetery maintenance. Recommended by the Budget Committee. 14 ayes, 0 nays, 0 abstentions.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand (\$4,000.00) Dollars to be di-

vided equally between the Chambers of Commerce in both Conway and the Mount Washington Valley Chamber of Commerce with \$2,000.00 going to the Conway Chamber of Commerce and \$2,000.00 going to the Mount Washington Valley Chamber of Commerce. Agreeable to a petition signed by Walter F. Keefe and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee. 9 ayes, 7 nays, 0 abstentions.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Three Hundred Sixty-seven Dollars and forty-three cents (\$3,367.43) to assist the Carroll County Mental Health Service, Inc. 1978. Agreeable to a petition signed by Bebe Toor and others. Submitted without recommendation by the Budget Committee. 11 ayes, 3 nays, 2 abstentions.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand (\$3,000.00) Dollars for expenses of the Mount Washington Valley Public Service Council, operating as a regional Refuse Disposal Planning Board under Chapter 53-B of NH RSA, for the purposes of entering into an engineering service contract with Environmental Engineers, Inc., of Concord, N. H., for a feasibility study for solid waste disposal in the Mount Washington Valley area. Recommended by the Budget Committee. 13 ayes, 0 nays, 3 abstentions.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town of Conway will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand (\$3,000.00) Dollars to the North Conway Day Care Center. Agreeable to a petition signed by Marcia Weld and others. Not recommended by the Budget Committee. 8 ayes, 6 nays, 2 abstentions.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town of Conway will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) for the Center of Hope for Developmental Disabilities, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by Jeffrey Kaplan and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee. 9 ayes, 6 nays, 2 abstentions.

ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town of Conway will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Four Hundred Seventy-two (\$2,472.00) Dollars towards the support of the North Conway Children and Youth Project (C&Y). This sum to be used as rent for clinic and office space. Agreeable to a petition signed by Joan M. Whetton and others. Submitted without recommendation by the Budget Committee. 9 ayes, 6 nays, 1 abstention.

ARTICLE 33. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Hundred (\$1,500.00) Dollars for the Fourth of July Parade held in North Conway for the year 1978. Agreeable to a petition signed by John Pandora and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee. 16 ayes, 0 nays, 0 abstentions.

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) to partially defray current expenses at the Eastern Slope Regional Airport, Fryeburg, Maine. Agreeable to a petition signed by Francis Deasy and others. Submitted without recommendation by the Budget Committee. 14 ayes, 0 nays, 0 abstentions.

ARTICLE 35. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Hundred (\$1,500.00) Dollars for the White Mountains Region Association. Agreeable to a petition signed by Ralph L. Grindle and others. Submitted without recommendation by the Budget Committee. 11 ayes, 0 nays, 3 abstentions.

ARTICLE 36. To see if the voters of the Town of Conway will raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Hundred Dollars (\$1,200.00), said sum to be turned over to the North Conway Park Commissioners to be used for the program of the North Conway Park. Agreeable to a petition signed by Eleanor S. Perkins and others. Not recommended by the Budget Committee. 11 ayes, 4 nays, 1 abstention.

ARTICLE 37. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to publish a 1978 Real Estate Assessment booklet for the Town of Conway and to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) to defray the cost of printing. Recommended by the Budget Committee. 13 ayes, 0 nays, 1 abstention.

ARTICLE 38. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for the naming and numbering of all streets and lots within the Town of Conway. Agreeable to a petition signed by Homer Hamlin and others. Submitted without recommendation by the Budget Committee. 13 ayes, 3 nays, 0 abstentions.

ARTICLE 39. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) to help defray the expenses of the Water Safety Program as carried out by the Conway Chapter of the American National Red Cross. Submitted with recommendation by the Budget Committee. 12 ayes, 0 nays, 1 abstention.

ARTICLE 40. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for a 4-channel portable radio for the Town Fire Warden, agreeable to a petition signed by Donald H. West and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee. 11 ayes, 3 nays, 2 abstentions.

ARTICLE 41. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) in support of the Senior Meals and Wheels program. Agreeable to a petition

signed by Mary Whitcomb and others. Recommended by the Budget Committee. 11 ayes, 1 nay, 1 abstention.

