RECORD OF ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

Dunbarton, N. H., March 11, 1952

Meeting called to order and warrant read by the Moderator Louis D. Holcombe at ten o'clock in the forenoon.

ARTICLE 1. Check list posted and polls opened for balloting.

On motion of Eli N. Noyes, it was voted that the polls remain open until 7 o'clock.

The following named officers were elected in open meeting.

Fence Viewers—Ralph C. Walker, Lincoln W. Burnham, Elmer Warriner.

Surveyors of Wood and Lumber—Fred C. Blackman, Caleb A. Fuller, Jr., Wilfred H. Marshall, William L. Merrill, Frank E. Woodbury, Jr., Arthur Powell.

Auditors—Earle H. Stone, Agnes L. Marshall.

Overseer of the Poor—Louis D. Holcombe.

Constables—Wilfred H. Marshall, Henry Hodgman, Arthur Powell.

Town Forest Committee—Robert F. Baker.

Sextons—Charles Weatherbee, Center Cemetery; Walter E. Warriner, East Cemetery; Herbert Anderson, North Cemetery.

Hog Reeves—Charlie Sawyer, Elmer Warriner.

ARTICLE 2. On motion of Eli N. Noyes, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,650.00 to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 3. On motion of C. Allen Fuller, Jr., it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1800.00 for general highway expenses.

ARTICLE 4. Motion made by William L. Merrill to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for summer maintenance.

Amendment by Weston P. Lord that the town raise and appropriate an additional sum of \$800.00 to gravel and tar the road from Earle H. Stone's to Sabine's corner.

Amendment to the amendment by William L. Merrill that the money be used for gravel this year. Motion passed as amended.

ARTICLE 5. On motion of Eli N. Noyes, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for winter maintenance.

ARTICLE 6. On motion of William L. Merrill it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$699.52 for Class V roads, to match a sum of \$4,663.46 contributed by the State, for the upkeep of T.R.A. roads now completed, and completion of the two roads now under construction.

ARTICLE 7. On motion of Eli N. Noyes, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for care of town poor, dependent soldiers, old age assistance.

ARTICLE 8. On motion of Arthur Newell, it was voted to pass over the article .

ARTICLE 9. On motion of L. Webster Burnham, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,533.75 to meet 1952 payment and interest on toilet notes.

ARTICLE 10. On motion of Lyman H. Nutt, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$322.57 for water holes and fire hose. This amount to be added to the sum of \$177.43 carried over from previous year.

ARTICLE 11. On motion of C. Allen Fuller Jr., it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for Memorial Day. This money to be turned over to the American Legion Post.

ARTICLE 12. On motion of Eli N. Noyes, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$215.00 for the support of the Library.

ARTICLE 13. On motion of Eli N. Noyes, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the care of cemeteries, to be allocated as follows—Center Cemetery \$200.00. North Cemetery \$75.00. East Cemetery \$75.00. For repairs at Center and North Cemetery \$150.00.

ARTICLE 14. On motion of C. Allen Fuller Jr., voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for re-checking an area for White Pine Blister Rust.

ARTICLE 15. Motion of Eli N. Noyes to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money to build necessary cupboards in the Town Hall kitchen.

Amendment by Arthur Newell to raise \$300.00. Motion passed as amended.

ARTICLE 16. On motion of Alfred Venator, it was voted that no money be spent on the Mack truck.

ARTICLE 17. On motion of Donald B. Montgomery, it was voted to authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's Deeds.

ARTICLE 18. On motion of William L. Merrill, voted to allow a discount of $1\frac{1}{4}\%$ on all property taxes paid on or before July 1st 1952 or two weeks after the mailing of the bills if mailed after July 1st.

ARTICLE 19. On motion of Arthur Newell, it was voted to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 20. On motion of Donald B. Montgomery it was voted, to pass over the article.

ARTICLE 21. On motion of Arthur Newell it was voted to accept the report of agents, auditors, committees and other officers chosen, as printed, subject to minor errors in printing.

ARTICLE 22. Motion of Donald B. Montgomery to sell the Mack truck, that the money received from the sale of the truck be turned into the general fund.

Amendment by Eli N. Noyes, that the money received from the sale of the truck be made a Capital Reserve Fund to be used for road equipment, Motion passed as amended.

On motion of Charlotte A. Fuller, it was voted that the selectmen be authorized to look into the matter of redecorating the interior of the town hall, also repairing or replacement of the furniture.

RECORD OF SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

Meeting called to order and warrant read by the Moderator Donald B. Montgomery at 8 o'clock in the afternoon.

ARTICLE 1. On motion made by C. Allen Fuller Jr. voted to rescind the action taken on March 11, 1952 under Articles 16 and 22 of the warrant relative to the Mack Truck.

ARTICLE 2. On motion made by Lymand H. Nutt, voted that the selectmen be authorized to sell the Mack truck to the highest bidder, reserving to the said selectmen the right to except or reject any or all bids.

ARTICLE 3. On motion made by Eli N. Noyes, voted to set aside the amount received from the sale of said truck as a capital reserve fund to be used for future purchase or replacement of town equipment.

Voted to adjourn at 8:45 in the afternoon.

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L. s.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Dunbarton in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Dunbarton on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

ARTICLE 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

ARTICLE 3. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for general highway expenses.

ARTICLE 4. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for summer maintenance.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a fixed sum of money for winter maintenance.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$696.06 for Class V roads to match a sum of \$4,640.42 contributed by the State.