ARTICLE 42. To see if the Town will vote to Authorize the following: That Village districts may apply to the town for tax-anticipated money before the tax rate has been established for the town if said district presents to the Selectmen a district budget, approved at a properly constituted district meeting, called for the purpose of approving the budget; that Town may advance to any village district a share of any money borrowed by the Town in anticipation of taxes, not exceeding the total approved budget amount to be paid to such district; and that the town may charge the districts a proportionate share of the interest due on the tax-anticipated notes. Agreeable to a petition signed by Herbert E. Hall, Jr., and others. Not recommended by the Budget Committee. 12 ayes, 1 nay, 0 abstentions.

ARTICLE 43. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a Deputy Town Treasurer upon recommendation of the Town Treasurer.

ARTICLE 44. To see if the Town will vote to authorize payment of full medical insurance (Blue Cross-Blue Shield) for all employees, to be paid by the Town of Conway. Agreeable to a petition signed by Gary C. Smith and others. Not recommended by the Budget Committee. 14 ayes, 0 nays, 0 abstentions.

ARTICLE 45. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen in behalf of the Town of Conway, N. H. to accept gifts and/or Federal or State Aid in the name of the Town of Conway, N. H. applied for and to receive and expend them in accordance with the purposes thereof.

ARTICLE 46. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell, at their discretion, at public auction, real estate in the Town to which the Town has title by Collector's Deed, any such real estate to be sold and conveyed on or before December 31, 1978.

ARTICLE 47. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell at public auction, a parcel of land approximately 6.5 acres, Map 12, parcel 47, on the Southeast side of the East Conway Road and Old Route 302.

ARTICLE 48. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire upon the credit of the Town such sums of money as may be needed, such sums not to exceed the combined school, town and county tax budgets, in anticipation of taxes for town, county and school purposes.

ARTICLE 49. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to study and review the Town Highway Department and if found to be a definite economic advantage to contract snowplowing and snow removal.

ARTICLE 50. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue and made subject to gates and bars the highway described as follows: Rockhouse Mountain Road to the Eaton Town Line, as provided in RSA 238:2. The gates and bars shall be maintained by the Town of Conway.

ARTICLE 51. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue and made subject to gates and bars the highway described in Volume 8, page 128 of the Town Book of Records, described as starting at the Center Conway Post Office to the Maine Central Railroad, thence Easterly along said railroad, thence Southerly to Route 302 between Old Potter Place and Dickson's, as provided in RSA 238:2. The gates and bars shall be maintained by abutting land owners.

ARTICLE 52. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue and made subject to gates and bars the highway described as follows: The Henderson Road, so called, starting at the Rockford Brown residence in South Conway, to the Davis Hill Road in South Conway, as provided in RSA 238:2. The gates and bars shall be maintained by the Town of Conway.

ARTICLE 53. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to send a letter to the General Court urging the Court to pass legislation that would prohibit utilities from including in their rates financing charges for facilities not actually able to provide service. Agreeable to a petition signed by Irvin A. Grubbs, Sr. and others.

ARTICLE 54. To see if the Town will vote to exempt the land of business corporations abutting the east and south sides of Mill Street from the 1974 Flood Plain Ordinance. Agreeable to a petition signed by Donald E. Newton and others.

ARTICLE 55. To act upon any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

1977 was a year of challenges, problems, changes, continued growth and an increased tax rate. Attempting to find a solution to the problem of efficient flow of traffic into and through the town is a challenge and a study was started and is continuing. This study includes street parking, off street parking and travel lanes. In cooperation with the Catholic Church, Mt. Washington Valley Chamber of Commerce, and the Town, a 240 car parking lot was constructed at the rear of the Villa, on the east side of Main Street between Grove and Seavey Streets. It is hoped that the majority of people employed in establishments along Main Street in North Conway Village will use this parking area.

Solid waste management has consumed many hours of time. We were successful in obtaining a \$227,000.00 Public Works grant that is being used to construct an incinerator building and recycling building. The incinerator building is designed to accommodate the installation of incinerators at a later date. In the very near future our present pit type incinerator will have to be demolished and a different type of incinerator purchased and installed. Every town by July 1, 1979 must comply with Federal and State air pollution regulations. Selectmen and Town Manager will need to continue searching for an approved type of incinerator and also be searching for any funds that might become available to help defray costs of purchase and installation. Solid waste is a problem for every town. In anticipation of having to change to a different type of incinerator, a recycling program has been in operation for several months. We have had a contract with Mr. John Strout for several months whereby he purchased newspapers, cardboard, metals and tires. Mr. Strout has contacted us and has requested that we contract the operation of the incinerator-recycling to him for a three year period. Several years ago the Mt. Washington Valley Public Service Council was formed, with representatives from Bartlett, Jackson, Conway, Eaton and Albany to study solid waste management. The Council this year is proposing to employ Environmental Engineers, Inc. to study solid waste management alternatives and the feasibility of forming a Refuse Disposal District.

There are areas within the town where sewerage is a problem and these areas need to be identified. Federal and State funds are available to conduct a feasibility study which will cost \$60,000.00. The Federal Government will pay 75% (\$45,000), the State will pay 20% (\$12,000) and the Town 5% (\$3,000). The State and Town share need to be raised and appropriated at Town Meeting.

The Planning Board was requested to revise their Subdivision

Regulations, prepare a Master Plan for the Town and work on a Zoning Ordinance for the 1978 Town Meeting.

The five year project of reconstructing Intervale Crossroads was completed in the fall of 1977 with a total cost of \$107,000.00 for this one mile of road. Funds for this project were shared by the State (85%) and the Town (15%), plus T.R.A. funds for the asphalt concrete topping.

It should be noted that the Intervale Crossroads-Dinsmore Road area became a drainage problem with the increased runoff from Ledgewood, Birch Street, and Ash Street. The area involved is approximately 100 acres. Drainage in this area was accomplished in cooperation with the State, Soil Conservation Service and all abutting property owners.

With the increase road mileage within the Town it will be impossible for the highway crew to perform any more construction work. Maintenance of roads and drainage systems must have top priority.

Maintenance work for the highway crew will include:

Complete drainage on River Street (Conway Village)

Sweeping streets once a week May through September

Drainage repairs: North Conway - The Lane, Artist Falls Road, Oak Street, and Echo Acres

Drainage repairs - East Conway Road

Remove brush along Eastern Slope Terrace to make room for snow-plowing

Clean ditches and culverts

Marking Streets

Maintain Signs

Roadside Mowing

Applying asphalt and asphalt concrete

For approximately six years, residents in the Oak Street section of Conway Village have been told that their street was going to be reconstructed when the sewer system was installed. Sewer work on this street and others within Conway Village will not be started for another three years. In the meantime, these streets will receive patching treatment as we do not want to spend money in construction only having the streets ripped up for sewerage systems and then be faced with additional costs of paving.

Reassessing the Town in accordance with Article 7, 1977 Town Warrant is being performed by Sewall Company of Old Town, Maine. Tax maps and records in the Town are not in the best condition. It would be in the best interest of the Town if the voters

would authorize the Selectmen to contract with Sewall Company to maintain all maps, etc., and in 1979 to appropriate the necessary funds to have all tax data in computers so that our assessed valuation could be maintained at the 100% valuation, thus eliminating future complete reassessment.

Much needed work was completed on cemeteries within the Town. Work included repairing fences, resetting gravestones, loaming graves, cutting trees and brush.

Our Town Hall is a fine old building and should fulfill the needs of the Town for many years with some more remodeling. The entrance should have new outer doors, hallway and two front upstairs rooms should be paneled to conform with the new work in the Courtroom. The Selectmen's meeting room is very small and crowded on meeting days. It is proposed to extend the present building outward 12 feet and 50 feet in length. The basement would be fireproof for the storage of records and the ground floor would be a meeting room for the Selectmen and other Boards and Commissions.

Selectmen's meetings are held every Thursday afternoon at 1:30 P.M. Representatives of the media attend our meetings each week (namely — Radio Station WBNC, The Reporter, Carroll County Independent and The Irregular.) Many times during the year the Selectmen held an additional weekly meeting to work on problems that time did not permit to be worked on at the regular meeting.

Changes in personnel this past year have included the resignation of Selectman Herbert E. Hall, Jr., because of ill health; the appointment of Harvey C. Blake to Mr. Hall's unexpired term; the resignations of Cindy Dickson, who took a position with Hamel Realtors, and the resignation of Ann Priebe, who took a position with Attitash Mountain Recreation Association.

Due to the late passage of the State Budget, it was impossible to obtain a tax rate until November 8, 1977.