ARTICLE 7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of the town poor, dependent soldiers, old age assistance.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$60 (less than 1/100 of one percent of the Town's assessed valuation) to the Merrimack Valley Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town in cooperation with the other 37 Communities of this Region, or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not exceeding \$400 for the purpose of painting the lower town hall.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for water holes and fire hose.

ARTICLE 11. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

ARTICLE 12. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Library.

ARTICLE 13. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of Cemeteries.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for rechecking an area for white pine blister rust.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$462 to purchase a new snow plow.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the town will vote to allow the collector of taxes additional compensation for his services in collecting the state head tax and to fix the amount thereof, in the event the new head tax law becomes effective.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the town will vote to make the office of Tax Collector elective instead of appointive.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$100 for the purpose of establishing a Municipal Court in Dunbarton.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collectors Deeds.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on all taxes paid on or before the first of July.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the division of municipal accounting and make appropriation to cover the expense of such an audit.

ARTICLE 23. To hear all the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and other officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the town will vote to close the Leg Ache Hill road from Kimball's Pond to George's Mills, with gates and bars.

ARTICLE 25. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Citizens of Dunbarton:

The present school year opened with a slight increase in the number of pupils at the Center School. The teaching staff of the prior year all returned, including Mrs. Marion Hayes in Grades 1-4, Mrs. Elizabeth Fottler in Grades 5-8, and Mrs. Katherine Bartlett as music instructor. Mrs. Beatrice Bockus, who replaced Miss Edith Walker in January 1952, continued as school nurse.

Dunbarton is faced, as are most communities, with two major problems,—enrollment and finances.

In my report of last year I called your attention to the anticipated enrollment figures for the Center School for the next five or six years. Our fall school census in 1952, although slightly changed over the figures of 1951, verifies the earlier prediction that we are slowly but surely approaching a difficult school housing problem. Our 1952 census shows that we can anticipate the following entering groups in Grade 1 in the years indicated:

The above figures do not include children from East and South-eastern Dunbarton, from which areas the children are now enrolled in the schools of Bow and Manchester on a tuition basis.

If we project these potential first graders over the next six-year period, we may expect the following enrollments:

In reference to the above figures, I can only repeat my statement of a year ago,—that beginning next fall and extending through the next five years, we are going to have an over-crowded condition in the Center School. We may be able to worry through the coming year (1953-54) but it is quite evident that the years following promise more youngsters than we can possibly accommodate and educate effectively. We undoubtedly will have to send a number of our pupils to surrounding communities, such pupils to be selected geographically or by grade (as for example, all grade 8 pupils to Concord and/or Goffstown). The only other solution would be to add a third room to the Center School, and until such time as we are certain that the increase is permanent in nature, this plan does not appear to be feasible.

Our second major problem is that of finance. School costs both for personnel and supplies have not leveled-off and are causing a steady increase in our gross budget. Secondary tuition, however, shows the greatest percent of increase over the last ten years. In 1941-42 we expended approximately \$1,900 for high school tuitions, while in 51-52 our payments totalled \$8,246, and our anticipated payments for the school year 1953-54 amount to \$9,970. The cause of this increase is due to a larger number of pupils attending high school and also to the increase in the tuition rate. In 1942 the tuition rate in Concord was \$100, while for 1953-54 the charge will be \$325 per pupil. In September 1942 we had 23 pupils attending neighboring high schools; in September 1953 we expect to have 34.

The problem of finance would not be as severe if our state funds had kept pace with the devaluation of the dollar and with the increased enrollments. In 1942-43 our state aid figure was approximately \$2,400. It increased slightly until in 1946-47 it was just under \$3,000. The legislature of 1947 increased state aid from \$400,000 to \$2,000,000, and Dunbarton's share jumped to \$5,961. However, the distribution of the \$600,000 approved by the legislature in 1951 reduced our share to an average of \$934 for the present biennium. It seems to me that the future of our schools depends upon sound and adequate financial aid from the state in order that the local tax-payers not be required to shoulder the whole burden of education.

At the annual district meeting in March 1952, an article was approved to adopt the Non-Partisan Ballot System. In carrying out the provisions of the state statutes, it has been necessary to make certain changes in the warrant. If you refer to copy of this year's warrant contained in these pages, you will note that the polls will open at 4 o'clock in the afternoon and remain open until 9 o'clock or until the close of the meeting, whichever time is the later. All business other than election of officers will begin at the customary hour of 8 o'clock.

Whether or not the Non-Partisan Ballot system is retained for future meetings will be dependent upon your reaction to an article in this year's warrant,—to see if you desire to continue such system or return to the method of election of officers previously used.

Fifty-six children had their teeth cleaned and fluoride applied by Mrs. Dorothy Powers, State Dental Hygienist.

Three children were taken to Dr. Backus for examination at his office.

One child is attending the Orthopedic clinic in Manchester every six months.

Glasses were obtained through the A. D. C. for one child and Orthopedic shoes for another. One child was taken to Dr. Dickerman's office for eye examination and glasses.

Thirteen children received the patch test during the year and all were negative.

From September 1951 until June 1952 there were:

- 8 cases of measles
- 1 appendectomy
- 1 fractured leg
- 1 fractured wrist
- 1 fractured arm
- 6 first aids.

This last fall we have had an epidemic of chicken pox.

It is hoped that in the near future we will be able to have the services of a physician for our school examinations.

In June 1952, we held Registration Day for all children who were to enter school the following September. The children were registered and given a party by their teacher. Each child was weighed, measured, and given a vision and hearing test by the school nurse.

Twenty home visits were made during the year.