Some people believe that the Selectmen control the Tax Rate. You, the Voters, who attend Town Meeting, School Meeting and Precinct meetings vote to raise and appropriate monies to be spent and every dollar that is to be spent has to be paid with the tax dollar. We have tried to keep the Town Budget down, but YOU VOTERS should seriously consider the amount of money requested for give away programs entered by Special Articles to the Town Warrant.

Your Selectmen have spent a very busy year and we realize there are many challenges and problems facing the Town that will have to be met headon. One thing for sure, you cannot close your eyes and hope to have all the problems disappear. We plan to continue to look for possible ways and means to reduce the cost of operating the Town government. We welcome suggestions from you, the Taxpayer.

We take this opportunity to thank all elected officials and Town employees for their cooperation throughout the year.

We have examined the books and records of the Town of Conway, New Hampshire for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1976 and have prepared the attached exhibits and schedules in conformity with the recommended format prescribed by the Municipal Services Division of the State of New Hampshire. Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, District Court, Public Library, and Trustees of Trust Funds.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

General Fund:

Comparative Balance Sheet: (Exhibit A-1)

A comparative balance sheet disclosing the financial condition of the general fund as of December 31, 1975 and December 31, 1976 is presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the current surplus of the Town decreased by \$159,419 in 1976; from \$447,585 at December 31, 1975 to \$288,166 at December 31, 1976. An analysis of the change in financial condition is contained in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures — Estimated and Actual Revenue: (Exhibits A-3 and A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenue for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1976, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of \$94,750, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$47,746, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$142,496 for 1976.

Long-Term Indebtedness:

Comparative Balance Sheet: (Exhibit A-5)

A comparative balance sheet disclosing the long-term indebtedness of the Town as of December 31, 1975 and December 31, 1976, is included in Exhibit A-5. The long-term debt decreased by \$26,000 in 1976; from \$434,000 at December 31, 1975 to \$408,000 at December 31, 1976.

Statement of Debt Service Requirements: (Exhibit A-6)

A statement showing annual debt service requirements of principal and interest is contained in Exhibit A-6.

OTHER FUNDS AND OFFICIALS' ACCOUNTS

The accompanying supplemental exhibits covering segregated funds and the accounts of those officials entrusted with the custody, receipt or expenditure of Town funds, are presented in accordance with the current requirements of the Municipal Services Division of the State of New Hampshire. Although not considered necessary for a fair presentation of the financial statements and results of operations, our examination of these accounts included the same tests and auditing procedures applied in the examination of the aforementioned financial statements. In our opinion, these exhibits are stated fairly in all material respects when considered in conjunction with the financial statements taken as a whole.

We extend our thanks to the officials and the office staff of the Town of Conway for their assistance during the course of the audit.

Report of the Conway Conservation Commission

The Commission met monthly throughout the 1977 year, discussing and acting upon dredge and fill applications and management of town owned land.

More emphasis was placed on management of conservation land through sound forestry practices and use of land by townspeople. A Management Plan for both Whitaker Woods and Pudding Pond was developed in 1976, and a start was made to put this into action. Selective cutting of timber on four acres in Whitaker Woods gave an income to the town of about \$1,000.00. Due to the increasing use of Whitaker Woods by cross country skiers, it was obvious other land should be developed with trails. Fire roads and repainting of boundary lines needed to be completed on conservation land.

With the above needs in mind the Conservation Commission submitted a proposal for funding through CETA and the ACP Programs. The Comprehensive Employment Training Act (CETA) request was approved for three people to start work in January. Funding for timber stand improvement (TSI) work was approved for 20 acres in Pudding Pond and will be carried out in 1978.

The commission in 1977 spent many meetings discussing the acquiring of additional land for the town. Two parcels of land, Bancroft Property 36 acres in North Conway and Irish Property 82 acres in Conway, were available for purchase. The Bancroft Property would be an addition to the Whitaker Woods Property which is heavily used by skiers. The Irish Property would be an ideal property for Conway Village. Besides the skiing possibilities the Irish Property also borders the Saco River which would permit a site for a much needed swimming area. The commission voted to place both parcels before the townspeople in March 1978.

The Commission welcomes townspeoples' comments and suggestions on managing town land at any time. Please contact any commission member in your area.

Report of the Library Trustees

The usefulness of a public library is measured primarily by the circulation of books, then by the number of persons using the reading room. At Conway Library the circulation of adult books rose last year 7.3%, from 20,084 to 21,561, and the circulation of juvenile books 15%, from 8,575 to 9,862.

A 68% gain was recorded in the reading room, from 2,115 persons to 3,572. Healthy increases were also recorded in the number of reference questions, from 511 to 781, and in the number of patrons registered, from 405 to 527.

The increases could be attributed partly to the longer hours the library kept on Mondays in the summer — from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. instead of from 2 to 5.

Distribution of tapes through the Outreach Program increased from 2,128 to 2,434. Through the efforts of Polly Burnell, a volunteer who coordinates this program, \$130 was raised to purchase 200 new tapes. The Conway Woman's Club contributed \$50, the Elmwood Grange \$50, and the Fryeburg Woman's Library Club \$30.

Friends of the Library, organized in 1976, were helpful in many ways. They presented a bike rack to the library, had a clean-up day for the grounds in the summer and bought containers for plants which were presented to the library by the Garden Club. They cooperated with the Conway Woman's Club in two book sales, which raised \$374.40 for the library. They were also in charge of 68 story time programs, 2 puppet shows and 2 summer programs, a puppetry program for younger children to learn how to make puppets and a creative dancing program for older children. They also sponsored a Saturday program by the Forestry Service and the Conway Fire Department.

Many exhibits were held during the year. The Little Red Wagon, co-sponsored by the library and the Conway Village Recreation Commission, attracted 145 people. The library float in the July 4 Conway parade won a prize of \$60.

The N. H. Library Council Conference was held at the Red Jacket Motor Lodge on May 16 and 17, and was attended by Margaret Marschner, Amy Gardner, Helen Nute, Ernest Kroner, Herbert Lucy and Helen Bumstead. The library was open on these days from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. and from 7 to 9 so that people attending the conference could visit. Margaret Marschner attended the New England Library Conference held in Sturbridge, Mass. in the fall. Helen Nute

and Helen Bumstead attended the meeting of the N. H. Library Trustees Association in Concord in October.

Peter Dunn, Trustee and Treasurer of the Trustees, is retiring in March. We will miss his helpfulness and wise counsel.

The Trustees accepted with regret the resignation of Ethel Towle because of ill health. She had been the Assistant Librarian for many years.

We were fortunate to have Nanette McIntyre from Wisconsin work as a library assistant under the CETA program, which paid her full salary for 13 weeks and 50% of her salary for the next 6 months. At the end of that period she returned to college and Jan Horvath joined the library staff.

Amy Gardner received a scholarship through the N. H. Library Council to take a Public Library Techniques course at the University of New Hampshire.

Margaret Marschner, librarian, was granted a leave of absence when her daughter Krista was born.

A copy of "Call it Zest," written by Elizabeth Yates, was presented to the library by Ernest Kroner, one of our trustees. He is one of the characters described in the book.

We are grateful to the selectmen for granting the library \$2,285 from anti-recession funds received by the town. This money was used for insulation.

The trustees are proud of the library, and appreciate the support of the many people who contribute to its effectiveness in the community.

POLICE COMMISSIONER'S REPORT - 1977

In January former Chief Allan MacLean submitted his resignation to the Commission.

The Commission made arrangements with the New Hampshire Department of Personnel for their assistance in the selection process for a new Police Chief. Advertisements were placed in the Manchester Union Leader, North Conway Reporter and the Carroll County Independent advising potential applicants of the requirements of the position and that written and oral examinations would be conducted by the New Hampshire Department of Personnel.

This procedure was followed for the more than 30 applicants for the position. The Commission interviewed all of the applicants that successfully completed both the oral and written examinations conducted by the Department of Personnel.

The Commission selected Frederick A. Henley who was sworn in as Chief on April 3, 1977. Unfortunately it was necessary to place Chief Henley on medical leave in October; as of January 1978 he was still on medical leave.

Lt. Salmon served as Acting Chief from January through March and is again serving as Acting Chief while Chief Henley is on medical leave.

Sgt. Carl Sonne and Patrolman Malcolm MacDonald submitted their resignations to the Commission during 1977.

Again the Commission asked the Department of Personnel for their assistance in conducting written and oral examinations for sergeant. As a result of those examinations and upon the recommendation of Chief Henley, the Commission appointed Patrolman Stanley Lukas to the rank of Sergeant.

The Commission appointed, with the recommendation of Chief Henley, Anthony DiGregorio and Chris Canney as Patrolmen. Both men had been Special Officers with the Conway Police Department, Chris Canney has also served as police dispatcher for several years.

Police Aide Suzanne Russell resigned; the Commission appointed Marilyn Howard as a replacement.

Following successful completion of written examinations for patrolmen conducted by the Department of Personnel and satisfactory results of physical examinations, the Commission appointed the following Special Officers: Frank Gambone, John Flynn, Bruce Tymeson, Michael Jones and William Scaletti.

The Department was able to operate well within its budget for 1977. Since the Town operates on a cash accounting system rather than an accrual accounting, several reimbursements and appropriation credits received in January 1978 but applicable to 1977 were not included in the financial report prepared by the Town Office.

The proposed 1978 budget for the Police Department is in two parts. The first part includes all of the items included in previous years. The second part is what we have termed a supplementary budget which includes those items applicable to the Police Department but heretofore included in the Selectmen's budget; those items are: police insurance, Blue Cross-Blue Shield, life insurance, State Retirement, FICA as well as various expenses related to the police headquarters building. These items total \$38,081.00 which had not previously been a part of the police budget.

The first part of the proposed budget, which is directly comparable to previous years, shows an overall increase of 3.12%; the operating portion of that comparable budget shows a decrease of 2.8%, the labor portion an increase of 4.70%.

The salary schedule upon which the Department has operated for several years has, what we believe to be, several serious deficiencies. It allowed for only three salary increments from the lowest pay rate for a patrolman to the highest rate; the increments were at a higher percentage than we felt necessary; the system lacked longer range incentives; and, was on an automatic basis. Since most members of the department were at the same salary level it was decided that 1978 would be an appropriate year to attempt a change.

The Commission asked Donald Pocock, Personnel Director of the North Conway Lumber Company and Ralph Wiggin of the U.S. Forest Service to serve as members of a wage study committee along with members of the Commission and the Department. Patrolman Roger Anthony served as secretary and research analyst to the Wage Study Committee.

Salary schedules and compensation systems of several New Hampshire Police Departments were studied as well as a few out-of-State departments.

As a result of this study and with the objectives of a good salary schedule in mind, the Commission adopted a proposed plan, the salient features of which are: each increment, which has at least a one year interval, must be upon the recommendation of the Chief and approval of the Commission. The Chief must advise each member of the Department by November First of each year whether or not he will recommend the salary increment for the officer concerned. There are more increments over a much longer time span but at a lower percentage increase between increments.

The Commission believes the most important feature of the plan is the "merit" requirement rather than automatic salary increase predicated wholly on time in grade. The Commission recognizes the potential imperfections, but also feels that the advantages of a merit system far out-weigh the potential mis-use of this particular plan.

The Commission adopted a Rule that all newly appointed full time members of the Department must be residents of the Town of Conway. Those members now residing outside of the Town may continue to do so as long as they remain in the same domicile; should they change domiciles, the new residence must be in the Town of Conway.

The North Conway Garden Club was quite disturbed with the bare appearance of the new Police Headquarters. Through their initiative funds were obtained from the Pequawket Foundation for landscaping the grounds with lawns and shrubbery. We are very appreciative of their efforts, the results are most gratifying.

We also wish to thank Eastern Slope Elks Lodge for the flagpole; Yield house for the fabrication and finish of the conference table, and Carroll Industries for cabinets.

While we did not reach or accomplish all of our goals for 1977, the Commission feels that substantial progress has been made in making a very good Department even better. Taking all factors into consideration, and especially the most important factor — people — the Commission feels, with a great deal of documented justification, that the Conway Police Department is one of the best in the State.

The year 1977 was another record year for traffic in Conway. The approximate average percent of increase during the months of July and August was 7.6%. There were events in 1977 that were a first for Conway, such as the Snowmobile Ride-in and the Country and Western Music Festival that accounted for some of the increase in traffic and people in the area.

We are fortunate to have had a fatality-free year on Conway's roads and highways. No one likes to be stopped for a violation of the speed laws; however, without enforcement of these laws, the auto accidents that are recorded by this department would be of a more serious nature if higher speeds were involved.

One has but to read the newspapers to know that vandalism is an ever increasing problem, not only in Conway but in the rest of the State as well. A high percentage of these acts involve juveniles (17 years or younger). I believe one answer to solving this problem lies with community involvement on a local level. A potential juvenile problem might be avoided if detected in time and a referral made to a community agency for assistance for that juvenile. In most cases, the police become involved after the damage is done.

260 dog complaints were recorded by this department. Of this total only 5 were processed through court. When a dog is picked up and taken to Dr. Hussey, the leash law is being enforced and the dog owner goes to considerable expense and inconvenience to redeem the dog. This is not considered an arrest but has the deterrent effect of a court summons.

There were 967 court cases prosecuted by the Conway Police Department in the Conway District Court, and of these, 18 defendants were found not guilty.

Recovered stolen property totaled \$61,635.00. Complaints received totaled 3,502; 232,580 miles were travelled in patrolling and answering complaints.

At this time I wish to thank the many citizens who have assisted the Police Department by getting involved in the prevention of crime. Their assistance in bringing our attention to activities of a suspicious nature is greatly appreciated.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN

This has been a quiet year for brush and grass fires. There has been a change in the way fire permits are issued.

I took over in late April the duties of Forest Fire Warden. Each Fire Chief is now delegated to issue fire permits for his jurisdiction. In this capacity each Fire Chief knows who is burning in his area and he also knows the weather and burning conditions in his area. It also brings the Chiefs and the public involved with each other together so if and when something should go wrong they will have some type of contact in person before hand.

Some Chiefs have also designated deputies who also can issue permits should you not be able to locate the Chief of your particular area.

A state law forbids any fires during the hours 9 A.M. and 5 P.M. The reason for this law is that this is the time when fires are hardest to control and because most of the state has volunteer fire departments and it is hard for most areas to get manpower during these hours.

Anybody burning brush for house lots, commercial areas, right of ways, etc. must submit, in writing, at least one week in advance to the N. H. Air Pollution Control Commission through the Town Forest Fire Warden as to where, when, and how much he will be burning. All brush to be burned must be 5" in diameter or less. Anything 5" in diameter or greater will not be permitted to be burned.

The following people will issue fire permits for their respective areas for campfires, outdoor grills and fireplaces, etc.

Conway Trustees of the Trust Funds Meeting

Saturday, October 27th, 1977, 9:00 a.m.

Nine cemeteries were visited. They will be listed below with appropriate comments.

Osgood-Thoms, Center Conway: This small cemetery needs mowing. The large one was in good shape except for the replacement of one headstone and filling of several sunken graves.

Center Conway, Center Conway: The appearance was good. There was one stone, that of Betsy T. Mills, which needs repair.

Burbank, East Conway Road: This cemetery is in a state of reconstruction. It is most unattractive now, needing grading, seeding, replacement of foot stones, and perhaps a stile to get over the solid stone wall.

Wentworth, East Conway Road: The grounds looked good. The gate needs metal repairs and two graves, Ralph and Nettie, need fill.

Conway, Conway Village: The upkeep is very good.

Dearing, West Side Road: Vernon Smith and Bob Johnson have done a massive job of mowing, cutting and improvements. It looked nice.

Davis, West Side Road: There were several stones which have been repaired and are rebroken. The appearance of the access road and the cemetery was good.

Dinsmore-Will, Intervale: The grounds were in good shape. There had been some grading and fill done which will probably be seeded in the spring.

Kearsarge, Kearsarge: The grounds are very attractive, with new fruit tree plantings.

We noted the use of plastic flowers and suggest to all cemetery associations that they consider regulations limiting the use of them. The plastic is unattractive when the color fades.

We also would hope that the town crews in clearing overgrown cemeteries in the future would leave all trees which have a diameter of 4" or more.

Report of Mt. Washington Valley Public Service Council

In 1974, the Towns of Albany, Bartlett, Conway, Eaton, Hart's Location and Jackson created the Mt. Washington Valley Public Service Council to operate as a regional Refuse Disposal Planning Board as authorized by the New Hampshire General Court. The specific purpose as chartered by the member towns was to determine the advantages, if any, of the member towns joining in a regional Solid Waste Disposal System.

As each year progressed, pressure proportionally increased for the simple reason that every town must comply with Federal and State air pollution regulations by July 1, 1979. If all the member towns are not complying by July 1, 1979, each is subject to mandatory penalties of up to \$25,000 per day.

Each member town has its own unique problem, but the simple fact of the matter is that open dumps and open-dump burning will not be allowed after July 1, 1979, and, furthermore, any such burning now is in violation but either being allowed by special grant, which will cease on July 1, 1979, or the town is operating under appeal from a cease-and-desist order. Even in Conway's case, its incinerator is a stop-gap measure which will be forced to close on July 1, 1979.

Therefore, within the next year and one-half, each member town will be required to expend money and take physical action either in the form of a land-fill project, an approved incinerator, or such other means as to comply with the State and Federal regulations. Each town has a choice of taking this action by itself or in concert with its neighbors. Obviously, that solution which calls for the least expenditure of money for the member towns, as balanced by our needs in the future, is the most desirable.

The Mt. Washington Valley Public Service Council has selected Environmental Engineers, Inc., an affiliate of the Weston Group, to professionally analyze the Mt. Washington Valley area and determine the feasibility of a regional solid waste disposal system. If a regional solid waste disposal system is the most feasible, this meeting is the last opportunity for towns to initiate the necessary professional study to make that determination, and then authorize and form a solid waste disposal district and complete construction, if any, by the cutoff date of July 1, 1979, and forego any mandatory fines.

If each town approves its share of the study, it will be completed within three months. The study will also be completed prior to any town committing itself to forming a solid waste disposal district under R.S.A. 53-B. Only after the completion of the study, will a member town know if it is best to go it alone or join with its neighbors.

For these reasons, your Counsel highly recommends each town to authorize the funding of its share of the expenses of its Counsel to perform the feasibility study.

Town Report from the North Country Council, Inc.

Box 40, Franconia, N. H.

In Conway, the NCC provided assistance with a successful LPWA Round II application requesting \$227,000 for a town's incinerator facility.

In 1977, NCC provided the following region-wide services: *Planning Services*: NCC provides technical assistance to communities in a number of areas such as comprehensive planning, assistance with subdivision regulations, or reviewing development proposals. NCC is always available to meet with any local official, planning board or public body to assist with local planning matters and thirty-five towns have received some type of direct service from the Council.

Economic Development Grantmanship: NCC worked closely with the Economic Development Administration of the US Department of Commerce, the Farmers Home Administration, the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation, and HUD to bring a greater amount of financial resources into the Region; this will assist municipalities, local development corporations, and other organizations implement locally developed projects and programs. NCC attempts to be aware of the many federal grant programs that would be relevant to needs of communities in the North Country.

Preparation of Development Plans: By working overtime to complete components of the Development Plan (in accordance with RSA 36:45), the Council will be in a position to make specific recommendations on how the communities in the Region can develop and prepare for future growth. During 1977, much progress has been made in the areas of Land Use, Housing, and Economic Development.

Participation in National and State Policies: NCC responds to opportunities to present a North Country perspective before federal and state agencies. Examples include its presentation to the Regional Town Meeting on transportation sponsored by DOT Secretary Adams; meetings with the Regional representative of the Department of Energy on the potential of wood energy, its role in initiating legislation which permitted the construction of bi-state sewerage treatment plants, and its assistance in developing state legislation permitting town governments to develop and own industrial parks. NCC has also worked with the N. H. Department of Public Works and

Highways to encourage the Department to make improvements to U.S. 302 from Woodsville to Littleton. As a body representative of local government, NCC provides a local response to state initiatives on "208" Water Quality, Solid Waste, and Safe Drinking Water Standards.

Inquiries, Technical Assistance and Special Reports: NCC staff is always available to respond to the inquiries and requests of member municipalities. In the last year, the Council has published technical assistance reports on "Model Subdivision Regulations," "Woodsville Downtown Improvement Summary Report," "Energy Perspectives in the North Country," and the "North Country Housing Element." Education and Training Programs: NCC again co-sponsored the six Municipal Law Lectures in the Fall and the second statewide Annual Meeting of Regional Planning Commission members. A special workshop for applicants of Round II of the Local Public Works Act was held in conjunction with EDA officials from Concord and Philadelphia. Planning News, the NCC Newsletter, and a legislative bulletin keep local officials and interested persons informed of planning and development activities.

In 1978, the Council will be available to work with the member towns and other appropriate groups to help implement some of the recommendations contained in the Plans, Ideas and suggestions on how the Council can be of greater assistance are appreciated. The Council was created by five towns in 1973 and continues to exist as a service agency to member towns. Active membership of the town in the North Country Council will enable the town to take full advantage of the many local and area services provided by the Council. The Council will respond quickly and efficiently to the request of the town in those fields where it has some expertise.
